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SUNSHINE SPECIAL HAS BAD ACCIDENT

The Sunshine Special, passing Crockett at about 4 o'clock north-bound, was wrecked three miles south of Longview Thursday evening. This train was running late when it passed Crockett, but had made up some of the time when the wreck occurred. Report is that it had made up 25 minutes between Palestine and the scene of the accident. Engineer Tarbutton, his fireman and a passenger were killed. The steel equipment saved the lives of other passengers. The engine left the rails, turned around and turned over, as in the case of the wreck at Grapeland last summer, and also as in the wreck of the Sunshine Special between Crockett and Houston several years ago. The engineer was caught under the overturned engine and crushed to death, as at Grapeland, but in the wreck south of Crockett the engineer was thrown clear of the engine and not killed. It is said that the baggage car went off opposite the engine, the first coach followed and turned over and the second coach turned crosswise the track. The chair car and diner were derailed, but the six Pullmans staid on the rails. Engineer Tarbutton who, with his fireman and a passenger, lost his life, was about 65 years old and had been running as an engineer between Longview and Galveston for more than thirty years. It is said that he had never before had a bad accident. A brother, who was also an engineer, was killed by the overturning of an engine near Latexo several years ago. The dead engineer and the fireman leave families in Palestine, where they were buried on Friday following.

COUNTY'S GROWTH KEEPING IN STEP

Mrs. Gertie Sallas, county superintendent of schools, gives us the scholastic enrollment of the county as 9,231, including all common school districts and the Crockett, Grapeland and Lovelady independent districts. This is a substantial increase over last year.

The scholastic census is considered as one-fifth of the population, according to custom, thus Houston county should have a population of 46,155. This is no doubt more than the actual population of the county, the census of 1920 showing about 30,000, yet the growth of the county since the last census has been large, and this would be in keeping with estimates of Crockett's growth. A fairly conservative estimate, however, of the county population would be 36,000, one person for each bale of cotton the county produced in 1924. Growth and development has been rapid since the world war.

Christian Church.

BEDIAS TAKES GAME MONDAY FROM SNOW

Runt Carroll, he of the small stature and mighty left arm, engaged in a southpaw pitching duel with Dewey Snow Tuesday afternoon, and when Crockett's defense crumbled behind Snow, Bedias walked off winner by a 4 to 2 count. Bedias jumped ahead in the second inning. Block and K. McAdams produced singles, and when Holleman dropped Snow's throw on Mayfield's hunt, the bags were filled. Pyle sacrificed, Snow to Barbee on first, Black scoring. Carroll sacrificed out pitcher to first, McAdams scoring.

Crockett scored once in her half. Barbee bounced a double over center. Gardner singled to center and Barbee scored when the hit was poorly handled.

In the Bedias third, Stone singled and Bailey walked. Black forced Bailey, short to second, and Holleman missed the throw to first, Stone scoring.

In the sixth Stone singled and scored on Henry's double over third.

In the eighth three Crockett errors filled the bases with one out, but Snow worked out of the hole.

In the fifth Crockett filled the bases after two were out, but the pinch hit was not forthcoming. In the ninth Barbee singled and scored when Carroll threw to the fence after fielding Monzingo's easy grounder.

Carroll fanned eleven, while Snow laid seven low on strikes. Each hurler walked one batter. Bedias made a double play in the third inning, third to first to short, on third base. Lynum made an unassisted double play in the seventh. Wakefield and Barbee furnished the fielding features.

POPULATION SHOWS HEALTHY INCREASE

The scholastic enrollment of the Crockett Independent school district this year shows 1042 scholastics. By the old custom of multiplying the scholastic census by five, we arrive at 5,210 as the total population of the Crockett school district. Possibly seven hundred would live beyond the city limits, thereby giving us 4,500 as a fairly accurate estimate of Crockett's population. The census in 1920 gave 3,061 as the population.

CROCKETT WINS THE SERIES FROM BEDIAS

Crockett defeated Bedias in the third and deciding game of the series Tuesday 5 to 2. Curtis Barbee, catcher by trade, mounted the slab and hurled a two-hit game, though wildness came near proving fatal. He walked four men, three in the fourth inning, and hit two batters. An error at first paved the way for the first run and a wild pitch let the other in. Barbee fanned six.

Stone was hammered steadily. In the first inning Prince flew out to center, but Wakefield and Gardner got on base on errors by the Bedias third baseman. Powledge doubled, scoring both.

After Barbee had grounded out, short to first, in the fourth inning, Prince doubled and scored on Wakefield's double.

In the seventh Lynum singled and took third when Holleman hit through the second baseman. Holleman stole second, and both scored when Monzingo singled.

Thirteen hits were made by the Crockett players, Powledge getting a double and two singles, Prince and Wakefield a double and single each, Lynum two singles and Gardner, Lewis, Holleman and Monzingo one hit each.

