STEEN WELL TO "BE BROUGHT IN" NEXT SATURDAY

The Steen well a few miles north of the city, which struck the second pay sand at a depth of a little more than 2800 feet, is expected to drill in Saturday if the new packer arrives from Wichita Falls in time and the water can be cut off. All indications point to this well proving a good producer.

It will be recalled by many of our readers that in this well, last fall a good sand, which would produce, it was estimated, better than twenty-five barrels per day, was struck at a depth of 310 feet. As the drilling contract called for the deep sand as a test, no attention was paid to the shallower sand. If the new or deep sand proves to be as good as is expected it may come in for development first as the product is of a far better grade. However, much acreage in this vicinity is owned by individuals who may develop the shallow sand, as not much expenditure will be required to sink a well to a depth of only 310 feet.

It does not seem certain that this section will be the center of interest after a few more weeks and will undergo great development during the coming summer.

SENATOR BAILEY ANNOUNCES FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Gainesville, Tex., Feb. 18.—Former United State Senator Joseph W. Bailey is a candidate for Governor of Texas. Speaking in his home town to about four thousand people, the audience including many of his friends who journeyed here from widespread parts of the State, he formally announced his candidacy, and added that he would not have made the race if he had not been forced to do so by the attack made upon him at the recent meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee at Dallas. Also, Mr. Bailey received a telegram from former Congressman R. L. Henry of Waco, hereafter a gubernatorial candidate, pledging Mr. Henry's support of Mr. Bailey for Governor.

Mr. Bailey's announcement as a candidate for Governor was hailed with very great enthusiasm. Men mounted their seats, yelling and tossing their hats in the air. The audience included a liberal proportion of women and of these practically all wore "Bailey for Governor" badges, these badges abounding everywhere in Gainesville today, and were demonstrative at the announcement. After the speech the former Senator was for a long time the center of a clamorous crowd, swarming to the platform and later, around him at the hotel, and expressing delight at his decision and extending pledges of support.

His gubernatorial announcement Mr. Bailey urges that it is just important to "elect a Legislature of the right kind" as it is to elect a "Governor of the right kind." In every legislative and senatorial district a "Bailey principles" candidate will be put in the field; it is planned.

TEXAS CO. LETS CON- TRACT FOR 16 WELLS NEAR THE ARNOLD

The faith the Texas Co. has in our oil fields was manifested in a degree this week when a contract was let for sixteen wells to be sunk in the vicinity of the Arnold well. Work is to begin within the next thirty days. Already large warehouses are being erected for the storing of materials for the work of development and an almost endless line of trucks are to be seen daily on the road to the new locations.

The Arnold well is producing daily about one hundred barrels of the highest grade oil yet found in the State, at a depth of over 4200 feet. Two other oil sands were passed through in the Arnold which may prove good in most if not all the new wells to be sunk near it. However, it is understood that the high grade oil in the 4200-foot sand is the one desired by the Texas Company and unless the shallower sands prove exceptionally good it is quite certain no attention will be paid them until the extreme depth contracted for is reached.

The Graham No. 1, which has been a paying producer for more than a year, is also in this section and it is generally believed will come in for its share of offsets as soon as work is well under way around the Arnold.

To insure adequate water supply for the vast amount of development to be carried on by them this summer, the Texas Company yesterday purchased the exclusive use of the Graham Lake, the largest body of water in the Clear Fork valley, for a period of four years, and will soon begin laying a six-inch pipe to their several new locations. It is expected the pipe will be laid and pumps installed on or before the first of April. The fuel will come from the Arnold and Graham wells.

A warehouse and trackage sufficient to care for twenty-six cars is now being built in Graham.

