BAPTISTS LAUNCH BIGGER PROGRAM

\$100,000,000 IN SUBSCRIPTIONS AND
\$20,000,000 IN CASH BY MAY 1
IS NEW AIM SET.

WILL SEEK SOULS, ALSO

Evangelistic Campaign Calculated To
Reach Thousands of Unserved Per-
sons is Announced For March
and April of This Year.

Now that the subscriptions to the
Baptist 75 Million Campaign have
passed the \$90,000,000 mark, leaders
in all the states composing the terri-
tory of the Southern Baptist Con-
vention have resolved to place this sum at
\$100,000,000 by the meeting of the Con-
vention at Washington early in May.
It is also planned to bring the total of
cash offerings by that time to \$20,000,-
000. The convention at Washington
will be the seventy-fifth session of that
body and it is deemed appropriate to
celebrate the diamond jubilee of the
organization with an enlarged sub-
scription and cash sum with which to
carry forward the missionary, educa-
tional and benevolent work fostered
by the convention in all parts of the
world.

This additional sum will be sought
from churches which did not have a
part in the original campaign, from
members of churches who did not sub-
scribe then and from other persons who
made subscriptions in the fall but who
feel disposed to increase their sub-
scriptions now. This effort for in-
creased funds will be made during the
last week in April so that everything
can be completed before the convention
meets in Washington May 12.

Returns By the States.

The reports on the original drive for
funds in the 75 Million Campaign to
date, as made by the several states,
follow: Alabama, \$4,163,000; Arkan-
sas, \$2,265,000; District of Columbia,
\$250,000; Florida, \$1,370,392; Georgia,
\$10,100,000; Southern Illinois, \$830,704;
Kentucky, \$7,167,713; Louisiana, \$2,
\$75,000; Maryland, \$907,760; Missis-
sippi, \$4,144,902; Missouri, \$2,062,506;
New Mexico, \$732,260; North Carolina,
\$7,250,000; Oklahoma, \$3,200,000; South
Carolina, \$7,554,772; Tennessee, \$5,
\$10,000; Texas, \$16,560,000; Virginia,
\$8,298,488. Returns from the foreign
mission fields and other sources not
included in the above bring the total
subscriptions beyond \$90,000,000.

This vast sum of money was raised
at a total expense of three-quarters of
one per cent, making this probably the
most economically conducted campaign
in the history of the country.

Plan Evangelistic Campaign.

Prior to this effort for additional
subscriptions and cash, however, a
South-wide campaign of evangelism,
stewardship and emphasis upon the
fundamental doctrines of religion is
planned for the month of March and
the first three weeks in April, when
the churches will employ their organ-
ized forces in seeking to win to Christ
many thousands of the 20,000,000 people
within the territory of the Southern
Baptist Convention who are not affil-
iated with any church. A day of pray-
er in behalf of the success of every
item on the Baptist program for the
spring and summer of 1920 has been
set apart. Many of the states have al-
ready got their evangelistic campaigns
well under way.

In the hope of arousing as large an
interest as possible, city-wide, county-
wide and associational campaigns of
soul-winning have been planned in
many places. In other places, espe-
cially the rural districts, where the
summer months are considered more
desirable for evangelistic work, the
special program will be deferred until
July and August. This will make it
possible for city pastors to aid the
rural pastors and thus double the evan-
gelistic force of the denomination.

The program of evangelism, steward-
ship and emphasis upon the fundamen-
tal doctrines of religion is calculated
to conserve the victory achieved in the
past year for funds. Dr. George W.
Truett, pastor of the First Baptist
Church at Dallas, Tex., is chairman of
the campaign commission, while Dr.