Crockett is famous for its water system, and some of the visitors commented that Crockett people do not appreciate the wonderful water supply that we have. The Huntsville officials are aroused by numerous disastrous fires, which they have suffered recently. Besides a wonderful water system, the visitors found a modern fire truck with up-to-date equipment which has been utilized very successfully by a volunteer fire department.

The Huntsville people were strongly impressed with what they saw and will doubtlessly begin work on plans of a similar system for Huntsville in the near future.

CROCKETT TO HAVE TWO NEW BUILDINGS

The Courier learns that two new brick buildings will be erected by Mrs. I. A. Daniel and Hon. J. E. Winfree of Houston on the vacant lots near the Highway Filling Station and facing the Beasley old home on West First street. These new buildings will be a decided improvement in that section of the city. Hon. J. E. Winfree recently invested in considerable local property and is planning to make extensive improvements.

Crockett Lions Feed.

The Mecca Cafe fed the Lions Wednesday at regular luncheon, the Methodist ladies having tired of the job and the weather getting too warm. Invitation from the Lions' Club of Palestine, to be guests of the Palestine club Thursday of next week, was accepted and a committee appointed to arrange details of the trip. President C. L. Edmiston announced

that citizens would meet with the commissioners' court Friday, June 5, when the petition for a county-wide road bond issue would be considered and the election probably ordered. President Edmiston advised all Lions to be present.

Matters of minor importance were considered and the club adjourned until next Wednesday at noon.

CITY AUDITORIUM HAS BIG OPENING

The new city auditorium theatre opened Monday night with an overflow attendance. The opening picture, "Sally," drew people from all over Houston county to this new, modern motion picture house.

The seats on the main floor number 624, while balcony seats number 252, totaling 876. Every seat and all available standing room were taken, and scores were of necessity turned away from the ticket office for the first show. More than a thousand people saw the picture opening night.

The cost of the city auditorium was more than \$35,000 dollars, while the pipe organ installed by the lessee, alone, cost in excess of \$6,000. Several thousand dollars' worth of additional fixtures have been installed in completing the auditorium for use.

A number of school elections have been held recently. An election for the consolidation of the Center Ridge and Kennard districts lost. A bond election in the Latexo district lost. A \$2,000 bond issue and maintenance tax in the Rodgers district carried. A bond election in the Ash district carried. Maintenance tax elections in the Volga and Holly districts carried.

An election for the issuance of \$1500 bonds in the Creek colored school district is to be held on June 13. A bond election in the Center school district for the issuance of \$1200 will be held on June 22.

Houston county is building a system of schools that few counties of the population and valuation of this county can excel.

Two Students Slightly Injured.

Students returning from Mary Allen Seminary to Oklahoma were on the Sunshine Special, wrecked near Longview Thursday evening. Rev. B. R. Smith, principal of Mary Allen, left immediately for Longview; where he found two of the students in a hospital, but not seriously injured. The students were being well taken care of and provided for at Longview.

VICTIMS OF TRAIN WRECK ARE BURIED

Palestine, Texas, May 29.—Funeral services for Engineer L. H. Tarbutton, aged 64, and Fireman F. H. Griffith, aged 40, who were killed instantly in a train wreck near Longview on Thursday night, were conducted at their residences here on Friday afternoon, followed by interment in East Hill cemetery. Both men were popular here and their tragic deaths have cast a gloom over the city.

Engineer Tarbutton was one of the oldest men in service on the International-Great Northern. He is survived by his widow and seven children. Ed Tarbutton, a brother, is chief of police at Tyler.

Fireman Frank Griffith is survived by his widow and two small daughters.

During the past year Engineers W. B. Cook, T. M. Webb and L. H. Tarbutton and Firemen Vernon D. Hill, W. P. Persons and F. H. Griffith, all of Palestine, have been killed in wrecks while operating trains.

Longview, Texas, May 29.—Immediate investigation was begun Friday by railroad officials to determine the cause of the wreck Thursday night of Sunshine Special No. 2 of the International-Great Northern railroad, two miles south of here, in which three were killed and 30 injured, according to a revised check of the casualties.

Though the cause has not been determined, it was believed that a broken flange or other locomotive trouble resulted in the train leaving the rails while running at a high rate of speed.

The train, said to be traveling about one hour late out of Palestine, had made up lost time, when it hit a slightly downward curve, the engine and tender plunging over an embankment about 15 feet high. The baggage and mail coaches were thrown south of the roadway, while the first passenger coach was hurled northward. Only a few passengers were in this coach.

All Pullman coaches remained on the rails. The third coach hung partly suspended over the edge of the embankment, with one end high in the air, preventing passengers leaving except through the windows.

Wrecking crews started to work early Friday. It will require the entire day to clear away the wreckage and prepare the road for traffic, it is said.

Prince and Gardner hit a single and double each; Wakefield hit a double; Barbee scratched a pair of singles; Lewis, Snow and Lynum each hit a single and Snow contributed a pair of sacrifices to the semi-pro victory. Few bad mistakes marred the fielding.
