



## Dr. Jenkins Mortally Wounded.

BY AN OFFICER.

Wicks Was Held by Dallas County Officers on the Charge of Forgery Offcer Who Did the Killing Released.



## WILL ACCEPT COLONIAL OFFERS

are to be Rushed Across the Ocean in a Volume Unprecedented.

London, Dec. 19.-Upon the receipt of Gen. Buller's defeat at Colenso the defense committee of the cabinet met and decided on the following measures to strengthen the field force in south

The seventh division, now mobilizing, will proceed at once to south Africa. Heavy reinforcements of artillery, including three howitzer batteries, will be sent out immediately.

Gen. Roberts has been authorized to raise a local mounted camp in south Africa and a considerable mounted force from home will be sent out.

Nine battalions of militia in addition to the three that have already volunteered will be asked to volunteer for foreign service.

A special force of volunteers from the yeomanry and volunteer regiments will be formed for south African service and the offers of mounted men from the colonies will be accepted.

These measures should give the British 50,000 more men against the Boers. This, including the loyal Cape and Natal forces, will give the British 75,000 additional troops. Thus, the British strength in the field will be almost dou-

The newer levies will be used mainly to guard the long lines of communication, thus setting free the regular trained troops for the front. Officers, men, arms, ammution ane stores are to be pour ed accross the ocean in a volume unprecedented in history.

Wicks Was Held by Dallas County Officers o the Charge of Forgery-Offcer Who Did the Killing Released.

Dallas, Tex., Dec. 16.-Dr. H. E. Wicks, alias John Williams, a colored prisoner, was shot and killed Thursday afternoon between 12 and 1 o'clock on Houston street, near the front gate to the jail yard.

Bailiff Herman Muller did the shooting. On Wednesday Wicks was arrested on the charge of forgery, and waiving an examination before Justice of the Peace Edwards was granted bail in the sum of \$500, but failing to give bond he was sent to the county jail. Thursday he was out in charge of Bailiff Muller ostensibly to hunt bond. Muller at the time named was taking Wicks back to jail, having also two negroes handcuffed together, whom he was taking from the criminal district court room to jail. About thirty yards behind Muller and his prisoners Deputy Sheriff Whit Webb also had two prisoners whom he was taking to the jail. When Muller and his prisoners reached the gate opening into the jail yard the two men handcuffed together stepped through the gate into the yard, but Wicks broke off down Houston street in a run. Muller started in pursuit of Wicks, calling upon him three times to Halt, but unheeding the command Wicks kept running, going at full speed, when Muller fired, the ball entering the body of Wicks under the left shoulder blade, going through the body near the heart and passing out in front. Wicks fell forward on his face, mortally wounded, living only

about an hour. Bailiff Muller surrendered himself at once, went before Justice of the Peace Edwards, waived examination and on agreement of the state's counsel he was granted bail, Justice Edwards fixing the amount at \$500, which was given at once, and Bailiff Muller re-

American Labor Federation.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 16 .- Sentiments of the delegates to the American Federation of Labor convention on various pending labor questions were declared Thursday in the adoption of a string of resolutions reported by committee.

The report of the boycott committee on the New York Sun lockout was unanimously adopted. The committee recommended the adoption of a resolution offered from the Detroit trades councils declaring indorsement of the Sun boycott by the federation and approving the "magnificent defense the printers and stereotypers in the matter.

A resolution declaring for the reduction of the standing army to 25,000 men was adopted.

Other resolutions were adopted as follows: Urging state legislature to outlaw all kinds of competitive convict labor; against permitting slavery in the Hawaiian islands; reaffirming seamen's demands; appropriating \$500 in aid of the Cramp shipyard strikers, and iviting the letter carriers to affiliate with the federation.

A negro had come upon Mrs. Griffin, the wife of a respectable white farmer and made a desperate attempt to rape her. Her screams and stubborn resistance, however, prevented the villain from accomplishing his purpose. The negro fled but was caught subsequently and having been fully identified, the infuriated neighbors of the Griffins decided to mete out summary vengeance. A mob was organized and quietly took the culprit to a tree and swung him up.



Lake Titicaca is unique among the waters of the world, says Harper's Magazine. Its extent is fourteen times that of the Lake of Geneva, and the level of its surface is 12,545 feet above the sea . Along its eastern shore runs the main Cordillera, rising aloft at its southern end into the mighty Mount Sorata, whose broad expanding glaciers seem to lift themselves like silver from the waves. The shores and islands of the lake were-who knows how long ago?-the cradle of a remarkable civilization, or even series of civilizations. Perhaps latest among them was that of the Inca tribe, which, rising in this place, spread northward over the hills and down a valley to Cuzco and thence stretched forth its conquering arm over a vast area whose exact limit can no longer be defined. The Incas looked back to Titicaca island as the sacred spot whence emerged their legendary founders, Manco Capac and his consort, Mama Occlo Huaco. The traveler on the waters or round the shores of the lake beholds many a monument of departed greatness and industrial prosperity. He feels that he is looking upon historic ground and the dim glamour of a well-nigh forgotten past sheds luster upon peaks and ranges doubtless untrodden by human foot, but often traveled by human eyes, and in whose names yet linger the fossilized faith and poetry of departed men. The waters of Titicaca lake reflect no longer the splendor of Inca religious pageants; they are plowed instead by three bustling steamers, on one of which we voyage 111 miles tothe Bolivian port of Chililaya. 

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
