He flew in to the Ozona airport with about fifteen volunteers and the afternoon hours were taken up with street campaigning. The group met with Ozonans Tuesday night at the Hiway Cafe where Mr. Krueger emphatically denied that he was a labor candidate.

Krueger will face Senator Nelson Wolff of San Antonio in the June 1 run-off for the Democratic nomination for Congressman. The winner of the run-off will have competition from Doug Harlan, the Republican candidate, in the general election in November.

## THE SELF GOVERNORS

During the last session of Congress, a measure was approved which will grant to the residents of the "Federal City" of Washington, D.C. partial self-government. Those residing in the Nation's Capital will be permitted to elect a city council, a mayor and a school board; but since the city is supported by Federal funds, Congress will maintain control over the purse strings.

The first big public affair to take place after the citizens voted to approve the new city charter was a "Human Kindness Day" on Saturday, May 11, held on the Washington Monument grounds and featuring "soul" and rock and roll music. The idea was to have a big, all-day family picnic style affair.

What happened was told in the Washington Star-News. Four refreshment stands were broken into and vandalized; the cafeteria on the government grounds, which is run by Government Services was looted of thousands of dollars worth of food, novelties and souvenirs; windshields in a number of cars parked near the grounds were broken and other cars were damaged when people began jumping on the roofs; roving gangs of thugs beat and robbed a number of victims, some of whom were injured seriously enough to require hospital treatment; in addition, windows in downtown Washington business stores were broken. Cleanup work alone by National Park Service crews to pick up has until the end of July to tons of garbage, debris, broken glass and rocks left by the crowd has been estimated to cost \$15,000.

Who will have to pay the bill? You will - even as you pay most of all other costs of public affairs in Washington.

In all fairness, it must be said that the Washingtonians have not yet held their first election, and the violence which took place is similar to that which has occurred after other "soul" concerts in other parts of the country.

Still, this was a "local" affair for "local" people, and it is not enough to say as did one official, that "it doesn't take but a few people" to ruin such affairs. Irresponsible and savage behavior on the part of "only a few" can also wreck the best-laid plans for

## FALL OF A CHANCELLOR

There is great irony in the reported dismay of East Germany and other Communist nations over the resignation of West German Chancellor Willy Brandt. Brandt quit, ostensibly over the discovery that one of his best friends and top aides, Gunther Guillaume, was a long-term East German spy.

Guillaume had entered West Germany as a supposed East German refugee in the mid '50s. He then infiltrated and worked his way through the ranks of the Social Democrat Party until he became virtually the right hand man of the chancellor. In this position he had access to such material as the highest level diplomatic correspondence between the U.S. and West Germany and no doubt passed this and other sensitive information to his East German bosses.

Thus, as an espionage coup it ranks among the more notable feats in that ages-old profession. It should serve as a sobering reminder that the Communists are long-term players in this field. Where there is one such "sleeper" as Guillaume there are undoubtedly other agents in other countries patiently biding their time until opportunity strikes.

But both sides play in this game and there is no cause to engage in any hypocritical moralizing. The irony in this case is that Guillaume's unmasking not only ended his career but also brought down the man whose policies the Communists had every reason to favor.

Brandt's so-called "Ostpolitik" (Eastern Policy) was aimed at "reconciliation" with the East and formally recognized the post World War II European boundaries established by the Soviet Union. The Kremlin and the other Communist regimes of Eastern Europe regarded Brandt as a good friend. His successor, Helmut Schmidt, may not be quite so much in that category.


# COMMUNISM IN PORTUGAL

Reports out of Washington have it that the U.S. is very worried over the possible consequences of the takeover of Portugal by a military junta on April 25. The previously outlawed Portuguese Communist Party has emerged from its underground status and may play a prominent role in a promised new

The Portuguese Communists evidently see themselves joining in a popular front with the also legalized Socialist Party. Their platform suggests withdrawal from the NATO alliance and the ousting of the U.S. from its base in the Azores. The Communists also favor immediate independence for the colonies of Guinea, Mozambique and Angola in Africa.

Some U.S. experts are very concerned over more than just the specifics of the Portuguese situation, which could be damaging enough in itself. They also fear that the sharp turn to the left in Portugal could spill over into Spain and possibly into Italy. Many in Spain are chaffing under the relative lack of political freedom in that country and signs of unrest have increased since the Portuguese coup.





AUSTIN, Tex. - The end may be in sight for the historic Texas Constitutional Convention which began last January.

Delegates have been zipping along since they came back to work after the May 4 primary election, and only one major article - the catchall, controversial General Provisions was left to complete on tentaive passage at mid-week.

After that, of course, lawmaker-delegates must go back through the whole package on final consideration. And only those articles receiving a twothirds majority vote can be submitted to voters.

