Majority In Favor Of Wool Promotion

A majority of the Crockett and Sutton County wool producers casting ballots in the recent Wool Referendum were in favor of continuing the promotion fund deductions of 1 1/2 cents a pound of shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents a hundred weight on unshorn lambs. There were 114 ballots cast, 105 for continuing the deductions and 9 against.

If two-thirds of the producers voting in the Referendum or two-thirds of the total volume of production (nationally) represented in the Referendum approve the agreement, deductions will be withheld from incentive payments for the 1974-1977 marketing years.

Extender Open In Crockett County Field

A newly-opened south extension area of Canyon production in the Ozona multipay field of Crockett County gained its tenth producer and a 5/8 mile west extension to that pay with completion of Tamarack Petroleum Co., Inc., Midland, No. 21-13 Hoover, 15 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,600,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 24,637-1. Gravity of the condensate was 68 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,396-432 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 6,000 gallons and 52,250 pounds of sand.

Location is (amended) 1,120 feet from the south and 1,270 feet from the west lines of 13-R-TCRR.

Junior High Girls' Basketball Christmas Lights Go Up Monday In Ozona

Crockett County Water District personnel began decking the city of Ozona with festive Christmas decorations and colorful lights Monday, but whether they will be used throughout the Christmas season is in doubt.

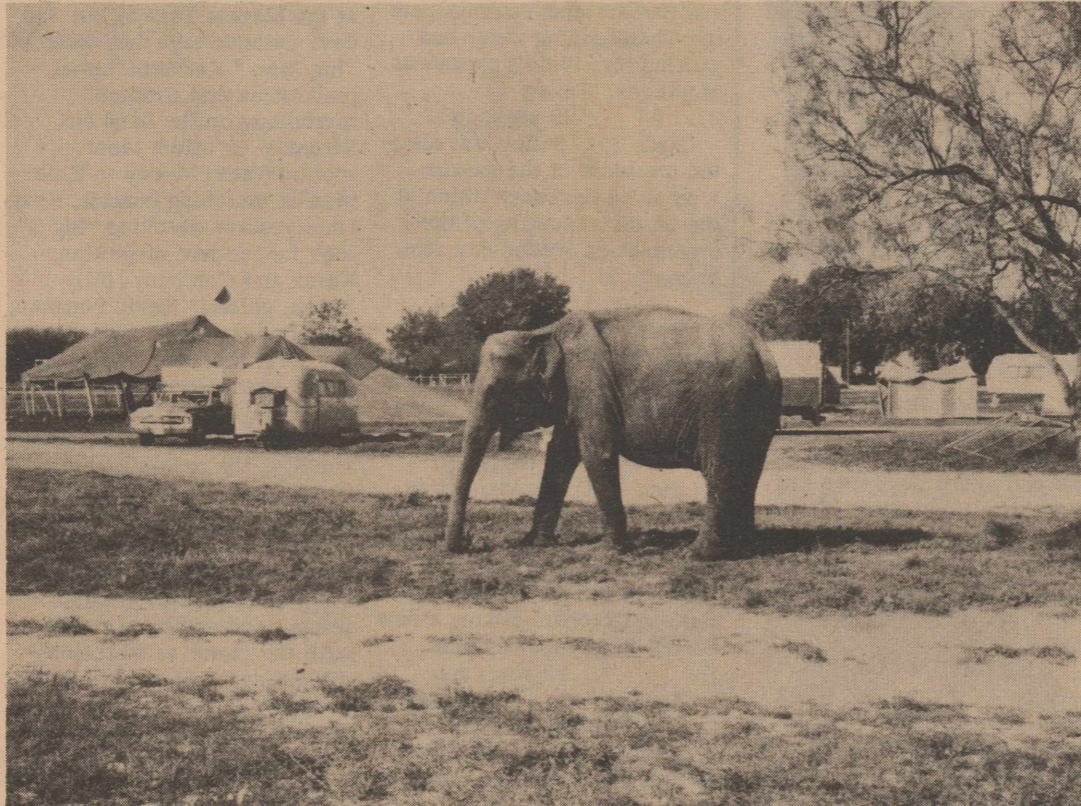
Bill Cooper, manager, said the town would try to cooperate with the Federal Energy Administration. The REA has announced that holiday lighting would not be singled out this year for voluntary or involuntary curtailment. However, consumers are urged to be prudent. Perhaps fewer indoor and outdoor lighting, the FEA suggests for homes, and nothing more than turning off community and other outdoor lights nightly at a reasonable hour.

