HELP REDUCE ILLITERACY IN TEXAS

In less than two months the people of Texas will have an opportunity to vote on an amendment of far reaching importance to the future welfare of the citizenship. This amendment will give to all school districts the same local option in the support of local schools as is now extended to large towns and cities.

We are giving below the proposed amendment and hope all interested in public education will study it and be able to vote for it in November:

"Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

"Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3).

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free textbooks for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general and special laws without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the

amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law.

CANAL BEGINS TO PAY

Probably not many citizens have taken the trouble to ascertain whether the Panama canal has been profitable to its builder, the United States government, and perhaps even fewer have cared one way or the other, being satisfied with the value of the canal as a promoter of world commerce, regardless of its financial return.

The facts are, though, that the canal, heretofore showing an annual deficit, has finally begun to pay. For the fiscal year ending June 30 last it showed a surplus of earnings over expenses of \$2,150,000, with total income of more than \$8,000,000 on the handling of 2478 vessels of commerce, besides numerous naval units which passed from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

These figures constitute new records for the great waterway. The number of vessels utilizing the canal was the largest since its opening, the income was larger in its gross total, and the net earnings was a totally new thing. The accumulated deficit in operative costs will require several years to wipe out, being now about \$4,000,000, but with increases in revenue on the basis of the last fiscal year, it will not be long until the Panama canal will begin to pay interest on its original cost. It has already more than paid for itself in the opportunity accorded for the development of American world commerce, and that, combined with the provision of naval mobility, was, after all, the reason for its creation.

THE NEW FREIGHT RATES

Railroad officials, in issuing statements showing just what the increase in freight rates will amount to on various articles of consumption, are rendering the public a service.

They are giving the people information which should put them on their guard against profiteers who may try to hold them up for much higher prices than warranted on the plea that the higher freight rates have made the advance necessary.

In reality, the increase in freight rates affects the single commodity only slightly, in most instances, only a few cents. According to some illustrations given by railroad officials, extra freight charge in a pair of shoes should not in any case be over 1 2-3 cents. The advance in freight charges should not be over 3 cents on a suit of clothes.

In the aggregate, the advance on all articles bought will foot up to a neat little sum for each family, but it should not greatly overburden the average family if the freight advance is not pyramided by greedy dealers and added to the cost of the goods as profits.

K. Graham of Young County, Texas.

A hearing on the application of the said Texas Company will be held by the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, at the office of the Board, in Austin, Texas, on Monday, October 4th, A. Such hearing will be continued from time to time, and from place to place, if necessary, until such determination has been made relative to said application as the said Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.

