**OHS Band Gets II Rating At Brady Contest**

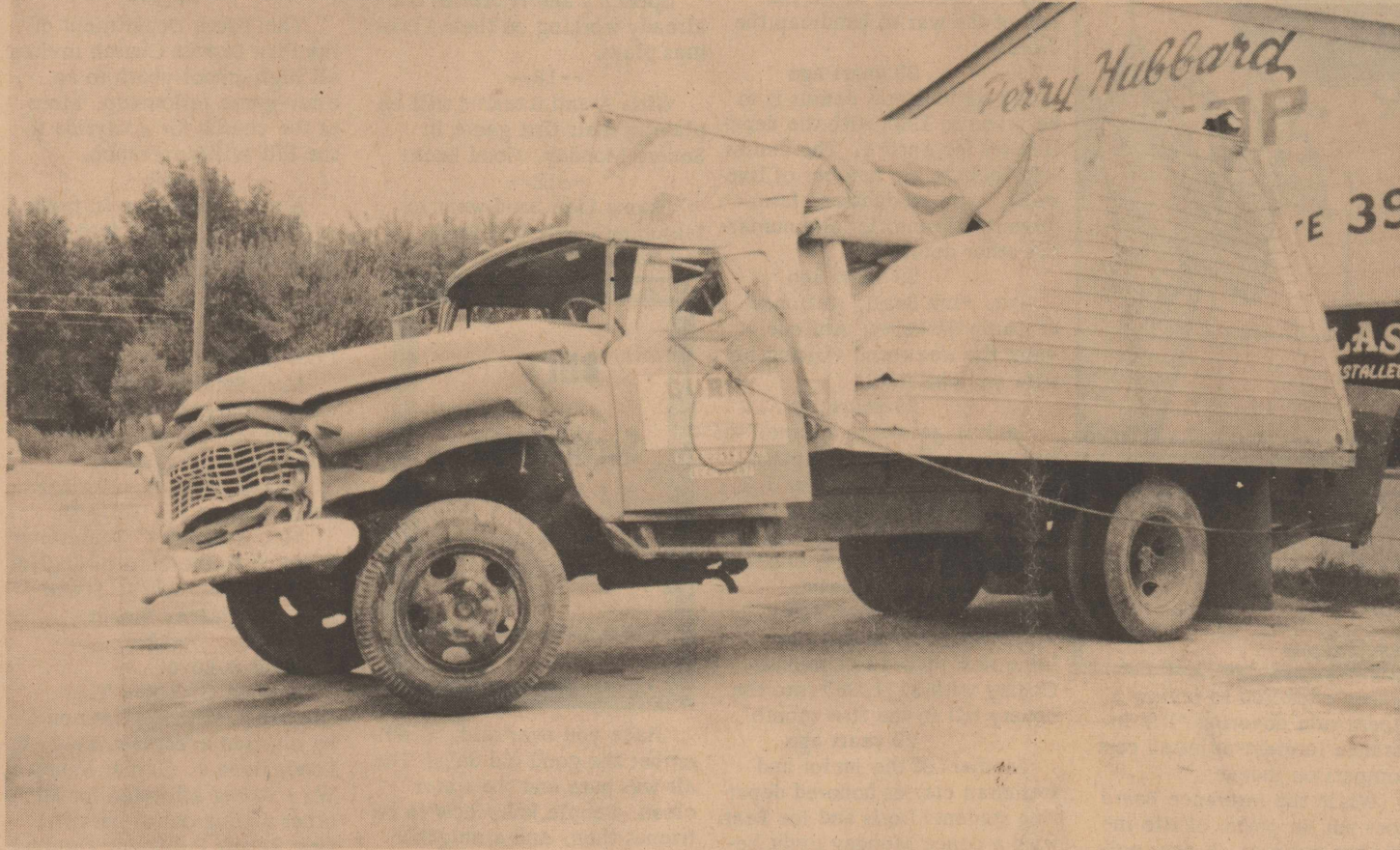

**Crockett County Commissioners Hold Routine Monthly Meeting**

Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular monthly meeting on Nov. 12 with the following members present: Troy Williams, Jess Marley, Jack Williams and Glenn Sutton.

