#### THOSE NEW VESSELS.

Ever Built.

A Washington special to the New York Tribune says:

An even dozen is the prependerating fighting figure in the designs just practically completed by Chief Con-One expert extensively quoted, structor Hichborn for the four coast defense vessels authorized in the last naval appropriation bill. These vessels are to be the most formidable ever constructed for their peculiar purposes, and will include many novelties in modern naval architecture. Under the provisions of the bill their cost, excluding armanent, is limited to \$1,-250,000 each. They will have 12. knots speed, 12 feet draught, 12-inch batteries, 12-inch Hichborn inclined turrets, 12-inch guns, 12-inch armor, and each of their twin screws will be has been found to contain rubies and driven by 1200 horse power engines. Their displacement will be just twice 1200 tons.

> The guns will be monnted in pairs in turrets placed a little forward of the midship section, and will have an arc of fire of 300 degrees, which is unequalled in any vessel of the navy. The turrets will be the first constructed with inclined surfaces, which are calculated to deflect any shot striking them. The hulls will have three feet freeboard, covered with armor, and the engines will be more thoroughly protected than those of any battleship affoat.

The chief objection to existing monitors, the lack of berthing capacity for the men, will be obviated on these vessels by a superstructure on deck extending from the turret to within a few feet of the stern, in which the men will live in time of peace. In action no particular harm will be done if this is shot away by the enemy, as the crew and officers at that time will be below deck, working the ship. It is expected that these vessels will be begun in a few weeks and completed in twelve months.

#### THOSE MORRO CASTLES

How There Happened to Be So Many of Them in Cuba

Readers of war news must be struck by the number of "Morro Castles" with which our forces have to deal. Havana's fort of that name is the best known building in Cuba. And now comes word of an attack by American warships on a third M castle at Santiago de Caba, the most important port in the southeastern part of the island. Some readers have probably wondered how it happened that no such castles were encountered at Matanzas, Cardenas and Cienfuegos.

The explanation of this recurrence of the name "Morro Castle" is found in the fact that that the word "Morro" means "promontory." Many of the harbors of Cuba are remarkable landlocked bays, opening to the sea through narrow channels, usually long and deep. They are shaped somewhat like a man's hand, with the fingers more or less spread and the wrist reduced in size. At Havana, Santiago and some other ports, one side of the channel connecting the inner with the sea ends in a bold, rocky headland. The opposite point is lower and less conspicuous. Where the higher and steeper angle of the shore, between the channel of the harbor entrance on one side and the open sea on the other. is telephones, to survey for water works crowned by an elaborate fort, formidable in the times when it was erected, this fortification is usually and naturally named Morro castle, or "The Castle of the Promontory.'

#### AMERICAN DAREDEVILS

Sink the Merrimac in the Neck of the Entrance to Santiago Harbor

Washington, June 4 .- Unofficial dispatches announce the sinking of the collier Merrimac just at the entrance of the parrow channel leading into Santiago harbor It was designedly done by orders of Admiral Sampson, and it is said that when he called for eight volunteers to undertake the hazardous deed-which meant possible death, and little hope of escape-every man in the squadron offered his ser-

Hobson was chosen to command because of his coolness and knowledge of the explosives he was to use. Seven other men accompanied him. At 3 a. m., Friday, the Merrimac, laden with coal and other ballast, under her own steam, headed for the channel. She passed the first fort before being really observed, or was purposely permitted to pass it. Then the firing begun from all the forts, and under a rain of red hot metal she sailed on to her doom. A hundred shots passed around her, and a dozen went crashing through her, but none disabled her machinery. At the proper time and place Lieutenant Hooson swung her around across the channel and exploded the dynamite bomb that sent her to the bottom-corking the channel which holds Cervera's fleet in.

The crew escaped on a small boat, but were unable to row back in open boat under such deadly fire, so the daring lieutenant headed direct in the harbor and pulled to the Spanish flag-

The Spaniards were dazed by their udacity, but they were taken on board and cleverly treated.
