



### TOMATO TRELLIS IS **EASY TO CONSTRUCT**

Features of One Shown Are Lightness and Durability.


Device May Be Put Together With Any Material at Hand-Fruit Will Hang Low, but Not Enough to Touch the Ground.

The features of this trellis are lightness, durability and easy method of construction. It may be made of any material at hand, although materials of the following dimensions are just about right for a trellis that may be taken up and put away for use for

The pieces that rest on the ground are 11/2x3 inches by 4 feet long. The strips nailed on these are 1x2 inches by 6 feet long

Where the pieces cross one nail is driven and clinched. As shown in the cut, the other pieces are nailed to hold the frame rigid.

A Good Tomato Trellis,

When the vines are dead and before bad weather in the fall the trellis may be cleaned and closed up and stored away for further use,

In setting the trellis in position along the row of tomatoes, they should be set five or six feet apart, so that strips, as shown in the cut by dotted lines, may be put on, thus saving one-half the number of heavy pleces.

The strip shown by dotted lines, lying in the fork of the trellis, is to tie the plant to first; then keep off all suckers but two on each side of

The fruit will hang low in great bunches; being shaded by the foliage and not touching the ground, it will be nice and clean.

### CONCENTRATES MUST BE FED

Dairy Expert Advises Against Discontinuance of Grain Feed for Cows in Pasture.

I. V. Wilson of University farm, agent in dairying for the United States department of agriculture, advises against the discontinuance of grain feed when the cows are turned out first to pasture. Some grain must still be fed, he says, if a consistent milk flow and the average weight of ing from grain feeds to pastures can from a day's grazing that they may obtain from two or more regular feedtice," he says, "an increase in milk production following the change from barn confinement to the freedom of the green pasture. However, we are running the danger of reducing the weight of our cows, consequently putting a greater strain upon their system, if we do not tide them over through the first few weeks with some amount of grain."

### FRESH WATER FOR CHICKENS

Abundant Supply Should Always Be Handy for Hens-Keep Out of Sun's Rays.

Plenty of fresh water should always be accessible to the hens. If supplied irregularly they are likely to drink too much at a time. It should not be exposed to the sun's rays in summer nor be allowed to freeze in winter if this can be avoided.

In very frosty weather it is often worth while to give the flock slightly warmed water two or three times a day rather than permit them to drink water at the freezing point. A flock of 50 hens in good laying condition will require four to six quarts of water a day, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agri-

Professor Voorhees, an authority on soil fertilization, says that the beneficial results of coal ashes when applied to some soils is evidently due to the physical effect on the soil. Professor Van Slyke in his work on fertilizers recommended coal ashes for lightening heavy, clay soils,

OCCUPY VERA CRUZ AND MEXICO CITY-CAPTURE OF CARRANZA REPORTED.

### OBREGON AT MEXICO CIT

Occupation of City Without Disorder on Friday Confirmed by State Department.

Washington,-Official confirmation f the occupation of Mexico City by rebel forces Friday, May 7, has been the American embassy. There was no to suspend publication this week. disorder and no foreigners were interfered with, the message said.

Laredo, Texas.-Nuevo Laredo, the Mexican town opposite this city, suring after a two hours' battle. The revolutionists attacked from three sides of the town.

General Reynaldo Garza, commander of federal forces in the Nuevo Laredo military district, is a refugee on tion. American soil. Following defeat of his troops and capture of Nuevo Laredo by revolutionists the Carranza officer arrived in Laredo and took refuge in the Mexican consulate.

General Garza who ordered his troops to make a determined stand against the rebel attack on Nuevo Laredo at dawn, saw his defense crumple after a short fight and with his son escaped in an automobile. Pursued by rebels the general eventually made a ford of the Rio Grande, five miles west of Nuevo Laredo and arrived on American soil with his automobile perforated by 120 bullets.

The revolutionists approached Nuevo Laredo shortly before dawn from the west.

The most desperate fighting, however, occurred in the section immediately surrounding General Garza's residence. Desperate resistance was offered in that district, probably for the purpose of covering the federal commander's escape.

When the rebels had taken full control of the town the populace turned out in celebration of the fall of the Carranza garrison. Bands paraded the streets playing popular marches, while

But in the democratic convention there is a much better chance for the wets to obtain their desire, although they will be up against the stiffest kind of fight led by William J. Bryan, who thinks more of prohibition than he does of the democratic party, and who never knows when to quit, once he has started fighting.

New York.-The socialist party of America has plunged into the active political warfare of the 1920 presidential campaign with broadside after broadside fired by "the big guns" at the national convention mass meeting in Madison Square Garden.