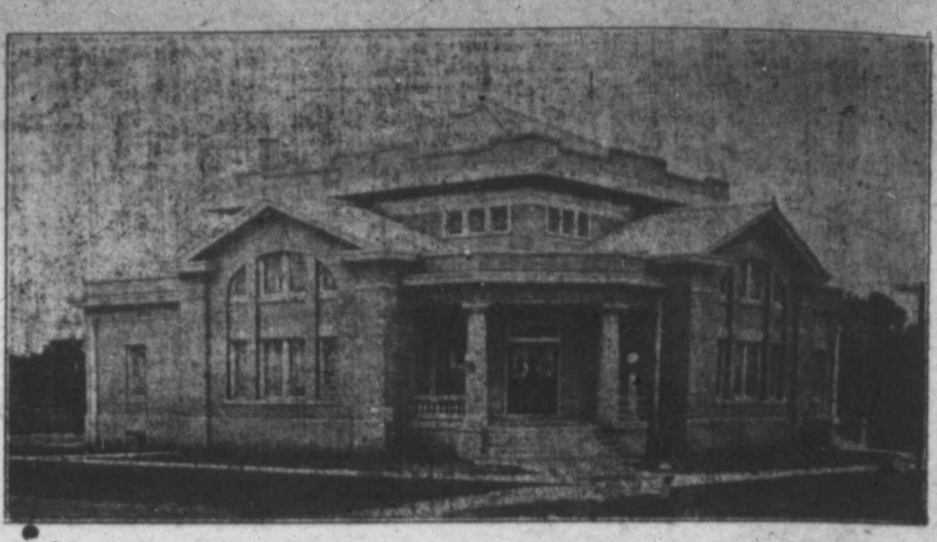

S. P. Acosta has finished laying the water pipe line from the Graham well to the Graham Lake, a distance of eight miles. Water from this lake will be used in developing the field around the Graham well in which there are being erected sixteen derricks.

