Train Held Up.
Fort Worth, Texas, Oct. 1.—At high noon to-day, at a point 110 miles north of this city and at siding No. 1, just north of Chickasha, I. T. there occurred one of the boldest and most daring train robberies to date. The train held up was the through Rock Island passenger mail and express from Chicago and Kansas City. Six masked and well disguised men did the work.
