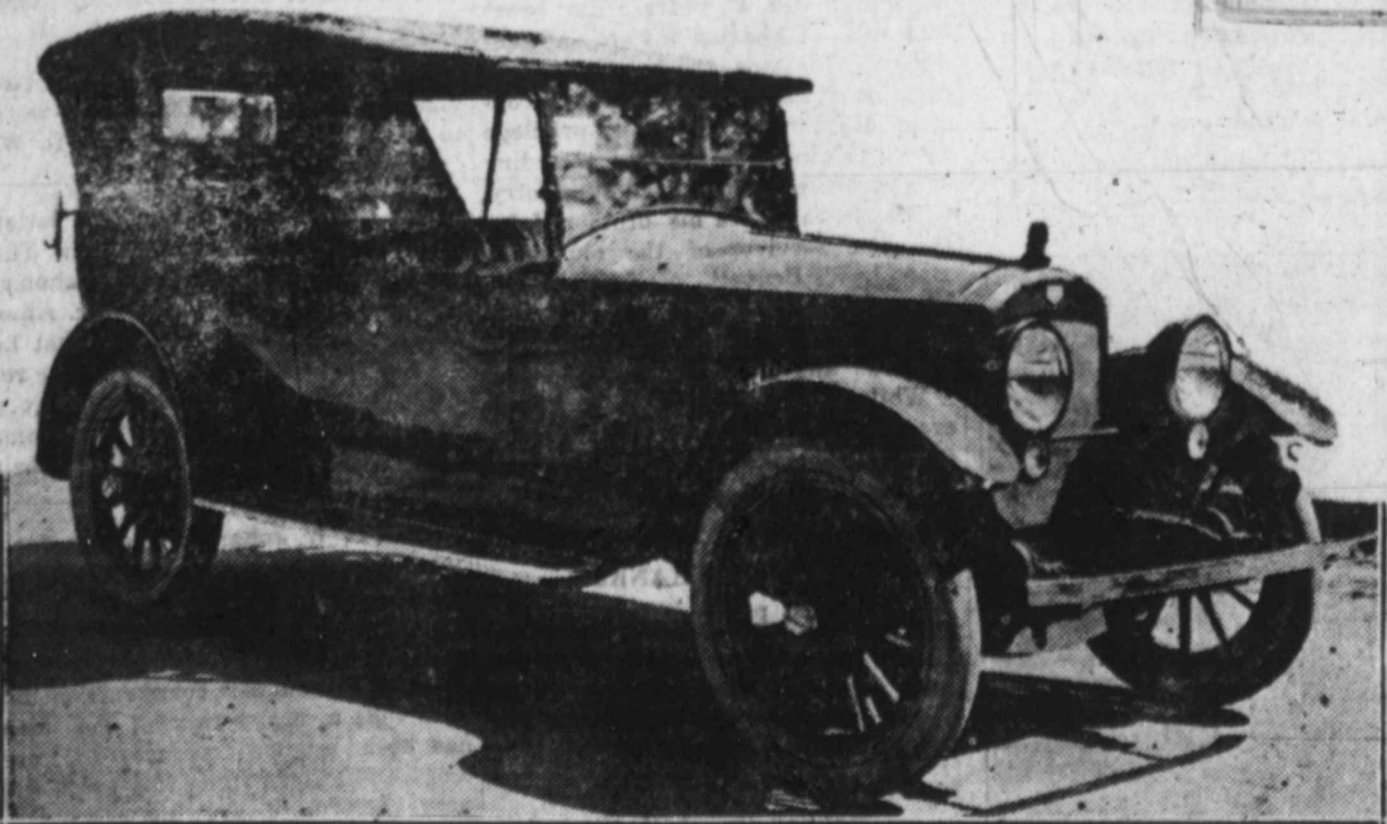

**TOWN OF OLNEY HAS A NARROW ESCAPE**

It seems to us that Olney had a narrow escape from a disastrous fire Tuesday afternoon when a tank containing ten thousand gallons of gasoline caught fire on the Katy tracks in the northeastern part of town. Jack Marcell was unloading a car of gas into a storage tank, using an electric motor and a power pump. The motor was located directly under the storage tank, and before they noticed it the pump had filled the storage tank and gasoline had run over the sides, onto the motor, and became ignited. The pump is supposed to pump 100 gallons per minute, and as Mr. Marcell was on top of the tank when it caught and had to climb down and cut the pump off, there must have been fifty or a hundred gallons of gasoline run onto the ground around the storage tank. The storage tank was open at the top, and

all of this wasted gas burned up, the flames shooting high in the air above the tank, yet the thing did not explode, and neither did the gas in the tank become ignited.

