### **GERMAN MILITARISTS ARE NOW IN CONTROL**

EBERT'S GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN OVERTHROWN; DR. KAPP NEW CHANCELLOR.

Ousted President Issues Proclamation, Calls for General Strike to Prevent Former Kaiser's Return.

Berlin.-The socialist government of Germany, headed by Frederich Ebert, president of the republic, was overthrown last Saturday by a mili-Kapp, one of the founders of the fatherland party, and general director of the agricultural societies, has ousted Gustav Bauer, the chancellor, taking the office himself, and temporarily at least, assumes supreme director of

Germany now has two contending governments, the new one under Chancellor Kapp, at Berlin, and the old one under President Ebert, at Desden. Officials of the new government makes announcement that it is neither reactionary nor monarchist.

The old government has issued a proclamation calling upon the people to arise in a mighty strike, saying this is the only means of preventing the return of the former kaiser, Wilhelm II, to the head of the German government

Wr. Kapp, as chancellor, and Maj. Gen. von Luettwitz have issued the following statement:

"The overthrow of the government must not be taken as reactoinary. It is a progressive measure of patrotic Germans of all parties, with a view to establishing law, order, discipline and honest government. It is an overdue attempt to lay the foundations for the economic resuscitation of Germany. enabling her to fulfill those conditions of the peace treaty which are reason-

able and not self-destructive. "Inspired by a desire for the benefit of all the German people, the new government invites co-operation of the independents for the creation and elaboration of laws for the betterment of all classes."

The manifesto charges the socialist government with overburdening the people with taxation, failing to create conditions for an increase of production, suppressing newspapers, and interfering with personal liberty and refusing to dissolve the national assembly and issue writs for new elec-

Last, but not least," says the manifesto, "a government whose chief spokesman is Erzberger, must be swept away."

Troops of the counter-revolutionists now occupy Berlin but the number is not known-and the movement is spreading rapidly. Masses of troops and paval brigades with artillery have seen brought into the capital and dominate the situation.

Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is reported to be favored by the new regime as imperial president, but thus far he has remained in the back-

### DISASTROUS FIRE SWEEPS GRANDVIEW

Damage About Million and Half Dollars, With 900 Persons Home-

Grandview-About 900 persons were rendered homeless Sunday afternoon by a fire which started in the south part of town and swept a section three blocks wide and twelve blocks lang, causing a loss estimated at \$1.-500,000. The best parts of the business and residence sections were wiped out and virtually nothing was left of the portion occupied by the negroes, 350 or 400 of whom are home-

The fire originated in the residence of W. D. Davis when an oil stove in an incubator exploded.

All the churches and school buildings of the town were destroyed.

The new substitute is as follows: "The United States assumes no obligation to preserve the territorial integrity or political independence of any other country by the use of its military or naval forces, its resources, or any form of economic discrimination, or to interfere & controversies between nations, whether members of the league or not, under the provisions of Art. 10, or to employ the military or naval forces of the United States under any article of the treaty for any purpose, unless in any particular case the congress, which, under the constitution, has the sole power to declare war or authorize the employment of the military or naval forces of the United States, shall in the exercise of full liberty of action, by act or joint resolution, so provide.'

The democrats have a feeling that at some time in the future the episode will redound to their advantage and that the treaty will be ratified ultimately in a way more nearly approximating their desires if the Simmons-Wat son plan had prevailed.

### COTTON CORPORATION TO BE LAUNCHED SOON

Permanent Headquarters and Warehouse of \$1,000,000 Concern to Be at Dallas.

Dallas .- A \$1,000,000 cotton corporation to conduct a factorage and consignment cotton business is being organized in Dallas by A. H. Wicker of Ennis, head of the firm of A. H. Wicker & Co., cotton merchants. Mr. Wicker has been in the cotton business in Ennis for a number of years.