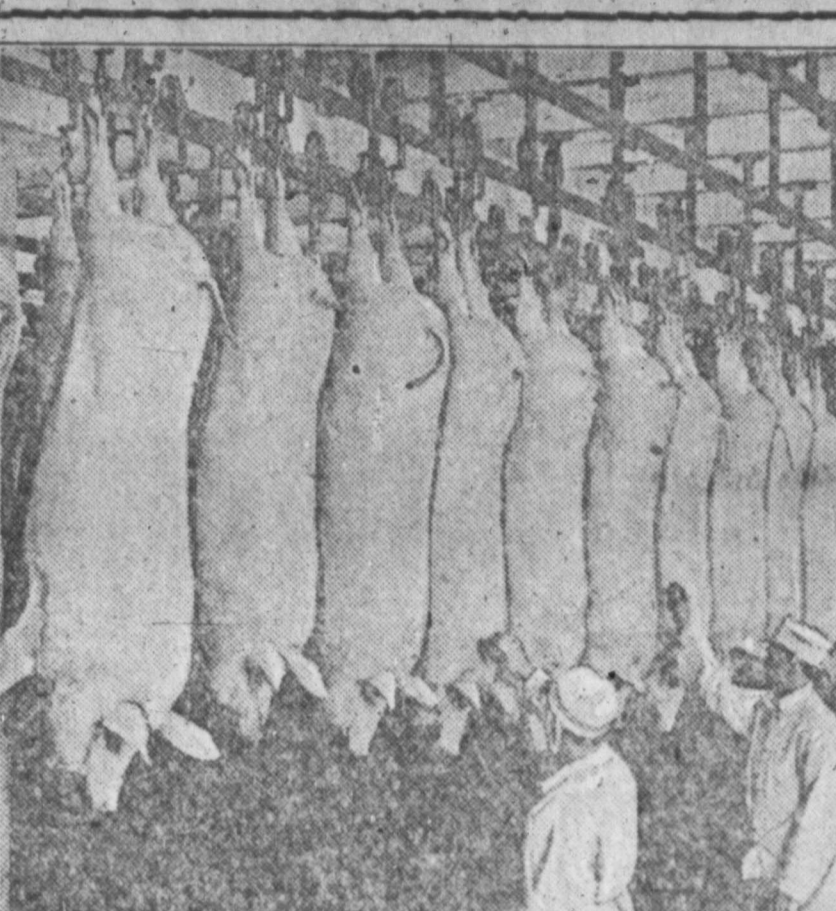

NEW RECORD IN MEAT INSPECTION



Applying Marks of Inspection on Hog Carcasses—One Phase of Meat Inspection Work Carried on by the States Department of Agriculture.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The federal system of meat inspection, which is conducted by the bureau of animal industry of the United States department of agriculture, recorded its biggest 12 months in the last fiscal year. The number of animals slaughtered under federal inspection was 20.6 per cent greater than in the preceding fiscal year and 21.0 per cent greater than the average for the last 12 years.

The total number of animals inspected was 70,708,637. The ante-mortem inspection resulted in the condemnation of 2,588 live animals on account of 18 different diseases and conditions.

Post-mortem examination revealed 40 different diseases and conditions, resulting in the condemnation of 212,245 carcasses and 603,050 parts of carcasses.

The seven meat inspection laboratories which are a part of the service made more than 60,000 analyses of products. Analyses revealed 306 violations of rules prescribed by bureau.

Employees in the meat inspection service number about 2,500, including veterinary inspectors, experts in sanitation, laboratory inspectors, lay inspectors, clerks, and others.

The number of establishments at which inspection was conducted last year was 865, located in 263 cities and towns.

There were certified for export 3,402,070,735 pounds of meat and meat products.

Meat Imported. The total amount of meat offered for importation was 179,911,142 pounds, of which, upon inspection, 842,160 pounds were condemned or refused entry.

The inspection of meat for the military and other departments of the government amounted to 288,248,536 pounds, of which nearly 10,000,000 pounds were rejected.

In connection with actual inspection of meats and products, numerous investigations were conducted to develop and improve tests of various kinds and to perfect the system generally.

EARLY HATCHED BIRD BRINGS BEST PRICE

Other Farm Work Sidetracks Hatching Operations.

Early Chicks Are Strongest and Most Vigorous in Flock Because They Are Produced From Eggs Laid While Hens Are Best.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Chickens can be hatched at any time of the year, but it is the chickens hatched early in the spring that give the best results. One reason is that if no special effort is made to hatch early on the farms throughout the country the hatching season coincides too closely with the planting season, and hatching operations are reduced on that account.

Early hatched chicks, as a rule, are the strongest and most vigorous in the flock because they are produced from eggs laid while the hens are in their best breeding condition. After a long period of laying the hens lose something of their vitality and their capacity to transmit vigor to their offspring, and so late-hatched chicks are on the whole decidedly inferior to early hatched ones in vigor and constitution. Because they are thrifty and vigorous the early chicks make quicker and better growth than the late ones. Thrifty chicks get more from a given quantity of food than others. Weak and undersized birds often consume as much feed as the larger and better developed ones, but make no perceptible growth.

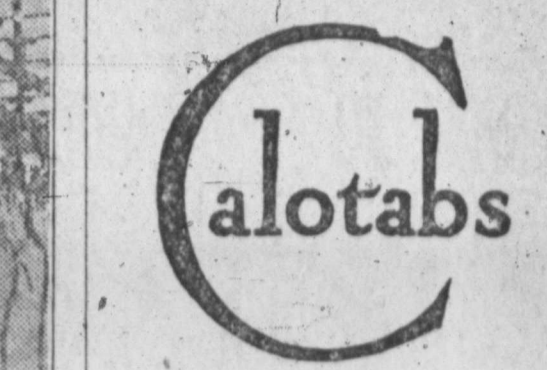
The early chicks develop to a stage where they can withstand extreme heat and an attack by the parasites which are more numerous and troublesome in hot weather. The severe heat is apt to check the growth of the late chicks and in their weakened condition they easily become a prey to lice and mites. When the cold, wet weather comes in the fall they are peculiarly susceptible to it and likely to develop colds, while the vigorous early chicks find the coldness stimulating.

When eggs do not hatch well early in the season there is time to find the reason for the poor hatching and to cure it before the season is too far advanced. When late hatching is not successful the crop of poultry is cut short and egg production falls.

Early hatched cockerels are ready for the market when prices are highest. Early hatched pullets mature before cold weather and lay when prices of eggs are highest. Late-hatched chickens are not mature before cold weather sets in and often will not lay until spring.

Feeding Value of Rye. Rye is not as good a feed for hogs or poultry as corn or barley, while the value of rye hay all depends upon the time the rye was cut and the amount of grain in the hay.

WASHINGTON CITY SIDELIGHTS



Hawaii Territory Is Desirous to Enter the Union

WASHINGTON.—Hawaii territory wants to be a state. A concurrent resolution adopted by the Hawaiian legislature sets forth this desire. The territory also wants various legislation at the hands of congress.



A Hawaiian commission will present to congress a series of concurrent resolutions adopted by the Hawaiian legislature setting forth the desires of the territory.

Gov. Charles J. McCarthy heads the commission, which includes Attorney General Harry Irwin, Senator Robert W. Shingle, Senator John H. Wise, secretary of the commission; Representative William T. Rawlins and Representative Henry J. Lyman.

The members of the commission, it is announced, will initiate no discussion of the Japanese question.