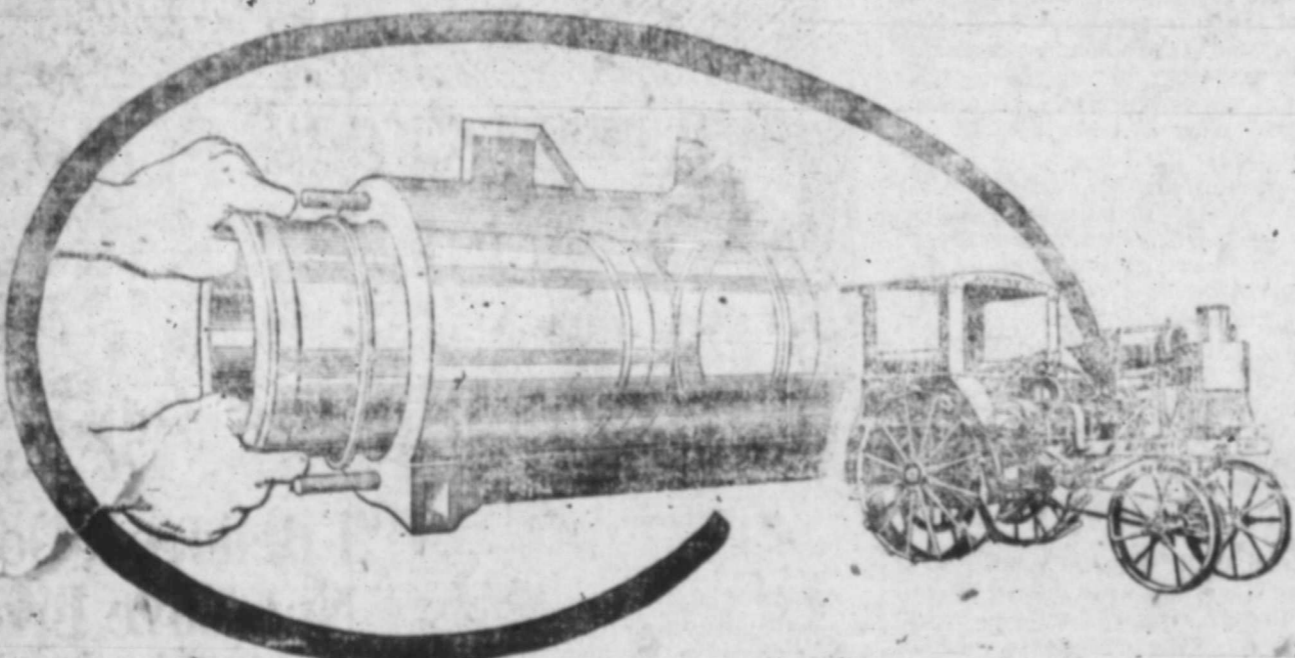

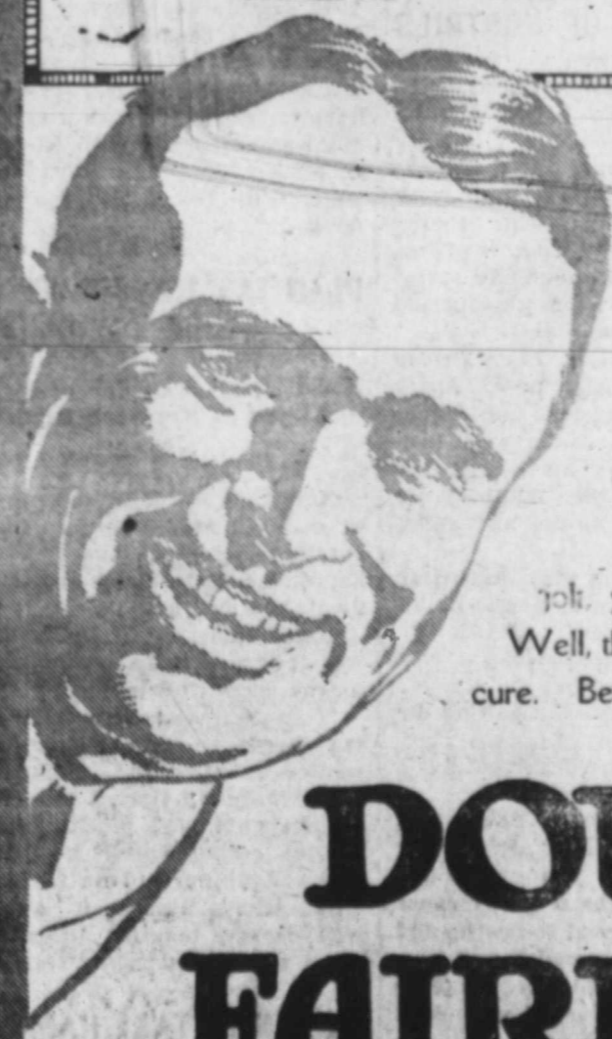

COAL OPERATORS AND MINERS IN DRAG NET

CONSPIRACY TO ENHANCE PRICE OF FUEL IN VIOLATION OF LEVER ACT IS CHARGED.

Indianapolis, Ind.—Indictments, charging conspiracy in violation of the Lever fuel control act and the federal criminal code, naming 125 coal operators and miners as defendants, have been returned in federal court here by a special grand jury which has been investigating the coal industry since Dec. 17, 1930. More than half of the defendants are operators, it is said.

Bond was fixed by United States District Judge A. B. Anderson at \$10,000 in some of the cases and at \$5,000 in others. The defendants will be arraigned on May 4. Names of those indicted will not be made public until they are arrested.

Ten overt acts are charged against the coal men in the indictment, which contains eighteen counts. It is understood that many of the violations charged have no connection with the strike of bituminous miners, but occurred prior to the signing of the armistice.

The indictment was brought under sections 4 and 9 of the Lever act and section 37 of the criminal code and charged in general that miners and operators conspired to enhance the price of necessities by restricting distribution, limiting manufacture and by other means, and conspiring to commit offenses against the United States as defined in the criminal code. The penalty on conviction is a fine not exceeding \$10,000 imprisonment for not more than two years, or both fine and imprisonment.

While no names were made public it was learned that practically all those facing charges are active in the central competitive field, which embraces Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Pennsylvania. The grand jury was instructed to go fully into all reports of violations of the Lever law, without regard to the place of origin of the reports.

REMARKABLE GROWTH OF NATIONAL BANKS

Increase More in Last Six Years Than in Previous Fifty-One-Year Period.