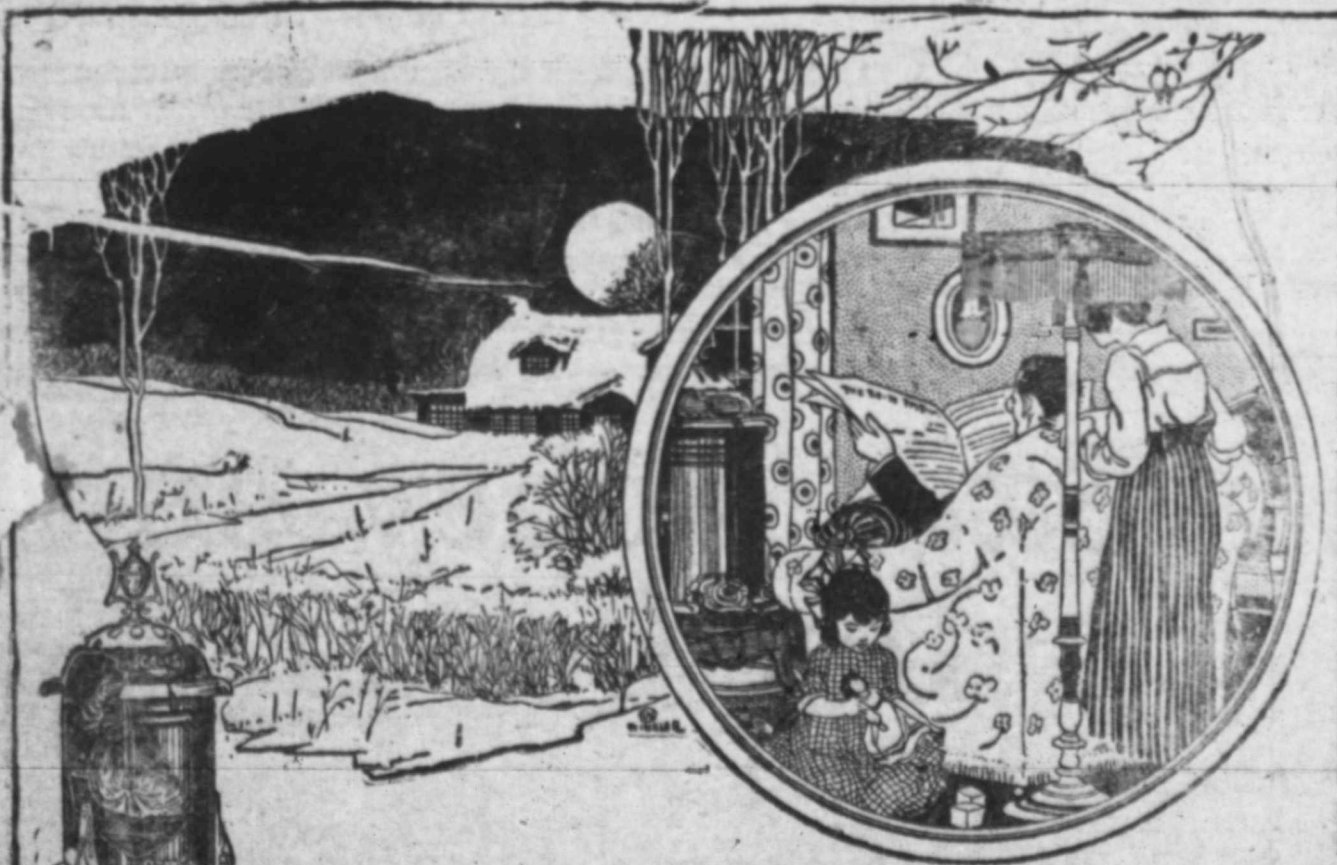

FEED CHILDREN PROPER RATION

Austin, Sept. 14.—Most children of today do not get enough variety of food, do not take enough time to eat their meals, and do not get enough sleep. This is the statement made by Miss Pearl N. Hyer, R. N., public health nurse of the Texas Public Health Association.

In her physical examinations in the public schools Miss Hyer has discovered that these three things are responsible for fifty per cent of Texas children being under weight. To help remedy this defect among the children the Texas Public Health Association recently sent an article by the public health nurse to a number of Texas mothers.

“Children should eat a variety of food,” said Miss Hyer, “not so much at one meal, but it must be seen to that the meals of the day are balanced. Three things, and not over four, at a meal are all that are necessary.

“The following foods give the elements of nourishment necessary for almost any age, work or climate. I advise that all mothers should see that their children eat daily: (1) Cereal, whole grain well cooked; (2) eggs, once a day when no meat is used; (3) milk, one pint to one quart; (4) potatoes and leafy vegetables such as spinach, onions and lettuce; (5) fruit; (6) meat, not more than once a day, avoid fried meat; and (7) bread and butter with every meal, whole wheat is best.”

“Diet for children should be up-building,” declared the nurse, “and should give reserve strength and energy. Any kind of food which will not do this is not worth eating, regardless of whether it tastes good or not. Beware of too much candy. It is hard on the teeth and not good for the system. Children crave sweets when they are not eating right—there is a lack of some element of nourishment. If they must have sweets, they are best eaten at the end of a meal, not between meals. Sweet fruits like raisins, figs, and dates are good; honey is an excellent sweet.”



A message from Mars is coming to the State Fair of Texas, dates of which are October 9 to 24, at Dallas. The message from Mars is the theme of an elaborate scenic extravaganza, taking the form of a musical revue, staged by the noted French producer, Emil de Recat, and known as De Recat's "Smiles of 1920."



