### CRIME NOT HEREDITARY

Kessler, Houston Chief, Addresses Sleuths' Convention.

Crime is not hereditary, in the opinion of Wm. F. Kessler, chief of Houston detectives. A paper which Kessler had prepared was read by Barney Finn before the International Association for Identification and Texas Police Chiefs' convention at the Rice hotel Thursday morning.

"In some instances I believe that a distorted, unbalanced mind might lead a young man into a life of crime," Chief Kessler declared, "but I do not believe that a boy of the average mentality will voluntarily turn to a life of crime unless he has been brought up in an environment of hate and selfishness."

The address touched further on the problem of the stolen auto and declared that "the stool pigeon is a sty on the eye of society and a drawback to any department in the country."

Kessler pointed out the alarming increase in the number of youthful criminals—those between the ages of 16 and 25 years—and attributed the prevalence of these over any other type to the negligence of parents in bringing up their children, and to the automobile.