Last year, Ozona's lights were turned on during Christmas and again during the New Year holiday. There was no shortage of electricity here, but the curtailment came with the oil embargo and government urging that electrical lighting be cut back. After discovering that one large department store in the east used more electricity in one night than Ozona's community lights used in a week, some were inclined to ignore the warnings from the nation's capital.

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Grand Prairie Has Ronald Berry Day

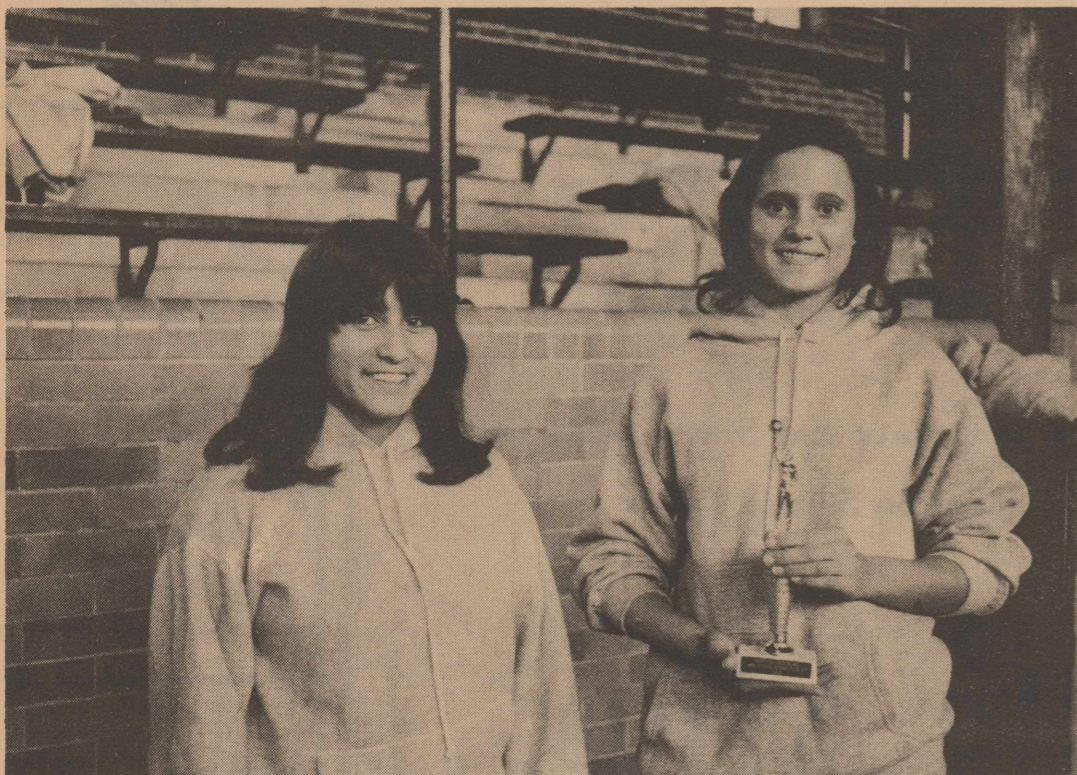

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Washington News Letter by Congressman O. C. Fisher

The current coal strike, which is playing havoc with the Nation's economy, is reminiscent of the old World War II John L. Lewis capers, and features the union power ambitions of the current President of the United Mine Workers, Arnold R. Miller. Miners already get from \$42 to \$50 per day.

The strike by 120,000 coal miners if continued for as much as four weeks--which may happen--is due to idle as many as 400,000 workers in steel, railroads, and other industries dependent on a steady supply of coal.

A tentative settlement was scrapped by the mine operatives before being submitted to the rank-and-file for approval. It is believed Miller can stop the strike if he wants to bad enough. That remains to be seen.

An innocuous sounding bill, labelled a "safe drinking water" measure, sailed through the House last week by a vote of 296-to-84. Fifteen Texans voted against it, and 8 favored this new power delegation to the EPA. The bill, an even stronger version having previously passed the Senate, now goes to conference. It empowers EPA to set federal standards for every municipal water system in the country.