Routine reports were received from the various boards. A letter from District Judge Sherrill appointing Eugene Upshaw District Probation Officer of the 83rd and 112th Judicial Districts was read and discussed. It is proposed that Mr. Upshaw have two assistant Probation Officers and individual counties may retain local probation officers for juvenile offenders and also for misdemeanor offenses; no action was taken.

It was reported to the Court that Dr. David Blanton has agreed to move to Ozona and expects to be in his office about Dec. 1. Dr. Blanton has

been practicing in Corpus Christi for the past 15 months, having moved there from Osage, Arkansas where he practiced for 3 years.

Rev. John Berkley appeared and discussed with the Court the possibility of soundproofing some of the rooms at the Coliseum-Auditorium.

Starley M. Lenamon and wife, Ginger, appeared and expressed an interest in operating the Ozona Airport if the

present operator should resign. J. D. Brown appeared and briefly discussed the removal of junk cars, the installation of new street signs and the proposed ordinance regarding traffic control. He was assured this would be placed on the December agenda.

Final bills were submitted by A. E. Morris in regards to the new County Maintenance

Building-it is almost completed.

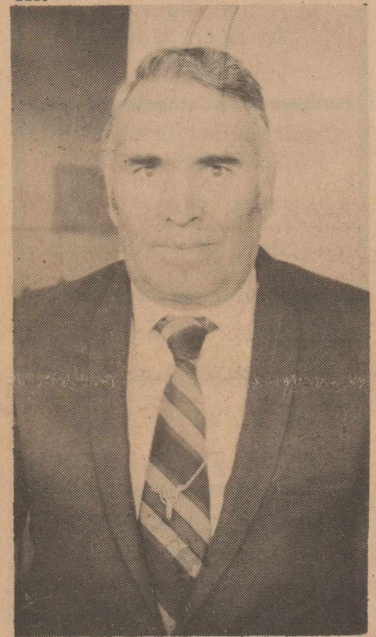

**Lions Skin Buffaloes 18-14 In Stanton, McCamey Here Friday**

Ozona's Lions skinned the Stanton Buffaloes last Friday night on the Buffaloes' own home range by a tally of 18-14. However, in the statistic department, the victory was much bigger. The Lions will take on McCamey here tomorrow night in the season finale for both teams.

McCamey is 3-1 in loop competition while the Lions are 2-2. However, the Lions have the distinction of being the only team in season play to knock off the Reagan County Owls, who cinched the district championship last Friday night with a win over Crane.

Should the Badgers manage a victory over the Lions, they would share the championship with the Owls, but the Owls would represent the district by virtue of their district win over McCamey.

The Lions really got their offense rolling over Stanton, racking up a total of 465 yards,

334 on the ground and 131 in the air.

The Lion defense held the Buffaloes scoreless until the final stanza, and they scored their final touchdown with only 57 seconds to go in the game.

Ozona scored on two big plays by quarterback Craig Taliaferro and a dazzling run by Romaldo Cervantez.

Taliaferro got the first Lion score on a sneak from a yard out to cap a 15-play, 79-yard drive.

The next Lion score came

when Taliaferro hit Rick Hunicutt with a 60-yard scoring aerial.

Cervantez scored his touchdown on a 46-yard run around left end.

**Contract Let For Hiway Construction**

October 16, bids were taken and a contract was let by the Texas Highway Department in Austin, for the construction of another section of Ranch to Market Road 1973 south of Ozona. This construction will be grading, structures and surfacing on approximately five miles of RM 1973, extending from the end of the existing completed section, southwest for five miles. The contract was awarded to the low bidder, Allan Construction Company, Inc., of San Antonio, Texas.

A Pre-Construction Conference was held Nov. 12 in the office of the Resident Engineer in Ozona, with representatives of Allan Construction Company, Inc., and the Texas Highway Department present. The purpose of this meeting was to secure closer cooperation between the personnel of the various interested parties, concerning the construction and accounting procedures, as well as the safety and convenience of the traveling public through this project during construction. The requirements of safe construction practices were also discussed, as well as the fact that this is an Equal Employment Opportunity Project. A review and discussion of all signing and sequence work called for by the plans and specifications was held.

Representatives of Allan Construction Company, Inc., stated that their plans call for the erecting of the barricades on or about Nov. 13. The construction of the drainage structures would follow shortly along with the stockpiling of the base material. Following this will be the grading and base operations with a final operation of surfacing planned for early April, 1974.

