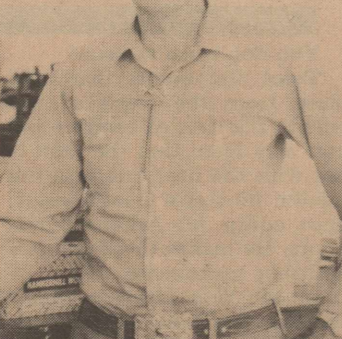

Funeral Service For Jimmie Nunley Friday

Funeral services for Jimmie B. Nunley, 58, will be held Friday afternoon at 3:30 from Mt. Zion Baptist Church and at 4:00 p. m. Saturday at St. Johns Baptist Church in Brackettville with burial in Indian Scout Seminoles Cemetery in Brackettville.

Mr. Nunley was found dead at his home here Saturday morning, apparently after suffering a heart attack.

He had been a resident of Ozona for 27 years and was a veteran of World War II. He was married to Celestine Jones May 29, 1939 in Del Rio.

Survivors include his wife, of Ozona; a daughter, Gloria Gilley of Duarte, Calif.; a brother, Willie Nunley of Long Beach, Calif.; a sister, Ruth Ellen Nunley of Los Angeles, Calif.; two uncles and several nieces and nephews.

Rev. Berkley To Leave Methodist Church Pastorate

Rev. John Berkley, pastor of the Ozona United Methodist Church for the past five years, announced to members of the church's congregation Sunday morning that he will end his pastorate here at the end of the present Conference year in June.

Rev. Berkley said that until a few days ago he had anticipated there would be no change in the Ozona church charge, but "one of those musical chairs developments common to the Methodist church" occurred, he said, and he was offered a post he "could not decline." The offer came in a telephone call from Bishop Eugene Slater resulting from the series of pastor changes.

Rev. Berkley, who has made his influence felt not only in the church but through extensive community participation, will assume the post of pastor of the United Methodist Church at Beeville, a town in central South Texas. Moving date will be June 20.

Rev. Berkley has exerted community leadership as a member of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, has served as president of the Rotary Club, and is now a representative of the District Governor of Rotary. He has served on the board of directors of the Community Center here, on the board of the Salvation Army, the American Cancer Society and the local Ministerial Alliance. Expanding his service to the church, Rev. Berkley is presently serving as chairman of the District Council of Ministries, a program planning group.

Official announcement of the pastor to be assigned the Ozona church will come from the Annual Conference in June, or from the Bishop at an earlier date.

Mrs. Berkley is a music teacher aide in the Intermediate School. The couple has two children, Rachel and Mark, both Ozona High School students.

Annual Ozona Quarter Horse Show To Be Held Saturday

The twenty-second Annual Ozona Quarter Horse Show will get underway at the rodeo arena Saturday morning, May 25, with the Youth Activity Halter Classes to be judged first, beginning at 9:30.

There will be two judges this year. Youth activities will be judged by Darrel Davidson of Sanger, and adult activities will be judged by Roland Moore of Tullia.

Bill Watson, secretary of the Ozona Quarter Horse Association, the sponsoring organization, said that he had more requests from exhibitors this year than ever before, and he feels that there will be excellent competition for this year's show. L. D. Kirby is show chairman and Tony Allen is ring steward.

A saddle will be awarded in both Youth Division and Adult

Division to the Champion All-Around Horse of the show. Eligibility for all-around will require entry in halter class and minimum of two performance classes prior to judging of halter classes. Basis for awarding trophy is as follows: first place, 6 points; second place, 5 points; third place, 4 points; fourth place, 3 points; fifth place, 2 points; sixth place, 1 point; Grand Champion, 2 points; Reserve Champion, 1 point.

In excess of two thousand dollars worth of trophies will be given for winners in the various

classes. Trophies include silver and bronze horse trophies, thirty-six silver platters and 3 silver trays, plus ribbons and rosettes.

Adult halter classes will follow the youth activity halter classes Saturday morning. Performance classes will be held in the afternoon with youth performance classes held first and adult classes to follow. Western pleasure, western riding, reining, pole bending and barrel racing in the adult performance classes will be open to all age groups, as will the roping events and the cutting horse events.

