After Our Coal Lands.

For sometime past Hon. B. B. Paddock of Ft. Worth and Hon. R. F. Arnold of this place have been in correspondence with an English syndicate with a view to the development of the Young county coal fields. Samples of the coal were sent to London and the Britons became interested enough to send out an expert to examine the fields. The expert, Dr. Keith of London England, arrived last week in Ft. Worth and came out over the proposed line of railway, accompanied by Hon. B. B. Paddock, W. D. Paddock, and W. O. Hall, leasing engineer, from Fort Worth. The party were met at Whit by Mr. Arnold who accompanied them to the various coal croppings and shafts in the west part of this county. The expert made a careful examination and will submit an exhaustive report to his employers in London. Of course he did not intimate what that report would be but Judge Arnold believes that it will be a favorable one and if it is it means the early development of our coal lands as well as the immediate building of a railroad from Fort Worth via Graham to the coal fields.

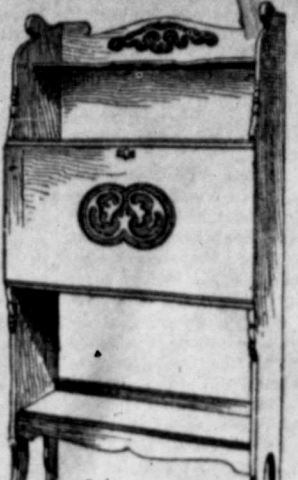

WHERE BESANT LIVES

PRETTY HOME OF THE ENGLISH WRITER.

The Grounds Were Laid Out by the Owner—An Old Fashioned Interior—The Author's Domestic Tastes and Personal Habits.

T breezy Hampstead Sir Walter Besant lives and his home is called Frogal End. The picture of a red house stands on a small hill and the approaching path is bordered by green lawns, trees and lovely flowers.

Sir Walter himself was landscape gardener when the grounds were arranged and there is an entire absence of formality—vegetables and strawberries thrive together on the sunny slopes and flowers and fruit live amiably in the same plot of ground. The study looks like a room set in the middle of a garden, for the long open windows show charming views of flowers and trees. Miss Lottie A. Lytle is the first colored woman ever admitted to the bar in any court of the United States. She is 23 years old and is a native of Tennessee. In 1882 he secured for his daughter, who had received a good public school education, the position of engraving clerk for the Kansas general assembly. This work gave her a taste for a career higher and wider than domesticity, and soon afterward she went to Tennessee and entered the Nashville Central College. She completed the full law course. A diploma from that institution, together with certificate of good moral character from some of the judges, was presented to any bar in the state without examination. Upon the certificate of a colored lawyer of standing, Judge L. P. Cooper of Memphis, without other formalities, ordered the clerk's office to enroll Miss Lytle as a member of the Shelby county bar. The young woman had no intention of practicing law in Tennessee, but deemed it best to secure admission in that state as a stepping stone to entering active work in her profession in Topeka.

La Fort is a good specimen of the highest type of the civilized Indian. He is well along in years now, and his hair and mustache are gray. His English is excellent for one of his limited opportunities. Among the tribes of the Six Nations his word is law. Not only is he the head of the Iroquois League, but he also is the chief of the Onondagas. All the Indians within his jurisdiction had great respect for him. He was at the head of the New York Indians who were at the Columbian Exposition, and he said last Sunday that a man from New York had been to see him in the previous week about going with some of his people to the Paris exhibition, and that he had agreed to go.

When waiting for the white people to come, the chief spoke about the old dadas and their ceremonies. "I have not taken a census of the people on the reservation in three years," said he. The last one showed about four hundred Indians, men, women and children, and the number is about the same now. There are between seventy and eighty families. Twenty years ago there were only 200 persons here, so you see we have increased in numbers. The state gives us an annuity of money and salt. Last year we got \$444 to each inhabitant, and 150 bushels of salt for this dance comes the nearest to money of those that were sung in the afternoon.

The squaws soon grew weary and so did the spectators, and they were all glad to get away from this stuffy room with its swarm of flies. After the dance the young Indians played lacrosse on the green near the Council House, and really the game was more interesting than the dances.

INDIAN CORN DANCE.

Annual Festival of the Onondaga Indians.

Celebrated at the Reservation Near Syracuse—White Men Admired Upon the Payment of a Fee—How the Ceremony Has Degenerated.

HAT heathen recognition of the blessings of Divine Providence, the annual green-corn dance, was held by the Onondaga Indians last Sunday, writes a Syracuse, N. Y., correspondent. As is customary with them, some ceremonies were held in the latter part of the preceding week, which the whites were not made acquainted. It is said, and it is undoubtedly true, that the real green-corn dance is held on the quiet—although there is a good deal of noise about it, and that the public ceremony, which always takes place on Sunday, is really the curiosity of the whites and the mercenary earnings of the noble red men. The dance was at first fixed for a week ago Sunday, but was postponed for a week. The delay was due to the fact that the old chief Daniel La Fort was ill. The real reason was that the number of white people on hand was too small to make it profitable to the whites.