This project will follow the location of an existing county road and will be built carrying the present traffic. There will be short detours around structure sites, and later, base finishing operations. The public is requested to cooperate by complying with all barricade and warning signs.

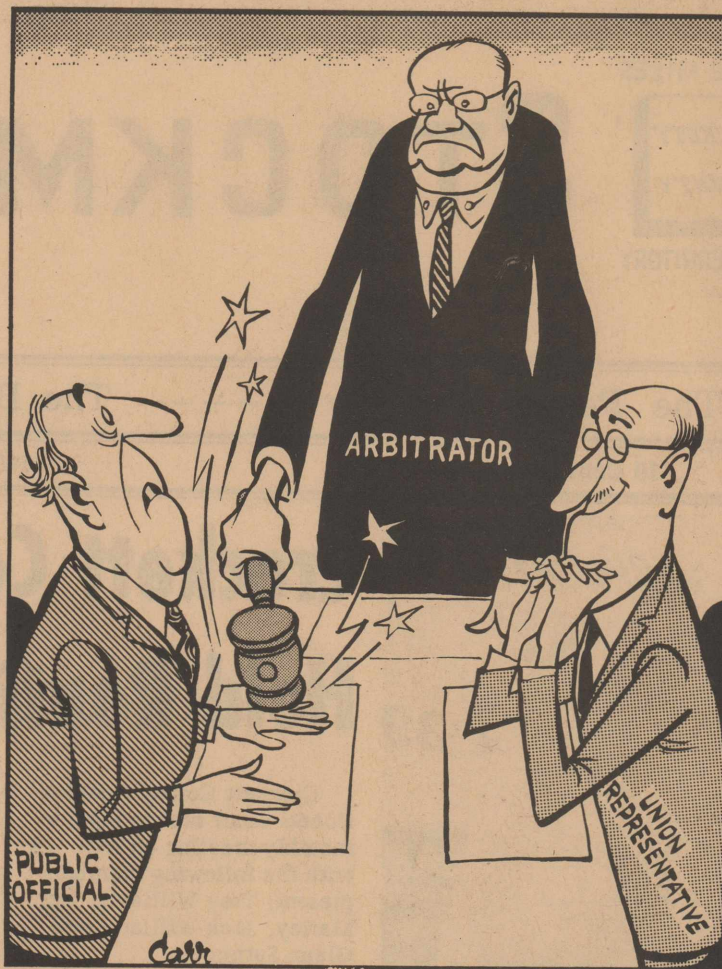
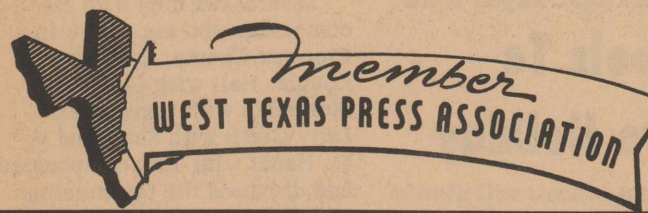

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

Outlook for a bleak winter grew steadily worse as the energy crisis mounted. Speed limit reductions and year-around daylight savings time, recommended by President Richard Nixon, may be some of the milder results.

While the Insurance Board does not set prices of life insurance policies, it does police misleading and deceptive sales practices. Board Chairman Joe Christie said calculation of life insurance costs through the cash-surrender value doesn't always show true cost to purchasers.

Grimmest of all was Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Langdon's forecast. "Some people in Texas are going to be cold this winter."

Middle distillate fuels, used primarily to generate electricity--and of increasing importance due to the shortage of natural gas--may also be in short supply as much as 400,000 barrels daily, according to Langdon's estimate.

Meanwhile, the Nixon administration altered previously announced allocation policies to allow middle distillate suppliers to provide Texas customers diesel fuel, fuel oil and kerosene without limit through November.

Even in the reprieve from mandatory allocations, there was an implied warning to Texas electric utility companies; come December they may be running short of fuel oil, since allocation formulas are based on 1972 purchases.

Things apparently are going to get a lot worse before they get better on the energy front. PAY AMENDMENT DEFEAT ASSESSED--For the fifth time in eight years Texans voted down a pay raise for legislators and assessments of the reason why varied widely.