Nobody knows why or how it failed to explode and to blow Olney off the map just like Ardmore was destroyed a year or two ago in the same manner. Just luck and the poor quality of gasoline we get these days are to be thanked for our town still being on the map.—Olney Enterprise.

**THE END OF CARRANZA**

Most men must have felt the hope, on reading the first report of Carranza's death, that he had fallen in battle. Such an end, while not less tragic, would have been less shocking. Death in that manner was a fate to which Carranza had exposed himself, and one would have had to regret only the destruction of a man of good impulses and of frailties of mind which made his good impulses mischievous. But all who indulged in that hope have been robbed of it. Subsequent reports make it certain that Carranza was murdered by one whose proffer of protection he had accepted. Thus he was the victim, not of the fortunes of war, but of treachery.

Whether Herrero, in committing that crime, was acting as the instructed agent of those who overthrew Carranza's government, or whether his foul deed was a voluntary offering of loyalty to the new regime, remains to be determined. The question is of large import. In any case, the crime is another reproach to the character of the Mexican people. It somewhat heightens a doubt which most people must have long felt, the doubt whether the influences of civilization have yet sufficiently mastered the barbarous propensities of an Indian race to render the Mexican people capable of maintaining any kind of orderly self-government. In this crime many will see, and not altogether illogically, another circumstance urging the United States to take control of Mexico as a servant of civilization and humanity.

But while this crime has, in any case, added another moral scar to the character of the Mexican people, one is still left with reason for hoping that Obregon, Gonzales and those who have been acting with him are not implicated in it. Happily, such circumstance as we have had indicate that they are not. They had given Carranza the promise of protection and safe conduct from the country as an inducement to surrender, and we know of no reason to doubt that they were sincere. If they were the fact excludes the idea that Herrero was acting under either their direction or suggestion. There has been nothing to suggest that he was under their authority, or even that he was recognized as an adherent of their cause. But if the world is to be confirmed in a belief which is prompted by hope and supported by circumstances it will be necessary for those now in authority to proclaim Herrero a murderer, and hunt him out and visit the punishment a murderer incurs. The world's judgment, as to the responsibility of Obregon, Gonzales and their associates, will depend largely on the character of the efforts they make to punish the man who committed this crime. And not only will the world judge their moral responsibility by that test, but also their qualifications for establishing a government worthy of being received into the society of nations. What has lately happened in Mexico has nearly everywhere been regarded as a mark of national disgrace, but that reputation of recent events will be faded, and if it shall transpire that those now in authority use assassine as agents of the government.—Dallas News.

**ENGLISH AS SPOKEN IN ENGLAND**

Most people are aware of the fact that the English language as spoken in the United States and the same language as spoken in England have many points of dissimilarity; but many American globe-trotters even will be surprised to see how varied are the terms employed in the two countries for the common affairs of life when these variations are gathered together in brief compass, as is done in Harper's Magazine, for instance:

"If you ask a guest at your home in England whether he likes his meat rare, he asks you what you said, because he does not understand you. He calls meat underdone when it is not thoroughly cooked. If you tell him you fear the asparagus is canned, he is at a loss again, because he would have said it was tinned. To ask him to pass the powdered sugar will again set him to wondering, for he calls it icing sugar, generally though he knows that it is sometimes called caster or sifted sugar. And if you have candy on the table you may not call it so without betraying your foreign origin, for he calls candy 'sweets,' abbreviated from 'sweetmeats,' and used to designate all preserves, puddings, pies, candies and jams.

"To go further along the eccentricities of English at the dining table, most persons know, I suppose, that the beet is called the beet root, cornstarch is corn flour, corned beef (or a particular cut of it) is called 'silver-sides' of beef, and napkins are serviettes.

"If in a shop I say, 'I want a paper of pins,' the clerk says 'Thank you. A great many Americans in London now, aren't there?' 'Oh, yes' I say: 'I meant a packet of pins.' To ask for a spool of cotton is to set a clerk to staring at you, and to speak of a baby carriage is to speak of the unknown, because spools of cotton or silk are called reels, and baby carriages are known as perambulators—shortened to 'prams' in the speech of millions.

