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CROCKETT DOWNS TRINITY TWICE

Crockett handed Trinity a twin trouncing Saturday at Trinity as a part of the Fourth of July celebration. The morning game went seven innings and was won 7 to 5. The afternoon contest was of regulation length and was a 3 to 2 affair.

First Game.

Crockett started off with a rush. Dorrell doubled past first and took third of Wakefield's sacrifice. Reynolds was hit by a pitched ball. Powledge was out, pitcher to first, Reynolds taking second. Minnick then crashed a home run over the left field fence. Holleman tripped to left, but Lynum grounded out to second.

Trinity came back with two runs. Faust walked and Riviere singled. Youngs doubled and Faust scored. Riviere also scored and Youngs took third when Powledge threw the ball into the grandstand. Carroll then fanned the Barschow brothers and Falk.

In the fourth Minnick singled, took second on Holleman's sacrifice, reached third on Lynum's fly-out to right and scored on Monzingo's single.

A single by Henry, a double by McMahan, a walk to Faust and doubles by Riviere and N. Barschow gave Trinity three runs and the lead in the fifth.

In the seventh Lynum doubled past third. Monty popped to short. Davis batted for Carroll and was out, pitcher to first, Lynum taking third. With the count three-two, Dorrell singled, scoring Lynum. Wakefield singled and scored, with Dorrell, on Reynolds' Texas leaguer to right.

TRINITY LOSES GAME IN CROCKETT SUNDAY

Crockett defeated Trinity Sunday on the home grounds for the third straight victory, score being 6 to 4. A good crowd witnessed the game, despite threatening weather. Showers made the ground slippery and almost prevented the playing of the game.

Crockett scored twice in the first inning. Reynolds was safe on an error and was forced by Wakefield. Powledge shot a home run over the left field fence, scoring Wake ahead of himself.

Trinity filled the bases in the second on singles by R. Barschow, Hines and Falk. Bloxsum fanned. Henry grounded to third and Wakefield fumbled, Rube scoring. Hines scored on a wild pitch, but the side was retired without any more scoring.

Three errors, three hits and a sacrifice gave Crockett three runs and the game in the third inning.

A single by Hines and a double by Bloxsum gave Trinity a run in the fourth.

Reynolds led off the Crockett fourth with a long home run over the center field fence.

In the eighth Bloxsum lifted a high fly over the left field fence for a homer.

Trinity filled the bases with one out in the ninth, but failed to score. Crockett got but one man on base after the fourth inning.

DRAWS 25 YEARS FOR WIFE MURDER

Winnie Anderson, an I.-G. N. locomotive engineer, was given 25 years in the penitentiary for wife murder at Palestine last week. Anderson was known in Crockett, having been an engineer on freight trains through Crockett before taking a passenger run between Palestine and Longview. He and his wife were both reared in Palestine. Anderson was 44 years of age and leaves a son 22 years old. Quarreling with his wife at night, he arose early the next morning, struck her on the head with his pistol and continued until her head was badly beaten. Anderson then went into the kitchen, got a butcher knife, came back and cut his wife's throat from ear to ear. Returning to the kitchen, he prepared his breakfast, after which he went out on his passenger run to Longview, but returned to Palestine when advised by telegraph that his wife had been murdered. He at first confessed, but afterward denied his guilt. The fact that there were no eye witnesses perhaps saved him from the electric chair. There was another woman in the case, who testified that she had gotten around \$2000 from Anderson since last fall and frequently went with him on his train to Longview. In appearance Anderson would be classed above the average, and his wife was from one of Palestine's oldest families. Anderson belonged to the younger class of engineers and had been in the passenger service only a few years, having graduated, as is customary, from the freight service.

STRANGER DIES IN CROCKETT HOTEL

Clint Wilkerson, 33 years of age, was found dead in his bed at the Thornton hotel Friday morning. He had retired at 11:30 o'clock Thursday night in apparent good health. Justice of Peace E. M. Callier held an inquest and declared death due to natural causes. A farmer living near Crockett identified the deceased as an old acquaintance in Milam county, and stated that he knew him to be subject to epileptic fits, the probable cause of his death.

Communication was established with a brother in Milam county, but the brother failed to reach Crockett, or give instructions for forwarding the remains.

The deceased came to Crockett about two weeks ago, looking for work. A sister had lived near Crockett, but moved away some time ago. About \$17.50 in money and some clothing were found among Wilkerson's personal effects.

The remains were interred in the Crockett cemetery Monday morning by Waller & Green, on proper authority.

Salt Necessary for Animals.

The best way to salt live stock is by permitting them to help themselves at will. Either common salt or rock salt may be used; however, if common salt is used it is advisable to protect it from the weather, in that the rains will dissolve it, and, of course, wash it away.

The matter of whether live stock can be raised with or without salt has been the basis of many an experiment. Those experiments have usually resulted in added support to the contention that salt is a necessary item in any ration. While live stock will live a considerable time without salt, nevertheless they will not give as profitable returns from feeds consumed as will live stock receiving salt, in fact, animals have been known to show a general lack of thrift and vigor owing to the lack of salt.—Southland Farmer.

TOMATO IS GOLD TO FARMERS OF SMALL EAST TEXAS VILLAGE

Gresham, Texas, July 1.—The enigma of the tomato may stir the outside world into heated controversy as to whether it is a fruit or a vegetable, but to Gresham a tomato is now and ever shall be gold.