House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr. and others concluded that the vote on the \$15,000-annual-pay-annual-sessions amendment was due to "tragic events at the national level that have crushed public confidence in our political and governmental systems."

Not so, said Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Granberry, who maintained lawmakers asked too much salary and made an error in coupling the pay raise issue with that of annual sessions.

Granberry suggested voters will approve \$8,000 to \$10,000 salaries and limited annual sessions with proper leadership support and a clear presentation.

At any rate, Texans undoubtedly will get to ballot on the issue again in some form after next year's constitutional convention. Most-likely proposal will be creation of a commission of citizens, as recommended by the Constitutional Revision Commission, to set salaries of lawmakers and other state officials.

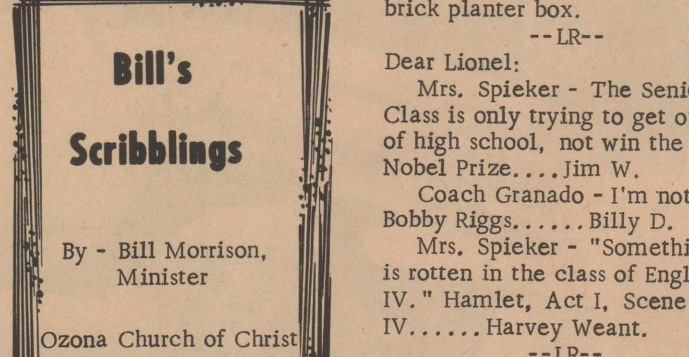

The Kenaf Plant

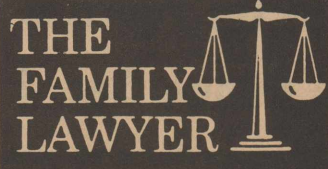

Dying Babies

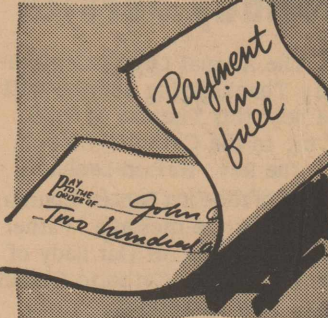
A flap in the press and public opinion forums of the country was recently kicked up when the chief of staff of a Connecticut hospital said candidly that in many hospitals infants born with serious, incurable defects were, after consultation with parents, allowed to die. Parents choose between various operations, artificial feeding and various other means to keep infants with serious, incurable defects alive--to delay death, the doctor said. If they choose to let nature take its course, the infants get reasonable care and support until death occurs naturally.



THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Payment In Full"

Suppose somebody owes you money. According to your figures, the amount is \$300. But the debtor insists that the amount is only \$200. One day you receive a check from him for \$200. On the back he has written the words: "PAYMENT IN FULL."



True, with the \$200 check in your hands, you might be reluctant indeed to let it go. One man in this predicament tried to steer a middle course. He erased the word "FULL" and substituted the word "PART," then cashed the check.

However, his strategy did not work. A court held later that he had no claim to any more money. The court said he had no authority, on his own, to alter the terms of the defendant's offer.

Another man tried something else. He too cashed a PAYMENT IN FULL check, but at the same time wrote the debtor that he simply was not accepting it as a full settlement.

But again, a court ruled that the entire debt was wiped out. The court said the man's actions in cashing the check spoke louder than his words of disavowal.

Even if you don't cash the check but merely hang onto it, you might be held to have accepted the debtor's offer. Silence can mean consent.

However, that wouldn't happen right away. In one case, a creditor kept such a check for six weeks before mailing it back to the debtor. The latter thereupon insisted that the delay had cancelled the entire debt.

But a court decided the debt was still due and payable. The court thought six weeks was not an unreasonable time, under the circumstances, for the creditor to weigh his next move.

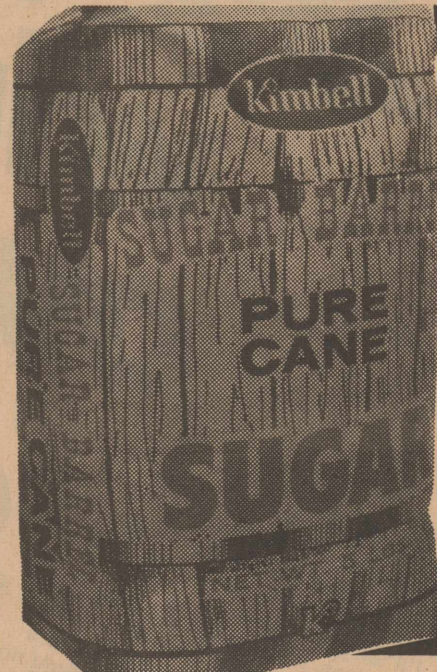

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Since we barely escaped a killing frost several times, be sure to make preparation to protect tender outdoor plants, and move house plants inside on short notice.

