travel under it. Highway 163 to the south will not be closed during construction, but traffic will be required to slow to 35 mph while traveling through the construction site of about a mile.

Construction Begins On Five Million Dollar Hwy. Project

Work got under way Monday on the section of IH 10 which will be constructed about three blocks south of the downtown business section of Ozona. Warning signs were placed near South Texas Lumber Company to the right and near the South swimming pool on the approach to town on State Highway 163.

The Texas Highway Commission has established a 35 mph speed limit to warn the traveling public of construction hazards.

The work of connecting with U. S. 290 will be last in order to reduce interference with traffic. Approximately 1,000 feet of U. S. 290 east of town where it connects with IH 10 will be under construction and also the connection west of Ozona where the new construction will tie in with 290.

H. B. Zachry Company of San Antonio, which has set up headquarters at Crockett Heights, began construction Monday, clearing the right of way, which included demolishing the old Lockett pool at the east end of 14th Street.

The 6.9 mile project extends from 6.6 miles east of Ozona at Taylor Box Road to 0.8 mile west of State Highway 163. The \$5,943,908.85 project includes grading, structures, flexible base, two course surface treatment and delineation.

Houses and county buildings, plus the Powell Field park and

the little league park have already been cleared along 14th Street, which will be the access road to the super highway. Public utilities have also been re-routed for the construction. Within the next few weeks definite signs of preparation will be seen as the new roadbed takes shape.

W. F. Dixon, Supervising Resident Engineer in Ozona, will supervise the project for the Texas Highway Department. The contractor estimates the project will be completed in 19 months.

The part of the new highway which travels through the town area of Ozona will be elevated. The elevation will begin at Johnson Draw and 14th St. and reach 20 feet as it curves over State Highway 163. This elevation will continue to the east hill where a cut will be made and the roadbed will continue at ground level until it connects with the part of IH 10 which has already been

constructed and is in use east of Ozona. There will also be another road under the elevated part of the highway. This will be at Gurley Draw and Martinez Street. The two streets under the elevation will give traffic easy access to both sides of town.

Pvt. Andres Aguirre, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Andres Aguirre of Ozona, attained the highest marksmanship score of his platoon while firing for qualification in the Marine Corps recently.

Pvt. Aguirre scored 229 out of a possible 250 and was in competition with 66 men of Platoon 2027 who had all received the same marksmanship training.

Pvt. Aguirre was awarded a certificate for his accomplishment which will commend his rank as "Expert Rifleman."

"If you receive an incorrect bill, shred it," Lillian Cochran, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, advised.

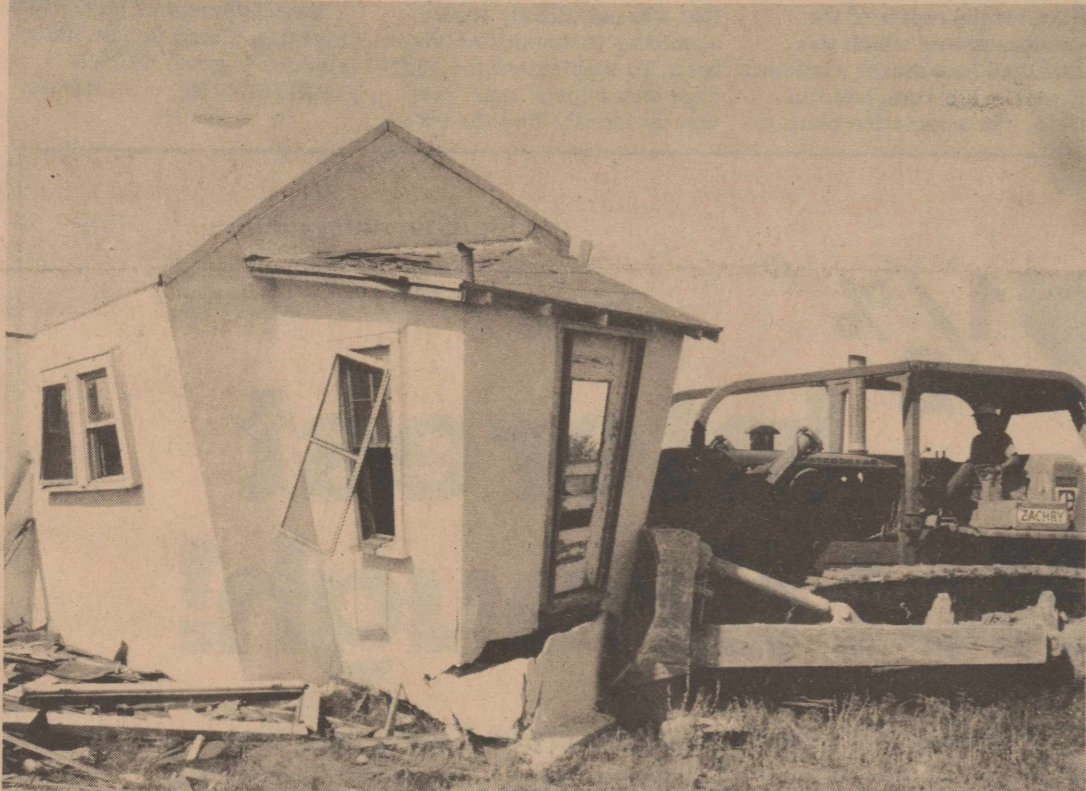
"Place the shredded bill--along with a note of explanation--in an envelope, and mail it to the company. This requires personal attention--whereas just a hand-written note might be ignored.