The company expects to be ready to season. The organization will sell cotton for small buyers direct to the shippers and also will conduct a factorage business whereby cotton exporters can buy cotton in even running grades and staples in large quantities Mr. Wicker said this will eliminate the necessity of carrying big stocks. He pointed out that by having just the kind of cotton to fill the particular demand. which the shipper may have he can sell for a better price than under the present system of marketing.

### GOVERNMENT TO BUY QUARANTINE STATIONS

Appropriation of \$90,071 For Five Stations in Texas is Requested.

Washington.-The treasury department has placed before the house appropriations committee a request for an appropriation of \$90,071 to complete the purchase of five Texas quarantine stations which the federal government leased some time ago at a nominal rate of \$1 a year. The properties are at Galveston, Aransas Pass, Sabine, Port Isabel and Laredo, and the appraisement was reached by a joint board consisting of a medical officer of the public health service, the constructing engineer of the treasury department, the Texas health officer and the attorney general of Texas.

Returns By the States.

The reports on the original drive for funds in the 75 Million Campaign to date, as made by the several states, follow: Alabama, \$4,100,000; Arkan-Bas, \$2,265,000. District of Columbia, \$250,000; Florida, \$1,370,392; Georgia, \$10,100,000; Southern Illinois, \$830,704; Kentucky, \$7,167,713; Louisiana, \$2,-875,000; Maryland, \$907,760; Mississippi, \$4,144,902; Missouri, \$2,062,506; New Mexico, \$732,260; North Carolina, \$7,250,000; Oklahoma, \$3,200,000; South Carolina, \$7,554,772; Tennessee, \$5,-010,000; Texas, \$16,560,000; Virginia, \$8.298,488. Returns from the foreign mission fields and other sources not included in the above bring the total subscriptions bayond \$90,000,000.



### Tesla

F COURSE you recall Jules Verne's Ten Thousand Leagues Under the Sea." Well, his submarine is now an accomplished fact, isn't it? And doubtless you read Kipling's 'With the Night Mail." Well, the Atlantic has been crossed in a single 'flight, hasn't it? Probably, also, you read H. G.

Wells' "The War of the Worlds," in which the Martians descended upon us with fighting machines even more formidable than the tanks of the great war and a mysterious agent of wholesale destruction even more deadly than any gas used by either

Well, who shall say that Wells hasn't the right idea about Mars being inhabited by beings just as smart as we are-and probably a good deal

It is a bold man who say "impossible" these

Anyway, Guglielmo Marconi, the famous Italian engineer, who perfected wireless telegraphy. has opened up an exceedingly interesting question by this statement:

"I have encountered during my experiments with wireless telegraphy most amazing phenomena. Most striking of all is the receipt by me personally of signals which I believe originated in the space beyond our planet. I believe it is entirely possible that these signals may have been sent by the inhabitants of other planets to the inhabitants of earth.

"If there are any human beings on Mars I would not be surprised if they should find a means of communication with this planet. Linking of the science of astronomy with that of electricity may bring about almost anything.

"While our own planet is a storehouse of wonders, we are not warranted in accepting as a fact the general supposition that the inhabitants of our comparatively insignificant planet, are any more highly developed than inhabitants (if there be such) of other planets.

"For all we know, the strange sounds that I have received by wireless may be only a forerunper of a tremendous discovery.

"The messages have been distinct but unintelligible. They have been received simultaneously in London and in New York, with identical intensity, indicating that they must have originated at a great distance.

"These signals are apparently due to electromagnetic waves of great length, which are not merely stray signals. Occasionally such signals can be imagined to correspond with certain letters of the Morse code. They steal in at our stations irregularly at all seasons. We do not get the signals unless we establish a minimum of 65mile wave lengths. Sometimes we hear these planetary or interplanetary sounds 20 or 30 minutes after sending out a long wave. They do not interrupt traffic, but when they occur they are very

"The most familiar signal received is curiously musical. It comes in the form of three short raps, which may be interpreted as the Morse letter 'S.' but there are other sounds which may stand for other letters.

"The war prevented an investigation of the Hertzian mystery, but now our organization intends to undertake a thorough probe." Australia corroborates Marconi's statement.