Authority to incur public debt in an amount of 3 per cent in excess of the amount fixed by present laws, 7 per cent, is to be sought from congress. The present debt is \$10,894,000. The additional money is said to be seriously needed for road building and schools.

Another proposal is that the governor, land commissioner and land board be given the right to pass upon qualifications of applicants for homesteads, to assure that "the remaining small body of agricultural land should be settled by a class of farmers who will remain the active owners thereof, and interested and actively concerned in its development."

Other concurrent resolutions to be put before congress ask: A law requiring residence of not less than one year in Hawaii for eligibility to appointment to federal office in the territory.

Extension to Hawaii of the farm loan act and the reclamation act of June 17, 1902.

Appropriation of \$1,000,000 for roads, pipe lines and water works in homestead tracts.

Permission for Hawaii to retain 50 per cent of all customs and internal revenues collected in the territory.

Long-time leases on arid lands upon which water may be brought.

Mexico Has Been a Nuisance Since Jackson's Time

MEXICO has been a nuisance for a long time, it appears. Senator King of Utah read into the Congressional Record the other day extracts from two annual messages by President Andrew Jackson and a special message. The latter, under date of February 6, 1837, is in part:

"The length of time since some of the injuries have been committed, the repeated and unavailing applications for redress, the wanton character of some of the outrages upon the property and persons of our citizens, upon the officers and flag of the United States, independent of recent insults to this government and people by the late extraordinary Mexican minister, would justify in the eyes of all nations immediate war."

"We should act with both wisdom and moderation by giving to Mexico one more opportunity to atone for the past before we take redress into our own hands. To avoid all misconception on the part of Mexico, as well as to protect our own national character from reproach, this opportunity should be given with the avowed design and full preparation to take immediate satisfaction if it should not be obtained on a repetition of the demand for it."

"To this end I recommend that an act be passed authorizing reprisals and the use of the naval force of the United States by the executive against Mexico to enforce them, in the event of a refusal by the Mexican government to come to an amicable adjustment of the matters in controversy between us upon another demand thereof, made from on board one of our vessels of war on the coast of Mexico."



Exit Automobile and Enter Fool-Proof Airplane?

THE world is now entering the aerial age—the last stage of civilization. This is the opinion of Prof. Samuel Pickard, president of the Kansas City (Mo.) Aeroplane school. "Man has conquered land and water transportation," said Prof. Pickard, "and he is now conquering air transportation. Air travel eventually will be safer than traveling by land or water. In fact, it is now only a question of a few months when a new fool-proof machine will be ready for the market."

"It is a simple combination of the features of the aeroplane and balloon, with helium gas. The new air machine will be on an equal competitive basis commercially with the automobile. It will enable one to land on the street or rise directly in the air, for it is nothing more than a lighter-than-air airplane."

"These machines will be small in size, not much bigger than the present five-passenger automobile. It will be possible to rise or descend with as much facility and ease as to go forward or backward. As much of the power of the present plane is utilized in keeping the machine aloft, only a lightweight motor will be necessary."

"The new type of machine will be absolutely safe and in perfect control at all times. It will be possible to operate it at any speed, from two or three miles up to sixty or 125 miles an hour, depending upon the power of the motor. It will be the universal mode of transportation and travel. The cost of producing the machine will make the selling price within the reach of practically everyone, including the skilled workman, whose present income is sufficient to buy and operate one."

Only Our Rich Men Can Afford to Be Ambassadors

THE new position of the United States in world's affairs urgently demands that the agencies through which the foreign affairs of this government are conducted be improved to a degree which shall compare favorably with similar agencies of other governments with which the United States maintains relations."

That is the theory upon which Secretary of State Lansing bases his request to congress for the addition of \$1,333,000 to the appropriation for his department and for permission to reorganize our entire foreign relations service on a basis that would add still further large items of expense.

Leading the list of increases proposed by Lansing is a sum of \$150,000 for salary raises to ambassadors and ministers at foreign capitals. Fifteen ambassadors now receiving \$17,500 annually would be raised by Lansing to \$25,000 each; three ministers would be raised from \$12,000 to \$15,000 and twenty-nine ministers from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

As compared to the salary of \$17,500 allowed ambassadors at the chief capitals, for instance, with no official residence provided or allowances made to cover same, Great Britain pays her ambassador to Italy \$35,000, to Japan \$25,000 and to France \$37,500, and, in each instance, supplies in addition a well-equipped residence.

The result has been, and is, that it is often impossible to fill an important post with the man best qualified for the position. The deciding factor is not so much his diplomatic attainments or knowledge of public and international affairs as it is the size of his pocketbook.

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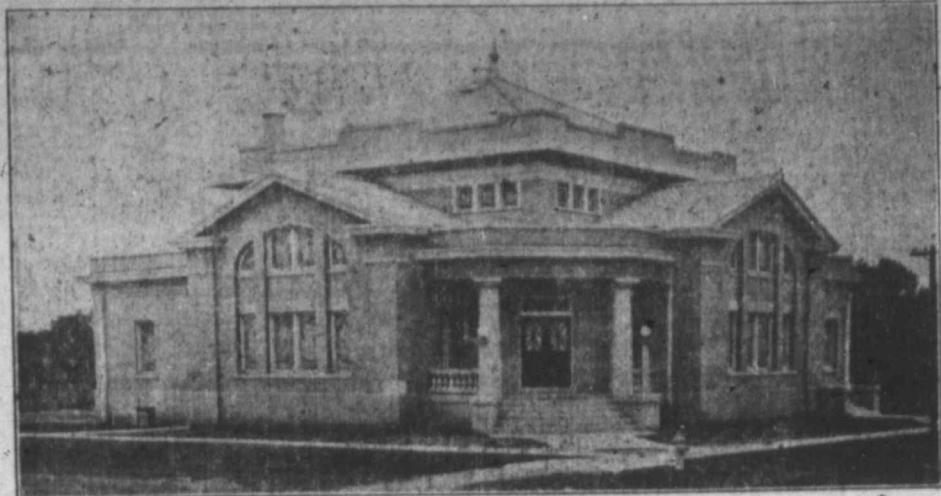

