





# SUPPORTERS OF TAX

FIGHT TO MAKE 10 PER CENT LEVY FOR SOLDIERS BONUS TO BE RENEWED.

### THERE WILL BE NO SALES TAX

Move to Limit Bonus to \$500 for Home Service and \$625 for Overseas Opposed.

Washington .- On a tie vote with one member absent, republican supporters of a stock dividend tax to finance soldier relief legislation in the house ways and means committee lost their fight for 10 per cent levy retroactive to last March 15. The majority mempers of the committee divided seven

The fight, opponents of the tax said. would be renewed this week when democrats of the committee meet with the senate and house. the republicans to take final action on the relief bills.

The new bill differs little from the original measure which met a check in the house last week. The sales tax has been eliminated, and the four other forms of taxation extended to three years' instead of two.

A further fight in committee against the cash bonus, the maximum limit for which is now fixed at \$500 for service in this country and \$625 for oversease service, is threatened. Besides the bonus, the bill offers four options, the value of each to be 40 per cent greater than that of the cash provis-

The bonus would be fixed at a rate of \$1 a day for service in this country by authority of the joint committee. and \$1.25 a day for overseas, with maximums of \$500 and \$625. The optional benefits are paid up insurance, partments to effect economies in cause I know the stuff you are made home aid, reclamation of land for

farms and vocational training aid. Taxes proposed to add \$500,000,000 a year to government revenues for the next three years would become effective next December as follows:

A new surtax levy on incomes exceeding \$5,000; 1 per cent of the amount between \$5,000 and \$19,000: 2 per cent on that between \$10,000 and \$26,000, and 3 per cent on that exceeding \$26,000.

A levy of 2 cents on each \$10 of exchange transactions in stocks and bonds and deals in futures of grain and produce. A tax of 25c for each \$50 on real

estate sales. Increases of 15 per cent in existing

taxes on tobacco and cigars.

Payments of the bonus would begin July 1, 1921, and be made in quarterly installments of \$60 each.

### HOOVER SEES LONG SHORTAGE OF SUGAR

Two or Three Years Before Supply Equals Demand, He Says.

Washington.-Two or three years will be required for the sugar situa- FREIGHT TIED UP AT tion to get back to normal. Herbert Hoover, former food administrator, estimates.

Mr. Hover, expressing what he said was an "off hand" opinion, asserted that there would have been a "less rapid" rise in domestic sugar prices' had Attorney General Palmer not agreed that Louisiana producers could sell their crop at 17c and 18c a pound.

"Prices have never been fixed by the government or mortal man by threats of jail." declared Mr. Hoover. They have got to be fixed by the business process of purchase and sale."

Purchase of the Cuban crop last July with government control over distribution would have given the people 12 1-2 cent sugar at this time instead of 25c sugar, Mr. Hoover testified.

### OIL FIRE CAUSES

LOSS OF \$100,000

Lubricants and Gasoline In Warehouse, Tanks and Cars Destroyed.

Fort Worth, Texas.-Spontaneous combustion may be the cause of a \$100,000 fire which spread like a sheet over the warehouse of the Producers' Refining company and destroyed two tanks of gasoline, one of lubricant ofl and two carloads of lubricating oil which were inside the warehouse, Three other tanks of oil were damaged. Of the \$100.000 loss sustained,

\$95,000 is covered by insurance. Damage to the amount of \$12.600 was caused by lightning which struck a 5,500 barrel off tank belonging to the Magnolia Petroleum company at its refinery plant at Hodge Station, several miles north of Fort Worth. The tank contained 3,600 barrels of oil and is a total loss.

### GREEN ESTATE MUST PAY NEW YORK TAX

\$24,006,151.56 and Certain Additional Securities Subject to Levy.

New York.-The appellate division of the supreme court unanimously decided that out of \$38,000,000 Hetty Green had invested in this city, \$24. 006,151.56, together with bank deposits interest-bearing bonds, securities and certificates of deposit, whose value is not given, are subject to a state transfer tax. The decision reverses the finding of former Surrogate Fowler, which was that the former "leading business women of the world" did not have any capital invested in business

in this state at the time of her death. The amount of tax which will be collected is estimated at \$1,000,000 to \$1.

Robs Mail Car and is Later Killed. Chicago, Ill.-Federal officers are investigating the disappearance of \$5,-000 from a satchel containing \$75,000 stolen from the New Orleans limited on the Illinois Central railroad by a man identified as Horace Walton of St. Joseph, Mo., who later was killed in a fight with policemen, one of whom was slain. The money was on its way to a Chicago bank from the Citizens National bank of Decatur, Ill.

Express Company Declares Embargo. Dallas.-The American Railway Express company has placed an embargo on the receipt and dispatch of each express shipment weighing more than 200 pounds. The embargo will take effect at once, and has been declared on account of abnormal traffic and a shortage of cars. No shipment of more than 200 pounds will be received on any one day rfom any consignor for any one consignee.



Read the Following Statement of the Commissioners' Court

Graham, Texas, May 12th, 1920.