While the days are so beautiful and warm, I am reluctant to bring plants in or cover them up.

All the way to Galveston every area was a luscious green making our drive most enjoyable. It was a bit early for the colorful foliage, except the sumac along the highway was almost at its best. As we neared home these wide open spaces gave us a welcome nowhere else can give.

Drive over our city and enjoy the colorful foliage, roses,

mums and many other fall plants that are displayed in so many yards.

If you have the perennial or Chinese hibiscus, they need to be protected from freezes. They should be cut back to near ground level and mounded with soil.

Also cut tops of browned peonies back to a few inches above the ground, add a cup of bone-meal to soil around the plant and mound with soil for the winter.

Keep pansies fertilized and watered if no rain, to keep them growing well.

Continue the fall cleanup this month and especially after the leaves fall. Clean gutters and drains of leaves that may prevent their normal functions. Prune shrubs and tree limbs that may rub and damage your house or roof.

Keep after slugs, snails and pillbugs. Repeated baiting produces the best results. Watch for other diseases and pests.

Lawns should not be cut too short for the last mowing to provide more protection for the grass roots.

Plan to start planting bulbs every ten days this month and next for a succession of blooms in the spring.

Anemones are among favorite plants, and should be planted this month. The tuberous-rooted anemones are the most successful in our area. The three most popular ones are the Greek (A. blanda) with deep blue flowers; poppy flowered (A. coronaria) with flowers in shades of pink, red, white and blue; and scarlet windflower (A. fulgens) with vivid red blooms. Plant 1 to 2 inches deep, 6 to 8 inches apart in light, rich, well-drained soil.

Does your iron skillet get rusty? Don't leave iron skillets out to air dry after washing. Moisture causes rust--whether the skillet is seasoned or not. After washing and towel-drying an iron skillet, make sure it's completely dry by putting it over the range pilot light. Or, with an electric range, place it over very low heat for a few minutes.

The heat "cooks out" all moisture, helping prevent rust. Should rust appear, scrub away the blemishes with soap or detergent and a scouring pad or brush. Season iron skillets at least every six months--more often if in frequent use. To season a skillet, first wash it carefully, rinse and dry. Then liberally coat the inside with vegetable oil or shortening. Heat skillet so the oil permeates the porous surface.

The old American art of quilting has been revived. Quilting materials--such as batting, backing and edge finishes--are now available in many colors. Our ancestors used old clothing as pieces for quilt blocks. Today's seamstress can too--or buy fabrics to suit the pattern.

Many magazines offer patterns for quilts and how-to-do-it instructions. Or some people design their own. Beginning quilters--or those wanting a simple project--might consider purchasing a quilt design pre-printed on fabric. Instead of using the traditional patchwork or applique method, simply quilt around the design. This pre-printed quilt is a good idea for someone who's a bit afraid to undertake a complete quilting project on her own.

**BUTTERMILK PIE**

- 1-1/3 c. sugar
  - 3 Tbsp. flour
  - 2 eggs
  - 1/2 c. melted margarine
  - 1 c. thick buttermilk
  - 2 tsp. vanilla
  - 1 tsp. lemon extract
- Combine sugar and flour. Beat eggs thoroughly. Add to the sugar and flour mixture. Add melted margarine and buttermilk. Mix well. Add extracts, pour into chilled 9-inch unbaked pastry shells. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Then reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake for 35 minutes more without opening door.

