Who is To Blame For Drug Abuse ?

Is it parents' fault that many young people choose drugs as their "thing" in life? Is it the times? The generation gap? Something, surely, is causing the drug cult, with its accompany- that one was 101 for and 303 ing death, crime, and misery.

Professor Alvin Toffler in "Future Shock" (Bantam Books) charges that "Allan Ginsberg and Timothy Leary (are) the two men most responsible for creating the hippie life style, with heavy accent on drug use" and that the drug cultists promote their merchandise with high-powered promotional efforts "like any good corporation.

Toffler cites a letter from Ginsberg to Leary, in which Ginsberg wrote:

"Yesterday got on tv with N. Mailer and Ashley Montagu and gave a big speech. . . . recommending that everybody get high... Got in touch with all the liberal pro-dope people I know to have (a certain pro-drug report) publicized and circulated... I wrote a five-page summary of the situation to this friend Kenny The law of supply and demand Love on "The New York Times," and he said he'd perhaps do a story (newswise)... which could then be picked up by a U. P. friend on national wire. Also gave copy to Al Aronowitz on "New York Post" and Rosaline Constable at "Time" and Bob Silvers on "Harper's".

To this hard evidence that the liberal media, knowingly or not, collaborated with drug pushers, Toffler comments:

"No wonder LSD and whole hippie phenomenon received the mass media publicity it did. This partial account of Ginsberg's energetic air press agentry, complete with the Madison Avenue suffix 'wise' (as in newswise) reads precisely like an internal memo from Hill and Knowlton or any of the other giant public relations corporations whom hippies love to flagellate from 'manipulating' public opinion. The successful 'sale' of the hippie life style model to young people is one of the classic merchandizing stories of our time. Drugs and the drug cult did not, therefore, arise because parents or teachers, or clergymen, or the police of this generation are any less dedicated than those of past generations. We are burdened with a runaway drug problem because it is being sold as a way of life to young by the "liberal pro-dope people" and "mass media publicity."

Australia Now Perilously Leftist

One of the dominoes that has fallen or tilted as a result of the indecisive nature of the conflict in Indochina is Australia. The long no-victory war, together with the United States rapprochement with Communist China, combined to give a victory last December to the Australian Labor Party, in which Communists openly boast they hold the predominant power. Australia's was the second government to change as a result of American foreign policy in the Far East, the first having been Japan's.

Gough Whitlam, the new Australian Premier, has a sevenseat margin in the Parliament, although the Liberal Party with the Democratic Labor Party and the Country Party controls the Senate. The Communist exert their strength in the Labor Party through the 47 labor federations, which are Communistcontrolled. The top man in the Labor Party caucus is Dr. J. Cairns.

Immediately after its election the Labor Government recognized Communist China and withdrew recognition from the Republic of China on Taiwan. It also recognized Communist East Germany, and is planning recognition of the Red dictatorship controlling North Vietnam. Recently it entertained Yugoslav Prime Minister Bijedic, who presented a list of Croat-born Australians, who, he alleged, were "terrorists." Naturally. with Operation Keelhaul of World War II in mind, the 100,000 Croats in Australia are deeply concerned.

Dr. Cairns has denounced President Nixon as a "murderer and a maniac" and accused him of "genocide" for the bombing of North Vietnam last December that brought about the ceasefire agreement.

This Australian development is not a fortunate one.

Common Sense In Education

Recently, speaking at Lorraine County (Ohio) Community College, Dr. Max Rafferty, Ph. D., said that "Long before the end of the 20th century there is going to be a successful challenge to the arrogant assumption that teachers shouldn't be held responsible for the product they turn out." Rafferty advocates standardized testing as one measurement of children's performance.

"If we're still paying bad teachers the same amount we pay good teachers, then public education will be ready for the boneyard, " declared Rafferty. "And unless we drastically modify the network of State laws currently giving ironclad tenure to teachers so that we can fire the senile, the stupid and the subversive, public education is going to be a dead duck."

Asked, in the question and answer period, "As an advocate of patriotism, how do you explain to students America's mistakes, " Rafferty answered: "I tell them they love their mother. and their mother makes mistakes all the time; but that doesn't mean you can't love your mother."

Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that Easter is over. gardening can begin in earnest and we can try to overcome the set-back from the late freeze

Again I will remind you not to rush out and cut down evergreens that may look dead. It may take a month for new growth to begin showing. Too, it is advisable to prune off dead ends, branches or limbs of trees, except for pecans. They may come out and bloom again, giving a chance for a pecan crop this fall. If you haven't already fertilized, do so to help overcome the freeze damaged plants and trees.

Mums should be separated and planted this month, discarding the old center stem.

You can hasten the season by buying started plants if you lost seedlings during the cold. If in no hurry, there is plenty of time to plant the heat-loving annuals. Since the soil is warming up, seed should germinate much faster. Some are cosmos, amaranthus, celosia, marigold, zinnia, and portulaca.

When azaleas or camellias have finished blooming, feed them with special foods and soak into soil well. Repeat this application once or twice in 2 to 4 week intervals. Snip off any spent blooms and gather up flowers that have fallen to the ground to prevent insects and disease.

As flowers fade, cut tulips, hyacinths and daffodils, but remain until it matures and turns brown. If it doesn't rain soon, shrubs and newly planted trees should be watered. This is necessary for the new growth which is forming. --0--