RESIGNATION OF LANSING

A friend of Mr. Wilson's, seeking an explanation of his dismissal of Mr. Lansing, could probably come to no conclusion which would be at once more just and lenient than to suppose that a mind of strong autocratic bent had been made petulant, and perhaps somewhat morbid, by the disappointments and afflictions which it has lately suffered. The grievance which Mr. Wilson gives as his provocation is so palpably a pretext that one will not easily be persuaded that it is entitled to serious consideration. If there should be any one who should be inclined to think that Mr. Lansing's offense was in having called meetings of the Cabinet and presided over them during the time of the President's disability, there are several reflections any one of which would render that idea inadmissible. Consider, for example, the delay of three months in complaining of that action. Is it to be imagined that it was not until last Monday that Mr. Wilson learned that Cabinet meetings had been called and presided over by Mr. Lansing? If so, one can only infer that Mr. Wilson's illness and incapacity have been much more serious than had been assumed; whereas, if Mr. Wilson has not been so ill and incapacitated as not to know, during three months, of a fact that he now makes a reason of complaint, then one will not avoid the suggestion that any sense of grievance he may have suffered on that account has been too long tolerated to permit one to think that it is in fact his provocation. It must occur to one, too, that if Mr. Lansing, in calling and presiding over meetings of the Cabinet, offended to the degree which justifies his dismissal, those others members of the Cabinet who sanctioned his action by attending those meetings have at least incurred a reprimand. The charge that Mr. Lansing sought to usurp the authority of the President is too fragile, not to say too petty, to be accepted, and it will be both just and indulgent to Mr. Wilson to seek elsewhere for some explanation of an act which must be mortifying to those who have been his political friends and admirers.—Dallas News.

SURFACE SIGNS OF THE TIMES

According to the New York Sun-Herald, "Anti-prohibition elements all over the country are uniting in their efforts to obtain a liberal Democratic nominee for the presidency at the San Francisco convention. In almost every state the issue is clear cut. MEANT TO SERVE AS BEACON

Statue of Liberty at New York is Not Fulfilling Original Purpose of Designer.
The statue of Liberty, in New York harbor, is electrically illuminated—that is, so flooded with light as to be rendered brightly visible at night. Originally, however, the idea was to make it serve as a beacon, and for this purpose the "flame" of the lady's torch was cut at the sides, the openings fitted with glass, and nine duplex arc lamps placed inside.

Thus was obtained a light which, upheld at a height of 305 feet above the water, was visible 24 miles out at sea, or ten miles beyond the anchorage of the outside lightship. Its maintenance was assigned to the government lighthouse board.

But the lighthouse board declared that it had little or no usefulness as an aid to navigation, its value being purely sentimental, and in 1902 the light was extinguished, the business of illuminating the statue being handed over to the war department.

GAS COMPANY WILL DEMAND MORE MONEY

IN LETTER TO DISTRIBUTING AGENCIES LEGE SAYS 50C 1,000 CUBIC FEET NECESSARY

Dallas.—Natural gas distributing companies of North Texas receiving their supply from the Lone Star Gas company have been informed in a letter from Fred M. Lege Jr., vice president and general manager, that no effort to augment the supply now in sight can be made unless an increase in the payment for gas by the distributing company to the producing concern is made.

The minimum price to be received by the Lone Star Gas company from the distributing companies is fixed by Mr. Lege at 60¢ a thousand cubic feet. The Dallas Gas company, Fort Worth Gas company and North Texas Gas company now pay two-thirds of their gross receipts to the producing company. The present rate to Dallas consumers is 45¢ a thousand cubic feet. To meet the demands of the Lone Star Gas company, distributing company officials estimate that the rate to consumers will have to be raised to about 75¢ a thousand.

Mr. Lege holds out no hope for relief from west Texas fields, saying that "the development in west Texas has not at this time reached a point where we feel that our line can be completed in time to be of material benefit next winter." Developments in southern Oklahoma must be relied on for the coming winter, Mr. Lege says.

A list of projects and developments stated to be necessary to develop a supply is given by Mr. Lege, which he estimates will cost from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000. He adds that "even with the completion of all of them, the Lone Star Gas company can not undertake to guarantee an adequate supply of gas for all requirements." He also says that "the construction and completion of any and all of the above projects must rest in the business discretion and judgment of the management of the Lone Star Gas company to be exercised in good faith."

The letter from Mr. Lege was sent to the Dallas Gas company, Fort Worth Gas company, Dallas County Gas company, Gainesville Gas company and the North Texas Gas company. The North Texas Gas company supplies Wichita Falls, Denton, Sherman, Whitesboro, McKinney, Denton, Byers, Petrolia, Bowie, Bridgeport, Alvord, Sunset and Decatur. Officials of this company said that a copy of the letter will be sent to the managers of the towns served by the company.

METHODS OUTLINED FOR SALE OF LIQUOR

System of Permits to Sell is Worked Out By Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Washington.—Methods by which intoxicating liquors may be obtained for medicinal purposes—and detailed regulations governing their sale are made public by the bureau of internal revenue.