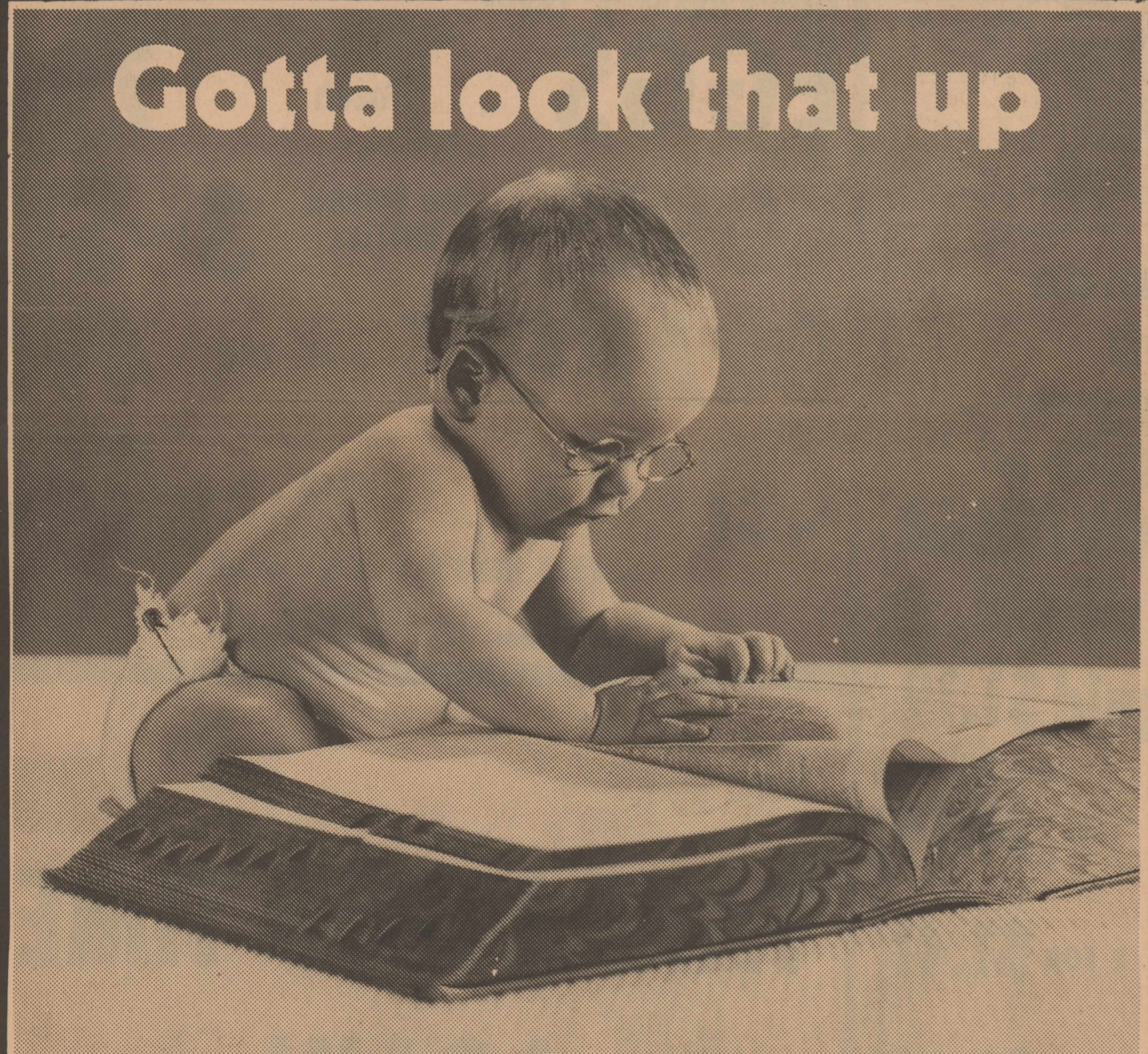

 We adults haven't outgrown the hunger for knowledge. Most of us recognize that our scientific and material progress points up the crucial need for spiritual standards to believe in. God has vital truth to impart to men. The place to look it up is your church.