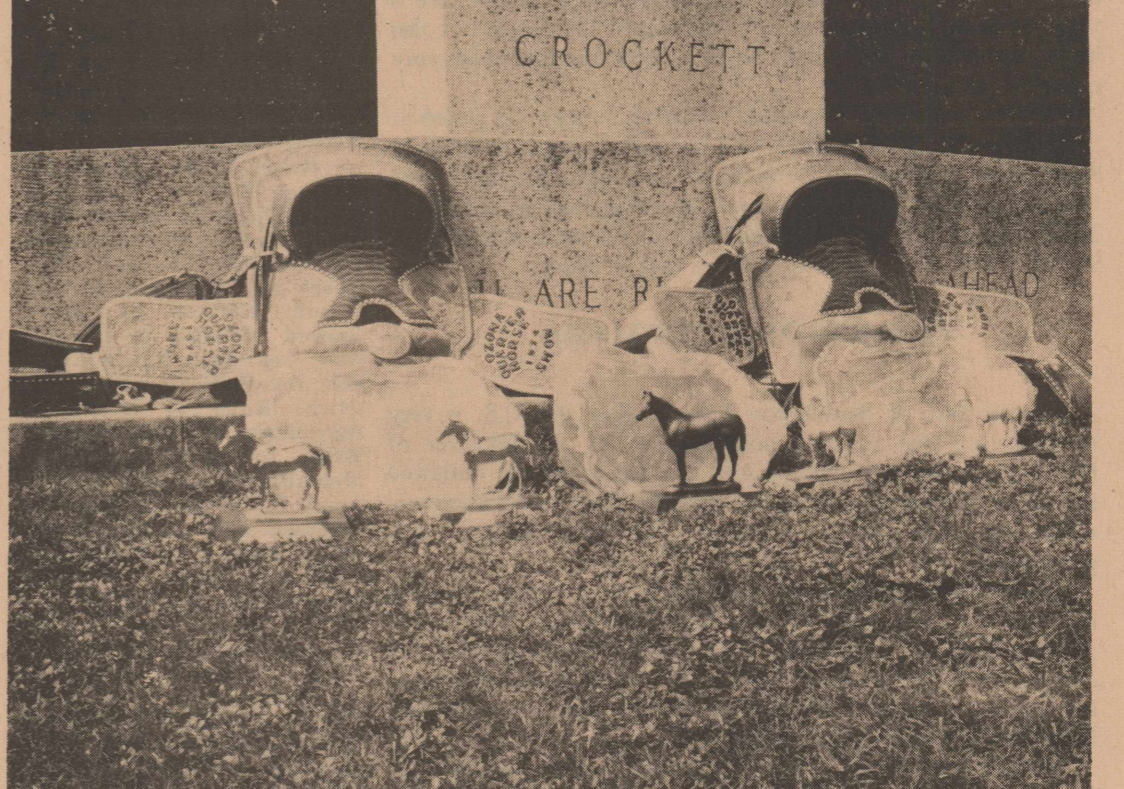
Desi Tijerina and Robert Tambunga had two hits each.

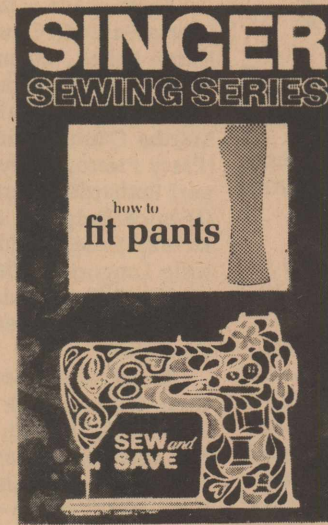

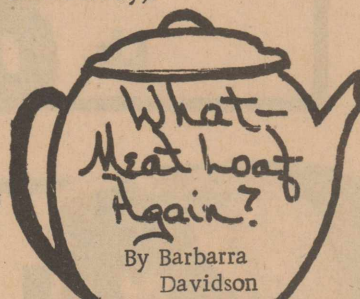

1 pkg. Duncan Hines Orange Supreme Deluxe Cake Mix
1 pkg. Vanilla instant pudding mix (3-3/4 oz.)
1 c. Crisco oil
4 oz. frozen orange juice
4 oz. water
4 eggs
3 oz. Galliano liqueur
1 oz. Vodka

Blend all ingredients in large bowl; beat 5 minutes. Pour into greased and floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 350° F. 45-55 minutes until center springs back when touched lightly. Cool in pan about 15 minutes.

Have you been sewing machine shopping lately? The shopping may be more complicated than operating the machine. The small-sized appliance is a large, long term investment. You need to think about what you need before you set out to buy.

Before you shop, answer the question "What do I need a sewing machine for?" Consider these points:

1. Will it be used to make

most of the family's wardrobe? In that case, versatility as well as endurance is important.

2. Are most of the sewing jobs limited to mending rips and tears? A basic straight or zig-zag stitch appliance may be satisfactory.

3. Will upholstery fabrics and other heavy materials be used on the machine?

4. Are knit fabrics favored over cotton, wool, linen, and other nonstretch fabrics? Many machines have the stretch stitch.

5. Is sewing occasional and is table or floor space limited? A lightweight portable may be suitable.

With so many styles and features available, there is a wide range of prices. But re-

member, a high price is no indication of how useful a machine will be to you.

One general rule says that if you plan to make most of the family's clothing, you should save enough on clothing bills in two or three years to pay for the machine. The cost of a versatile machine may be worthwhile, although the initial cost is high.

When you discuss price with a dealer, make sure you understand what the figure includes. Some items like the carrying case, foot control, or attachments are priced separately.

Before any sale is final, ask for a written guarantee and study it. Find out if the machine must be returned to the manufacturer for service, or can the store selling it make repairs.

When you visit stores, take fabric swatches of various weights and textures with you for testing. Most machines produce a good stitch on fairly stiff material, but some will fail on nylon tricot or a bulky woolen. To test the smoothness of the feed dog teeth, sew on a polyester knit fabric. Rough teeth snag this material.