The physician who prescribes and the pharmacist who sells liquor, the regulations provide, must have a permit, which may be obtained from the federal prohibition director.

Other details of the method by which liquor for medicinal purposes may be purchased, follow: Any physician duly licensed to practice medicine and actively engaged in the practice of such profession may obtain a permit to prescribe intoxicating liquor and may then issue prescriptions for distilled spirits, wines or certain alcoholic medicinal preparations for medical purposes for persons upon whom he is in attendance in cases where he believes that the use of liquor as a medicine is necessary. In no case may spirituous liquor be prescribed by one or more physicians in excess of one pint for the same person within any period of ten days.

Would Retain Thirty German Ships.
Washington.—Action on bids for 20 of the former German liners seized in the United States was deferred by the shipping board as a result of a protest from Secretary Baker against the sale of such of these vessels as have been included by the war department in its army transport reserve.

Gompers Condemns Bolsheviks
Washington.—Writing in the current number of the Federationist, official organ of the American Federation of Labor, Samuel Gompers condemns bolshevism "completely, finally and for all time."

Interchurch World Headquarters
Dallas.—State headquarters of the Interchurch World movement will be located in Dallas, and offices will be opened here next week.

Jugo-Slavs Reject Adriatic Settlement
Paris.—The Jugo Slav reply to the allied ultimatum regarding the Adriatic question, received in Paris amounts to a virtual refusal of the compromise offered by the Italians.

Earnings Greatest in History.
Dallas.—Gross earnings of the Texas Electric railway from operation in 1919 were \$2,951,511.27, the greatest in the history of the company, according to the report of J. F. Strickland, president of the corporation.

Jenkins To Sell Mexican Holdings.
Mexico City.—William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla, is arranging to sell his Mexican holdings and leave for the United States, according to Julio Mitchell, state prosecutor at Puebla.

FOOD RELIEF FAVORED BY HOUSE COMMITTEE

WILL RECOMMEND APPROPRIATION OF \$50,000,000 FOR AUSTRAINS AND OTHERS.

Washington.—In voting to recommend new government loans of \$50,000,000 to European countries for food relief, the house ways and means committee, including its republican members, went counter to the majority view of the republican legislative steering committee. While there was no indication that this disagreement on program would result in an open fight, cloakroom discussion strongly forecast vigorous opposition to any loan when the measure reaches the house floor.

Technically, the committee agreement was by a unanimous vote of nineteen of its twenty-four members. Six democratic members joined the majority, after failing to get a larger fund, but reserved the right to seek an increase when the bill comes up in the house, probably this week. Their efforts to make the amount \$125,000,000, as proposed by the treasury, \$100,000,000 or \$75,000,000, were defeated in order.

\$58,000,000 OIL AND GAS PIPE LINE IS PROPOSED

Would Extend From Wichita Falls via Dallas to Atlantic Coast.

Shreveport, La.—Officials of the United States Producers Refining company have announced that plans are rapidly maturing for the construction of parallel oil and gas lines from production at Wichita Falls and in Louisiana to deep water on the Atlantic seaboard, the lines involving an expenditure of \$58,000,000, to be raised by bond issues through New York and London connections. The plan, as outlined by E. W. Hartman, president, is to start from Wichita Falls, run through Fort Worth and Dallas, due east to Shreveport, thence through Vicksburg, Meridian, Jackson, Montgomery and Columbus, and from there either to Charleston, S. C., or Savannah, Ga. It is also planned to erect casing head gasoline plants every 200 miles along the line, and it is also planned to furnish towns and cities along the route with gas for fuel and industrial purposes and for electric power.

It is expected that valuable connections will be made in Dallas and Fort Worth for the gas line.

DALLAS MAN ELECTED DIVISION PRESIDENT

Permanent Organization of Cotton Interests Formed at Meeting in that City.

Dallas.—Nathan Adams, Dallas banker, has been elected president of the Texas division of the American Cotton association. Mr. Adams' election followed the effecting of a permanent organization by the Texas division, held in this city. The proposed plan to sell and ship 300,000 bales of low-grade cotton to a foreign country was discussed. Indorsement of the plans and purposes of the American Cotton association was given by all speakers and unanimously by the audience. Three hundred and sixty-four delegates were present from different sections of the state.

Other officers elected were: First vice president and general manager, D. E. Lyday of Fort Worth, president of the Texas Farmers' Union; second vice president, J. A. Thompson, of Corsicans. The executive committee was empowered to select a vice president of the Texas division from each congressional district of the state.

Seven Perish in Tenement Fire.
New York.—Trapped by smoke and flames before they could reach windows from which to jump, seven persons, including a mother and her four children, were burned to death when fire destroyed a three-story double tenement house in Newark, N. J. Sunday.

British Premier's Son Arrives
New York.—Major Richard Lloyd George, son of the British premier, arrived here on the steamer Mauretania from Southampton and Cherbourg. The Major, who was accompanied by his wife, said he was on a "business trip" to America.

Acc Killed At Kelly Field.
San Antonio, Texas.—Capt. Field E. Kindley, American ace and commander of the ninety-fourth aero squadron, was instantly killed in aerial maneuvers at Kelly field No. 2 here Sunday.

Attempt To Reseat Socialists Fails.
Albany, N. Y.—A fourth attempt to reseat the five socialist assemblymen, suspended for alleged disloyalty, failed in the lower house.

\$500,000 Proposed to Fight Influenza.
Washington.—A bill carrying an appropriation of \$500,000 to be used by the public health service in combating influenza has been adopted by the senate.

American Aviators Freed by Mexicans
San Antonio, Texas.—Lieutenants E. F. Davis and G. E. Grimes, United States army aviators who have been held by Mexican authorities since Wednesday have been released.

