Friday, County Judge Troy Williams informed the Stockman that the court gave \$25 per month raises to employees of the road department, sheriff's department and other non-elected courthouse personnel, at the first meeting of the year.

## Election Season Coming Up For Crockett County Voters

Several elections are coming up for Crockett County voters. Election for four school board members will be held April 6, with the election for two directors of the Crockett County Water District board to be held the same day. The Democratic Party Primary will be held May 4, with several county posts to be decided upon as well as state, district and federal offices.

Locally offices for County Judge, Justice of the Peace Precinct #1, Commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, County and District Clerk and County Treasurer will be on the ballot. Filing deadline for these positions is February 4. Filing deadline for school board and water board is March 5.

On the federal, state and district levels, the May 4 primary will be of special interest in the races for state representative for this area as well as Congressman for the 21st District of Texas of which Crockett County is a part. Incumbents for both positions will not be in the race this year, leaving a wide open field for remaining candidates. Hilary Doran, who has served as state representative for the 70th Legislative District, for almost eight years has declined to run for another term in office. O. C. Fisher, who has served for many years in the U. S. Congress House of Representatives, did not file for re-election due to reasons of health. Several candidates have filed for the

### Fire Dept. Tells Disaster Signals

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department has announced a system for giving the community a signal in case of a natural disaster. In case of fire, flood, tornado, etc., the siren will sound for three minutes up and down the scale.

The siren will continue to go off for daytime fires to signal firemen, until 10 p. m. After that time, radios installed in the homes of firemen will alert the fire-fighter in case of night time fire.

### Graham Family Is Topic For Historical Society

The fun and serious side of life in a small West Texas town shortly after the turn of the century, the ups and downs of the family of a young lawyer just starting out to practice there after a trial at homesteading in the Plains, was the story of the N. W. Graham family in Ozona as told to the Crockett County Historical Society Monday night.

The story was told by a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Graham White, admittedly "biased" she said and from a daughter's view of a family that "daughters out". The Grahams had three daughters, Mrs. White, Mrs. Clinton (Leta) Glover and Mrs. Hugh (Rachel) Childress.

Although their roots were elsewhere, Mr. and Mrs. Newton Wesley Graham made their home in Ozona from 1905. Mrs. Graham was a York, and the story is, said Mrs. White, that every York is a descendant of the British House of York.

The Graham roots were likewise in the British Isles--the Duke of Montrose was of the Graham clan in Scotland.

"Grandfather was an imposing figure of a man, six feet four inches, curly hair and electric blue eyes. He was the product of a bit of feudin' history, the Grahams and the Barnes. Robert Graham and the Barnes girl slipped away and were married and Grandfather was a son of that union."

Violence was the order of the time then but her father was always a kindly, gentle man who in his role as lawyer helped many persons who found

themselves in trouble. Although he was Crockett County attorney for many years, until he resigned at the end of his term in 1953, and served for a time as district attorney, he was always concerned with defense as well as prosecution.

### Del Rio Woman Is Candidate For State Rep.

Susan Gurley McBee of Del Rio has announced that she has filed her candidacy with State Democratic Chairman Calvin Guest for state representative of the 70th Legislative District.

Mrs. McBee seeks to follow in the footsteps of her mother, Mrs. Dorothy Gillis Gurley, who served two terms in the Legislature from 1950-1954, representing this district.

The tradition of public service is long established in Mrs. McBee's family. Her grandfather, Roger Gillis, served as county judge of Val Verde County and her great-grandfather was an early day district judge. Her uncle, Walter Gillis, served as county commissioner. Her mother presently serves as Val Verde County Democratic Chairman.

Those whose terms expire on the school board are Joe Bean, Charlie Fuantoz, Sam Perner and George Bunker, Jr. All but Bunker had filed for re-election with the County Judge as of the first of this week. On the water board, the terms of Lowell Littleton and J. W. Johnigan expire. Both have indicated that they wish to serve another term.

### Mrs. Stuart Receives ASU B.A. Degree

Chesta Ann Stuart of Ozona was among 134 students to receive degrees from Angelo State University at the conclusion of the fall semester.

Mrs. Stuart received a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in English.

As the result of a new policy on graduation, students at Angelo State will receive degrees at the end of the fall semester, the end of the spring semester and at the end of the second term of the summer session.

Of the 134 degrees granted there were 8 Master of Arts in Teaching degrees, 32 Bachelor of Arts degrees, 31 Bachelor of Business Administration degrees and 63 Bachelor of Science degrees.

### Wildcat Set In Southwest Part Of County

Henderson & Erickson, Midland, will drill a 7,800-foot Ellenburger gas wildcat in Crockett County, three miles southwest of Ozona, 5/8 mile west-northwest of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multi-pay field, 5 1/2 miles west of the Ozona, East (Ellenburger gas) field and 3/4 mile south-southwest of the depleted opener and lone producer in the Humble-Cox (Strawn gas) field and 1 1/4 miles west-southwest of an 8,668-foot failure. It is the No. 3 C. W. Meadows.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,950 feet from the west lines of 4-QR-D&E.