Highly skilled and experienced operators at Sydpey have received numerous signals similar to those reported as having been received in England. They consist of frequent repetitions of two dashes, representing the letter M. They are on wave lengths of 80,000 to 120,000 meters. The Australian experts say such wave lengths have never yet been used by any wireless station of the earth.

Now what do the electrical authorities say on the general subject? Here it is, in brief:

Thomas A. Edison has this to say: "Although I am not an expert in wireless telegraphy, I can plainly see that the mysterious wireless interruptions experienced by Mr. Marconi's operators may be good grounds for the theory that inhabitants of other planets are trying to signal to us. Mr. Marconi is quite right in stating that this is en-

tirely within the realm of the possible. "I have given some thought to the matter and can record one personal experience which may or may not have bearing on proving that Mr. Marconi is right. I was seated on the peak of a great pile of iron ore near the reduction plant at Orange one day, when I noticed that the magnetic needle



rays of light, which could much more easily be controlled.

was jumping about in astonishing fashion. The thought immediately popped into my mind that static signals from some other planet were probably responsible. This idea took such a hold on me that I made the definite suggestion that there be established in the ore fields of Michigan a station where scientific vigil might be kept, in the hope that the great masses of ore in that region would attract magnetic signals from interplanetary

"If we are to accept the theory of Mr. Marconl that these signals are being sent out by inhabitants of other planets, we must at once accept with it the theory of their advanced development, Either they are our intellectual equals or our superiors. It would be stupid for us to assume that we have a corner on all the intelligence in the universe."

Nikola Tesla, the famous Serbian inventor and electrical expert says: "Marconl's idea of communicating with the other planets is the greatest and most fascinating problem confronting the human imagination today. To insure success a body of competent scientists should be organized to study all possible plans and put into execution the best. The matter should be directed probably by astronomers with sufficient backing from men with money and imagination. Supposing that there are intelligent human beings on Mars, success is easily within the range of possibility. In March, 1907, I stated in the Harvard Illustrated Magazine that experiments looking to communication with other planets should be undertaken.

"In 1899 I built an electric plant in Colorado and obtained activities of 18,000,000 horsepower. In the course of my experiments I employed a receiver of virtually unlimited sensitiveness. There were no other wireless plants near, and, at that time, no other wireless plants anywhere on this earth of sufficient range to affect mine. One day my ear caught what seemed to be regular signals. I knew that they could not have been produced upon the earth. The possibility that they came from Mars occurred to me, but the pressure of business affairs caused me to drop the experiment.

"The thing, I think, that we should try to devel-op is a plan akin to picture transmission, by means of which we could convey to the inhabitants of Mars knowledge of earthly forms. This would enable up to exchange with them not only simple primitive facts, but involved conceptions. To talk to Mars seems to me only a matter of electric

power and perseverance." Frank Dyson, British astronomer royal, believes we could get Hertzian waves from other planets. Prof. Edward Branley, Paris, Inventor of the coherer, is sceptical. Prof. Domenico Argentieri, Rome, says the supposed signals are worthy of careful observation.

Prof. Albert Einstein, the German astronomer and author of the theory of "Relativity" that is apparently upsetting all accepted doctrines, believes that Mark and other planets are inhabited, but if intelligent creatures are trying to communicate with the earth he should expect them to use

Are there inhabitants on Mars? That's a question on which scientists differ. Among scientists who have won the right to speak with authority the foremost was the late Professor Lowell, director of the observatory at Flagstaff, Ariz. Not only was Professor Lowell convinced that Mars was inhabited, but he believed the people had a much higher degree of intelligence than those on earth. He dwelt par all sorts of bladder disorders.

ticularly on their inventive genius. In 1914 he found a new opportunity for strengthening his pet belief by announcing that instead of losing any of their canals the Martians had built two new ones, which could be seen plainly through the telescope.

"We have actually seen them formed under our eyes," Professor Lowell said at the time, "and the importance of it can hardly be overestimated. The phenomenon transcends any natural law, and is only explicable so far as can be seen by the presence out yonder of animate will."