Reported Grand Turk is Mobilizing.
London.—The Turkish minister of war, according to reports from Constantinople, has secretly ordered the printing as quickly as possible of 10,000 copies of a proclamation for general mobilization of the Turkish forces.

PLAN FOR HOSPITAL FAVORED BY DR. BLUE

TEXAS NEEDS PLACE TO TREAT EX-SERVICE MEN SUFFERING WITH TUBERCULOSIS.

FEDERAL AID IS ASSURED

Red Cross Will Furnish Nurses and Equipment and the Government Will Use the Institution.

Washington.—An indorsement of the Benevolent War Risk society of Texas is proposing to erect a \$500,000 hospital in Texas for the care of ex-service men of that state afflicted with tuberculosis was given by Dr. general of the United States public Rupert Blue, the retiring surgeon general of the health service.

"There is need for such an institution in Texas," said Dr. Blue, "and it is hoped that the idea will be carried out for the sake of the ex-service men. The public health service will co-operate in all ways possible."

Dr. Oscar Davis of the Texas public health department, secretary and assistant health officer of Texas, has been in Washington seeking indorsement from federal agencies of the proposal to erect such a hospital, to correct the impression in Texas, they said, that such an institution was not needed. Governor Hobby is president and C. W. Goddard, state health officer, is active vice president of the association.

The co-operation of the public health service will be in the use of the institution and its facilities along the plan of using other hospitals of the country. In addition, according to Dr. Largent, the federal vocational board for the rehabilitation for vocational training, the compensation in each instance being fixed by law.

"The hospital board of the United States health service is favorably impressed," said Dr. Largent, "and the Red Cross has promised that it will aid in every way possible in furnishing nurses and equipment. There are 200 men in Texas needing immediate hospital treatment, and of the 176,000 soldiers sent to the war by Texas it is estimated that 4,000 of them are afflicted with tuberculosis."

DALLAS COUNTY HAS 31,112 POLL TAXES

Approximately 3,500 Women Are Among Those Qualifying For Right of Ballot.

Dallas.—With a total of 31,112 paid poll tax receipts and a grand total of \$4,573, including exemptions issued, Dallas city and county probably will lead the state in the number of poll tax receipts issued this year, according to Tax Collector Charles A. Tosch. The women's portion of the total receipts issued was under the figure of last year, approximately 3,500 women obtaining receipts this year in the city and county.

Of the grand total of 34,573 approximately 7,000 receipts were issued to persons residing outside the city limits. It is estimated that approximately 500 women procured poll tax receipts in the county outside of Dallas and approximately 3,000 in the city. The downtown poll tax booths reported a total of 1,817 receipts issued.

RAIL ADMINISTRATION LOSS IS \$594,200,000

Government Operation of All Carrier Lines Has Cost Nation Near \$700,000,000.

Washington.—Operation of the railroads, Pullman lines, express companies and waterways, unified under federal control, has cost the nation approximately \$700,000,000 since they were taken over two years ago, according to official calculation.

Figures made public by the railroad administration reveal a net loss of \$594,200,000 from railroad operation alone in the two-year period. Statistics, gathered from official sources as to operating costs of the Pullman lines and waterways and express companies while operated by the government, show the addition of \$100,000,000 to the transportation costs.

\$7,000,000 For 1920 Wool Clip.
San Angelo, Texas.—Receipts from the sale of wool and mohair and the marketing of mutton sheep and goats in a score of counties tributary to San Angelo will in 1920 aggregate over \$7,000,000, according to conservative estimates that have just been made by sheep and goat men here. Within the next six months, \$5,000,000 will flow into the trade channels of San Angelo from wool sales alone.

Confidence in Millerand Cabinet.
Paris.—The cabinet of Premier Millerand was given a vote of confidence in the chamber of deputies at a session attended by virtually all the members.

Vote on Nationalizing Mines.
London.—Premier Lloyd George is about to offer the miners a proposition that a referendum of the \$20,000,000 electors of Great Britain be taken on the question of the nationalization of the coal mines.

EFFORTS IN TREATY COMPROMISE FAIL

DEMOCRATS WALK OUT WHEN REPUBLICANS REJECT PROPOSAL OFFERED BY TAFT.

Washington.—Efforts to break the peace treaty deadlock by an official bipartisan negotiations have ended suddenly in failure and democratic senate leaders have begun preparations to bring the treaty back into the open senate for consideration.

It was over the long debated Art. 10 that the bipartisan movement, after bringing republicans and democrats together on many collateral issues, finally met disaster. The end came after Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader, had renewed his refusal to compromise on that article and had rejected a reservation on the subject written by former president Taft and presented to the bipartisan conciliation committee by the democrats.

Walking out of the conference with the announcement that further deliberations there were useless, the democrats quickly drafted plans to renew the fight in the open. The acting party leader, Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, announced that notice would be given in the senate of his intention to move on Feb. 10 to take up the treaty for ratification. Opinion was divided as to whether such a motion would prevail.

If it does Senator Hitchcock expects to propose, he said, that the senate adopt those reservations on which tentative agreement had been reached in the committee and then fight out differences over the others. A draft of the committee's work made public by Mr. Hitchcock did not correspond with a review of its accomplishments given by Senator Lodge, however, and a bitter aftermath seemed in store should the democrats plan of open discussion be carried out.

Tentative agreement, Senator Hitchcock said, had been reached by the committee on the proposed reservations, the only subjects remaining at issue being Art. 10 and the Monroe Doctrine. Senator Lodge maintained that there were in all six of the fourteen on which no agreement, even of a tentative nature, had been consummated.