The family's roots are deeply embedded in this district, where they have lived and ranched for more than 90 years --almost a century.

But while Mrs. McBee feels her background makes her well aware of the problems, interests and needs of the nine-county district, she stressed that she is more interested in looking ahead to the future than back at the past.

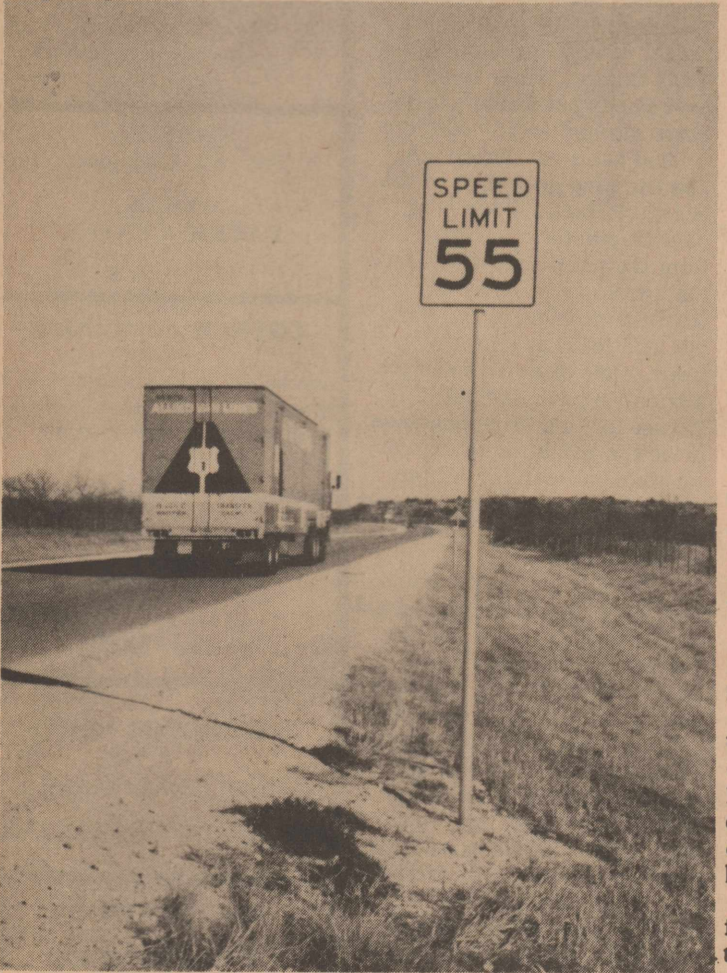
"I am the mother of a seven year old son and I look forward to his growing up and living in this district," she pointed out.

W. Graham and Della York at Crews, Texas, the daughter related. Mr. Graham taught school for a time and then in the pioneer spirit, homesteaded a section of land in Lynn County near Tahoka. He freighted to nearby towns to supplement his income from farming and stock raising.

The family started out in a dugout home while he was building a home on the land.

"I came along before the house was completed," Mrs. White said, "adding to the burdens of the time. But everything went well until one day while Daddy was away on a freighter trip, Mother went out the back door of the newly built house to feed the chickens. As she set the chicken feed pan on the back step a rattlesnake struck at her hand, but fortunately struck the pan. Mother killed the snake and left it near the back step.

"When Daddy came home that night and the house was still and quiet, and when he saw the dead snake, visions of disaster floated before his mind--of a wife, dead from a snake bite, doing all she could for the baby to the end, without any means of going or calling for help. The experience so shook him up that he immediately went about selling his claim."

With that experience, he moved with his family to Austin where he enrolled in the University of Texas and was graduated from the University law school. With his law degree and license to practice, he first hung out his shingle in San Angelo, later moving to Sonora.

"It was always a matter of pride for Daddy that he was invited to come here," she said. "Judge Davidson was practicing here, but there were some who thought the town needed another lawyer and invited him to come." The second daughter, Leta, had come along by that time and she remembers coming with her father to look for a house. The first house was about where the Paul Perner home is now, she said, and in 1910, Mr. Graham announced to his family that he had bought a house. "And it has a whole bathroom," he announced and the family was thrilled.

Along with his practice of law, Mr. Graham later took on the insurance business. Among his first policies was a general policy covering the home of his neighbor, Pleas Childress. When a severe hail storm came, Mr. Childress had the laugh on his insurance man neighbor, for he had insurance and Mr. Graham had none. He, in partnership with Judge Davidson, bought what is now the Crockett County Abstract Co., which he managed until his death.

