COTTON GINNING AND SHIPPING

Tuesday afternoon Mr. W. E. Hail, cotton weigher, had weighed a total of 6651 bales of the 1924 cotton crop. The record books show that through September 16, 1923, the receipts amounted to 7427 bales, or about thirteen per cent more than this year. However, most of this year's crop is already in, the ginning rush being over.

Mr. G. H. Henderson, station agent, stated that 2886 bales had been shipped through the local station, while the shipping clerk at the warehouse said that his figures showed 3368 bales ordered to be shipped by

local buyers. Several nearby lots are now being used for storing the overflow cotton, which cannot be placed under the crowded warehouse. As soon as the shipping can be taken care of the congested conditions will be relieved.

REQUEST WARDEN OF PENITENTIARY TO RESIGN PLACE

Houston, Tex., Sept. 9.—W. N. Miller, warden of the state penitentiary at Huntsville, was today requested to resign, following a series of conferences between Governor Pat M. Neff and the state prison commission and the prison advisory board, was information available here.

The sessions were held at Huntsville behind closed doors. Secrecy was maintained regarding the subjects under discussion, but it was stated in well-informed circles that the demand for Mr. Miller's resignation came as a result of differences which existed between him and members of the board, and that the plan was one cause of disagreement.

Mr. Miller took office early this year and was the first warden to execute a prisoner by electrocution. He has served many years as a peace officer in Texas and six years as sheriff

of Johnson County. His home was at Cleburne. He has been given until Oct. 1 to quit office.

CRIME NOT HEREDITARY

Kessler, Houston Chief, Addresses Sleuths' Convention.

Crime is not hereditary, in the opinion of Wm. F. Kessler, chief of Houston detectives.

"In some instances I believe that a distorted, unbalanced mind might lead a young man into a life of crime," Chief Kessler declared.

The address touched further on the problem of the stolen auto and declared that "the stool pigeon is a sty on the eye of society and a drawback to any department in the country."

Kessler pointed out the alarming increase in the number of youthful criminals—those between the ages of 16 and 25 years—and attributed the prevalence of these over any other type to the negligence of parents in bringing up their children, and to the automobile.

In addition to setting the date for the hearing the court directed the notification of the defendants in the case, consisting of all county judges, county clerks and sheriffs of all Texas counties, James E. Ferguson and Mrs. Ferguson and J. J. Strickland, secretary of state, are named in the petition in addition to the county officers.

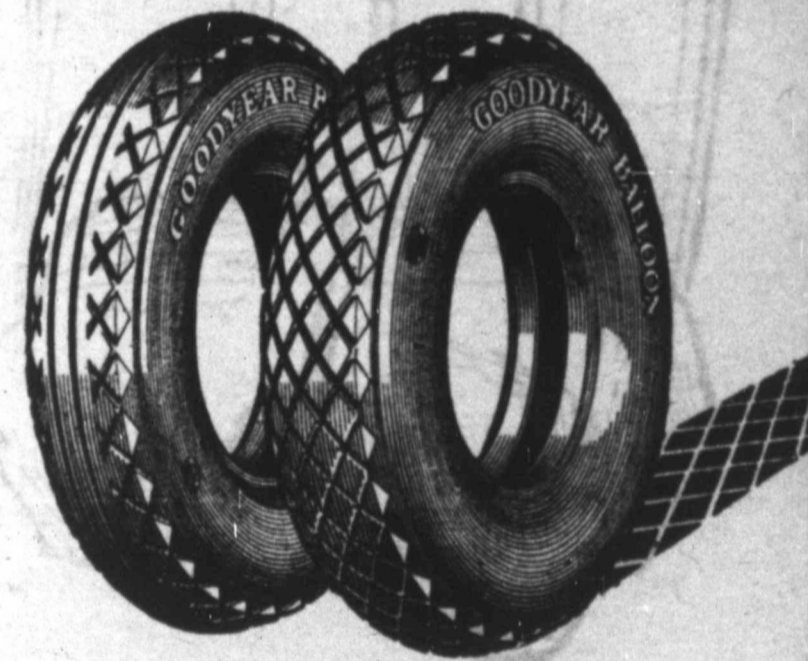