Professor Lowell had little to say about the appearance of the beings on Mars. Edmond Perrier, director of the museum of the Jardin des Plantes, in Paris, constructed the first picture of the Martians as he conceived them. He said in

"The men on Mars are tall because the force of gravity is slight. They are blond because the daylight is less intense. They have less powerful limbs. Their large blue eyes, their strong noses, their large ears, constitute a type of beauty which we doubtless would not appreciate except as suggesting superhuman intelligence."

On the other hand, Dr. C. G. Abbott holds that If wireless messages are being received, it is not Mars sending the signals, but most probably Venus. Abbott is director of the Smithsonian instrophysical observatory and assistant secretary of the Smithsonian institution. He says Mars is eliminated as a possibility because known conditions on that planet would not permit the existence of any form of living creature. It is too cold there and there is practically no water vapor

in its atmosphere. Assuming that Mars or some other planet is signaling us, what can we do in the circumstances? Apparently we can do much.

Dr. James Harris Rogers of Hyattsville, Md., who has devoted his life to the study of electric waves and invented the underground and underseas wireless used during the war, declares he is going to undertake to teach the inhabitants of Mars the rudiments of intelligence of this planet. Within a year wireless communication will be established with Mars, Dr. Rogers believes.

L. J. Lesh, a New York radio engineer, suggests that one of the methods of constructing a gigantic station would be to erect huge antennae suspended by balloons like the British dirigible R-34. He asserts, however, that a still better way would be to use huge and brilliant shafts of light as antennae for the system: He thinks that projectors could be grouped around one spot where a great amount of electricity could be generated. He suggests Ningara Falls or some other spot with an enormous amount of water power.

Elmer A. Sperry has a searchlight capable of producing a beam having the illuminating intensity of 1,280,000,000 candle power. He would form a group of 150 to 200 of his searchlights and direct their combined beams in the direction of Mars. An aggregation of that sort would possess the luminous equivalent of a star of the seventh magnitude such as our telescopes are able to pick up readily. Therefore, assuming that the Martians had glasses of equal power, they should have no trouble in catching that dot of light from a distance of 35,000,000 to 40,000,000 miles.

It would be possible, no doubt, to operate these lights so that they could give slow signals which would fill all the requirements of a system of communication, However, an array of lights of this character and the needful energizing plant

would cost a pretty sum. The outlay might be warranted some day, but certainly not until it is certain that we are being called by one of our neighbors cut in space.





### REMARKABLE GROWTH OF NATIONAL BANKS

Increase More In Last Six Years Than In Previous Fifty-One-Year

New York.-The national banks of the United States have grown more in the last six years than in the 51 preceding years, or since the passage of the national bank act, according to an ohn Skelton Williams, comptroller of the currency, from returns of the Dec. 31 bank call.

At the end of the year the national banks had total resources of \$22,-711.350,000 an increase of \$2,670,000,-000 in a year and an increase of \$266,-000,000 from the previous call. Since January, 1914, the increase has been more than 100 per cent.

The total cash on hand and due from federal reserve banks Dec. 31, 1919, (including lawful reserve and items with the reserve banks in process of collection) amounted to \$2,-227,733,000, of which \$508,605,000 was cash in vault (being an increase in the total as compared with Nov. 17, 1919, of \$88,557,000 and an increase as compared with Dec. 31, 1918, of \$288,702,



BROOD COOPS FOR CHICKENS

Directions Given for Construction of Cheap and Effective Pens for Little Chicks.

The accompanying drawing gives an idea of how quickly and cheaply any number of brood compartment coops can be constructed. It shows only two sections, but any desired number can be put together, saving material. We suggest that only three at the most be united, as they are easier handled when desiring to remove to new quarters, says a writer in an exchange.

The one section shows the door closed and button turned to hold lid up at night. The other section shows the door down for daytime to allow the hen and young free range in the orchard or pasture, wherever the coops may be located.

