IT'S NOT THE SHORTAGE

The fact that we have a fuel shortage in this country is not what is bugging us. Our big beef is the way in which it is being handled.

At the outset, most Americans set their thermostats back 6 to 10 notches and began wearing sweaters. Oh, there was some grumbling and some who still do not think there is any real shortage refused to do with less heat and light.

Then everyone seemed to get into the act. Congress, the White House, the Executive Branches of the Federal Government, and the State Government all began issuing statements or proposing regulations or passing legislation that each day brought more woe.

Two of the outstanding examples were the return to daylight saving time and the gasoline allocation.

Utility spokesmen and school officials have confirmed that daylight saving time has saved very little if any power throughout the nation. On the other hand, it has created a real danger to children who have to go to school in the dark.

At the same time, the helter-skelter results of the gasoline allocations include a truckers strike, accidental deaths on the highways, traffic tie ups, hours wasted by motorists looking for gas, violence and an increase in crime.

Basically, we believe a great deal of the trouble the country is faced with today in the fuel crisis results from a lack of confidence the people feel in those who are handling it.

We need someone to step up and tell us how it is and what we need to do to meet it. The American people can take it. They just don't want to be nagged into a panic.

PRESIDENT NIXON'S FAMILY

Russia's last czar, Nicholas II, was forced to abdicate in March, 1917, by the Russian Revolution. Seventeen months later he was taken by the Bolsheviks to a cellar and shot.

Let us make it perfectly clear: we are not equating President Nixon with Czar Nicholas. However, we believe that a certain parallel does exist between the way the family of Nicholas was treated and the way the President's family is being treated today.

As a newspaper, we are the first to grant that President Nixon is fair game for the press. He freely chose the pitfalls of public life and is well aware of the adversary relationship that often exists between elected officials and the media, especially in an era characterized by government scandal.

That said, however, we must wonder aloud why some members of the press insist on dragging the President's family down with him.

Item: A UPI story dated January 1 from Alderwood Manor, Washington, with this sensational lead paragraph: "Mrs. Edward Nixon, sister-in-law of the President, says it's 'tough' to be left home alone with the couple's two children while her husband is 'off being paid to do nothing.'"

Item: Another UPI story, dated February 1 from Washington, D.C., in which the President's daughter, Tricia, felt compelled to answer rumors in the press that her marriage to Edward Cox is breaking up: "I don't know how they get started," Tricia said.

As we said above, the President is fair game to the press. We believe, however, that the great majority of comments in the press regarding the family amounts to nothing more than gratuitous mischief making. We think it should cease.

WHEAT SALE VS. ALASKA PURCHASE

As if to add insult to injury, the Russians, apparently, have offered to sell wheat to the United States to help replenish our grain stocks that are now at their lowest point since World War II.

It would not be a bad deal for the boys in Moscow. Wheat is now going for about \$5.00 per bushel and will probably go higher yet. Russia bought a huge quantity of American wheat at about \$1.65 per bushel following their 1972 crop failure.

Of course, the Russian "offer" may have a tongue-in-cheek quality to it. It was made in a news conference by one Vladimir S. Alkhimov, a visiting Deputy Minister of Foreign Trade.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Many delegates to the Constitutional Convention think it is now virtually impossible to wind up their revision job by April 7. President Price Daniel Jr.'s 90-day timetable for the historic task went out the window when debate on the education article dragged over 11 half-day sessions. Even Daniel conceded as the education article debate droned toward a close that the convention is off schedule.

Pressure is mounting for recess until after the May and June primary elections. Daniel hopes to keep the delegates plugging away at decision making until early April. If it is then obvious that the job is a long way from complete, he probably will go along with motions to take off until after the elections, although he isn't ready to commit himself to that. Some delegates would like to move up the recess date to March — and head for home as soon as all convention committees have handed in their reports.

NIXON POLL NOTED — An informal poll on the question of impeachment of President Richard Nixon at the January Texas Press Association convention drew the attention of the White House. According to Margaret Mayer, Dallas Times Herald Washington correspondent: "A call from the White House communications office recently directed the attention of the Times Herald Washington Bureau to a story that, in the opinion of the White House, merited more attention than it had received.