Perhaps the implementation of this new grant of overwhelming power to EPA will not be as expensive for municipalities as appears likely. But the power thus given to EPA is

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Due to a late freeze for the first time in several years, there are many beautifully colored trees, shrubs and vines in Ozona. Especially you should notice the Spanish and Red Oaks, Tallows, sumac, crepe myrtle, fruit trees and Boston Ivy. The pecans failed to turn yellow before most of the leaves have fallen.

Cut tops of browned peonies back to a few inches above the ground, add a cup of bone-meal to soil around the plant and mound with soil for the winter.

When planting new shrubs, it would enhance the beauty of our city if everyone would plant a watermelon red crepe myrtle. This would be one way to show a unified effort during the summer months for the centennial and many years thereafter.

If plants are dry when bought in a nursery or upon arrival, water them immediately. Set in a shaded place until roots have absorbed enough moisture for safe planting in the garden without undue drying from the sun or strong winds. Plants with tender green leaves are best kept in a shady location for a few days before planting. This will get them hardened to the sunlight after having been in darkness during shipment.

Dahlias should be cut back to 2 or 3 inches above the ground immediately after the tops are killed by frost. If left in the ground, mound plants with soil to prevent freezing.

If you have a small area and want an easy-to-care for garden, plan a mini-garden that will reflect your needs and personality. They can be appealing and a joy to care for. There are many small and dwarf plants to be used in narrow borders, along walks, corners, built-in flower boxes and many attractive containers. Some gardens have been created on a do-it-yourself basis, while others have been professionally landscaped.

When driving through our city, there are many homes, vacant lots, business fronts and alleys that desperately need

weeds cut and cleaned. We urge everyone to help in this project.

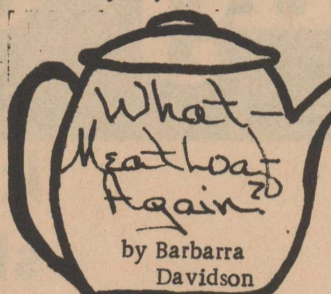
Not only is it good eating, it's good for you. Turkey is an excellent source of high protein, iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin.

ROULADE OF TURKEY
For each serving:
1 thin slice of cooked white meat of turkey, on bottom.
1 thin slice of baked or boiled ham, next.
3 stalks of cooked asparagus, last.

Roll up and place in a buttered baking dish. Cover with mushroom sauce and bake for 30 minutes at 300 degrees.

Mushroom sauce, 1 cup;
1/2 c. sliced mushrooms
2 Tbsp. butter
2 Tbsp. flour
3/4 c. chicken or turkey stock
1/2 c. cream

salt
sherry (may be omitted)
Sauté the mushrooms in butter until soft. Add flour, stock and cream to make a cream sauce. Cook for about 1 minute. Season with salt and sherry if you like.



CREAM OF POTATO SOUP
6 c. sliced potatoes (5 large)
1 c. sliced carrots
6 slices bacon
1 c. chopped onion
1 c. sliced celery
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 c. milk
2 c. light cream
finely shredded Cheddar cheese
parsley sprigs
Cook potatoes and carrots in boiling water until tender. Drain.

Saute bacon until crisp; drain and crumble. Sauté onion and celery in 2 Tbsp. of the bacon fat.

Combine potatoes, carrots, sauteed vegetables, bacon, salt, pepper, milk and cream. Simmer for 30 minutes. (Do not boil.) Garnish with shredded cheese and parsley. Makes about 2 quarts.

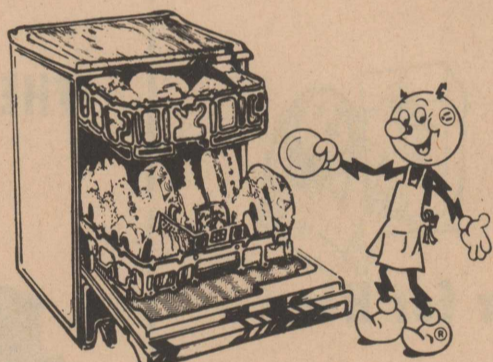

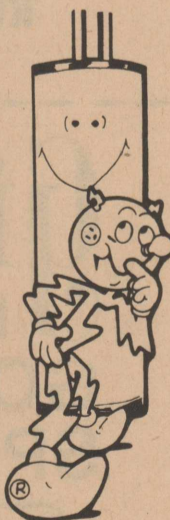

DISHWASHER SAVER-TIPS

A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash 1 dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it on. Use only detergents manufactured specifically for dishwashers. A wetting agent helps prevent water spots on glasses and silverware. Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.



