

Most newspapers hesitate to "That we have been slipping criticize various details of prohibition enforcement, not wantby a scientific test made on publing to be drawn into the vortex of propaganda which "wet" and "dry" interests are hurling over the public's head.

Even the most sincere friends of prohibition may find plenty of room for criticizing enforcement methods, however. One of the most glaring faults of dry officers was made the subject of comment by Federal Judge J. C. Hutcheson this week, when an aged man was brought to trial in federal district court on a charge of possessing a soda-pop bottle filled with whisky.

So long as there are stills in the woods, liquor laden cars on the highways and "wet" fleets running to and fro from the high seas, it would appear that prohibition officers might find bigger game than a soda-pop bottle of liquor in the hands of an aged man.

It is strange that in all the discussion regarding prison reform, the prisoners themselves have been asked for no referendum.

Being human, the inmates of the Texas prison system would offer widely varied remedies for prison ills. But the public might be surpised at the ideas which many intelligent convicts hold.

It is to be doubted whether some of the altruistic methods advocated by prison reformers would muster a majority vote among the convicts. It is certain that some of the men, at least, are opposed to any plan which will break the routine of prison rules.

Perhaps the most widespread demand of the men would be for farm managers, overseers and guards who "shoot square." In this connection we can think of one farm manager in Texas who is universally respected by his Black sateen bloomers for for the fifth time in six years, that you can eat all you want men, although his methods are far from those of a pacifist.