GASOLINE ALLOCATED — The Rio Grande Valley and the Midland-Odesa area, which reported severe gasoline shortages, have received additional supplies through the State Emergency Fuel Allocation Office. SEFAC ordered 200,000 more gallons sent to the Valley and 869,000 gallons to Midland-Odesa. The total emergency allocation routed to the Valley now comes to about 925,000 gallons. Shipments are made from the state's set-aside for emergencies and hardships. SEFAC operates in conjunction with the Federal Energy Office to administer the federal fuel allocation program.

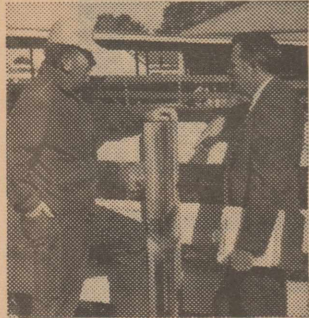

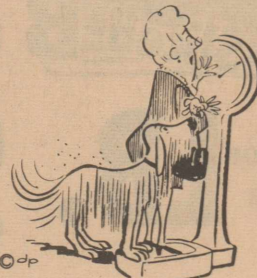

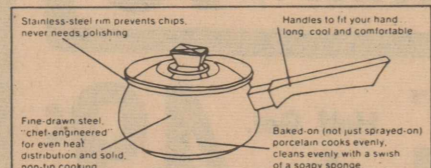

Although patented some 110 years ago, the roller mechanism of a window shade has changed very little. After all,

who needs to improve a good thing? When properly handled and adjusted, window shade rollers should last a lifetime. Shade fabric, on the other hand, can be replaced as needed to keep your shades looking pretty.

Slight problems can arise that require adjustment--such as a too-tight spring or a shade not catching properly. The adjustment is simple.

To fix a too-tight spring, roll shade all the way to the top. Take it down from the brackets and unroll it about six inches. Replace shade in brackets and test. Repeat procedure until shade has desired tension.

For a loose roller, simply reverse the procedure. Pull shade down about 12 inches from top, remove it from brackets and roll it up about six inches. Replace, test tension and repeat if necessary.

When shade doesn't catch and hold easily, check bracket installation. The roller should have one-sixteenth to one-eighth inch play to work smoothly. DISPENSER TAPE, Clear and ly. Also make sure the flat spear is vertical in the bracket slot. Never oil the mechanism. If brackets are too widely spaced, the shade may fall. If only a minor adjustment is

needed, pull out the roller's round pin about one-fourth inch--or slightly bend brackets inward. --0--

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Spring is marching our way this month. Again when the strong and unwelcome March winds hit us full blast, they discourage gardening, but let a beautiful calm day arrive and the windy days are forgotten.

March is the first really ambitious gardening month, so you should be active in the outdoor garden. Some of the very foundations for summer gardens should be laid now, to take advantage of every favorable opportunity the weather affords. Everything you do now in preparation for the coming flower show in April, as well as for summer enjoyment will repay you in fine exhibits and daily pleasure of your garden.

Summer flowering perennials should be divided and replanted before new growth is

very far advanced. These include candy tuft, phlox, Shasta daisy, hollyhock and poppies.

Select and plant gladiolus corms for summer cut flowers. Planting at two-week intervals through the spring will give you a long period to enjoy these flowering spikes. Choose large, healthy corms and plant them in a sunny, well drained location. Plant about 4 inches apart and cover with 4 to 6 inches of soil. Keep the soil moist.

Be sure to have your bush-type roses pruned by the 15th of March.

Feed pansies liquid fertilizer if you have not done so recently. Watch for early insects.

March is the last month recommended for planting and transplanting trees, unless balled and burlapped. When

planting shrubs and trees, don't forget they grow, so don't plant too close to the house where they will become crowded and ill-shaped. Another fault is planting too many, especially if you purchase small specimens. Fill in the first year with annuals and perennials to make an attractive planting.

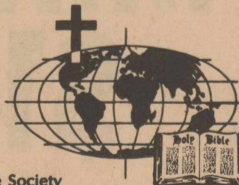