De Recat and his scenic artists are already on the grounds at Dallas preparing for the extravaganza. An afternoon and night performance will begin each day at the State Fair of Texas. This will be the first time that the production has been shown to the public, the French producer choosing the State Fair of Texas' gigantic coliseum to offer his elaborate Revue to the theatre world.

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1921 MODELS ARE COMING TO STATE FAIR OF TEXAS

Dallas, Texas.—State Fair of Texas officials have never doubted that the 1920 automobile exhibit at the 1920 fair would exceed previous exhibits, at these grounds, but it has come seriously to the attention of officials now preparing for the exposition that the huge automobile building, despite

Seven scholarships for boys and girls of the Texas clubs are offered this year by the State Fair of Texas, which opens October 9 and continues until October 24.

Consul Roberto Garcia, representing the Mexican government in Dallas, is actively engaged just now in aiding preparations at the State Fair of Texas Coliseum for arrival of the mass of exhibits from Mexico which this year make up the great Mexican National Exhibit, foremost feature of the exposition, October 9 to 24.

GREAT MEXICAN BAND COMING TO STATE FAIR

Don't fail, when you attend the State Fair of Texas, which of course you are going to, to hear that Estado Mayor Band from Mexico City, one of the most famous musical organizations in the world. It consists of 100 pieces and is sent to the State Fair of Texas by the Mexican government.

MEXICAN EXHIBIT LEAVES FOR TEXAS

The big Mexican National Exhibit, feature of this year's State Fair of Texas, will be en route to Dallas by September 12, reaching the State Fair grounds about September 17. This information was contained in a telegram just received from Luis



Lupian, secretary of General J. B. Trevina of the department of Commerce and Industry at Mexico City by the State Fair management. Mr. Lupian stated also that the official coterie of Mexican ministers and high officials, probably ten in number, will accompany the exhibit to Dallas at that time.

At a later date between 300 and 600 Mexican business men will arrive in Dallas, to be guests of the State Fair of Texas from October 9 to 24.

DUROC ROUND-UP TO BE HELD IN DALLAS

Dallas, Texas.—State Fair of Texas officials announce that Dallas and the state fair grounds have been chosen as the scene of the 1920 Southwest National round-up of Duroc-Jersey futu-



ry pigs, given annually under the auspices of the National Duroc-Jersey association, and this year affiliated with the Texas Duroc Breeders' association and the State Fair management.

The round-up is a competitive affair and each year attracts hundreds of breeders from throughout the United States. This year a total of \$2,400 in prizes has been guaranteed.

SHEEP EXHIBITS WILL BE LARGE THIS YEAR

Dallas, Texas.—A greater interest is being manifested in the sheep division of the State Fair of Texas this year at this time than during any previous year, according to announcement just made by J. M. Jones of the Texas A & M. college, who is superintendent of that division. Not only have the premium classifications in this division been increased, states Mr. Jones, but in addition a modern, commodious sheep barn has been completed, which will be ready for occupancy at the opening of the fair. Mr. Jones has called attention of sheep men to the fact that Rule 14 in the sheep and goat division reads this year as follows:

"Flock—A flock shall consist of one ram any age; one ewe two years old or over; one yearling ewe, and one ewe lamb."

Demand for space at the State Fair of Texas grounds this season is unprecedented, according to Secretary Stratton and President Keist. Practically all of the space has been sold, although some remains which may be made available to late applicants. This, however, is going fast. The State Fair officials state that never before in the history of their experience with the State Fair of Texas has there been such a host of applications for reservations of ground space, booths and exhibits.

MEXICAN OFFICIALS COMING TO STATE FAIR

Dallas, Texas.—A telegram received by Secretary W. H. Stratton of the State Fair of Texas from the offices of General J. B. Trevina, at Mexico City, secretary of the departments of industry, commerce and labor, states that ten officials of the Mexican government will accompany the mammoth Mexican National exhibit to the State Fair of Texas this year. It is estimated that between 300 and 600 business men of Mexico will attend the State Fair of Texas.
