STATE AID IS GIVEN MORE RURAL SCHOOLS

Total of 3,000 Out of 5,000 Applications Have Participated in Appropria-

Austin, Texas.-At the instance of Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state suberintendent of public instruction, the state board of education has extended aid to 1,500 rural schools whose applications had been pending and which would close unless funds were forthcoming at this time, instead of next month, the time for the regular meeting of the state board.

According to Miss Blanton, nearly 5,000 schools have asked for aid out of the rural appropriation of \$2,000,-000 and aid has now been granted to approximately 3,000. Commodity rates are not involved. It is pointed out that this was one of the rare occasions when the carriers and the Texas commission were agreed.

The hearing involved the policies erected under the Shreveport, Natches Memphis Southwestern and other rate cases which have brought the southwestern situation forward in rate contests during the last five years. The question was whether there should be readjustment of the rate structure by the application of a mileage scale of rates to apply from St. Louis, Mem phis and Mississippi river crossings to the south to points in southern Missouri, Ok! Laoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas and to apply generally beween points in that territory. As to Texas, it was to determine whether in this way the common point and differential territories shall be abolished as to interstate traffic. Shippers representatives contended that if this were done it would have to be abolished as to interstate Texas traffic in order to prevent discrimination against interstate business, a matter which the commission has full powers under the new raffroad law to carry out.

The Texas interests are opposed to the application of a mileage scale from the Mississippi river gateways indicated, stating it would mean the necessity of extending such a policy to Chicago, Kansas City, Cincinnati and elsewhere.







HAS CURE FOR **TUBERCULOSIS**

Physician Declares He Has Found New Way to Fight Disease.

ATTACKS THE GERM CAPSULE

Increases Power of Blood to Digest Wax of Tuberculosis-Claims a Large Record of Recoveries Even in Advanced Stages.

New York .- Many physicians of this city have shown interest in a treatment for all forms of tuberculosis developed by Dr. Benjamin S. Paschall, formerly of Seattle, now of New York, and asserted by him to be more effective than quinine is for malaria.

Tuberculosis is not thrown off easily by the body as many other infections recoveries. are, according to Doctor Paschall, because the germ manufactures for itself a capsule of wax which gives it a high degree of protection from the natural powers of the blood to digest and destroy germs and other foreign

The problem which confronted him at the beginning of his research in 1907, according to Doctor Paschall, was to find a method of increasing the power of the blood to digest the wax of tuberculosis germs,

Find Kitchen 5,000 Years Old in Alsace

Strasbourg .- The "kitchen" of a primitive man has been found in a quarry at Achembam, Alsace, where the charred bones and teeth of several mammoths. wild horses, rhinoceri and hyenas have also been discovered.

M. Forrer, of the Archaeological Museum of Strasbourg, says in the palaeolithic age the dwellers in Alsace used to hunt these animals and eat them. The ashes and earth in which the food was cooked were found with the bones.

The palaeolithic age goes back to 3,000 B. C. This means that the "kitchen" is at least five thousand years old.

In this case Doctor Paschall asserted that he had treated the man when he was in a hospital, almost blind, and when surgeons were preparing to remove one of his eyes in the hope of saving the other. On the following afternoon, according to Doctor Paschall, he found the man on the outside of the hospital cranking up his automobite and preparing to ride home. In cases of tuberculosis of the eyes, throat or kidneys or other forms, in which the diseased part is in close communication with the blood stream, the beneficial results are manifest in a few hours, it was stated. In the case of tuberculosis of the lungs the germs diffused through the body are said to be digested within a few hours after the first treatment, and the patient regains much of his energy and feeling of wellbeing. Bone and joint tuberculosis are said to yield readily to the treatment. Because mycoleum is in a laboraratory stage of manufacture, only a small quantity is in existence and its





RATIFICATION FAILS IN SENATE; TREATY ISSUE THROWN INTO CAMPAIGN.

Washington-The peace treaty with Germany has been rejected in the United States senate.

Not only did the senate vote its rejection by seven more votes than were required, but passed a resolution returning the document to the president. So it is no longer before this body and nothing more can be done with it until it is resubmitted by the president.

It is stated that one time during the controversy between President Wilson and the senate majority he threatened to send Senators Lodge and Knox to Germany to negotiate a treaty if the one he brought to them should be rejected, and while this was taken at the time as a sardonic bit of sarcasm, something of the sort is now an actual possibility.

The vote of rejection was 35 to 49" To ratify the treaty with 84 members present would have taken a vote of 56 to 38. It was rejected the first time on Nov. 18, last, 41 to 51. Then but seven democrats voted for the treaty, plus the Lodge reservations. This time 20 democrats voted with Senator Lodge Twenty-three stood by the president and with 12 republican irreconcilables made up the total

that rejected the treaty. The motion to send the treaty back to the president was rushed through in order to insure that it should be out of the senate definitely. It served its purpose directly, as well as indirectly, for a motion to reconsider the rejection of the treaty made by Senator Robinson of Arkansas was ruled out of order.

Promptly an effort was made to get to work on the Knox resolution that aims to declare peace with Germany without the formality of a treaty-an expedient the legality and practicality of which is questioned on both sides of the senate.

CHAOTIC CONDITIONS PREVAIL IN BERLIN

Nearly All the Revolutionary Troops Leace City, But Disorder Continue.

Berlin.-Berlin has not yet succeeded in emerging from the chaos into which it was thrown when Dr. Wolfgang Kapp and his associates, by a coup d'etat, took over the government a week ago. Although most all, if not all, of the troops which formed the backbone of the revolt have left the city proper, disorders continue

spasmodically. In addition to further shooting, in which a number of persons were killed or maimed in front of the Hotel Adlon, three officers were shot dead and one officer was mortally wounded by members of the security police. stationed at the guardhouse at the Brandenburg gate. The police ordered an automobile bearing the officers, who were reported to have been members of the Baltic force which invaded Berlin, to halt. Thereupon a crowd surrounded the car and the officers opened fire with revolvers on

DALLAS HEADQUARTERS OF NEW REVENUE DISTRICT

Capt. Scott Reed of Groesbeck Recommended by Both Senators for Collector.

Washington.-An executive order has been approved by President Wilson re-establishing the second internal revenue districts in Texas, abolished some ten.years ago, the headquarters of which will be in Dallas. In ofder to keep within the law, which allows only 64 districts in the United States, an order was issued March 11 combining two districts in Virginia.

Senators Culberson and Sheppard have recommended the appointment of Captain Scott Reed of Groesbeck as the new collector, and this is now before the president, with the approval of the treasury department. Captain Reed served overseas with a Texas

PEACE TERMS OPPOSED BY TURK NATIONALISTS

Foreign Interference and Partitioning Of Turkey Will Be Resisted.

Constantinople.-Leaders of the Turkish nationalists from Azerbaijan te Palestine seem to be co-operating in a movement to oppose allied proposal for a peace unfavorable to Tur-Men closely associated with Mustapha Kemal, leader of the nation alists, have been skillfully promoting opposition to all foreign interference. it is asserted, and the Arabs, Kurds and other tribes are said to be aligned with forces planning to checkmate any movement on the part of the entente looking to the partitioning of the country.

Asks for Seven-Cent Fare. Shreveport, La.-Application for an increase in street car fares here to 7e is made in a petition field with the city commission by the Sherevepert Traction company.

Japan Ready for Shantung Agreement Tokio. It is understood here that the government has instructed Yukichi Obata, the Japanese minister in Pekin, to begin negotiations immediately for a speedy settlement of the Shantung question.


