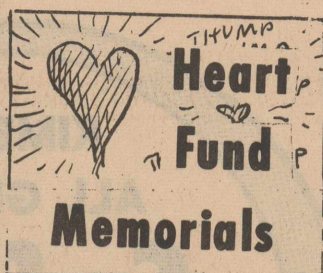

RECIPE

By Sarah Anne Sheridan

Sponge cake appeals to young and old and finds a place in spring menus. To mix sponge cakes—

1. Measure all ingredients. Sift sugar through a fine sifter one to four times before measuring, then sift four times.
2. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry, beat in gradually 1 tablespoon sugar for each egg white (out of sugar called for in recipe) and set aside.
3. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Beat in remaining sugar.
4. Combine yolks and whites.
5. Mix remaining dry ingredients and cut and fold into egg mixture. Do not beat after adding flour.
6. Do not grease pan.

Sponge Cake

- 1 c flour
- 1/4 t salt
- Grated rind 1/2 lemon
- 1 1/2 T lemon juice
- 1 c sugar
- 5 eggs.

Bake in tube pan in an oven 325 degrees for an hour. If in layer cake pans or individual tins, bake 25 to 30 minutes in an oven 350 degrees.

Museum Seminar Set For May In Odessa

A one-day seminar on basic principles of museum operation will be held in Lubbock Friday, May 4, sponsored by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

More than 100 persons involved in planning or operating museums in the Lubbock area are expected to attend the program, to be held in The Museum of Texas Tech University beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Top-ranking museum professionals will speak on how to form museum collections, documentation and research in the museum, exhibit techniques, educational programs, conservation of artifacts and documents, and operating a historic house museum.

Speakers will be Lonn Taylor, curator of Winedale Inn Properties at Round Top; Peter Rippe, director of the Harris County Heritage Society of Houston; Daniel Traverso, director of museum services, Texas State Historical Survey Committee, Austin; E. A. Carmean, educational curator, Houston Museum of Fine Arts; and Laurence Miller, curator of iconography, Humanities Research Center, University of Texas at Austin.

Lunch will be provided at the museum, and there will be an opportunity for informal discussion of individual museum problems with the seminar faculty and The Museum of Texas Tech University staff.

Turkeys Most Economical Buy For Homemakers

Turkeys tempt homemakers turning their heads as they bypass meat counters these days.

According to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, the big birds really are economical.

"Their fast growth--with most marketed at three to six months of age--and their efficient conversion of feed mean less money and time for producers compared to that of red meat production," she explained.

"Larger, whole turkeys prove the most economical even for small families. A large bird provides meat for the immediate meal with the remainder wrapped in meal-sized units and frozen for future use."

More specials on frying chicken make another poultry bargain, and eggs continue as an economical protein value, the specialist said.

"Grapefruit from the valley in heavy supply boasts attractive prices. Other fruit choices include oranges, apples, bananas, pineapples, and avocados."

Mrs. Clyatt blamed short supplies of some vegetables for their increased prices, and predicted a leveling of prices "as weather conditions level out."

Potatoes, carrots, bulk turnips, collards, mustard and turnip greens, along with Texas yellow onions, are among the most economical choices.

"Cottage cheese features appear on dairy counters, next to cream cheese, margarine, yogurt and low-fat milk."

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that Easter is over, gardening can begin in earnest and we can try to overcome the set-back from the late freeze.

Again I will remind you not to rush out and cut down evergreens that may look dead. It may take a month for new growth to begin showing. Too, it is advisable to prune off dead ends, branches or limbs of trees, except for pecans. They may come out and bloom again, giving a chance for a pecan crop this fall. If you haven't already fertilized, do so to help overcome the freeze damaged plants and trees.

Mums should be separated and planted this month, discarding the old center stem. You can hasten the season by buying started plants if you lost seedlings during the cold. If in no hurry, there is plenty of time to plant the heat-loving annuals. Since the soil is warming up, seed should germinate much faster. Some are cosmos, amaranthus, celosia, marigold, zinnia, and portulaca.