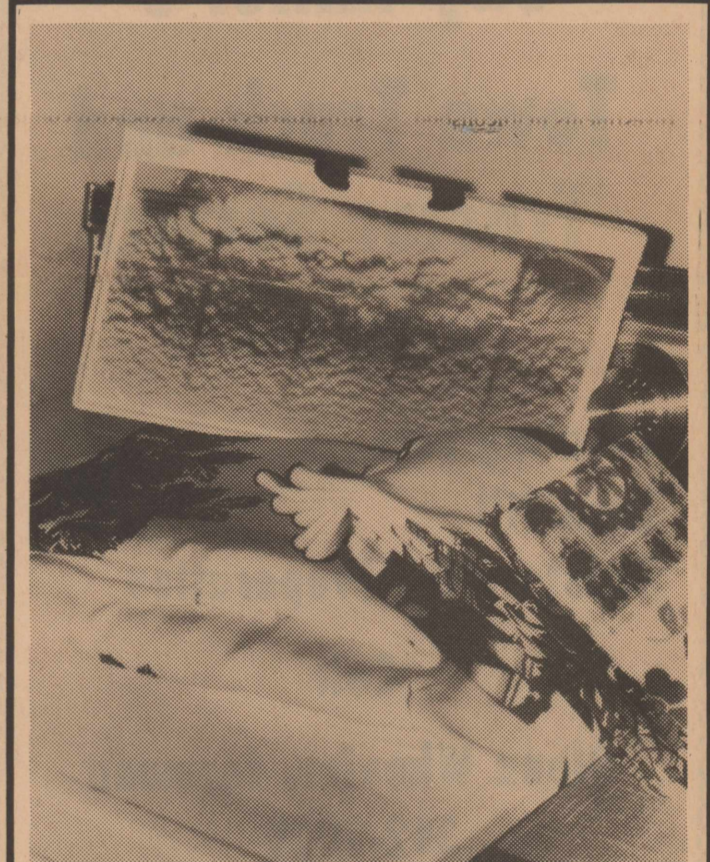

## Exotic Aoudad Sheep Not Really A Sheep

Not that it really makes any difference but what is popularly known as the aoudad "sheep" is not really a sheep.

Before proud aoudad trophy owners rip down their prizes, let us explain that the aoudad is a member of the genus Ammotragus which is closely related to both true domestic and wild sheep as well as goats. Such a pedigree should not make the aoudad or Barbary sheep any less prized by sportsmen.

Aoudad sheep hunting is one of the most challenging sports in Texas. Unlike deer and antelope, aoudad do not have any large patches of white on their bodies to aid the hunter in sighting the animals.

A native of the Atlas Mountains in northern Africa, some 44 of these sheep were first released in 1957 in the Panhandle's Palo Duro Canyon.

The hunt is physically demanding and in some instances the kill is just the beginning of hard work if no pack animals are available to haul out a 300 pound ram.

According to a questionnaire sent to some 900 aoudad hunters by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, 90 percent of the hunters declared that aoudad meat was good if cared for properly.

Responses ranged from "better than either deer, antelope or elk" to "everyone took a helping of both roast beef and Barbary sheep at a recent lodge dinner and those who returned for seconds took the Barbary sheep."

The New Mexico survey also found that 94 percent of the hunters would hunt aoudad again if they had the opportunity and 73 percent of them regarded the aoudad as an excellent game animal.

There are now an estimated 3,217 aoudad in Texas and only the approximately 600 animals in the Palo Duro Canyon area are considered game animals by the Parks and Wildlife Department and regulated as such.

Aoudad season in this portion of Texas is Nov. 10-16, limit of one sheep per season by permit only.

Elsewhere in the state there are no closed seasons or bag limits.

Prior to introduction of aoudad in the Palo Duro, the Panhandle had only a few species of wildlife to attract big game hunters. Some mule and white tailed deer lived around the perimeter of the canyon, but the population was small and little hunted.

Food habits of the big sheep indicate that it can compete with both mule deer and cattle. However, the aoudad browses the more difficult and rugged areas of the canyon. Mule deer usually stay on the gentler slopes and cattle seldom venture at all onto the treacherous sides.

Barbary sheep or aoudad are remarkably disease-free in both the wild and captivity. New Mexico studies show that of 100 species shot and examined only one--an old sheep--was in poor health.

Potential predators include cougars, coyotes and bobcats but no instances of predation on the well-armed sheep have been recorded.

Adapted to both heat and cold, aoudad have the curious habit of digging in soft, moist sand with their horns to dissipate heat.

The horns have small ridges which seem to increase the surface area much like the fins of a radiator.

Little heat is produced in the horns but they serve as conductors.

Driving their horns into moist sand helps in removing heat by conduction.

Tough, adaptable animals these aoudad.

