## **Construction Begins On Five** Million Dollar Hwy. Project

on the section of IH 10 which will be constructed about three blocks south of the downtown business section of Ozona. Warning signs were placed near South Texas Lumber Company to the right and near the South swimming pool on the approach to town on State Highway 163.

The Texas Highway Commission has established a 35 mph speed limit to warn the traveling public of construction hazards.

The work of connecting with U.S. 290 will be last in order to reduce interference with traffic. Approximately 1,000 feet of U.S. 290 east of town where it connects with IH 10 will be under construction and also the connection west of Ozona where the new construction will tie in with 290.



#### THE SAD SAGA OF PATRICIA HEARST

Five months following the kidnapping of Patricia Hearst by the communist guerilla gang, the "Symbionese Liberation Army," it was confirmed by law enforcement officials: Miss Hearst was wanted as a willing participant in a number of violent and vicious

Missed in the news is the fact that at least two anti-communist experts, many weeks before, had predicted (with great accuracy, as it has turned out) that Miss Hearst had indeed been "brainwashed" and was not, as commonly believed at the time, an unwilling accomplice.

In early April, Dr. Fred Schwarz, President of the Christian Anti-Communism Crusade of Long Beach, California, described the brainwashing process by which Patricia Hearst was transformed into a member of the Symbionese Liberation Army and further predicted: "She could be given some difficult and criminal task to test her and make her burn her bridges."

Within the week after Dr. Schwarz wrote his prediction, Miss Hearst, holding an automatic rifle in her hands, robbed a bank with other members of the S.L.A.

Mr. Edward Hunter, Editor and Publisher of Tactics, a "Monthly Psywar Journal" (Arlington, Virginia) appeared on an NBC televison "talk show" in April and also emphatically maintained that Miss Hearst had indeed been brainwashed. Dubious, the moderator of the TV show asked: "Yes, but in 60 days, can that process work?"

Patiently, Hunter explained that "brainwashing is composed of two processes: a softening up process and an indoctrination process . . . . she was softened up before she was ever captured. In document and related other words, it was not a matter of 60 days. It was a matter of several years, plus 60 days. She was indoctrinated before capture . . . at Berkeley."

Hunter, of course, is not the first to warn of the disastrous effects imposed upon our youth through slanted textbooks commonly found in public schools today; through "hate-America" messages constantly repeated in some segments of the academic community; and of the extreme, radical, violence-prone elements to be found in such leading institutions as the University of California at Berkeley; except that most Americans seriously underestimate the impact of such pro-communist, anti-American influences upon our youth.

Both Dr. Schwarz and Mr. Hunter were right; Miss Hearst had indeed been brainwashed. But the important fact is that the "brainwashing" had already begun long before she was kidnapped; it was relatively easy, therefore, for the S.L.A. to bring her the rest of the way.

#### THE MINIMUM WAGE LAW

The new minimum wage law, enacted by Congress earlier this year, went into effect on May 1. Predictably, the law, for all its to support the revision in its good intents, already is causing significant unemployment among present form, because some groups that need employment the most.

For the first time, domestic workers are included in the minimum wage provisions. There is no doubt that these low-income workers will find it increasingly difficult to find calling special legislative employment at the \$1.90 minimum that must be paid them.

And, as summer approaches, the Labor Department reports that, from all indications, teenagers find it very difficult to find jobs. One key reason for low earnings among the young in the past has been that their employment has included a considerable element of on-the-job training. Now, however, they must be paid the same as adults and many employers will opt for experienced workers rather than these youthful, inexperienced job seekers.

Unemployment rates for the young are already far too high and last year averaged three to four times the overall national unemployment rate. President Nixon warned last fall in vetoing the first minimum wage bill passed by Congress that, unless a special exemption was made for hiring the young, a minimum wage bill would "delay - or even prevent - their start toward economic improvement, and create greater demoralization for the age group which should be most enthusiastically involved in America's world of work."

Employers face their own special problems from the new law. Farm workers' wages, at a minimum of \$1.30 prior to May 1, will go up more than one-third, to \$1.80, by January 1, 1975. Their minimum will reach \$2.30 by 1978. Workers in most other categories must be paid \$2.10 by next January and will be paid \$2.30 by January 1, 1976.

The minimum wage law must be respected and obeyed. At the same time, however, we urge Congress to take a hard look at its potential negative effects with a view toward altering the law in the near future if it appears necessary.

#### GOOD MEDICAL CARE FOR VETERANS

Despite the flurry of charges leveled at the Veterans Administration recently, one fact stands out clear - veterans are getting excellent medical care in VA hospitals and clinics. In addition, plans are underway to increase facilities, services and

Reports of unbiased observers and veterans in VA hospitals show that the patients in VA facilities, on the whole, get better treatment than those in many private medical care units.

AUSTIN, Tex. - Constitutional Convention delegates are entering the make-or-break last laps of their work.

Delegates last week completed first-draft approval of the proposed new state charter after final agreement on the delayed judicial article.

President Price Daniel Jr. said he hopes all articles will be pushed through the third-reading stage by the end of June.

After that, document will go to the convention's "Submission and Transition Committee,' which will wrap up all proposals in package form and return them to

At this stage, the separate-submission items (like right-to-work) must be approved by a two-thirds majority (121 votes) to be submitted to voters.

The Submission and Transition Committee will serve as a kind of conference committee, seeking compromises which can rally approval of the necessary majority of delegates.

After months of stormy debate and close votes, the convention began to receive praise from many quarters for its efforts to improve the 1876 constitution.

Kind words were still being withheld by the governor, however. Aides to Gov. Dolph Briscoe said he would "find it very difficult" recommended changes infringe on gubernatorial powers in areas of veto and

TRADING STAMP LIMIT? - The State Finance Commission may ban use of trading stamps and other inducements by savings and loan associations to help attract deposits.

The panel's savings and loan section is scheduled to rule on the long-standing issue June 22.

Opponents argue the regulation would curtail advertising by savings and loan associations, would not benefit consumers and would be meaningless to federallychartered institutions.

An earlier version of the proposed regulation included exemption associations competing with other financial institutions which offer stamps and other premiums

Savings and loan associations are divided on the issue. Several consumer groups have indicated they will offer testimony in opposition to the proposal.

WASTE HEARINGS SET Texas Water Quality Board has scheduled 12 public hearings over the state to explore problems concerning disposal of industrial solid wastes, a controversial issue.



Check your instruction booklet to see if automatic drying is recom-

REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations. DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but

DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.

ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.

WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets. WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from

a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on. TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.


TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.

CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.

LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls - on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.

AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.




