**A VISION OF 2420 A. D.**

Those unimaginative people who believe the high pitch of inventive genius was reached with the advent of electricity, talking machines, airplanes and the X-ray will be interested to know that civilization on this planet has really just begun. Dr. A. M. Low, a London engineer with many inventions to his credit, says 500 years hence our descendants will look back upon conditions in 1920 with just such feeling of amused pity as we show for the state of the savages of prehistoric times.

The scientist predicts among other things that in 2420 A. D. all public thoroughfares and parks will be underground, vehicles will carry an attachment enabling the speakers to see each other and all roads will be as smooth as billiard balls.

Dr. Low, who invented a motor scooter and has produced an apparatus for seeing simple objects by wire, in a recent interview in London, said in part:

"When a man sets out for business he will not proceed, as he does now, by tramway car or train; he will pass along delightful avenues underneath the surface of the earth. Parks and all other places of public resort and beauty will be roofed in.

"Motor cars and all other motor vehicles will proceed by wireless power and not by the crude method of using petrol. They will be fitted up like luxuriously appointed drawing rooms and will be driven at a rate of 100 miles an hour. Wireless telephones will be installed in the cars, as well as every kind of appointment making for luxury and comfort. Many people will own these cars.

People will live in a condition of splendid physical isolation. Television—that is, the ability to see your absent friend over a distance of many miles—and wireless telephony will lead to this condition.

"This vision is not extravagant or a wild set of theories. It is the direction in which scientific discoveries and experiments tend. Many scientific men have come face to face with discoveries and inventions which are only separated from actual realization by a simple little difficulty, which will certainly be overcome in time.—New York Sun.

**ORDER OF ELECTION**

For the Purpose of Voting on the Issuance of Jail Bonds Young County

On this the 21st day of April, 1920, the county commissioners' court of Young county, Texas, convened in regular session at a regular term of said court, all members being present, to-wit: W. P. Stinson, County Judge, W. C. Burns, Commissioner of Precinct No. 1; H. S. McCready, Commissioner of Precinct No. 2; Sam Bird, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, and W. H. Reeves, Commissioner of Precinct No. 4, and passed the following order:

"Whereas, the present jail of Young county is in bad condition inadequate and unsanitary and it is believed to be to the best interest of the court that a modern structure be erected, it is therefore ordered by the County Commissioners' Court of Young county, Texas, that an election be held in each and every voting precinct in Young county, Texas, on the 29th day of May, A. D. 1920, for the purpose of determining whether or not the legally qualified voters within said county desire the issuance upon the faith and credit of the county of Young bonds for the purpose of erecting a jail for said county and to issue said bonds in accordance with Title No. 18, Chapter No. 1, Article No. 610, Acts 1911, page 204, Section No. 1, as set out in the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas relating to the erection of such jail.

Said bonds to be numbered consecutively from one to twenty, both inclusive, and shall be of the denomination of \$2,000.00 each and aggregating \$40,000.00.

They shall be dated the 10th day of June, 1920, and shall become due and payable twenty years from date, but may be redeemed at the option and pleasure of the county, at any time after ten years from said date.

They shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the 10th day of April and October, 1921, and on the 10th day of April and October of each year thereafter until all are paid. Principal and interest shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the bond or coupon, in lawful money of the United States at the office of the County Treasurer of Young county, State of Texas.

The said bonds shall be signed by the County Judge and duly countersigned by the County Clerk and registered by the County Treasurer and the seal of the County Commissioners Court shall be impressed upon each of them.

It is further ordered by the court that to pay interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to

discharge them at maturity a tax of 5 cents on each one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said County of Young shall be annually levied on said property, and annually assessed and collected until said bonds with interest are paid, and said tax is here and now levied for the (current) year 1920, and for each succeeding year while said bonds are outstanding, and the same shall be assessed and collected for the (current) year and annually thereafter, and applied to the purposes named.

It is also ordered that Chas. C. Triplett be authorized to take and have charge of said bonds pending their investigation by the Attorney General, and upon their approval shall have authority to negotiate their sale and receive for the County the proceeds thereof.

All persons who are qualified voters under the Constitution and laws of this State will be allowed to vote at said election, which shall be held in conformity with law. The ballots at said election shall have written or printed thereon the following words: "For the Jail Bonds."