The move of the democrats in championing this reservation came as a surprise, the leaders on both sides having indicated beforehand that any decision on Art. 10 probably would be put over until next week.

ALARMING CONDITIONS OF UNREST ON FARMS

Postal Official Tells Senate Committee Disastrous Consequences Threaten.

Washington.—Indication of a widespread spirit of unrest and dissatisfaction among the farmers of the country, so threatening as likely to disturb the existing economic structure, is considered by government officials to be revealed in more than 40,000 replies to a questionnaire recently sent out by the postoffice department.

The replies as thus far digested were summarized in a report prepared by George L. Wood, superintendent of the postoffice department's division of rural mails, and read to the senate postoffice committee by James I. Blakeslee, fourth assistant postmaster general. The views of the 40,000 or more farmers were obtained by the broadcasting of 200,000 copies of a questionnaire throughout the agricultural states asking for suggestions, whereby the postoffice department might aid in cutting down the cost of living.

Answers to the questionnaires as summarized by officials, show the major complaints of the farmers in numerical order to be: Inability to obtain labor to work the farms, hired help and the farmers' children having been lured to the city by high wages and easier living.

High profits taken by middlemen for the mere handling of food products. Lack of proper agencies of contact between the farmer and the ultimate consumer.

Embargo on St. Louis Shipments.
Dallas.—An embargo has been established by the St. Louis-San Francisco railroad against the receipt of all carload freight from connections at St. Louis, destined to points on their lines in Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Advice to this effect were received by the transportation department of the chamber of commerce. The embargo is effective immediately.

Players-Lasky Purchase Theaters.
Ashville, N. C.—A \$7,000,000 theater deal was closed here when the Players-Lasky corporation purchased the S. A. Lynch Enterprises, comprising a half interest in 135 theaters in the south. Among the cities represented in the deal are Dallas, San Antonio and Houston.

Confidence in Millerand Cabinet.
Paris.—The cabinet of Premier Millerand was given a vote of confidence in the chamber of deputies at a session attended by virtually all the members.

FARM STOCK

BASIS FOR PORK PRODUCTION

One Source of Failure Is That Many Follow It as Speculation Rather Than Business.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Recent heavy slumps in the hog market, as well as the high prices of corn, have caused hog raisers in various parts of the country to reduce the number of sows in their herds, according to reports received. But hog raising on the farm should be made a stable, regular business, department specialists believe. The man beginning to raise hogs should resolve to follow it year in and year out, regardless of the price he may obtain for his hogs or the cost of the feed which he converts into pork. Like every other farming activity, pork production has its ups and downs, but, according to long-time averages, the farmer who sticks realizes a fair and dependable profit, the specialists declare.

One source of failure is that too many follow it as a speculation rather than as a business. They plunge on hogs just as they would gamble on grain futures or on the stock market. Operations of this character are never beneficial for any business. Because of the recent decline in the hog market it does not necessarily follow that the selling price of the pigs that will be raised from the sows bred this fall will not be satisfactory. The pigs of this fall will not be ready for a year and untold changes may come about.

Every farmer who is conservative, careful, and painstaking in his hog-raising operations is able after a few years of experimentation to determine approximately the maximum and minimum number of sows that he can maintain on his farm at the greatest net profit. When he has accurately ascertained this number he should breed that many sows every year, other conditions being equal. In adhering to this plan the farmer is, in no sense, a speculator, but is in reality a business man practicing common-sense business management. Hog raising throughout the localities where pork is made as a regular and depend-

able cash crop has proved one of the most reliable farm activities in which the farmer engages, and despite market fluctuations and the spasmodic irregularities in prices the prospects are that pork production will be as profitable in the future as it has been in the past.

PREVENT CROWDING OF PIGS

Properly Constructed Feed Trough Assures Each Individual Porker of His Share.

Young pigs should be given their feed in such a manner that each individual pig gets its share. The simplest way to accomplish this is to allow the pigs to eat from a properly constructed feed trough, one that will keep the pigs out of the feed and will lessen the possibilities of crowding.

LIVE STOCK NOTES

Every colt raised will be one more work animal to help till farms.

Better a nose ring for the young bull than an accident after it is too late.

Pasture is by no means a luxury for live stock. It is now recognized as a necessity.

Silage is a good feed for most all classes of stock, but is more popular as a feed for cattle and sheep.

No other farm animals put on flesh as economically as pigs with a given amount of feed. Every farmer should have a few pigs.

Teach the calf to eat grain early. Calves are imitators. If an older calf, knowing how to eat grain, is in the pen with the smaller ones these will soon learn to eat grain.

POULTRY FACTS



TWO BREEDS IN SAME FLOCK

Crossing Is Prevented by Keeping Male of One Breed One Year and Another the Next.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

While keeping two distinct breeds of poultry in one yard without mixing the breeds seems difficult, it can be accomplished easily and with satisfactory results, as shown by the account of an experience just received from a New England poultry raiser. One of the kinds kept is a so-called egg breed, the other being a general-purpose variety of poultry. The method of preventing crossing is as follows:

One year, roosters of the egg-laying breed are retained and used for breeding, no other males being kept. The

Following year roosters of only the general-purpose stock are kept. The difference in the color of eggs of the two breeds selected is so great that hatching eggs have always been selected with a certainty as to the breed laying them. The plan necessitates introducing new males, but the advantages of keeping the blood lines of two breeds separate outweigh the slight cost of purchasing the males. The department of agriculture points out that when this method is followed on two neighboring farms an exchange of roosters might readily be arranged.