Savings Bonds Sales Reach 19% Of Goal

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$692 in Crockett county were reported today by County Bond Chairman Lowell Littleton. Sales for the four-month period totaled \$5,777 for 19% of the 1974 sales goal of \$30,000.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$19,212,748, while year-to-date sales totaled \$80,456,814 with 34% of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million goal achieved.

Pete Jacoby To Retire After 22 Years As Crockett County Agt.

County agent Pete Jacoby has announced his retirement effective August 31, from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and as county agent for Crockett County, the position he has held since April 1, 1952.

Jacoby has helped a number of 4-H boys and girls win many high 4-H honors on state and national levels along with several thousand dollars in scholarships for their use in pursuit of a career based on interest

and experience obtained during their 4-H career.

Over the span of the past 22 years, many Crockett County ranchmen have received assistance in livestock and range management problems from the agent as well as many homeowners on problems of insect and disease control on lawn and shade trees.

Born on a ranch in Menard County, the oldest of four boys in the family, Pete graduated from Menard High School in 1932. After four years of cowboying and ranching during the Depression, he decided to go to Texas A&M and obtain an education. Upon completion of his studies for an Animal Husbandry degree at A&M, Pete went to work in 1940 for the Houston Packing Company in Houston, at a salary of twelve dollars a week as a livestock weigher. "I was paying seven dollars a week for room and board and it cost me ten cents a day for bus fare, so I still had money left at the end of the week, although I wouldn't say that I was living very high on the hog," remarked Jacoby.

In December, 1940, after being promoted to cattle buyer and making nearly ninety dollars a month, Pete decided he was making enough to get married so he and Jimmie Gwynne Langford of Sonora made the big step and set up housekeep-

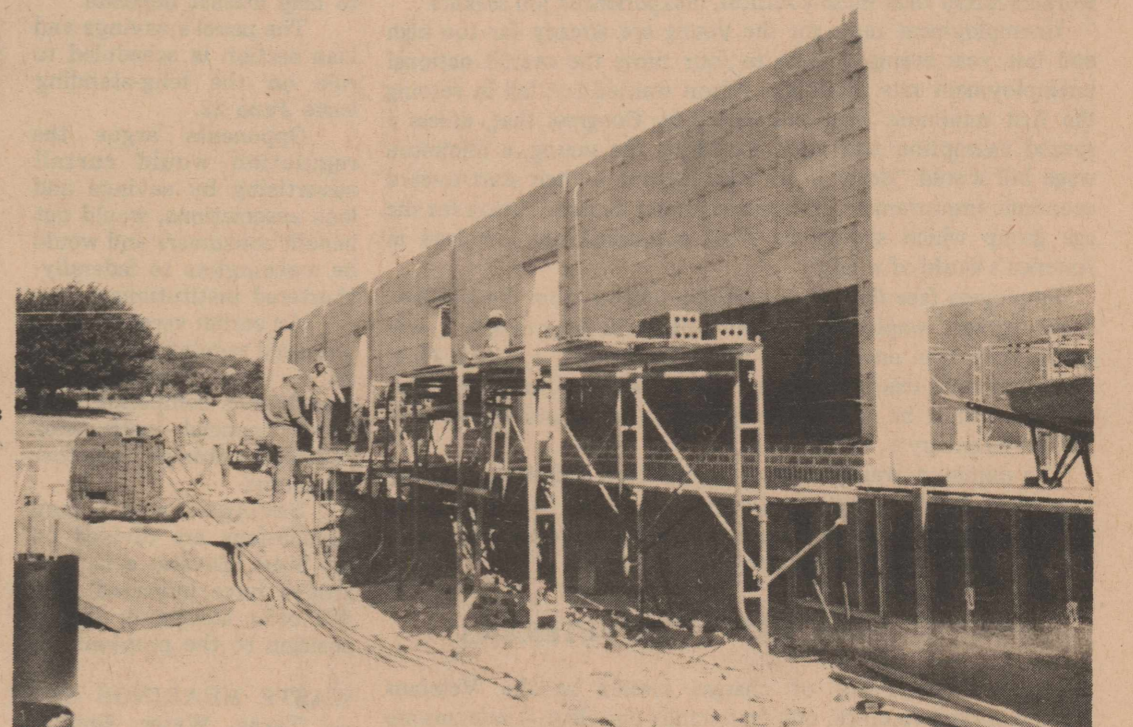

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

With the prolonged dry spell still holding on, our main chore is the keeping of plants, shrubs and trees properly watered. Evergreen shrubs should be watered each week or 10 days, being sure they are well soaked. Other plants may need water two or three times a week, while others and potted plants may need a daily spraying.