Actually, the convention complete the entire revision

However, President Price Daniel Jr. has expressed hope for a much quicker windup. Daniel, of course, pushed unsuccessfully for agreement on a proposed revision before the primary election, then had to settle for a month's recess during April.

Convention leaders debated whether to submit a \$1 million budget - enough to last until mandatory July adjournment or to budget piecemeal, hopeful of getting through within a few

Daniel expressed preference for budgeting through July, then "giving a lump of it back" on earlier adjournment.

However, Administration Committee Chairman Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon said he was concerned that appropriating through July would tempt delegates to stay that

Meanwhile, Louisiana Gov. Edwin Edwards gave delegates some practical advice on how to get new constitutions adopted. His own state has just approved

PRIMARIES CANVASSED -Executive Committees of both Democratic and Republican parties canvassed returns of the May 4 primary.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe is officially the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, having won over Frances "Sissy" Farenthold 1,024,335 to 438,564. W.H. Posey of Houston got 31,498 votes and Steve S. Alexander of Waco 26,889.

Republicans certified James H. (Jim) Granberry as their candidate for governor. Granberry defeated Odell McBrayer of Fort Worth.

Raza Unida again is running Ramsey Muniz of Corpus Christi for governor and Fred Garza for Railroad Commissioner. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby will be opposed in the general election by GOP Gaylord Marshall of Dallas; Atty. Gen. John Hill by Tom Cole; Bob Bullock by James N. (Nick) Rowe of McAllen; Agriculture Commissioner John White by Zack Fisher of Memphis; Treasurer Jesse James by Robert G. Holt of Amarillo; Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong by Mary Lou Grier of Boerne; Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon by Joe P. Cain of Houston and Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace by Dale W. Steffes of Houston.

FUEL SHORTAGE CON-TINUES - Once more, the statewide oil allowable (for June) has been set at a wideopen 100 per cent — for the 27th straight month - amid warnings that fuel shortages may last through summer.

Railroad Commissioner Langdon commended Texans

for their conservation efforts. He noted that crude oil stocks in the state are up two million barrels over a year ago - to 93.3 million - and that U.S. supplies are up 8.1 million barrels.

Langdon credited voluntary energy-conservation efforts with the improved inventory picture, but he warned that heavy summer vacation travel may cause more lines at the

Nominations to purchase crude oil for the next month totalled 3,879,449 barrels, an increase of 18,684 barrels over

COURTS SPEAK - A Dallas man won a reversal and new trial of a murder conviction because the state placed in evidence an obituary of his slain wife.

The Court of Criminal Appeals also reversed the assault to murder sentence assessed a Harris County man due to introduction by the state of a marriage annulment petition purporting to show he had a violent temper.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a state savings and loan commissioner's order backed by an Austin court allowing Equitable Savings of Fort Worth to set up a branch office in Lubbock. The State Supreme Court

set a June 12 hearing in a suit over whether Day and Zimmermann Inc., which operates Lone Star Army Ammunition plant at Texarkana, must pay \$112,668 in state sales taxes. The taxes were paid under protest on materials bought by the munitions maker. Day and Zimmerman claims the purchases were non-taxable, since they were made for the U.S.

The House action was a big plus for clean elections because the postcard technique. while appearing to be useful, would open the gates for fraudulent registrations, and would impose an insuperable task on a federal bureau which would administer it.

Will big labor gain firmer control over the Congress in the November elections? Much concern is being shown, particularly in view of Labor's claim to have played trump cards in recent special Congres sional elections to fill vacancies in Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Three of the winning candidates, all Democrats in normally Republican districts, received a total of \$70,000 from the Unions.

If this trend continues, as George Meany hopes, the next Congress could be very lopsided in favor of labor. AFL-CIO's Meany has publicly announced a mammoth drive to elect a "veto proof" Congress.

# TIPS FOR OUTDOORS

Trace the events that take place from the crack of the rifle to the time of cooking and you may learn that the fault is not with the deer but with the hunter. So states Gus Albright, news editor for Arkansas Outdoors. He makes these pointsand they make sense.

In the first place, accurate shooting provides the best venison. When a wounded animal runs off to die at a distance, his physical exertions send blood flowing fast through his body and into his muscles. This makes the meat tough and coarse. Secret is to get the meat to

the table in good eating condition. Many thousands of pounds are wasted, allowed to ruin, or are so poorly cared for that few people will eat it. And this should not happen. Proper field dressing is im-

portant. Without that, regardless of later care, the cooked meat will not be as it should. A deer must be bled as soon as it is killed. In most cases an accurate shot will take care of this. But if it doesn't then a knife should be inserted at the

base of the neck and the artery cut. Keep the wound open and free of clot. With the insides removed