REMODELING POULTRY HOUSE

Many Stuffy Old Structures Can Be Rebuilt With Little Trouble—Cost Is Small.

Many farms have old style, closed-up poultry houses with poor light and ventilation; also old sheds and other buildings of little use for other purposes that can be remodeled or built over with little difficulty into satisfactory poultry houses, according to the United States department of agriculture.

A building of that kind usually can be made over for less than one-half the cost of constructing a new one, and if the work is well done should give just as good results. Furthermore, the work performed in remodeling the building serves as a good poultry club demonstration in poultry house construction.

KEEP ALL PROFITABLE HENS

Close Attention and Study Must Be Given to Each Individual Fowl—Some Are Layers.

Keep all hens as long as they are profitable. This calls for close attention and the study of each individual hen, but it is work that pays. The man who turns off every hen that reaches the age of two years is pretty sure to sacrifice some of his best layers.

POULTRY NOTES

Clean, dry litter, clean water pans and mash hoppers are essential to the health of good layers.

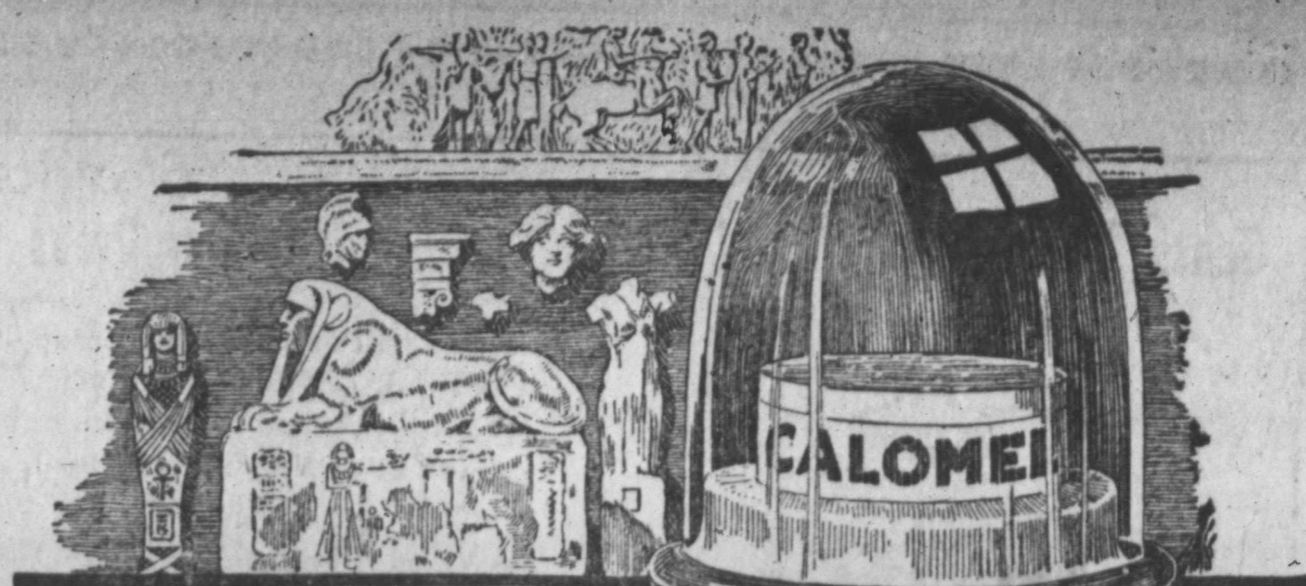
All air that is admitted for ventilation should be so handled that it will not blow on the fowls, especially when they are on the roost at night.

One of the best ways to furnish green food is to hang a cabbage head just high enough so that the fowls will have to jump for it.

A warm, comfortable henhouse will do much to secure a good egg yield, for fowls that are not comfortable cannot lay well.

There is not much danger that healthy, vigorous fowls will become too fat, if compelled to exercise by scratching for the grain part of their ration.

It is necessary to provide the hens with some reason for exercising in winter because they have no incentive to exercise naturally, as they do in summer hunting for bugs and worms, etc.

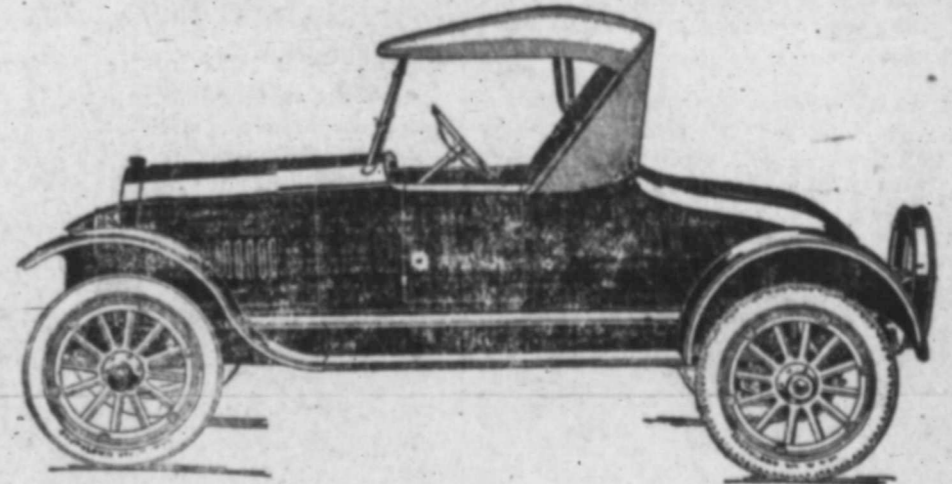