A very convenient size both for cutting material and the handling of completed coop has been found to be as follows: Twenty-four inches high in front, 18 inches high at rear, 18 inches deep from front to back. Oneinch holes can be bored at each end and a line of them through the top of the door, as indicated by the closed door in drawing. Also, if the roof boards are allowed to project over back wall several inches it is not a bad idea to bore a few holes in the back wall. Some farmers have been very thoughtful and constructed sim-Har coops during the cold, wet, sleety weather the last winter when nothing in the field could be done, and they are ahead much when the fields demand so much time and attention at

Shingles or prepared roofing, whatever is convenient, will make an ideal

covering for the roofs. We have seen where a farmer having a half dozen such constructed coops used galvanized fron from an old shed in town that he obtained for the hauling.

AVOID HIGH-FLAVORED FEEDS

Onions Have Been Fed in Sufficient Quantities to Affect Eggs-Color of Yolk Influenced.

In extreme cases the flavor and odor of the feed have been imparted to the egg. Onlons have been fed in sufficient quantity to bring about this effect. Those who desire to market a first-class article should not give feeds of high and objectionable flavor to their flocks.

In no case should tainted feed be allowed to enter the ration. Feed also has an influence on the color of the yolk, according to the United States department of agriculture. Corn fed exclusively will give a deep yellow or highly colored yolk, while wheat fed alone will produce a much lighter yolk. A fairly high-colored yolk is usually preferred and can usually be obtained by feeding a moderate amount of corn. Plenty of green feed also enriches the color of the yolk.

DO NOT OVERCROWD POULTRY

Few Hens in Small Yard Do Better Than Larger Number in Same Space-Room for Each.

Better results will be obtained from a few hens in a small yard than from a larger number in the same yard. The backyard poultry flock rarely will consist of more than 20 to 25 hens, and in many cases only a half-dozen hens are kept. For a flock of 20 to 25 hens a space of not less than 25 by 30 feet is required. From 20 to 30 square feet per hen should usually be allowed.

LARGE BREEDS GROW SLOWLY

Brahmas and Cochins Are Profitable Where There is Demand for Heavy Fowls.

The biggest breeds of poultry, like Brahmas and Cochins, grow more slowly than the medium-sized breeds and therefore are not ready for market as soon, but they weigh more and are profitable where the market demands a large-sized fowl.

NEEDED EXERCISE BY FOWLS

Hens Can Be Kept Busy by Scatter. ing Grain in Litter on Dry and Clean Floor.

Be sure that the floor of the henhouse is dry and reasonably clean and covered with three or four inches of clean litter in which grain can be scattered so that the fowls can obin exercise scratching for it.

### PASTORS OF TEXAS **ENDORSE THE PLAN**

EIGHT HUNDRED LEADING DIVINES PLACE STAMP OF APPROVAL AT DALLAS CONFERENCE BY UNANI-MOUS ACTION ON FINDINGS OF COMMITTEE REPORT. URGE THAT ALL CHURCHES CO-OPERATE IN GREAT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT.

In a message of acknowledgement and gratifude, the Findings Committee ap-pointed at the recent Pastors' Conference of the interchurch World Movement held in Dallas issued a statement which was This is the message to the church people of Texas, as sent by more than eight hundred active ministers, representing twenty one denominations from fully two hearts the profound conviction that this movement is of God.

It has been a session of spiritual fel-low-inp when more than eight hun-fred pastors of our Protestant Churches of Texas have been sitting together for three days thinking about and praying about the common interests of the king-dom of our common Lord and Master. Our hearts have been moved with this rnest of the fellowship that is to be us after the victory is won.
The Interchurch World Movement is it a scheme for organic union but a

not a seleme for organic union but a plan whereby the Protestant Churches of America may co-operate in carrying on their educational, missionary and benevodition of the whole world. These sur-veys stand before the Christian church atest challenge it has ever mission," and they have revealed the magnitude of the unfinished task and the insdespacy of the efforts which the church has as yet put forth.