WATER HEATER SAVER-TIPS

It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute will waste 300 gallons per month. To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom. The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs. A water heater that's old, or too small for your family needs, can be wasteful, because it's working too hard and using too much energy to keep up with your hot water demands.

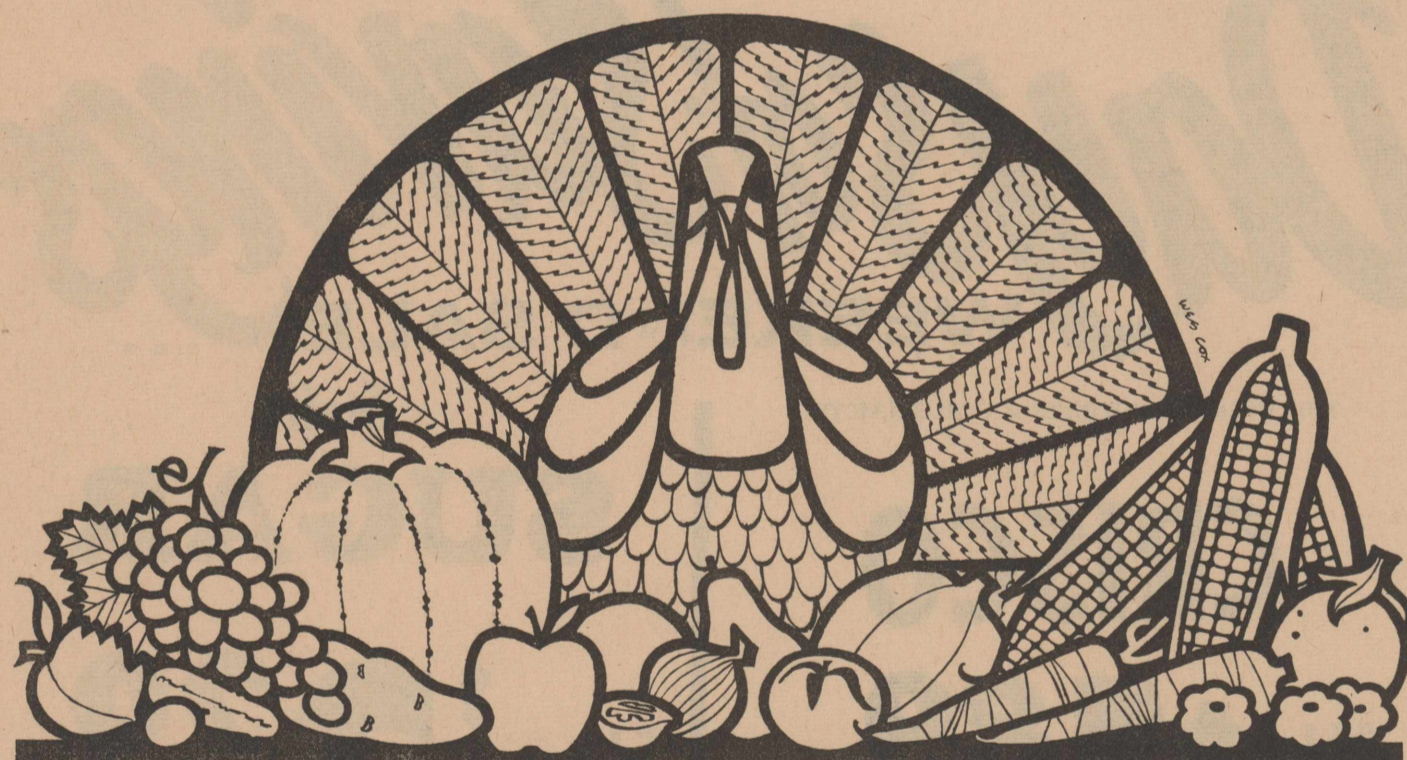