**"WOE UNTO A PEOPLE WHO HAVE NO VISION"**

Rev. George W. Truett is one of the noted pulpit divines of America. He is a native Texan, a citizen of Dallas. In the presence of 10,000 enthused Americans, in the shadows of the capitol of the nation, on a recent Sunday afternoon, Dr. Truett delivered an inspirational address before the Southern Baptist convention, an address that is being accorded a place among the notable speeches of modern times and which is attracting the attention of the people of the United States regardless of political creed. This eloquent Texan spoke from the east entrance of the capitol. These sparks of truth are taken from his message:

Woe unto a people who have no vision.

Democracies not only have their trials, but their obligations. God does not raise a nation to go strutting and to live in selfishness.

The stricken man in the White House still pleads to his people and for his people.

It is high time to hark back to the schools and place them on worthy and enduring foundations.

The supreme contribution from America up to this time to world civilization is religious liberty.

The faith and the hope of the world today rest in a league of nations that will forever banish wars.

America can't isolate herself from the rest of the world and wrap its cloak about itself, saying it will live and die alone.

The educational center has been transferred to the New World and should be employed as a means of fortifying the world with the idealism of Jesus Christ.

The world is to abound in one great family, and the nation that asks the question of the profiteer and the slacker, "Am I my brother's keeper?" such a nation is marked for disaster and death.

When America entered the war she said that there were yet some things worth dying for; the sanctity of women, the preservation of children and the integrity of a man's country, freedom and honor.

The church is a pure democracy and must never be associated with the state, but there comes a call to Baptists, as well as to others, to be citizens of the right kind, to be alert, to meet every encroachment upon their liberty, whether it be civil or religious.

If the league of nations comes not to day, it will tomorrow as sure as God is upon His throne, and standing in the shadow of the senate chamber, I declare that the moral forces of the country, without regard to political party, regard the delay a national and world-wide tragedy.

Just as the religious and moral forces of the country did not rest until they had banished booze and the saloon, the rendezvous of politicians, which have passed forever in America, the moral forces of the country will not be still until they get a

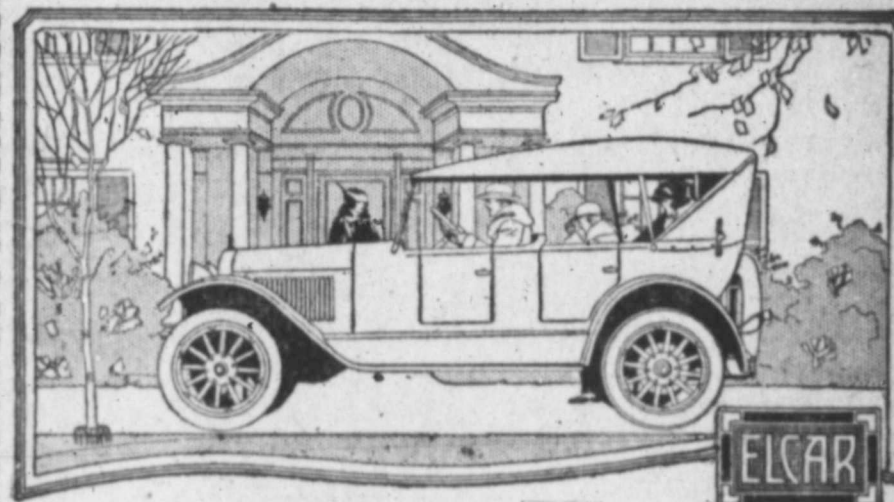

**THOS. G. BINKLEY ANNOUNCES FOR REPRESENTATIVE**

Graham, Texas, May 31, 1920.  
To the Voters of Jack and Young Counties.

In this issue the voters of Jack and Young counties will find my announcement as a candidate for Representative 99th District, composed of Jack and Young counties. I realize that this position is one of little remuneration, but I feel that it is a place of much importance and one that should be filled by the most capable man offering to serve the people in that capacity.

Briefly I will state that I am a native Texan and have resided in this District for the past five years, during which time I have engaged in the practice of law at Graham, Texas. I was admitted to the bar in 1906 and have since successfully engaged in the active practice of law. I am married and live with my wife and two little Binkletys. My wife has paid her poll tax and promised to vote for us and predicts my election which affords me much encouragement for when a man's wife believes in him and works with him, the battle is over half won.

If the good people of this district select me as their Representative I promise to represent and protect their interests in an honest and conscientious manner. I will govern myself as my conscience dictates, will do my own voting and my own thinking and will stand for what I think is right and will not hesitate to support measures of merit nor will I fail to actively fight for the defeat of measures detrimental to the interests of my constituents and the State at large. We have many laws now, too many, and some should be repealed while others should be amended or repealed.