To the Voters of Young County: -

The Grand Juries of Young County have for many years reported our jail to be in bad condition. Going a step beyond its predecessors, the last Grand Jury condemned our jail in the following terms; to-wit:-

"We beg to report that we have examined the jail and find as follows: The building is old, walls cracked, floors worn and not strong enough to support the weights of the cells it filled with prisoners. Its location, being near to a large frame building, makes it dangerous for the prisoners in case of fire:

"It is too small for the County, not sanitary, poorly ventilated and we consider it not a fit place to confine prisoners and we respectfully condemn the present jail building".

In all of which this court concurs unanimously.

It may be said that the present is not a good time to do any building and yet school houses are building where needed; and you have only to investigate the facts to realize the dire need of a new jail at this time

Many prisoners are unfortunate enough in having to go to jail. at all, without having to endure the extreme discomfort and risk of being confined in our jail, where men, women, boys and lunatics are all indiscriminately huddled near together, without conveniences and without regard to the evil effects on them, morally, mentally and physically.

The present jail and site will doubtless sell to advantage. After deducting the sum thus realized, the cost of the new jail may fall considerably below the amount of the bonds to be voted on and we assure you that no more bonds will be sold than shall be needed for a jail that will reasonably answer our needs.

We feel that the taxpayer should thoroughly acquaint himself with the condition of the jail now being used, before casting his vote for or against the building of a new jail.

### CITY MEN BADLY **NEEDED ON FARMS**

Shortage of Hired Labor Threatens to Curtail Production of Food.

### MEREDITH MAKES AN APPEAL

Increase of Wages From 15 to 25 Per cent Fails to Relieve Situation-Total Acreage Undoubtedly Will Be Reduced.

Washington-With a shortage of hired farm labor, as acute as in 1918, threatening to curtail food production on American farms, E. T. Meredith, secretary of agriculture, has issued an appeal to city men, college students and others to spend their vacations working on farms, particularly as helpers in harvest fields.

Reports secured by the federal department from its representatives in practically every state in the Union show that the supply of hired farm labor in this country is only about 72 per cent of the normal supply, compared with approximately 84 per cent of a normal supply a year ago. This year's shortage is almost exactly the same as that of two years ago when large numbers of men were in military service.





RIGHT STOCK FOR BREEDING

Fowls Should Be Healthy and Vigor ous for Best Success-Yearling Hens Preferred.

For success in raising chickens it is necessary to have healthy and vigorous breeding stock, for the lack of vigor in the newly batched chicks is often traceable to weak parents. Only the most vigorous and the best grown birds should be put in the breeding yards. Each bird should be full of life and energy and free from any serious deformity.

Yearling hens are usually better than pullets for breeders, because hens are more mature and do not lay so many eggs during the early winter, and consequently do not reduce their vitality

MAKING MILK DISEASE-FREE

Thriving Vermont Municipality First Small City to Adopt Strict Regulations.

Barre, Vt., a thriving municipality of about 15,000, is the first small city in the United States which requires dairymen furnishing it with milk to place their herds under federal-state supervision for the eradication of tuberculosis. The result has been accomplished by close and persistent cooperation on the part of the mayor and other municipal authorities, the United States department of agriculture, the state commissioner of agriculture, the local veterinarian.

Eradication of tuberculosis was begun in a thoroughly systematic manner. The regulations of the federal bureau of animal industry and of the state commissioner of agriculture were supplemented by a city ordinance. The city provided at its own expense a large barn, in which were assembled

all small herds, scattered lots, and individual cows. The city also furnished necessary conveyances, and employed a man who devoted his time to notifying owners when to bring their cattle in for test, assigning them stalls as they came in, and keeping the cattle moving out promptly after tests were completed.

Two hundred and sixteen herds, omposed of 2,107 individuals, were tested, and 379 reactors-17.9 per cent of the total-were found. Those reacting to the test were promptly shipped out and slaughtered under federal inspection.

PROPER MANAGEMENT OF COW

Ration Should Be of Such Kind That Animal Will Be in Good Flesh on Freshening.

During the dry period, the cow should be given a good ration so that she will be in good flesh when she freshens. This will improve the quality as well as the quantity of the milk. Just before freshening the grain ration should not be too heavy and should contain plenty of bran. The bowels should be kept well regulated. If necessary, one to one and one-half pounds of Epsom salts may be used as a drench. The cow should have a period of rest of four to six weeks in YIELD WHITE-SHELLED EGGS order to give the best supply of milk during the period of lactation,



### FEED FOR YOUNG DUCKLINGS

Nothing Needed Until They Are 24 to to 36 Hours Old, After Which They Should Be Fed Often-Good Fattening Ration.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Young ducks forced for rapid growth and marketed at from 8 to 12 weeks of age are called green ducks. They weigh from 5 to 6 pounds and are the principal source of income on commercial duck farms. The owner of a small flock of ducks will also find it profitable to crowd the growth of at least part of the ducklings that he

Feeding Young Ducklings.