New York.—The national banks of the United States have grown more in the last six years than in the 51 preceding years, or since the passage of the national bank act, according to an analysis of banking figures made by John Skelton Williams, comptroller of the currency, from returns of the Dec. 31 bank call.

At the end of the year the national banks had total resources of \$22,711,350,000, an increase of \$2,670,000,000 in a year and an increase of \$256,000,000 from the previous call. Since January, 1914, the increase has been more than 100 per cent.

The total cash on hand and due from federal reserve banks Dec. 31, 1919, (including lawful reserve and items with the reserve banks in process of collection) amounted to \$2,227,733,000, of which \$508,606,000 was cash in vault (being an increase in the total as compared with Nov. 17, 1919, of \$88,557,000 and an increase as compared with Dec. 31, 1918, of \$238,702,000.)

PLAN TAX TO REPLACE STOCK DIVIDEND LEVY

Assessment on Undivided Profits Suggested by Treasury Department Expert.

New York.—Congress must legislate at once to make up for the loss of revenue caused by the United States supreme court decision that stock dividends are not taxable, Dr. Thomas S. Adams, treasury department expert, has informed the house ways and means committee.

"I came here to suggest that some tax should be devised to replace the section annulled and I believe we will find eventually that it must be a tax on the undivided profits of personal service corporations," he said. "Unless something is done at once these corporations and their stockholders will escape taxation altogether and there will be a national scandal."

WILSON TO TAKE HAND IN COAL CONTROVERSY

Will Try to Compromise Differences if Wage Commission Does Not Agree.

Washington.—In all quarters concerned over the bituminous coal controversy a disposition is evinced to await President Wilson's word before taking any action. Announcement from the White House said the president would try to compose the differences.

Missouri Tornado Kills Eleven Persons

Springfield, Mo.—Eleven persons are known to be dead, two missing and eight injured as the result of a tornado near Branson and Hollister, in Taney county.

Italian Cabinet to Resign.

Rome.—Members of the Italian cabinet will hand their resignations to Premier Nitti, this step being taken in order to facilitate the premier's task in forming a new ministry, according to the Tribuna.

PROHIBITION FIGHT IS TO BE ENDED SOON

ATTORNEYS TELL THE SUPREME COURT SOVEREIGNTY OF PEOPLE IS AT ISSUE.

Washington.—Presentation of arguments in cases for Rhode Island and Massachusetts attacking the validity of the prohibition amendment to the constitution have been concluded in supreme court. The case from Kentucky will be disposed of after which the question will be left to the nation's highest tribunal for decision.

Counsel for those attacking the amendment continue to argue that it was revolutionary and an invasion of state rights.

"You are now coming to a fork in the road, one leading to the power of amendment and the other back to the constitution," Levy Mayer of Chicago told the court, in opening for the Kentucky complainants. "The very proposition is staggering. There is no difference, if we discuss whisky, tobacco or cotton. I rise above the question that this deals with whisky and dwell on the principles involved—can this constitution be uprooted?"

"The question is more than prohibition. Police power is synonymous with the sovereignty of the state. Remove the police power and no state will exist."

Mr. Myer denied that the amendment had been ratified properly in view of referendum provisions in numerous state constitutions requiring such proposals to be submitted to the voters.

These contentions were denied by Solicitor General King and Assistant Attorney General Frierson, who argued the amendment was properly adopted by congress and had been ratified by three-fourths of the states. The solicitor general also said the amendment did not interfere with the functions of the states, but gave the federal government power to act with the states in enforcing prohibition and resulted from a general demand upon congress to assist dry states in enforcing prohibition laws.

DALLAS GETS LIBRARY MEETING MARCH 25

New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma Asked to Send Representatives.

Austin, Texas.—Governor Hobby has invited the governors of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma to designate library trustees to represent their states at the southwestern conference of library trustees to be held at Dallas March 25.

Governor Hobby has invited the following library trustees to represent Texas at the conference: Richard F. Burges, El Paso; Nat M. Washer, San Antonio; Mrs. Ray Wheatley, Amarillo; Ballinger Mills, Galveston; Dr. Arthur J. Price, Port Arthur.

