

WHAT'S NEW ABOUT IT?


More than a few followers of world trends in arms and armaments read with no little astonishment the February 11, 1974 cover-story headline of Time magazine, reading: "The New Arms Race." Our reaction, which we believe we share with most of the people of this country, is: what in heaven's name is "new" about it? One wonders how far removed from reality are the cloistered editors of Time in their Rockefeller Center skyscraper in Manhattan.

It is no secret that for years the Soviet Union has been exerting maximum effort to surpass the United States and the free world in military supremacy. This has been top priority with the Communist dictators. All other areas of the Soviet economy have taken a back seat to the demands made by the development and manufacture of the weapons of war. Furthermore, as warned by public spirited organizations such as the American Security Council in Washington, D.C., the Communists have been gaining, and the United States losing, the so-called "arms race."

Two years ago Mr. John Fisher, President of the American Security Council, warned in the Council's WASHINGTON REPORT publication that, although all public opinion polls showed that "a majority of the American people favors a strong military," the American people "are not getting it."

"The United States is a democracy, after all," Mr. Fisher wrote, "and the very essence of a democracy is that representatives actually represent the people who elected them. Here on the biggest issue of all - survival - the electorate is not getting what it wants."

Today, thanks to the neglect of Congress and the frenzied efforts of the anti-military minority, the Soviet Union is forging far ahead of the free world. As against 101 nuclear-powered submarines in the American fleet, the Soviets have 115; while we have only 14 conventional subs, the Soviets have more than 200; we have seven cruisers, the Soviets have 29.

In the air, we are not much better off: against 3,900 tactical and strategic aircraft in the USA, the Soviets have 4,500; as against 72 medium-range bombers in the U.S. Air Force, the Communists have more than 700. Only in long-range bombers do we have a majority (440 USA, 140 USSR).

In terms of military manpower, we also show weakness. While the USSR has 3,420,000 uniformed personnel, we have only 2,230,000. Not only that, but Soviet industry is overwhelmingly devoted to the manufacture of arms, ammunition, and other weapons of war, while American industry is mostly producing consumer items and goods.

There is nothing "new" in the so-called "arms race" - which certainly has not been much of a "race" on our part. The Soviets have been gaining, and we have been losing, for over a decade and it is high time that all Americans woke up to that fact.

THE TWO-PARTY SYSTEM

Next to President Nixon and Energy Chief William Simon, the toughest job in America surely must belong to David K. Wilson.

David K. Wilson? He's chairman of the Republican National Finance Committee. In the face of Watergate and the massive citizen distrust of public officials that it has helped foster, Wilson is responsible for filling depleted GOP coffers.

The portents for his success, to say the least, are not good. According to a recent Louis Harris poll the Republican Party, already far smaller than the Democratic Party, declined by another seven percent during the past five years. And, in what was considered by many to be a bellwether election, the GOP, in February lost control of Vice President Jerry Ford's old congressional seat in Michigan for the first time since 1910.

Too many Americans, we fear, are willing to let the entire Republican Party stew in the juices of Watergate, irrespective of the fact that it was only a handful of White House zealots whose actions brought about this national disgrace.

Does the country as a whole have a stake in the preservation of a strong two-party system of government? We believe that it does.

One only has to look at the political troubles currently facing Britain and Israel to realize the enormous difficulty of governing a modern nation when many political parties vie effectively for control.

The strong two-party system has been essential to the stability of America's government. It has succeeded in offering voters a viable alternative to the policies of incumbent administration and ruling majorities of Congress. At the same time, during national emergencies, the system has made it possible for a President to govern effectively, while reducing the risk that a demagogue would arise and seize political control.

Regardless of what one thinks about either of the nation's two major political parties, all of us have a stake in assuring that both of them remain alive and healthy.