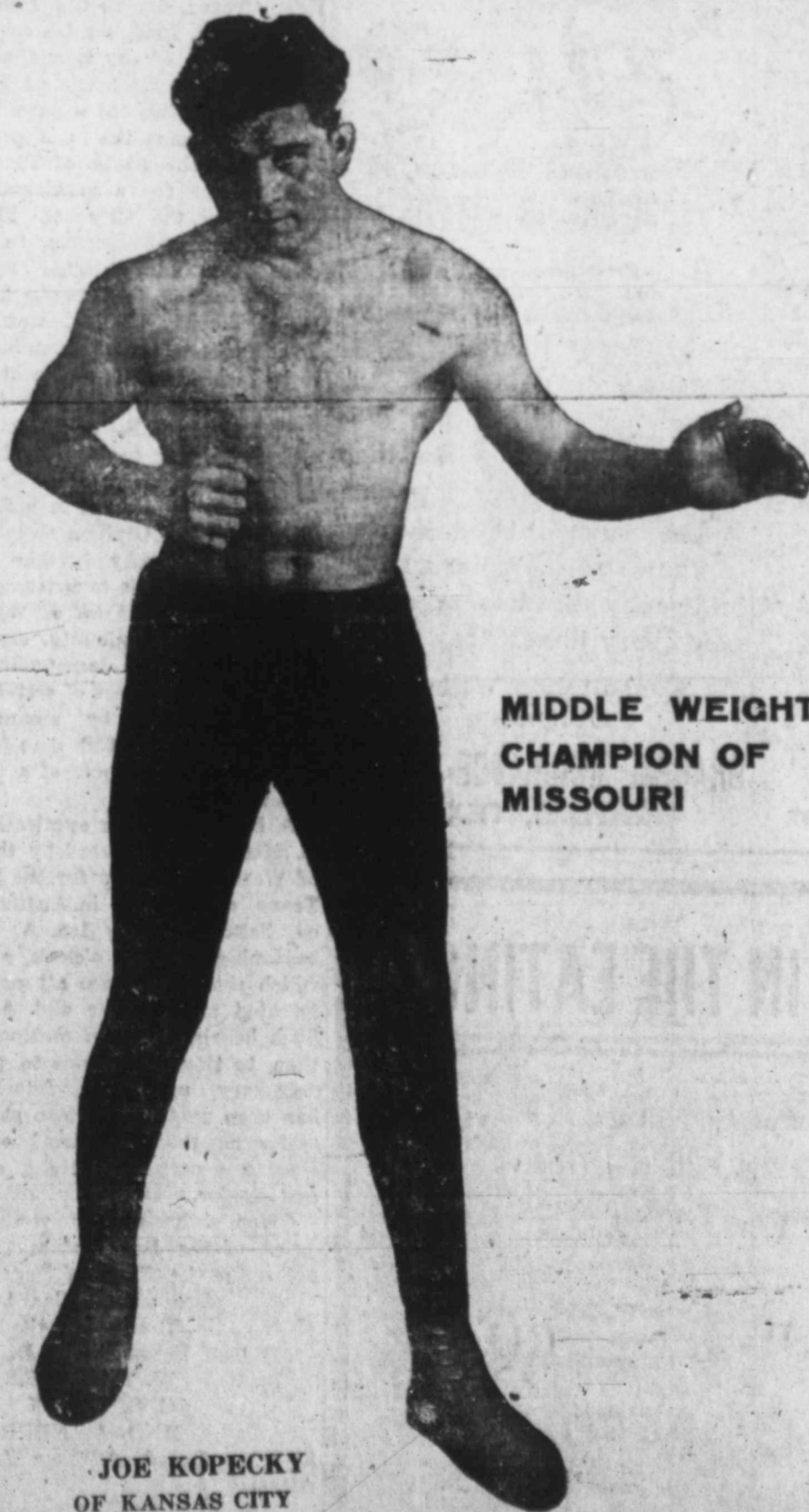

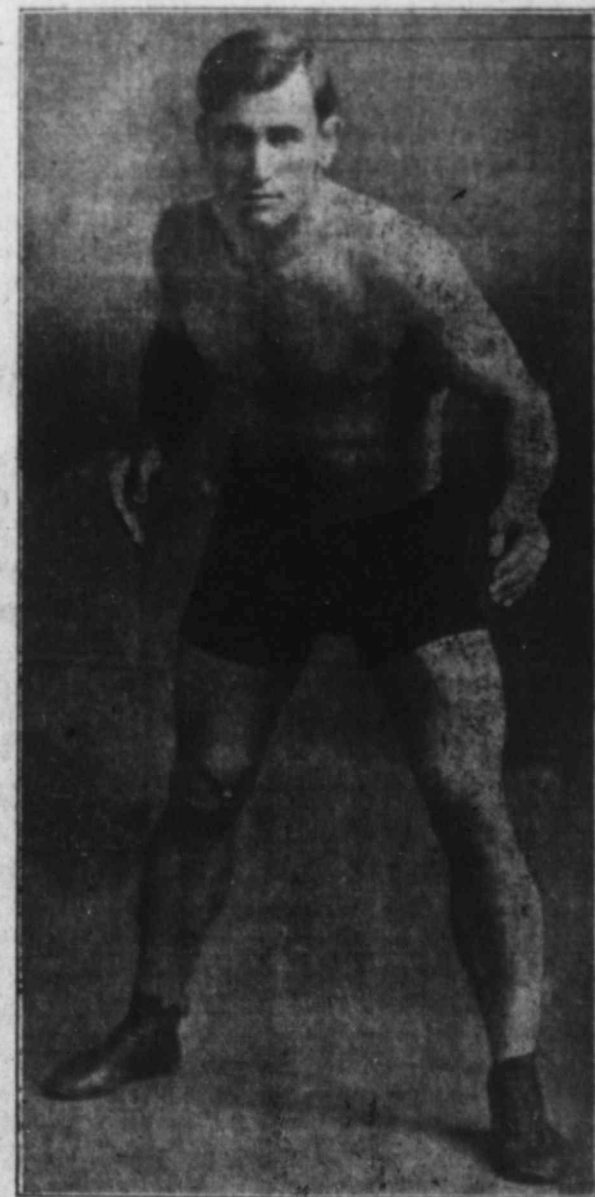

### WHAT THE COUNTRY NEEDS

Every political candidate is telling us "what the country needs." Reading their prescriptions and advice you would gather that the needs of the country can be solved by legislative bodies and financial groups. Practically every candidate proposes to do something for an abstract question, as if the only task the country has is to go ahead with a debate. The benefits which are proposed are all political, and the only beneficiaries which are in view seem to be the partisans of certain political ideas. The whole performance of the candidates resembles the attempt to stop a famine by a discussion of astronomy.

What the country needs is food and fuel, clothing and houses. There is no scarcity of politicians and of political theories, but there is a scarcity of these things of daily need. The need of the country does not center in Washington, but in the homes of the people.

The groups and the individuals that discussion have no need for food and have time to devote to oratory and fuel, clothing and houses. Their larders and coal bins and wardrobes are filled; they live in comfortable homes; so far as they are concerned this is truly an era of prosperity and the goose hangs high.

But when you move among the people, those whose daily labor sustains society, you hear another tale. Let any reader of this ask himself what he most hears these days from working man and house wife. It is about the difficulty of getting along even on the high wages that are going; the difficulty of getting coal, even with the money in hand; the difficulty of finding houses to live in, even with the high rent ready to be paid in advance.