In addition American Library association committee on enlarged program is issuing invitations directly to all library trustees in the four states comprising the southwestern region, to represent their libraries at the conference.

Several public libraries, among them Dallas, Waco, Cleburne and Galveston have already promised to send representatives. The conference, which will last one day, will be devoted to the discussion of the enlarged program.

50,000 BODIES ARE TO BE BROUGHT FROM FRANCE

Between 20,000 and 25,000 Will Remain Permanently in Overseas Graves.

Washington.—The bodies of about 50,000 of the American dead in France will be returned to the United States while between 20,000 and 25,000 will remain permanently interred overseas, Secretary Baker informed Chairman Wadsworth of the senate military committee.

The secretary, who wrote in response to a senate resolution, estimated the cost of returning the dead and concentrating the bodies remaining in cemeteries overseas at \$50,000,000.

Sociological Congress to Meet in Texas

Little Rock, Ark.—The Southwestern Sociological congress will meet at Fort Worth, Texas, next October, it was decided at a meeting of the governing board held at the office of Governor Brough, who is president of the congress.

Force Sale of Food Stocks

Chicago, Ill.—Plans to force into the retail trade on the market in the food ever known on the market in the United States are announced by District Attorney Clyne.

Higher Gasoline Prices Predicted

Chicago, Ill.—A further increase in the price of gasoline this spring is predicted by delegates attending the National Petroleum congress.

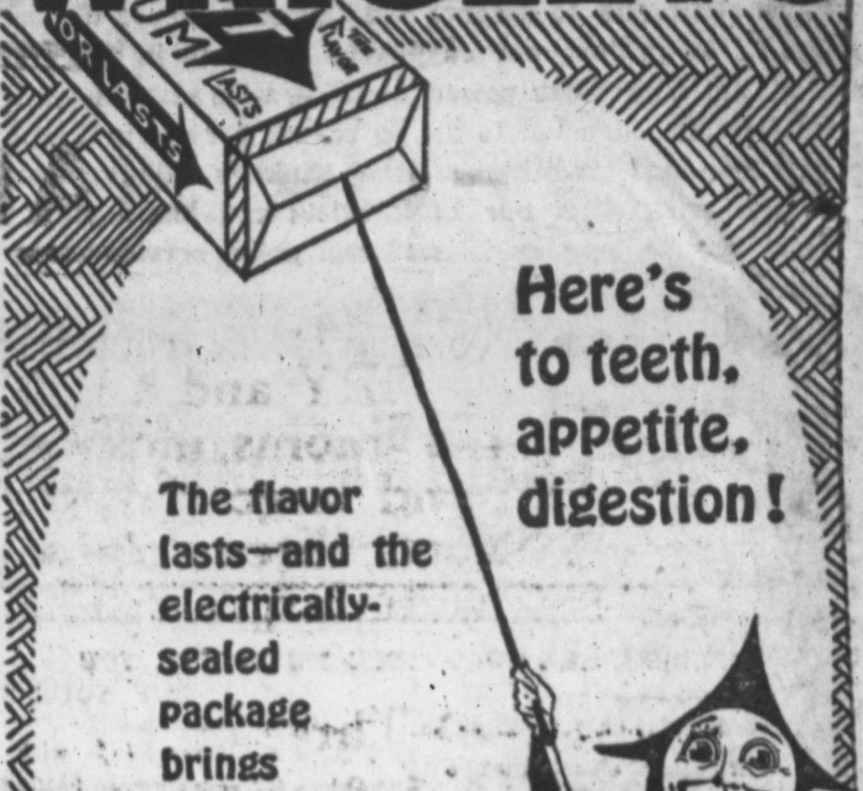

FARM POULTRY

BROOD COOPS FOR CHICKENS

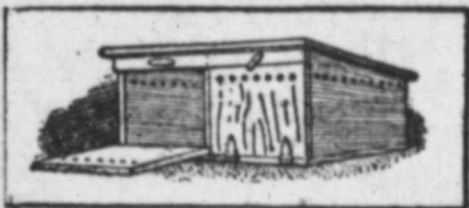
Directions Given for Construction of Cheap and Effective Pens for Little Chicks.

