An Elevator.

EDITOR LEADER: I would call the attention of the business men of Graham to a question, I think, of much importance to themselves, as well as creating a market for our country and tending to increase consumption of our produce, which would build up a greater volume of business generally.

The most important move would be to build an Elevator sufficiently large to accommodate those that would handle wheat, which could be done at a cost of, say \$3000 (on Chas plan) and could be run with small cost. The prospect at this time is very good for a good yield from the wheat crop, and with an Elevator to store away the surplus we would not have to go to other markets for our flour or have that which is taken away from us as has been done and will continue to be done until we provide storage for the surplus.

I am aware of the fact that money is scarce, and I am also sure that they are slow to take hold of such things without having some knowledge of what the future might reveal, but give this question a little thought and see if it would not be of your interest to have such an enterprise in your midst.

The rules and regulations governing such institutions is very easy to understand, and I think would work satisfactory to all concerned. Trusting that some one will give his views on this question, and also suggest some way that it can be accomplished by harvest, I submit and await replies. CITIZEN.

The Teachers' Institute.

The two days meeting of the Teachers' Institute was held in Graham, last Friday and Saturday. Following are the names of the teachers who were present: Misses Mollee McJilton, Gray Duling, Ivy Darling, Lee Biske, Lillian Eganest, Martha Elkins, Mary Fields, Cornelia Jewell, Sallie Whittenburg, Mary Willis; Prof. J. N. Johnston, Geo. Compton, R. Lindsey, J. A. Fairly, G. A. Hill, R. L. Johnston, C. W. Rasure, J. E. Simpson, T. K. Timmons, G. G. Tefeller, W. T. Blakey, and G. A. Gray. Also the two Bouldin brothers of Jack county and probably others whose names we overlooked. R. Lindsey was chosen chairman, R. L. Johnston, pro. tem, G. A. Gray secretary.

While not many of the teachers who were on the program were present, all the questions were taken up and very freely and elaborately discussed from many points of view, as only Young county teachers can do. The weather being very inclement, the turn out of hearers was rather limited part of the time. However the writer feels himself safe in the assertion that Young county can come nearer having a teachers' institute at anytime and at any place than any county in the State.

Capt. Gay was out, and as usual prepared to give the teachers a treat in the way of a good talk. The presence of Rev. G. W. White, of the M. E. Church, at each session, was inspiring and encouraging to say the least of it. Bro. White realizes the importance of good schools, as does Judge O. E. Pinsky, who also lent encouragement by his presence.

As usual Prof. Johnson and Lindsey "looked horns" in several discussions, creating the usual interest, sensation and fun, especially on the subject, "Hereditary Influences." A question of this species invariably "rites 'em up." The secretary had a point to make on the question of heredity, but failed to get the desired opportunity. Under the head of miscellaneous business, J. N. Johnston, J. E.
