### Letter From Alaska.

LAKE LINDERMAN, }  
May 8th 1898.

Mr. J. C. SHORT: Dear Father: Your welcome letter of April 5th to hand. I am pleased to say that I am as hardy as an ox and am always hungry—can eat any thing day or night; but that is not to be wondered at when you consider the hard work and the cold climate. We have been established here about a week, but we have been very busy getting our goods here from the summit of Chillecot Pass. We are moving slow—have been two months coming 27 miles, but from Dyea to the top of Chillecot is a terror, and the up grade is almost like a mountain side. There are steps cut in the ice and our goods had to be packed on our backs over this part of the pass, 50 lbs. at a time, and there are 2440 steps, so you see this is tedious work, but we are out of danger now, with all our goods here and did not pay out a cent for transportation.

The freight from Dyea to the Summit is 6 cts. per lb., and from Summit to the Lake is 2 cts., making \$8 per 100 lbs. I have in my outfit 3000 lbs., amounting to \$240, and having saved that I consider it made.

We have joined a party of four others to build our boats. Don't feel any uneasiness about the rest of my trip, since I have crossed Chillecot Pass and had the narrow escape of the snow slide, all danger is over, and the White Horse Rapids are not as bad as they claim when the river is full in the spring. Where the danger came in was last summer late when people went through when the river was low.

We have been here a week and have our timber all cut ready to begin sawing our lumber Monday. It will take about three weeks to finish our boats, as we will build two large ones for the two parties and two small skiffs for each party, making in all six boats, and then we will have nothing to do but wait for the ice to break up so we can go down the merry stream.

You ask about the game and fish. We have had no time so far to devote to such sport. We are now camped on a famous Indian fishing ground and will cut holes in the ice and try our luck soon. There is no game around the lake here, but back 5 or 6 miles there are plenty of Moose, Coraban, Ducks and Grouse; these we will tackle later on.

Dyea is like most western towns but as they have saw mill facilities most of the houses are put up of green rough lumber. We are in timbered country until we get to Sheep Camp, 15 miles from Dyea, then we are above timber line till we get down on this side to Lake Linderman, which is in the edge of timber.

Letters costs us 25 cts. each as they are brought from Dyea by private carriers. Newspapers are 50 cts. each here; we got one today of the 3rd and see where war is on in earnest. With love all, I am

He called for volunteers to take the vessel into the harbor and it is said that 4000 men offered to undertake the dangerous mission. He selected Lieut. Hobson of Alabama and seven men who took the vessel through a perfect storm of shot and shell to the place selected and there calmly anchored and sunk her. Not a man was killed but all were captured by Cervera who was so charmed with their bravery that he immediately offered to exchange them.

With Cervera securely fastened in the American troops are now being rapidly landed in Cuba near Santiago and that place will be invested by land and sea.

News of a battle between the land forces may be expected within the next few days.

## What a Knot Is.

Probably there is no nautical term more frequently used during the present naval war than the word "knot." The word is synonymous of the nautical mile, or 6080.27 feet, while as every one knows, the geographical mile is 5280 feet. This would make the knot equal to 1 15-100 of the geographical mile, and therefore, in order to compare the speed of a boat expressed in knots with a railroad train, it is necessary to multiply the speed in knots by 1 15-100. A cruiser that makes 21 knots travels 24.15 geographical miles per hour. The fastest speed yet obtained by any boat is said to have been attained by the yacht Ellide, which is known to have a record of one geographical mile in one minute, thirty-six and a half seconds, or 38.2 miles per hour. In fact, a recent article in one of the engineering journals states that a record of 40 miles an hour has been made by this boat.