The accompanying drawing gives an idea of how quickly and cheaply any number of brood compartment coops can be constructed. It shows only two sections, but any desired number can be put together, saving material. We suggest that only three at the most be united, as they are easier handled when desiring to remove to new quarters, says a writer in an exchange.

The one section shows the door closed and button turned to hold lid up at night. The other section shows the door down for daytime to allow the hen and young free range in the orchard or pasture, wherever the coops may be located.

A very convenient size both for cutting material and the handling of completed coop has been found to be as follows: Twenty-four inches high in front, 18 inches high at rear, 18 inches deep from front to back. One-inch holes can be bored at each end and a line of them through the top of the door, as indicated by the closed door in drawing. Also, if the roof boards are allowed to project over back wall several inches it is not a bad idea to bore a few holes in the back wall. Some farmers have been very thoughtful and constructed similar coops during the cold, wet, sticky weather the last winter when nothing in the field could be done, and they are ahead much when the fields demand so much time and attention at this season.

Shingles or prepared roofing, whatever is convenient, will make an ideal

covering for the roofs. We have seen where a farmer having a half dozen such constructed coops used galvanized iron from an old shed in town that he obtained for the hauling.

AVOID HIGH-FLAVORED FEEDS

Onions Have Been Fed in Sufficient Quantities to Affect Eggs—Color of Yolk Influenced.

In extreme cases the flavor and odor of the feed have been imparted to the egg. Onions have been fed in sufficient quantity to bring about this effect. Those who desire to market a first-class article should not give feeds of high and objectionable flavor to their flocks.

In no case should tainted feed be allowed to enter the ration. Feed also has an influence on the color of the yolk, according to the United States department of agriculture. Corn fed exclusively will give a deep yellow or highly colored yolk, while wheat fed alone will produce a much lighter yolk. A fairly high-colored yolk is usually preferred and can usually be obtained by feeding a moderate amount of corn. Plenty of green feed also enriches the color of the yolk.

DO NOT OVERCROWD POULTRY

Few Hens in Small Yard Do Better Than Larger Number in Same Space—Room for Each.

Better results will be obtained from a few hens in a small yard than from a larger number in the same yard. The backyard poultry flock rarely will consist of more than 20 to 25 hens, and in many cases only a half-dozen hens are kept. For a flock of 20 to 25 hens a space of not less than 25 by 30 feet is required. From 20 to 30 square feet per hen should usually be allowed.

LARGE BREEDS GROW SLOWLY

Brahmas and Cochins Are Profitable Where There is Demand for Heavy Fowls.

The biggest breeds of poultry, like Brahmas and Cochins, grow more slowly than the medium-sized breeds, and therefore are not ready for market as soon, but they weigh more and are profitable where the market demands a large-sized fowl.

NEEDED EXERCISE BY FOWLS

Hens Can Be Kept Busy by Scattering Grain in Litter on Dry and Clean Floor.

Be sure that the floor of the henhouse is dry and reasonably clean and covered with three or four inches of clean litter in which grain can be scattered so that the fowls can obtain exercise scratching for it.

PASTORS OF TEXAS ENDORSE THE PLAN OF INTERCHURCH

EIGHT HUNDRED LEADING DIVINES PLACE STAMP OF APPROVAL AT DALLAS CONFERENCE BY UNANIMOUS ACTION ON FINDINGS OF COMMITTEE REPORT. URGE THAT ALL CHURCHES CO-OPERATE IN GREAT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT.

In a message of acknowledgement and gratitude, the Interchurch Committee reported at the recent Pastors' Conference of the Interchurch World Movement held in Dallas last week a statement which was unanimously adopted by the Conference. This is the message to the church people of Texas, as sent by more than eight hundred active ministers in twenty-two hundred churches in the State of Texas.

We acknowledge with gratitude the gracious leadership of the Interchurch World Movement in all things. We record with fervent hearts the profound conviction that this movement is of God.