Ducklings do not need feed until they are from 24 to 36 bours old, after which they may be fed five times dally on a mixture of equal parts, by measure, of rolled oats and bread crumbs, with 3 per cent of sharp sand mixed in the feed. About the third day this or grit in all of the rations.


the ducklings are a week old the grit or sand may be fed either in the mash or in a hopper, but the common practice is to feed grit in all duck rations. Beef scrap is not usually fed until the ducks are a week old, when about 5 per cent is added to the ration, which amount is gradually increased to 15 per cent by the end of the third week. From this time on gradually increase the proportion of corn meal and decrease the bran until the ration becomes the fattening ration given below for those duck lings which are to be marketed.

Fattening Before Killing.

For two weeks before killing the ducklings to be marketed should be fattened on a ration made of 3 parts, by weight, of corn meal, 2 parts of low-grade flour or middlings, 1 part of bran, one-half part of beef scrap, with 3 per cent grit and 10 per cent green feed. Feed this mash three times daily, or use a mash of 3 parts meal, 1 part low-grade wheat flour, 1 part bran, 5 per cent beef scrap, and 3 per cent oyster shell, with the greev feed and grit added.

The green feed is sometimes left out of the ration during the last seven days of fattening, as it tends to color the meat and may produce a slightly raises and market them at 2 months flabby rather than a firm flesh; however, it is easier to keep the ducklings in good feeding condition on a mash containing green feed. ### **GREENS IN GARDENS** THROUGHOUT SEASON

ferent Varieties.

In Many Respects-Each Requires Rich Soil and Cultivation to Keep Surface Loose.

No home garden is complete without greens. The list from which to choose includes spinach, kale, chard, mustard, turnip tops, sour dock, bassella, and young beets. By proper seeding and the use of the right kind of plants, some kind of greens can be had growing in the garden throughout the frostfree season, according to garden specialists, United States department of

winter will produce a tender growth during the spring and may be used the same as spinach or other greens. The secret lies in getting a tender growth early in the spring, when our systems call for greens of some sort.

The culture of the various greens is similar in many respects. Each requires rich soil and sufficient cultiva- North Carolina Live Stock Owner tion to keep the surface loose and free from weeds. ter and early spring months as greens. Spinach is generally grown on a bed raised three or four inches above the surrounding surface to insure good drainage. The beds are made about five or six feet in width, five to seven rows being planted lengthwise. Cover the seed about one-half inch and when the plants appear cultivate the ground between the rows. Fall sown spinach can be protected during the winter with a little straw or leaves and will come out in good condition in the spring provided the temperature does not go below 10 degrees or 12 degrees above zero during the winter, and providing the ground does not freeze and

manner as cabbage, except that the seed is planted where the plants are to stand, and thinned to eight inches or one foot apart in the rows,

Mustard seed is so small that a very little of it goes a long way. Simply open a very shallow furrow in the early springtime and sow the seed very thinly in this drill. When the plants appear they should be thinned, the thinnings being used as greens. The entire plant should be used before it starts to shoot the seed. Young, tender mustard plants make delicious greens, having a pungent flavor. . They can be mixed with spinach or kale.

Swiss chard is one of the newer vegetables used as greens and likewise one of the best. It develops large leaf stems and very little root. It can be planted early and the young plants pulled out in thinning can be used for greens. Later the tender, fleshy leaf stems left in the row may be pulled. off and used for greens. When finally thinned out, the plants should stand Cabbage stored in a pit during the six to eight inches apart in the row. Swiss chard thrives best on a deep, rich, mellow soil similar to that required for beets. The variety known as Lucullus is considered the best.



KEEPING SHEEP FOR MUTTON

There Are Many Areas Where Animals Could Be Kept to Advantage for Meat and Wool.

Sheep are not very generally kept on farms for supplying the home family with meat. There are many areas, especially in hilly or mountainous regions, where nearly every farm could keep a few mutton sheep to advantage. Boys' and girls' clubs in some parts of the country have done much to foster home production of mutton. Sheep naturally graze over rather



Sheep Are Useful in Pasturing Off Weeds in Standing Corn After Cultivation Stops.

This habit particularly adapts them to being kept in large numbers on lands of sparse vegetation or furnishing a variety of grasses or other plants, says the United States department of agriculture. They do better on short and fine grasses than on coarse or high feed. They will eat a good deal of brush and, if confined to small areas, will do a fair job at cleaning up land. When used in this way, or on land producing brush only, they can not be expected to prove very satisfactory in the production of good lambs or good wool.

First Thing to Be Done Is to Cut Off Four Sharp, Hard Tusks-Never Pull Them.

Soon after pigs are born, the four sharp, hard tusks, two in the upper and two in the lower jaws should be cut off. Take a pair of nippers and gums. Often these tusks cut the sow's teats, make them sore and she will not let the pigs suck. Then, also, the pigs cut themselves with those tusks, and sometimes, stick them through their tongue, cannot suck, and starve. They cause sore mouth. They are soft and easily removed. "

A pair of sharp scissors will cut them easily but under no circumstances should they be pulled out. If it is seen that a pig is getting too fat, it is evidence that it is robbing its mates. To prevent this, take a sharp knife and, cut its rooter in two or three places, deep enough to make it sore, and it will stop taking more than its