The suspended sentence law has been abused more than any law in Texas and more criminals are now at large under same than are confined in prison. In some instances this law has a beneficial effect; but I favor amending same so as to apply only to young men in their minority. If such amendment should fail I would advocate the repeal of this law because I do not believe that we should

allow a law to stand for the protection of hardened criminals who come into this State and migrate from county to county and when, through efforts of our efficient peace officers, such criminals are apprehended and conviction is sought they make application for suspended sentence, make the required oath, and are released on suspended sentence and are released to continue in their flagrant violations of the law until again apprehended with same results.

Our State Highway Law as it now stands is the greatest farce and infringement on the people known for years. This Highway Commission occupies a major portion of one floor in the capitol building, the expense is enormous and the people receive nothing in return. A County cannot receive the benefits provided under the terms of the law for, when a county has complied with the requirements of the law and made application for the funds to which they are entitled, they are advised that the Commission has no available funds. Where is this money going? Whether are we drifting? I favor an amendment to this law giving each County its own funds and allowing a small per cent for maintenance of the Commission with a decided reduction of clerical force of the Commission and also curtailment of its powers, thereby vesting in each county control of its funds. If this cannot be reasonably amended, I advocate the repeal of same. In this connection I wish to impress that I am heartily in favor of good roads and favor any movement within reason for the betterment of our public roads, but I cannot endorse such wanton extravagance as is practiced under our celebrated Highway law.

I favor a change in our school laws whereby funds will be available to pay the salaries of teachers in the rural schools when due. These teachers are poorly paid and I consider it unjust for them to either be forced to shave their vouchers or wait several months for their meager salary.

Should the Federal census justify, I will introduce bill creating new Representative District, thereby giving Jack and Young County each a Representative.

I also favor and will introduce bill

creating new Judicial District to be composed of Young and adjoining counties, thus segregating them from Wichita County and giving to Wichita the 99th Judicial District Court thereby allowing two courts for that county.

The divorce evil in this State is alarming and I favor drastic legislation to curb this evil. This may sound strange coming from a lawyer, but he should, better than any one, see and realize the conditions and stand for the protection of society and the good of our future citizenship.

In conclusion will state that I could touch on many needed changes, but do not wish my announcement too voluminous, and will conclude by stating that I stand ready to express myself on any question. I am not a fence rider, and will ever stand ready to cast my vote on any question in a way that I consider to the best interest of the people.

Plaintiffs further allege that on September 5, 1883, Albert Jones conveyed the above mentioned 160 acres Albert Jones survey to J. C. Jones and Company, by deed recorded in Vol. 16, at page 114, Deed Records, Young County, Texas; that in said deed the vendors lien was retained to secure a note for \$800 due September 16, 1884; that said note has long since been paid but not released of record; Plaintiffs further allege that on July 10, 1890, Josie F. Hutchinson by deed recorded in Vol. 21 at page 257, Deed Records, Young County, Texas, conveyed to W. J. Carson and T. D. Lewis the aforesaid Albert Jones 160 acre survey; that in said deed the vendors lien was retained to secure a note for \$1070 of even date with said deed due

at 12 months that said note is fully described in said deed; that Josie F. Hutchinson endorsed same to W. F. Campbell to whom same was paid and she has no further interest in said land; Plaintiffs further allege that on Oct. 12, 1892, W. J. Carson et al. executed to E. S. Graham a certain option recorded in Vol. 22, at page 533, Deed Records, Young County, Texas, to sell the above lands belonging to R. W. Davis said option expiring June 1, 1893; that no sale was ever made under said option but same has never been released of record and constitutes a cloud upon Plaintiff R. W. Plaintiffs further allege that John James et ux. executed to E. S. Graham on September 13, 1892, a certain option to sell a portion of the above lands belonging to R. W. itions and all matters to which they relate; Plaintiffs further allege that if they are mistaken in the allegations that each and all of the above notes have long since been paid and said options expired, then they say that same have never been renewed or extended of record as required by law, and they plead the statutes of 1, 4 and 10 years in such cases provided by law in bar of said notes, liens and options as aforesaid. And Plaintiffs further plead the 5 and 10 years statutes of limitations against said unlawful entry by Defendants on said land and against any cause of actions in Defendants either for said lands or to assert any character of lien or option thereon.
