Several elections are coming up for Crockett County voters. Election for four school board members will be held April 6, with the election for two directors of the Crockett County Water District board to be held the same day. SOLZHENITSYN: ONE MAN'S COURAGE



WHAT GOOD IS SPACE RESEARCH?

Some folks have questioned our expenditure of millions of dollars for our space program. "What good is it," they ask, "to launch men into space or put them on the moon? Couldn't we spend the money better back here on good old earth?"

Of course, the answer is: the money is being spent right here on earth, providing jobs for thousands of workers and scientists, who in turn spend their money for necessities of life, thereby providing jobs for hundreds of thousands of others.

In addition, however, there is the factor of secondary "spinoffs" from our space research and development programs scientific discoveries which provide very direct and material benefits to our people. Without the extreme demands and far-out requirements of space exploration, many of these discoveries might not have been made - at least, in the forseeable future.

For example, to monitor how well our astronauts rest, space research developed a miniaturized "broadcasting station" the size of a tiny pill, no bigger than a vitamin capsule. Now it is being used by the medical profession to detect and broadcast information as it travels through a person's alimentary tracts. During its two-day trip, it can often reveal internal disorders, thus constituting a very valuable diagnostic aid.

Another electronic device was invented to solve problems of a film drive system for aerial photography. Today, the instrument, called a multiple microprobe, has been adapted for the recording of electrical activity in the brain. Medical researchers have been thus provided with a new tool to gain understanding of the complex patterns of brain response to various stimuli, which ultimately may lead to improvements in the treatment of epilepsy and various forms of mental instability.

Since communication has been a major factor in space flights, an enormous number of new discoveries have been made and it may take years to apply all of them to practical use. For example, one microelectronic, two-way radio circuit contains the equivalent of 93 separate components, yet it is no larger than a while, have registered with the pencil point. From this space technology has been produced a pocket-size, highly reliable two-way radio which weighs less than 18 ounces; a valuable assist for police departments, industrial firms and others requiring high quality, portable communications.

To solve space requirements in electro-optics, a device was designed to measure only one half inch by one quarter inch by one eight inch, yet it contains 300 glass tubes, each having a diameter less than that of a human hair. This tiny block of microscopic glass tubes, installed in a standard hearing aid microphone, greatly improve the hearing ability for those who wear hearing aids.

fits your hips. Have someone help you take your measurements accurately. Tie a string or narrow belt around your waistline so you know exactly where it is. If your pants, wear it when you

take measurements. You may have a figure with waist and hip measurements perfectly matching those on the

pattern, but your body and leg length may vary. For a perfect fit, compare your waist, hip, crotch, leg and thigh measure-

ment with the pattern. To Measure Crotch: Sit on hard chair or table and measure the distance from your waistline to the chair. Add 3/4" for