Wichita Falls, Texas-There are 170 producing wels in the Red river territory covered by the federal receivership, and the total daily production is 8,890 barrels, according to figures made public. While many of the wells in the district had 1,000 barrels or more flush production when completed, few are now making over 100 barrels. ### MAY 20 DATE SET FOR SPECIAL SESSION

PROCLAMATION IS ISSUED BY GOVERNOR TO PASS BOLL-WORM LEGISLATION.

Austin, Texas.-Governor Hobby has issued his mformal proclamation convening the legislature in special session in Austin to meet at 10 a. m. Thursday, May 20, three subjects being submitted at the start.

The subjects submitted in the proclamation are described as follows: To enact legislation which will make possible to establish zones in which the growing of cotton may be effectively prohibited or regulated in areas infested with what is known as the pink bollworm to the end of stamping out such infestation as a menace to the cotton industry of Texas and to the end of preventing a quarantine against the interstate shipment of Texas cotton and cotton products by the horticultural board of the United States government.

To make provisions for maintaining the public schools and the educational institutions of Texas during the next scholastic term.

To make appropriations necessary to supply deficiencies and for the support of the state government.

To consider and act upon such other matters as may hereafter be presented to Section 10, Article 3, of the constitution of the State of Texas.

A number of additional matters have been suggested from time to time, but the governor promises nothing lust now outside of those carried in his proclamation. .

### **EXCURSION RATES NOW AUTHORIZED BY TARIFFS**

Reduced Fares Allowed Between June 1 and October 31.

Dallas.-Round trip excursion rates to coast resorts in Texas and to tourists' points in northern and eastern states is authorized in passenger tariffs recently issued. Excursion rates are effective June 1 with a time limit of Oct 31, 1920.

Local joint passenger tariff No. 2-B authorizes summer rates from points in Texas and certain points in Louisiana to Galveston, Corpus Christi, Rackport, Kerrville, La Porte Beach and Palacios. Week-end rates, issued only on Saturdays, will be good for ten days to Galveston, Corpus Christi and Rockoprt.

the state. Reports indicate the rain will be of inestimable benefit in Runnels, Concho, Coleman, Brown, Coke, Nolan and adjoining counties where moisture has not been sufficient to bring up seed. The rain was just in time to save the large wheat crop in Hale county and permit planting of other grains, it is reported. Lynn county sees prospects for a bumper crop as a result of the precipitation.

### ATTRIBUTE HIGHER PRICES TO EXCESSIVE PROFITS

Brotherhoods Deny Increased Living Costs Due to Wage Advances.

Washington.-A study of profiteering in American industry, made under the auspices of the railway brotherhoods, was presented to the railroad labor board in support of the railway workers' demand for higher pay, and to refute the charge that increased labor costs are responsible for the high cost of living.

Prepared by A. J. Lauck, former secretary of the war labor board, the study seeks to show that profiteering in industry is the fundamental cause for high prices in practically all commodities. It gives many statistics to support that convention.



Here, practically untouched by time, are ornaments of shell cut into disks, and beads of turquoise and of shell. There are arrow points of jasper, bone awls and needles and fragments of painted wood-ceremonial boards, doubtless.

The basketry is of two types-coiled and twilled-some of it in an excellent state of preservation. Then there are cylindrical netted disks padded with corn husks. These are a puzzle to the museum's investigators. Some one advanced the theory that they might have been used as snow shoes, but the small size and unsultable shape of some of the specimens seem to refute that supposition. A wooden cradleboard with its curiously placed headpiece accounts for the flattened skulls typical of all the skeletons of this ancient civilization which have been recovered. A pillow of matting stuffed with corn husks, and some human remains wrapped in matting and showing the method of burial complete the miscellaneous portion of the collec-

Specimens of Pottery.

The rest of the exhibit is given over to pottery. The specimens are of white, red and black, and include cooking and eating utensils. The designs-not as advanced in conception as some other of our antique southwestern pottery, are, however, frequently skillfully executed. For the most part painted in black, or, less often, in red, they are sometimes clearly taken from textile designs, sometimes made up of free-hand curved lines such as would not have been practicable in textiles, or, occasionally consist of crude animal representations. As interesting broken mug shows a hollow bottom in which little pellets of clay had been placed so as to produce a rattle. The cross-markings on the edges of the bowls and drinking vessels are very characteristic of the pottery taken from this vicinity. Most interesting among these relics is the coiled pottery-made by rolling long strips. of clay and winding them round and round in the desired shape, as is done inscoiled basketry. In the pottery of this sort the mark of the shaping thumb can be plainly seen, and was frequently used to produce a wave pattern which often attained to a very pleasing development.