It has been a season of spiritual fellowship when more than eight hundred pastors of our Protestant Churches of Texas have been sitting together for three days thinking about and praying about the common interests of the kingdom of our common Lord and Master.

Our hearts have been moved with this earnest of the fellowship that is to be ours after the victory is won.

The Interchurch World Movement is not a return for organic union but a plan whereby the Protestant Churches of America may co-operate in carrying on their educational, missionary and benevolent programs, at home and abroad.

It is first of all an effort to survey the needs of the whole world and measure the whole responsibility of the church. This is the first time in history that the Christian churches of North America have ever attempted to study the condition of the whole world.

These surveys stand before the Christian church as the greatest challenge it has ever faced since it received the great commission and they have revealed the magnitude of the unfinished task and the inadequacy of the efforts which the church has as yet put forth.

It further proposed a program by which the churches may unitedly attack their common task. That task is fourfold: To bring the whole church to a recognition and acknowledgment of the stewardship of life and possessions; to enlarge the scope and improve the methods of missionary education; to win souls; the chief business of the church; and to enlist the whole life of the church for Christian service.

We approve the spirit and progress of the movement since the World Survey Conference was presented to us by the Interchurch leaders at the Texas Pastors' Conference. We feel that it is a program in which all the churches of Christ could co-operate and venture to hope that the day may come when they will be found in such fellowship of service.

We recommend the approval of the findings of the Atlantic City Conference. We urge that our pastors in their respective ecclesiastical fellowships use every influence to secure adequate support for the ministry and an adequate provision for the care of the aged and infirm ministers and their dependents, and we are persuaded that the realization of this program will make this possible.

We recommend that all pastors co-operate in the holding of the county mass meetings in order that this program and the fellowship of its service may be brought to all local churches.

We urge that every minister sympathetically study this movement and humbly and earnestly pray that God may guide in all things and give us the grace to follow where life leads.

TEXAS LEADERS CHOSEN FOR INTERCHURCH WORK
Noted Ministers Selected to Head Departments of Spiritual Resources, Stewardship, Missionary Education and Life Enrichment.

HAS FINE TRAITS Animal Trainer Reveals Facts About Elephant.

Says the Brute is Both Tender and Affectionate, Though He Will Hold Grudge Against One Who Has Abused Him.

An elephant lives to a great age and comes to maturity slowly, and is not full-grown until from thirty-five to forty years old. It is a mistake to think an elephant is clumsy because he looks so. In proportion to its size an elephant is much lighter on its feet than a horse, and can outrun most horses for a short distance, and there is no one of an elephant's four feet that he cannot strike or kick quickly and accurately with.

An elephant can stand considerable cold if he is kept moving. I have taken elephants in Bridgeport, fitted bags over their ears and tails and worked them up to their bellies in the snow pushing cars without its doing them any harm. On the other hand, I lost a fine elephant once as a result of exposure to the cold, writes George Conklin in the Saturday Evening Post.

The elephant is the most affectionate of animals and will watch over and protect a favorite keeper, and he will also hold a grudge against one for some time, watching for an opportunity to get even with him. But I do not believe those popular stories of elephants that have remembered being cheated by strangers and squirling water over them when they had an opportunity after the lapse of years.

An angry elephant, however, is a dangerous thing, and an elephant keeper who is rough is always running a risk. A cross elephant is usually made so by the keeper. Some men are naturally cruel and are willing to do anything to satisfy their desire to show off. This is apt to be a fault of new men around elephants. I knew of the case of a fellow called Bayou Bill, who was with the Jerry Mable show. An elephant put her trunk round his shoulders, pulled him off his horse, and before anyone could prevent she put one of her feet on his legs, pulled him in two and threw the pieces over her back. I have also known many instances of men being squeezed to death between a wall and an elephant's head or under its foot. But from a keeper or trainer who treats them properly an elephant will accept punishment, and when it has given in the man can do almost anything with it and the animal will not lay it up against him.