Chrysanthemums need to be mulched and fed every two weeks with liquid fertilizer. Do not let them dry out if you

want really fine mums in the fall. If plants are at the stage to become stringy looking, pinch back tips for lower branching until middle of July or August.

If you have high or filtered shade to protect the bulbous lilies, they perform well in Ozona. Varieties that are healthier, hardier and easier to grow have been produced the last few years. They require soil that is deep, loose and especially well drained. Although ample moisture is required throughout the year, lilies cannot tolerate being too wet. A general rule for planting is to plant the bulbs at a depth two or three times their diameter. It is better to plant a little on the shallow side

than too deeply, for they have roots that tend to draw down to the proper depth. They prefer to stay in one location, but where they become too crowded, dig, divide, and transplant as soon as possible after digging.

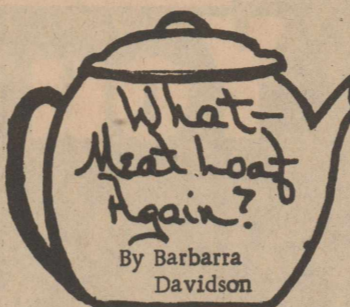
The Oriental hybrid, Imperial Gold strain, and Lillium auratum will reward you with an abundance of exquisite flowers during the summer months. I noticed the Easter lilies that were planted in a number of gardens were unusually beautiful, and full of blooms several weeks after Easter.

Then fill the washer with lukewarm water and add a mild soap or detergent. Let the blanket soak for ten minutes and then agitate it for one minute. Then spin for just two minutes.

Next fill the washer with lukewarm rinse water. Agitate again for one minute and spin two minutes. To dry, hang the blanket lengthwise over two parallel clotheslines. Change positions of the blanket frequently so it'll dry evenly. Dry the blanket in the shade—not in the sun. You can dry an electric blanket in the dryer if you're careful. Check your instruction booklet to see if automatic drying is recommended.

Tried any fresh cantaloupes this year? Here's some information on choosing and using this popular fruit. Look for cantaloupes with a coarse, corky outstanding netting on the rind, and a yellow cast under the netting.

A fragrant, sweet odor on the stem end, means the cantaloupe is ripe. A good melon will have fine-textured, orange flesh and a sweet flavor. For proper home care, wrap ripe cantaloupes in waxed paper or plastic bags before storing them in the refrigerator.

CHEESE-FRANKFURTER LOAF

1/4 c. chopped onion
2 tbsp. butter or margarine
1/2 c. chili sauce
2 tsp. vinegar
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. prepared mustard
2 tsp. brown sugar
1/2 tsp. celery salt
1 loaf French bread (about 16 to 18 inches long)
1 1/2 c. shredded sharp process American cheese
10 frankfurters, cut in half crosswise

Cook onion in butter till tender but not brown. Add chili sauce and seasonings. Simmer about 10 minutes or till sauce is thick. Here's the idea for cutting the bread. Slices will be 3/4 inch wide and cut crosswise of the loaf. Cut first slice, going Almost To Bottom Crust; cut second slice All The Way Through. Continue in same manner the length of loaf. Between the attached slices, spread the sauce, sprinkle in half of cheese, and insert 2 frank halves, letting uncut ends poke out and up at jaunty angle. Hide cut ends of franks with remaining cheese.

With long skewer, fasten sandwiches together in a loaf and wrap in aluminum foil. Heat on grill over charcoal till piping. Open the foil and sprinkle with additional shredded cheese, if desired. Remove skewer. Serve hot. Makes 10 servings.

(The skewer is not necessary if you wrap the foil tightly around the loaf. The sandwiches may be heated in regular or microwave oven.)

REDDY'S VACATION TIPS

Clip and save this vacation checklist.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shake the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls -- on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

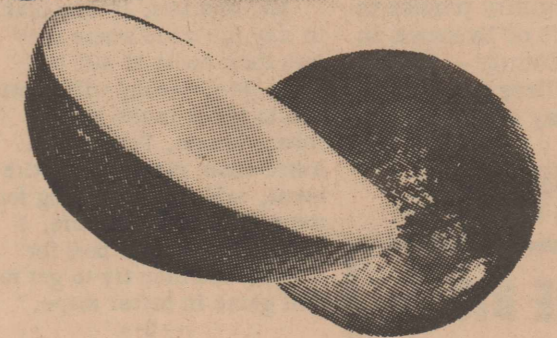

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
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
