HOW THE SUPREME COURT HAS DEALT WITH PROHIBITION

Four probibition decisions by the Supreme Court are to be noted. On December 15 it upheld the full validity of the war prohibition act. On January 5 it made a like ruling as to the section of the Volstead act defining intoxicating liquor as that containing more than one-half of 1 per cent of alcohol. On June 1 it sustained the efficacy of the constitutional prohibitory amendment, dismissing the liquor plea that ratification was incomplete because certain states had laws permitting or requiring a referendum in such cases. This foreshadowed the conclusive decrees of June 7, wherein every contention raised against the amendment and against its enforcement was swept aside. Stripped of technicalities, the sential findings were to the following effect:

The constitutional prohibition amendment was proposed by congress according to the proper forms, was ratified by the requisite number of states in the constitutional manner, and is in every respect effective. It "has become a part of the constitu-



The appearance of bubonic plague long the Gulf coast has directed our attention to the rat evil again. An examination of rats in different coast cities shows that about 20 per cent are affected with the plague. Efforts are being made to kill the rats. The extermination should not be left to the coast cities alone. We may not be in as much danger of the plague as the coast cities, nevertheless we are in danger and should begin to fight against them.

Aside from the danger of spreadng disease the rat is one of the worst pests with which the farmers have to contend. For ages human ingenuity has been taxed to suppress them, but in spite of innumerable devices in the way of traps, poisons, etc., the rat has increased in numbers and destructive-

The Progressive Farmer has the following to say on combatting the

On Southern farms the greatest damage from rats probably results from the attacks of these pests on the corn stored in the crib, although during a shortage in the crib, barn or house they migrate to the fields and continue their attacks on either the growing grain or that which has been in the shock for a considerable length

Experiments have shown that a full-grown rat will on an average consume about eight-tenths of a ushel of grain in a year. With corn at \$2 per bushel, every full-grown rat is costing the farmer \$1.60 per year for his upkeep. However, the less from rats is by no means confined to what they eat. They destroy fully as much as they consume. In addition to the damage they do, in esting and destroying food and feed upplies, the destruction of other farm property and the spread of certain diseases, make their extermination of still more vital importance.

While poisons, traps, etc., have been successfully used in securing temporary relief from the destructive attacks of this pest, so long as an abundant and unprotected food supply and shelter is furnished but little can be done toward their permanent suppression. "An abundance of food means many young in a litter and many litters in a year; a restricted supply means fewer young and fewer litters.' It, therefore, follows that by the more extended use of rat-proof cribs, barns, etc., and the better protection of food supplies stored in buildings that are not rat-proof offer the best means of lessening the reproduction of these pests and in so doing strikes at the very root of the rat evil. Of course, these preventative measures must be supplemented by the use of traps, poisons, etc., to

There is also much to be accomplished by co-operation and organization in the work of rat destruction. While it is quite important that the individual farmer actively codbat this pest, organized efforts by an entire community repeated with reasonable frequency will be found still more effective. Temporary relief follows the extermination of the rats on the farm premises, but a new rat population will soon be recruited from nearby



In its insistence upon the maintenance of order for protection of American Citizens within its borders a great service will be rendered the Mexican people themselves, for a continuation of present conditions means disaster to their interest and patriotic aspirations.

The Democratic platform is silent on what they will do in case of election in regard to the request of President Wilson for acceptance of the Armenian mandate-silent as to whether they will send 59,000 men to the Balkans and whether they will spend \$276,000,000 the first year and \$756,000,000 there in five years. (This is the estimate of the Hubbard commission, organized by authority of President Wilson.) The Republican platform says in part-"We commend the Republican Senate for refusing the President's request to empower him to accept the Mandate for Armenia. The acceptance of such a mandate would throw the United States into the very maelstrom of European quarrels. We deeply sympathize with the people of Armenia and stand ready to help them in proper ways, but the Republican party will oppose now and hereafter the acceptance of a mandate for any country in Europe or Asia." What does the silence of Democratic platform mean? How does Governor Cox stand on this? You may be able to find out by November, but you cannot by Primary Day. Senator Harding says the Republican platform suits him. The Republican platform is for America first.

There are many more great points of issue in the two platforms, and the two records of the respective parties. These will have to be thought of and studied and the attitude of the respective condidates found out. But these are critical times. Let every American be on guard against the pernicious tendencies of the day. Every voter should be free to vote as he sees fit.