The luscious, rotund edible has given this village the greatest income per capita of any town in Texas. With two stores, about half a dozen residences, and only 50 inhabitants, this wide spot in the road, six miles from Tyler, Smith county, within a few weeks each year does a business totalling half a million dollars. This is about \$10,000 for each inhabitant.

It is one of the largest shipping centers for the east Texas tomato crop, which begins to move about May 22 each year, continuing until about June 20. About 300 cars of tomatoes were shipped from here this season to all parts of the United States. Each car, containing 1000 crates, will bring about \$1200. Prices this year went to \$1.62 a crate at the highest. In a single day \$145,000 worth of tomatoes were shipped.

Ripen En Route to Market.

Most of the tomatoes are shipped green without refrigeration, the crates being so packed that the tomatoes get plenty of air. They are wrapped in paper and ripen on the way to market.

The shipping season is a hustling time in the village of Gresham. Every man, woman and child is at work in a feverish rush to get the crop rolling to market, for this is not only the bread and butter, it is the very life of Gresham. Women wrap pink squares of paper around the green, pulpy fruit, moving their hands with lightning dexterity. Men drive nails into crate lids in a flash. Others push enormous truck loads of the crates into the cars; while children run hither and thither doing innumerable odd jobs.

Long lines of country wagons loaded to the guards with full crates and singing negroes; locomotives pulling in empties and pulling out loaded cars; women and children and men bent double in the fields picking the crop; and crowds of automobilists stopping on the highway to see the sight—this is Gresham in the days of early summer. For a few brief weeks the little town lives; then, for long months it rolls up in its cocoon

Cotton No Longer King.

It is a common sight here to see a farmer drive in with \$250 worth of tomatoes loaded on his wagon. And many of the farmers are negroes, who have learned the ways of thrift and industry.

The point to the story of Gresham is that cotton is no longer king in east Texas. The white fluff is giving way to the red pulp. In Smith and Cherokee counties the farmers will receive about \$1,500,000 for this year's crop. Tyler and Jacksonville, with Gresham, are among the chief shipping centers. The loadings for the district totaled between 1800 and 2000 cars this season. About 500 cars were shipped from Jacksonville alone.

This year witnessed the first special express train shipment of tomatoes from this territory. On the night of June 15 a special train of eight refrigerator cars was made up in Jacksonville, near here, and the next afternoon it was in St. Louis, some of the cars going on to New York. On the same day another express car left for San Francisco. Alto, on the Cotton Belt line, also is a heavy shipper.

LABOR HELD BACK BY USELESS WASTE

Indianapolis, Ind., June 27.—

Wastefulness in American industrial and commercial life constitutes one of the greatest obstacles in the way of labor's aspirations, James M. Lynch, president of the International Typographical Union, said in a statement issued to members Saturday. The statement was based upon findings of an economic investigation conducted by the union.

"Enormous waste in wealth and manpower characterizes nearly every line of American business endeavor," said Mr. Lynch. "The 'middle man' takes an unnecessarily heavy toll from producer and consumer. Selling and credit costs run the nation's bill for necessities to an absurdly high figure.

"Improvement in the lot of the worker-wage-earner and farmer can not be greatly advanced until the national habit of wastefulness is assailed and reduced.

"We have come to talk of salesmanship almost with bated breath as the great American art, yet as a matter of fact intensive selling methods are intrinsically wasteful and no real service to humanity. It has become common practice to dispose of merchandise and service not on the grounds of quality and merit, but by virtue of superior salesmanship. Manufacturers allow as high as 40 per cent of their total operating expense for selling. The jobber adds to his selling cost and the retailer adds his, and eventually the consumer pays double or triple the value of his purchase for the luxury of being persuaded to buy.

"Modern advertising mediums have attained the capacity to exhibit all the merchandise anyone has to sell before all prospective buyers without the aid of armies of salesmen combing the country to harass buyers into investing.

"That we are overdoing this selling business is a natural conclusion if one but reflects upon the manner in which salesmen are greeted as a nuisance. Most buyers know they can go to market for all that they need and that they would save much time if relieved of the importunities of salesmen. It is becoming axiomatic that if one possesses talent as a salesman he can make money whether he possesses any useful knowledge or honesty of purpose or not. Hence more and more young men and women are crowding into the selling business instead of into producing lines.

"From an ethical viewpoint any talent, beyond knowledge of

his product, that a salesman employs in his work must be of little value to organized society, if not downright dishonest. Certainly selling, regarded as a profession, soon shades off into polite swindling. I am speaking, of course, of the peripatetic or outside salesman, whose mind teems with schemes for artful triumphs over buyers.

"Without conceding too much from the general superiority of American industrial and commercial methods, we might deign to observe the European attitude toward the salesman. The glib monologist and the cheap tactician, whose exploits form so large a part of American folk lore, would not be tolerated for a minute in England, for instance. The salesman is a native American nuisance.

"It is not the intention to condemn all salesmen. Some serve a really useful social purpose, but the vocation is overcrowded. The number of men and women, engaged more or less successfully in selling in this country, comes near to approximating the number actually engaged in production. Their number could be reduced by about one-half without any great loss to national wealth or service, and with this half restored to useful labor material wealth would be vastly increased.

"If the unnecessary salesman, the spenders, the wasters, the improvident heirs to fortune, the petty criminals and other humans who have never known work could be induced to engage in useful endeavor, hours of la-

bor could be reduced, working conditions improved and a great prosperity would be available for all. The cultural and recreational advantages thus gained would greatly improve the race.