### Turkey Supplies Down, Demand Up

The demand for turkeys will increase as the holiday season approaches, and that trend plus fewer birds in cold storage will keep prices up over the next few months.

That's the contention of Dr. David B. Mellor, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

According to Mellor, turkey prices generally are more stable than broiler and egg prices because most turkeys are sold frozen or in some processed form, such as turkey pie. However, cold storage stocks have

gone down due to increased demand this year, so prices have increased.

Citing figures from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mellor notes that turkey production so far this year is about two per cent above that of 1972. However, production during the remainder of the year--usually a heavy marketing season--will be lower.

Cold storage holdings on September 1 totaled 261 million pounds, down 53 million pounds from a year earlier.

According to the Texas A&M University System specialist, retail turkey prices averaged 55 cents a pound in 1972 and are now near the record levels of 1948-49.

"But turkeys are still a good buy," contends Mellor, "when you consider how much other goods and services have increased in recent years. The average factory worker today can buy almost two more pounds of turkey with wages from one hour of labor than he could in 1959."

Mellor invites consumers to buy more turkey for nutritious meals abounding in high quality protein. "Turkeys are 'in season' the year round!"

The man who planned to accomplish something worthwhile in 1973 hasn't long in which to make good.

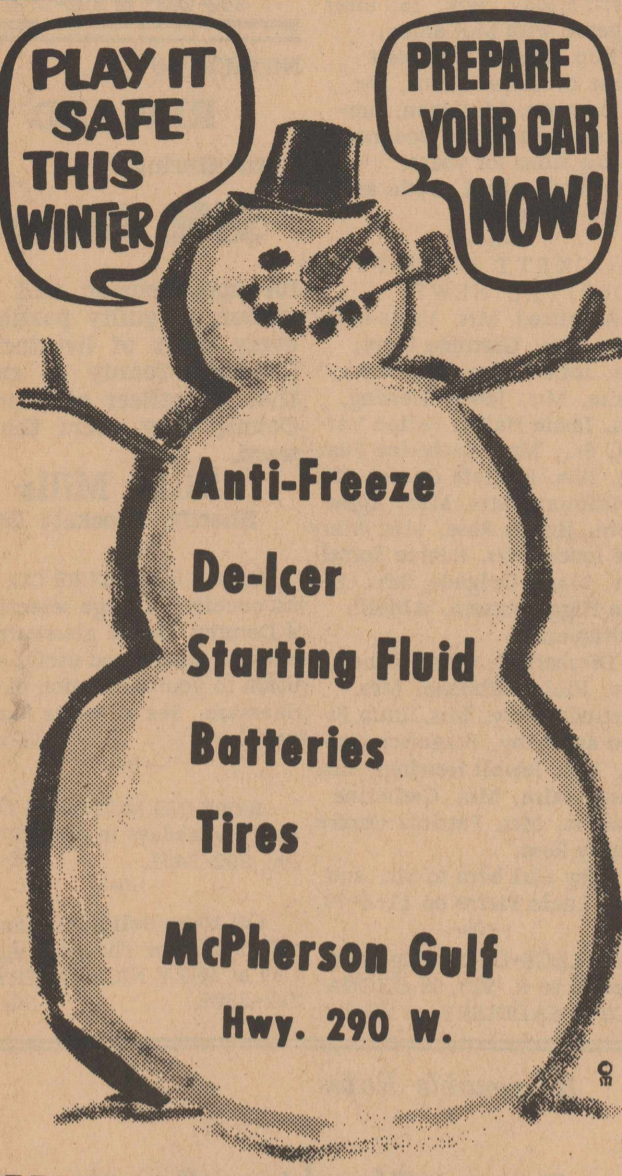

### Applications Being Taken Now For Supplement Pay

The Social Security Administration is asking for help in getting information to people who may be eligible for the supplemental security income payments that start in January for people with little or no income who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled.

"If you know of someone 65 or older who is in need, or a blind or disabled person, regardless of age, who needs financial help and they aren't getting public assistance now, please tell them about the new program. And, suggest that they call the social security office

to get more information." Supplemental security income will establish a nationally uniform income floor for people in need who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled. The amount of the payments they get will depend on how much other income they might have.

Eligible people with no other income at all will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 for a couple, according to Mr. Talbot. People in institutions or with other income may get reduced supplemental security income checks, he said.