We are in danger of bearing a resemblance to the man who sat around discussing world problems while his

family went ragged and on scant provision. Our first job is to provide the things we need to live, for we shall cut a fine figure if we counsel Europe how to recover if we do not take time to recover ourselves.—Dearborn, Independent.

### LESS STORAGE FOOD ON HAND

Reports of the State Department of farms and markets show that there was a notable decrease in the amount of food in cold storage on March 1 in comparison with the previous month. Eggs showed a decrease of 80000 cases, leaving only a little more than 7,000 cases still in the warehouses. The decrease in butter was more than 2,000,000 pounds, or about 20 per cent. Frozen fish and miscellaneous meat were 2,000,000 pounds less. All of these holdings were less than were the stocks of the same articles a year ago. Poultry showed a decrease of about 11,000,000 from the previous month, and lamb and mutton stocks were 400,000 pounds less. Pork and beef showed an increase over the previous month, but there was considerably less of this meat in storage than there was a year ago. Of course the figures do not include holdings in private cold storage, but are obtained from the public warehouses. Still they give a fair indication of the fluctuation of storage food available at different times. Just what conclusions might be drawn from this showing is not clear. In 1918 there had been a large production of food in anticipation of war needs, and more than the usual amount was in storage a year ago. Apparently, if the figures mean anything, we are now about on the normal basis.—Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.

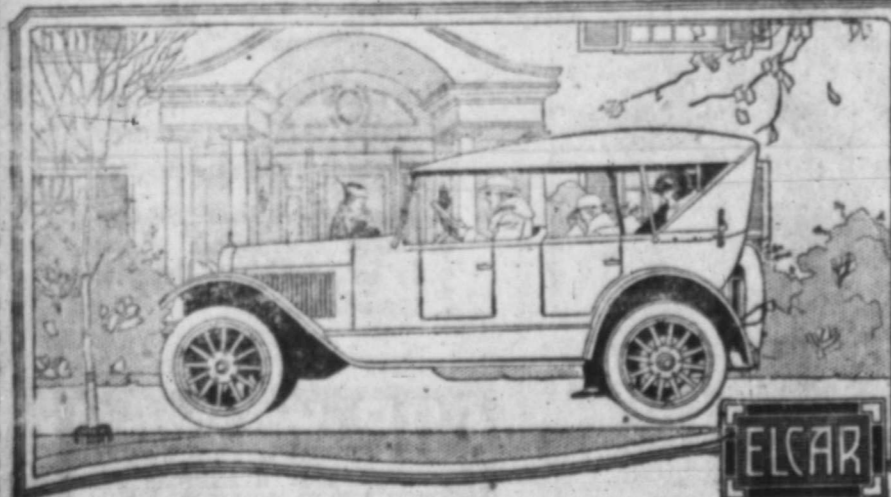