"In the late years of his life he was glad for having the insurance business for he was able to turn it over to Coralie Meinecke, who was his secretary for so many years and who made those late years so much easier for him," Mrs. White said. Mrs. Meinecke's son, Bud, still operates the business.

Mr. Graham practiced law and dealt in real estate. He served on the school board in Ozona, he made speeches for Liberty Bonds during World War I, he was manager of the Federal Land Bank Association in Crockett County and served as secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assn. during the tenure of T. A. Kincaid, Sr. as president of that organization.

"In the period of World War I, Daddy went in the cattle business," Mrs. White related. "There came a prolonged drought and since feed in those days was not readily available, the venture proved a disaster.

After that, he decided that the fellow who owned the land had the best of it so he began acquiring ranch lands, buying and later selling ranches in south Crockett county and in Burnet county. He then bought land in Terrell county, the Schwalbe ranch on the Pecos, a ranch in the Block Y county near Dryden and later the Fencie Bates place, also on the Pecos, all of the lands still owned by the family."

While mainly recounting the story of her family in Ozona, Mrs. White painted some pictures of early Ozona--how she admired Dr. Clayton's auto, the first in town, and how she wondered why it didn't run away when he left it--of how awe-struck she was at the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Perner--of Big Dick, the family's buggy horse--of the still vivid picture of the first electric light in their home, the single bulb that hung from the ceiling--of bake days at Mrs. Holmsley's when she was forbidden to ask but sat on Mrs. H's front step until she was invited in for a slice--and of how her father shined all the family shoes each Sunday morning getting ready for Sunday School and church.

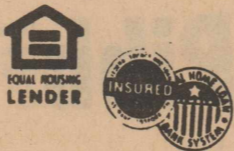

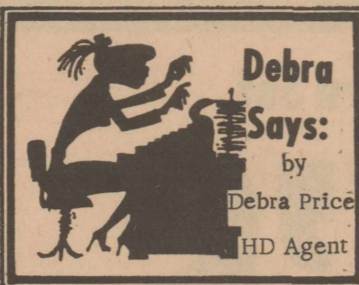

As a home sewer do you have problems fitting pants? Pants need to fit and sit well for comfort, because they outline the figure.

Like skirts, pants patterns are selected by waist measure. However, if hips measure more than corresponding hip measure on the chart, buy the size that fits your hips.

Have someone help you take your measurements accurately. Tie a string or narrow belt around your waistline so you know exactly where it is. If you normally wear a girdle with your pants, wear it when you take measurements.

You may have a figure with waist and hip measurements perfectly matching those on the pattern, but your body and leg length may vary. For a perfect fit, compare your waist, hip, crotch, leg and thigh measurement with the pattern.

To Measure Crotch: Sit on hard chair or table and measure the distance from your waistline to the chair. Add 3/4" for ease.

To Measure Crotch Seam: (for full or rounded figures only). Stand in a normal position and measure between your legs from front waistline to back waistline. Add 3" for ease.

To Measure Leg Length: At side, measure from waistline to the point where you want pants

to end. Add the hem depth. To Measure Thighs: Measure around the fullest part of the upper leg (thigh). Add about 2 1/2" for ease. (This depends on the style and how snug you like to wear your pants.)

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

The goal of the newly organized National Horticulture Committee appointed by the new national president, Mrs. Mary Kittel of Ft. Worth, shall be to promote gardening and influence all members and others to become personally engaged in growing. Personal involvement will enable members to share their plants and knowledge with others and introduce them to the exciting and enormous rewards of gardening. Trying new plants is part of the fun of gardening. It seems that many who are introducing new plants are striving for fragrance.

Announced last June were three roses that were named as All-American Rose Selections for 1974. 'Perfume Delight' is a highly fragrant hybrid tea, superb for cutting, with brilliant large blooms on long stems. 'Bahia' is an orange-pink floribunda with perfectly-formed small fragrant flowers. 'Bon-Bon' is a bicolor cream and deep rose floribunda with a neat compact plant useful for landscape purposes. Jackson & Perkins introduced three new 1974 Roses of the Year. 'Red Masterpiece', a hybrid tea with blooms of deep red color, classic form, long stems, and good fragrance. They grow on a vigorous upright plant with shiny dark foliage. 'Jadis' (pronounced jah dee) is a vigorous light hybrid that grows 4 to 5 feet high in spreading style, blooms are smooth light pink, rather loose when open to their full 4 or 5 inches, with strong fragrance and long stems. 'Antigua' is a hybrid tea of very vigorous growth habit, producing wide long-stemmed blooms blending gold, apricot and rose tint and a fruity fragrance.

Fragrance adds a pleasure to the world of flowers. Kinds with fragrance are considered more enjoyable than kinds not having it. This has been the reasoning behind a long sustained effort on the part of many breeders of gladiolus to

add fragrance to this favorite flower. One step forward in the breeding effort toward creating gladiolus with fragrance is the new variety, 'Peterson's' Fragrant.
