A Dallas Man Originated a Rapid fire Gun.

COST COMPARATIVELY CHEAP

Capt. Louis L. Flatau, Who Was a Skilled Confedrate Artillerist, Explains Its Advantages.

There was a rapid-fire gun on exhibition at the State Fair that attracted general attention. It was constantly surrounded by people examining and asking questions about it.

The rapid-fire gun is the invention of Capt. Louis S. Flatau of Dallas, who is an inventive genius, judgeing from the number of he has obtained, many of them being now in general use.

Capt. Flatau was an artillerist in the Confederate service for four years an the gun is the result of his experience during that time, based on a full knowledge of the needs of improvement in heavy artillery.

His claim for this gun is the bullet it shoots. This bullet is manufactured from a cold-rolled steel rod of any size from eight inches. The bullet is formed by first giving it a comical point, the cast iron and attached to the forother end being bored out to receive or contain the charge of contained the powder and would powder, into which bore is placed have much more effect at the exa sufficient amount of explosive ploding point than other shell. to throw the bullet any distance required. By this means the use of any brass shell that is used in all other ammunition is done away with, which very much simplifies details.

This gun has but three pieces, a plunger, a breech block, and firing pin and crank, the balls being fed into it from a magazine by gravity. The great complication in all other guns of rapid fire has been to get rid of brass shell that containes the powder. This gun having no shell other than the bullet, the bullet being loaded, it answers in lieu of this extra expense that is very important in the construction of the gun. There is nothing in the gun to get out of order, as there is nothing to extract.

A gun of this kind, Capt. Flatau claims, can be built for onehalf the cost of other guns and the ammunition likewise. He also claims that a shot from this gun will be much more formidable than any other because of its rapid travel through the air, it being of steel and chill pointed, as it is not marred in any way during its fight, the air having no effect on it whatever; neither would it be affected at the point of impingement with a target, as it is penetrative by reason of its density and the material of which it is made is immense-much greater than that of any other bullet or shot now ini use.

Among the several claims made by Capt. Flatau for his gun and

his bullet are noted the following: "The lifetime of a gun of this kiind would be much longer than that of any other because the bullet, the walls of which are very strong, being loaded receives the greatest shock from the explosion; this explosion expands the bullet to that egree that it fits the bore of the gun perfectly. The gun barrel meets this expansion, reinforcing the bullet to that extent that the two combined will handle the highest explosives W. D. It can by this means be given more twist than any other projectile known to the service. This gun is a muzzle loader or a breechloader either.

"The shells or shrapnel that could be used from this gun would be much more formidable than any now in use for many reasons. They would be made of ward end of the steel shell that The time fuse is much easier and more safely regulated through the stem that connected the shell to the chage of nowder. This gun is more intended for field batteries of four to six guns of what is known as three inch caliber.

"The present guns in use are very much complicated and cause considerable trouble in loading for quick action on the field. This gun, whose shot contains the powder as well as the bullet, for smaller guns, is a self-contained magazine within itsself, with no danger of a caission or a limber chest being exploded on the field on account of loose powder, for all the powder is in the magazine of its own. In action the gunner only opens the breech of the gun and a cannoneer would bring from a chest a steel shot containing the powder, dropping it into the opening in front of the breech pin, which would be only one motion, the gunner closing the breech up behind the shot and fires. This gun could be fired on the field at the rate of forty shots. a minute without the least danger of any thing getting out of order and it would not tax the attachment to perform such work the least bit whatever."

Cotton Mill Prospects. What One Hears in the Telephone.

"It is very hard to realize that the voice one hears over the telephone is not the voice of the person who is talking," said an electrician, chatting about the oddities of the business. "It seems exactly like the real tones, drawn out thin and small, and carried from a long distance by some mechanical means-but is isn't. When one speaks into the instrument, a little diagrphm, like a drum-head, begins to vibrate, and each vibration sends a wave of electricity over the wire. These waves set up a mimic vibration in another diagraphm at the opposite end, which jars the air and produces an imitation of the original voice. That's not a very scientific explanation, but it's accurate. The autograph-telegraph, which makes a fac simile of handwriting, is a fair parallel. You write your message with a pen, attached to a special electric apparatus, and a little ink siphon at the other end of the line exactly imitates every dot and curve. The result seems like the real thing, but is merely a first-class counterfeit. It's the same way exactly with the voice in the 'phone."

Sea Shell Curtain Fad.

"Shell curtains" are the newest fad in New York. It comes from the seashore resorts of Long Island, where shells are found, but it has broken out in the city with marked virulence. Some ingenious person has found that it is an easy thing to pierce the shells that are wicked up along the beaches, and that when they are strung on wire they make. dainty ornaments. 





LARGE CROWD WAS PRESEN

A Great Cheer Went Up from the Assembled Spectators as the Man-of-War Glided Into the Medway.

Chatham, Eng., Nov. 3 .- The launching of the British firstclass battleship Venerable here vesterday was accompanied by scenes of unusual enthusiasm. 