In spite of its great size the elephant is quite timid. A strange animal or an unfamiliar noise will start him in a panic. Once Tody Hamilton, the Barnum & Bailey press agent, had me demonstrate to a group of New York reporters how easy it was to frighten an elephant. It was at the winter quarters in Bridgeport. We had at the time some two or three dozen elephants, and I let a pig loose among them. There was a commotion at once. They snorted and squealed and kicked—and, by the way, they can use their hind legs like gaffing guns. I also put some rats in among them, and they were just as afraid of them. If they had not been well chained the whole bunch would have run away.

Elephants are driven from the rear, or left, side, like oxen. The driver tells them to shy when he wants them to go to the right and says "come in" to bring them toward him. "Mile" means to go fast; "mule up" to trot, and when he wants them to stop the driver calls out "hut."

WHEN THE CLOUDS GATHER "Birth" of Thunderstorm, as Seen by Airman, is a Remarkable and Beautiful Spectacle.

Have you ever been in the air to watch a thunderstorm grow? asks Popular Mechanics Magazine. If you were merely on the ground looking up, then you saw only the bottom of it. The airman is the one who sees just what is happening in a thunderstorm.

A few hours before the sky was, perhaps, perfectly clear. All at once a few white patches become visible to the eye, and if they quickly begin to dot the whole sky, it is a warning sign. Each fluffy cloud represents the point where moisture rising from the earth has begun to condense. The rapid formation of the clouds means uneven heating of the surface of the earth and the presence of lots of moisture in the air. The clouds grow together, forming a continuous rolling mass of dense vapor, cutting off the flyer's view of the earth.

So far the storm has only been threatening. The clouds have spread sideways as far as they can; now they begin to grow heavier. The heated air from the earth below pushes through the heavy layer and bulges it upward. Higher and higher it is pushed while more and more moisture condenses, and this great bulging mass of vapor, sometimes three or four miles high, has become a thunder cloud. Its bulging tops are called thunder peaks or thunder heads, and they are responsible for the lightning, the heaviness of rainfall, and the hail we sometimes have in midsummer.

The energy of a thunderstorm is amazing. A single great cloud may contain billions of pounds of water vapor. The flashes of lightning from cloud to cloud are sometimes 20 miles in length, and when we stop to think that it takes a current of 15,000 volts pressure to produce a spark an inch long, we can only wonder at the immense amount of electricity involved in a single flash. Sometimes the wind from a thundercloud, or the squall, as it is called, is violent enough to level trees and small buildings, and is improperly called a tornado. There is a big difference. A tornado is a violent whirlpool of air that sweeps across the country and twists off trees and roofs in its path. The wind from a thunderstorm blows straight away from the storm and never twists.

Broadly speaking, there are three general stages in the development of a thunderstorm. There must be strong currents of moist air rising from the earth, as indicated by the appearance of the white patches of cloud. This condition must continue until the sky is covered. And lastly, the force of these upward currents must be great enough to push the clouds up into thunder heads. A thunderstorm then results.

Opportunities on the Farm.
There was a time when the idea was altogether too common, that the occupation of farming was a sort of junk pile where fate threw human discards who lacked ambition, intelligence or perseverance enough to succeed in any other calling in life, observes the Christian Herald. Then along in the late nineties there was a "back to the land movement," and "mossback" and "haysack" were relegated to the columns of obsolete slang.

The farmer sees life and growth on every hand. Even in winter, in the localities where the landscape seems a symbol of death with snow and ice holding everything in its grasp, there is the hope of renewed life, or resurrection as it were, typified by the stores of seed grain laid away for the next spring's planting.

Truly, on the farm there are special opportunities for observation and thought and happy is the farmer whose thoughts go deeper than the bottom of his milk pail and whose pasture fences are not the boundaries of his horizon.

Making Starch From Potatoes.
The manufacture of starch from potatoes is not a complicated process, the drying, however, being somewhat painstaking. The tubers are first cleaned, then ground. This sets the granules of starch free. The ground mass is then washed with cold water and the starch settles at the bottom. This is collected into vats, spread out on shelves and artificially heated. It dries into lumps and is then the commercial starch. The residue from this manufacture is like alcohol mash, a valuable cattle food. It may also be used as fertilizer. With characteristic wastefulness we in this country have thrown it away.