It further proposes a program by which the churches may unitedly attack their common task. That task is fourfold: To bring the whole church to a recogni-tion and acknowledgement of the stewardship of life and possessions; to en-large the scope and improve the methods of missionery education; to win souls; the chief business of the church; and to enlist the whole life of the church for Christian service.

We approve the spirit and progress of the movement since the World Survey Conference was presented to us by the Interchurch leaders at the Texas Pastors' Conference. We feel that this is a pro-gram in which all the churches of Christ could co-operate and venture to hope that the day may soon come when they will be found in such fellowship of ser-

We recommend the approval of the addings of the Atlantic City Conference. WHEN THE CLOUDS GATHER

"Birth" of Thunderstorm, as Seen by Airmen, Is-a Remarkable and Beautiful Spectacle.

Have you ever been in the air to watch a thunderstorm grow? asks Popular Mechanics Magazine. If you were merely on the ground looking up, then you saw only the bottom of it. The airman is the one who sees just what is happening in a thunder-

A few hours before the sky was, perhaps, perfectly clear. All at once a few white patches become visible to the eye, and if they quickly begin to dot the whole sky, it is a warning sign. Each fluffy cloud represents the point where moisture rising from the earth has begun to condense. The rapid formation of the clouds means. uneven heating of the surface of the earth and the presence of lots of moisture in the air. The clouds grow together, forming a continuous rolling mass of dense vapor, cutting off the flyor's view of the earth.

So far the storm has only been threatening. The clouds have spread sideways as far as they can; now they begin to grow heavier. The heated air from the earth below pushes through the heavy layer and bulges it upward. Higher and higher it is pushed while more and more moisture condenses, and this great bulging mass of vapor, sometimes three or four miles high, has become a thunder cloud. Its bulging tops are called thunder peaks or thunder heads, and they are responsible for the lightning, the heaviness of rainfall, and the hail we sometimes have in midsummer.

The energy of a thunderstorm is amazing. A single great cloud may contain billions of pounds of water vapor. The flashes of lightning from cloud to cloud are sometimes 20 miles in length, and when we stop to think that it takes a current of 15,000 volts pressure to produce-a spark an Inch long, we can only wonder at the immense amount of electricity involved in a single flash. Sometimes the wind from a thundercloud, or the squall, as it is called, is violent enough to level trees and small buildings, and is improperly called a tornado. There is a big difference. A tornado is a violent whirlpool of air that sweeps across the country and twists off trees and roofs in its path. The wind from a thunderstorm blows straight away from the storm and never twists.

Broadly speaking, there are three general stages in the development of thunderstorm. There must be strong currents of meist air rising from the earth, as indicated by the appearance of the white patches of until the sky is covered. And lastly, the force of these upward currents must be great enough to push the clouds up into thunder heads. A thunderstorm then results.

Opportunities on the Farm.

There was a time when the idea was altogether too common, that the occupation of farming was a sort of junk pile where fate threw human discards who lacked ambition intelligence or perseverance enough to succeed in any other calling in life, observes the Christian Herald. Then along in the late nineties there was a "back to the land movement," and "mossback" and "hayseed" were relegated to the columns of obsolete slang.

The farmer sees life and growth on every hand. Even in winter, in the localities where the landscape seems a symbol of death with snow and ice holding everything in its grasp, there is the hope of renewed life, or resurrection as it were, typified by the stores of seed grain laid away for the next spring's planting.

Truly, on the farm there are special opportunities for observation and thought and happy is the farmer whose thoughts go deeper than the bottom of his milk pail and whose pasture fences are not the boundaries of his horizon.

Making Starch From Potatoes. The manufacture of starch from potatoes is not a complicated process, the drying, however, being somewhat painstaking. The tubers are first cleaned, then ground. This sets the granules of starch free. The ground mass is then washed with cold water and the starch settles at the bottom. This is collected into vats, spread out on shelves and artificially heated. It dries into lumps and is then the com-mercial starch. The residue from this manufacture is like alcohol mash, a valuable cattle food. It may also be used as fertilizer. With characteristic wastefulness we in this country have thrown it away.