When azaleas or camellias have finished blooming, feed them with special foods and soak into soil well. Repeat this application once or twice in 2 to 4 week intervals. Snip off any spent blooms and gather up flowers that have fallen to the ground to prevent insects and disease.

As flowers fade, cut tulips, hyacinths and daffodils, but remain until it matures and turns brown. If it doesn't rain soon, shrubs and newly planted trees should be watered. This is necessary for the new growth which is forming.

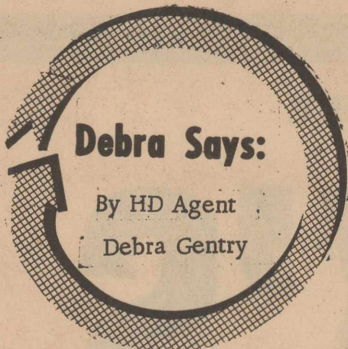

Choosing a ham to fit your taste and budget isn't always easy. But once you've made your decision and the ham is in your grocery cart, maintaining its wholesomeness is up to you. Ham, like all meat, naturally contains certain bacteria. Keeping it safe to eat means: Storing it properly, cooking it thoroughly, and handling leftovers with care.

With the exception of small (1 1/2-3 pound) canned ham, (not labeled "Perishable, Keep under Refrigeration"), and dry cured ham such as country style, and Smithfield-all ham must be refrigerated before cooking.

For best quality, a cured whole ham should be kept in the refrigerator no longer than 7 days. Any cured ham cuts smaller than a whole ham will keep in the refrigerator safely for 3-5 days. Unopened canned hams labeled "Perishable, keep under refrigeration" can be kept in the refrigerator up to six months without loss of quality, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Freezing is not recommended as a routine procedure for cured hams because of possible changes in flavor and texture. When necessary, cured hams may be frozen 1-2 months if wrapped closely, sealed tightly in moisture-resistant wrap and stored at 0 degrees F. or lower.

In the preparation and cooking of hams, proper sanitation is essential. Improper sanitation and handling can cause bacteria to grow and can result in food poisoning. According to 1971 statistics on food-borne illness, ham was the meat most often involved in cases of staph food poisoning. Staph food poisoning is rarely fatal, but the symptoms are nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps and diarrhea. Because these symptoms usually go away within 24-28 hours, it is often mistaken for the "24-hour flu."

When it comes to cooking ham, there are three temperatures to remember, depending on the kind of ham you select. If the ham is a canned or fully-cooked type, it may be eaten cold without any kind of advance preparation. Or, if you prefer it warm, heat it to an internal temperature of 140 degrees F.

If the ham is the cook-before-eating kind, simmer or bake it to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F. But if you are cooking shoulder cuts of pork like cured picnics or shoulder butts, heat them to an internal temperature of 170 degrees F. Fresh

ham, an uncured product, should be treated like fresh pork and heated to 170 degrees F. internal temperature, too. Once the meal is over, refrigerate ham immediately. Never leave it at room temperature for long. Staph germs multiply rapidly at temperatures between 45-115 degrees F. A good rule of thumb is: keep hot foods Hot (140 degrees F. or above) and cold foods Cold (40 degrees F. or below). Remember always that ham is a perishable product. If you have any reason to suspect leftover ham, throw it out. Staph toxin cannot be baked or boiled away.

The Crockett County Youth Center will hold open house Monday from 4 to 6 p.m. for all seventh graders.

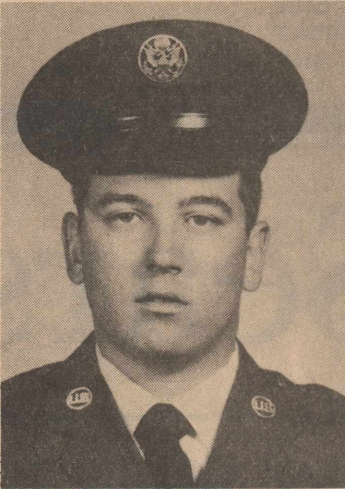
The event is being held to acquaint seventh graders, who will be in the eighth grade next year, with the facilities of the center. Students may become members of the youth center when they become eighth graders.
