An Italian inventor has a submarine apparatus which he calls "meridic" sphere, and by means of which he professes to be able to descend to any depth in the sea. In his experiment at Spezia he stored some two thousand cubic feet of compressed air in his "sphere" which he entered with two friends and which was then lowered to a depth of some thirty feet. ### Cuts of Beef.

The principal difference in cuts of beef as they are prepared for the production of bone and the relative amount of water, lean and fat in the flesh, says the Field and Farm.
