International Complications Likely.

Washington, July 22.-The lynching of five Italians in Louisiana yesterday promises to assume an international aspect through the action of the Italian government. Count Ninchi, Italian charge de affaires, called at the state department at an early hour this morning and made representations to the officials concerning the atrocity in Louisiana. In order to get full information as a basis for action by this government Secretary Hay thereupon telegraphed the governor of Louisiana requesting all the facts in the case. Count Vinchi's action is predicated on the reports from the Italian consular officials in Louisiana and by press reports. There is reason to believe also that the Italian foreign office has already been fully informed on the occurrence. It is probable, however, that the representations to-day are only preliminary, with a view of calling attention to the reparation which may follow. The affair is considered by officials at Italian headquarters much like that in the Mafia cases at New Orleans while Mr. Blaine was secretary of state, at which time the Italian minister, Baron Fava, called for his passports and left the country.

## DEWEY'S DEMAND.

He Files Suit to Recover Prize Money Due Himself and Crew.

THE MORMONS IN MEXICO.

The Government Will Make Investigations of the Report that They are Practicing Polygamy.

Washington, July 21 .- Admiral George Dewey yesterday filed suit as a libeliant in the district court of the District of Columbia, to recover the prize money due him and the officers and crew of his fleet for the vessels sunk in the battle of Manila and the property subsequently recovered by the naval force under his com-

For the ships and equipments which have already been appraised and inventoried by the board of appraisers, appointed by the secretary of the navy, Admiral Dewey demands the sum of \$325,-141, and in addition, the amount due upon the three cruisers sunk in the engagement, but subsequently raised, and upon which he places a value of \$425,000. These vessels have never yet been appraised. Hon. Hilary A. Herbert, the former secretary of the navy appears as the chief counsel for Admiral Dewey.

The number of men engaged on the American vessels during the battle is given as 1836, and while Admiral Dewey declares that he is unable to give the exact number of men engaged on the Spanish side, he asserts that the number was far in excess of those under his own command and that their forces were superior.

All the property recovered as a result of the battle is now in possession of the United States with the exception of that which has not been consumed.

Some days ago Admiral Dewey filed an individual application for claim for navy bounty growing out of the battle of Manila bay, and this with many others filed before the navy departmet are now before the court of claims for judicial determination.

#### Mormons in Mexico.

Chihuahua, Mex., July 21 .-Several years ago prominent officials of the Mormon church of Salt Lake City visited Mexico and obtained from the Mexican government a concession for the establishment of large Mormon colonies in this state. The colonists came direct from Utah and located north of here. It having been reported that members of the colonies were practicing polygamy, contrary to the Mexican law, an investigation cf the matter has been ordered by the Mexicans. The colonists number about 10,000. As a rule they are prospering.

ROBERT INGERSOLL DEAD

While Conversing With His Wife Falls inte a Chair and Expires.

New York, July 21 .- Col. Robert G. Ingersoll, the noted agnostic, died at his home at Dobbs Ferry, New York, this afternoon of apoplexy.

Mr. Ingersoll went to his summer home at Dobbs Ferry two days ago, apparently in good health. Shortly after his arrival there he complained of slight in disposition. He spent this morn. ing in his room, and shortly be. fore he was stricken his wife offered to have luncheon sent up to him so that he would not have to walk down stairs to the dining room below. He laughingly replied that he did not feel quite as young as he used to, he guessed he was not yet an invalid, and he would go down with the others. As he finished speaking and was about to rise he fell back into his chair. A physician was immediately summoned, but when he reached the house he found Mr. Ingersoll had died almost instantly. The physician did not give the cause of death, but the family believed it was due to apoplexy. Mr. Ingersoll's wife and two daughters were with him when he

#### Strikers Use Dynamite.

Cleveland, July 21-A dynamite bumb was thrown upon the roof of the big Consolidated Street Railway company's barn at Lake View at 3 o'clock this morning. A jagged hole two feet square was torn in the barn. The Was Park avenue car standing beneat the hole was also wrecked, the roof of the car being torn off by the explosion. The wildest excitement prevailed among the men in the barn. The explosion was heard for blocks and hunddreds of people were attracted to the scene. No one was injured. The identity of the perpetrators of the outrage is not known. However the police are at work on the case. Many of the windows of the big barn were shattered by the explosion.

#### American Troops Surprised.

Manila, July 21.-News has been received here from Gen. Smith at Itoilo, island of Panay, of a severe fight on Wednesday at Bobong between Capt. Byrne of the sixteenth infantry with seventy men and a force of 450 Babylones, who surprised the American troops. One hundred and twenty-five of the enemy were killed, as shown by actual count, many were wounded and one taken prisoner. The American loss was man killed and one wounded. The fighting was mostly at close quarters with bayonets and clubbed guns. A considerable stock of supplies and arms have been captured by Capt. Byrne, who is in command of the batalion operating at La Carlota, in the district of Negros.





"It is strange to me," remarked a prominent oil developer, "that with so much crude oil in Corsi cana the people or authorities do not make general use of it for street sprinkling, when it is so much more effective in abating the dust nuisance, and so much cheaper. There is one block in the city that was properly sprinkled with oil a month ago, and to-day if you were to drive a herd of 5000 cattle over it, you could not raise dust enough to soil a cambric handkerchief. A street properly sprinkled with oil once will not need a second sprinkling for six or eight months.

"I was reading a few days ago an article on this subject, and in it roads in California sprinkled with oil were cited. A mile stretch near the town of Alhambra was sprinkled with oil a year ago, and it is now in good condi tion and dustless. It is like riding on a rubber road to ride over

streets or roads where oil is used. "In Florida they have been experimenting with oil on public roads, and the result is very satisfactory. A section of shell road near Jacksonville was sprinkled with oil two months ago. At first there was a noticeable odor, but that soon passed away. The surface of the road united in a compact mass, which became more solid with travel; the road is smooth, with a firm crown, and rain or moisture will not penetrate it, but will run off, leaving no mud behind. Sun heat has no effect on it, and where the oil was applied less thickly the surface ground up slightly, but remains on top, without blowing away. This Florida experiment was had with roadbed oil that cost \$4 per barrel, and \$278 will sprinkle a mile of road 25 feet

Caught a Coon's Mouth. Gus Alred of Argyle, Denton county, booked a large raccoon on a trot line in Denton creek. He did not get the coon, it is true, but that was not the fisherman's fault, as the coon left a part of his mouth hanging on the hook. Alred had set out a trot line, one hook of which was close to the bank and barely under the water. He baited with crawfish and waited. Soon he heard a scrambling on the line and went out to investigate. Grinnan Returns. Sergt. J. S. Grinnan, son of

returned home from Hood's immune regiment, that was mustered out at Camp Meade a short time ago. He has been with the regiment since its organization, and says that he has experienced a sufficient amount of service in the army of Uncle Sam; that the troops did not mind the service in an active campaign, but that the police duties that were required of the "immunes" was rather monotonous except for an occasional chase into the mountains for the bandits, which were made up principally of the refuse of the Cuban army. That when the city of Santiago was first entered by the American forces it was the dirtiest city be had ever seen, all kinds of refuse matter being piled up in the streets and yards.
