NATURE IN A RAGE

Violence of Typhoon Is Almost Beyond Belief.

Writer Vividly Describes Scene When Great Windstorm Wrought Havoc in Harbor of Hong Kong-Boats Piled on Shore.

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"I had been anxious to see a typhoon," says Edwin Tarrisse, who has spent some years in the East, "and I had my wish gratified in Hong Kong more than once. The strength of the wind at such times is greater than one would have thought possible. It whirls ships helplessly adrift from the firmest moorings and with sudden blast takes away the corners of houses and sends projecting verandas flying across the street.

"During the night of one gale the residents for the most part shut thempelves closely in their houses, carefully securing their doors and windows, and so remained with constant apprehension and dread lest the dwelling should be swept away and themselves be entombed in the ruins.

"Once, while the storm was at its worst, I ventured down to the Praya to see the crowd of Chinese boats that had been blown inshore and piled up in a mass of wreckage just below the city. The sky was of dark leaden color, and the wind caught up the crested waves and sent them in long, white streaks of vapor across the scene, through which the dismantled ships were dimly descried drifting from their moorings.

"The beavy, stone-faced wall of the Praya had given way, and the great granite blocks had been washed in upon the road. Half-blinded by the waves as they leaped over the road and dashed in angry foam against the houses, and buffeted by the wind, I made slow headway to the east end of the settlement, where a number of foreigners were attempting to rescue

two women from a small Chinese boat. "We had to cling to the lamp posts and stanchions and seek shelter against the doorways and walls. Advantage was taken of a slight lull in the storm to fire off rockets, but these were driven back like feathers against the houses. Then, long lifeboats were dragged to the pier, but the first was broken and disabled the moment it touched the water, while the second met a like fate and its gallant crew

were pitched out into the sea. "In short, every effort proved abortive, and as darkness set in the unsappy women and their boat were refuctantly abandoned to their fate.

"Next morning, the whole length of the Praya presented a scene of wreckage and desolation. Many of the Chinese, notwithstanding their shrewdness in predicting storms, had been taken quite unawares and hence the fearful sacrifice of life and the loss of property which ensued."

Where Old Jewelry Goes.

The United States assay office at New York has recently received much gold and silver in queer articles for conversion to bullion or cein.

The charges for converting gold and silver are less than those made by any private company, which circumstance brings to the assay office dealers in precious metals, pawnbrokers, jewelers, gold and silver producers and the banks. It is no unusual sight to see a dealer bring in a lot of jewelry made up of a gold mesh bag, brooches, scarf pins and rings. This is weighed in bulk and a receipt given which includes no statement of value. All the articles are melted as a whole, and the owner given the privilege of receiving in payment gold or silver bul-

lion or cash. Some time ago the executrix of an estate sent a silver chandeller of enormous proportions, but hopelessly out of style. It was reported to have cost \$20,000 fifty years ago. Melted it brought about \$2,700.

Whales Not Deep Divers.

Although it is a common belief among sallors that whales, when they "sound," descend to enormous depths in the ocean, and, although it has been estimated that the larger whales commonly dive to a depth of almost twothirds of a mile, yet a member of an antarctic expedition challenges these statements and avers that about 300 feet is the maximum depth to which a whale can dive, says the Sun and New York Herald. He bases his statement partly on the fact that the fish on which they feed and to obtain which they are accustomed to sound, dwell near the surface, and partly on the fact that at the depth of 1,000 yards. or more the pressure is so great that they could not withstand it, and that their muscular strength is not sufficient to propel them into the regions where it prevails. .

Advises Walking on Tiptoe.

Walking on tiptoe a few minutes daily is the form of exercise prescribed by Dr. Gautiez, a French physician. It brings into action little used muscles of back and abdomen as well as those of calf and thigh, stiffens the spinal column and neck, and promotes chest breathing in place of abdominal breathing common from constant walking on the heels. It gives the benefit of gymnastic runping without the useless heart fatigue and loss of breath. It is pronounced the most convenient form of physical culture, and its efficacy is easily tested. GOT NO CREDIT FOR SONG

How Thomas A'Beckett Wrete a Version of "Hail Columbia" and Another Man Claimed It.

There are three patriotic songs known as "Columbia," and there is not always as much care in distinguishing them as there should be, the Philadelphia Record remarks.

In "Songs That Every Child Should Know" Dolores Bacon has included "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," which she credits to Dr. Timothy Dwight. That eminent man, so closely identified with the history of Yale. wrote another "Columbia."

"Columbia, Columbia, te glory arise, The queen of the world and the child of the skies."

Both "Hail Columbia" and "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean" are Philadelphia products, though the tune of the former, known before Joseph Hopkinson set the words to it as "The President's March." has a somewhat obscure and disputed origin. Both of these songs were born on the stage: they were written for the benefit of actors. An actor named Fox appealed to Hopkinson to write some verses that he could sing to "The President's March," and the result was "Hall Columbia," produced in 1798.

Thomas A'Beckett, whose son of the same name died last year, wrote to Admiral Preble an account of his compo-

"In the fall of the year 1843, being then engaged as an actor at the Chestnut street theater in Philadelphia, I was waited upon by D. T. Shaw (then singing at the Chinese museum) with the request that I would write him a song for his benefit night. He produced some patriotic lines and asked my opinion of them. I found them ungrammatical, and so deficient in measure as to be totally unfit to be adapted to music. We adjourned to the house of a friend (R. Hartford) and I then wrote the two first verses in pencil, and at Miss Hartford's piano I composed the melody. On reaching my home I added the third verse, wrote the symphonies and arrangements and made a fair copy in ink and gave it to Mr. Shaw, requesting him not to give or sell a copy."

Shaw, however, procured its publication by Willig of Philadelphia as a song "written, composed and sung by David T. Shaw, and arranged by T. A'Beckett, Esq." A'Beckett asserted his rights and obtained their admission, but "Columbia the Gem of the Ocean" has often been published as Shaw's work.

Another Crime Charged to Rat. The rat, already perhaps the most unpopular of all living creatures, earns fresh odium from the discovery that it may be responsible for the spread of cancer. Of the rats brought from a certain sugar refinery to the ober 24, Closing Day. laboratory of Professor Fibiger, of Copenhagen, many were found to have cancer of the stomach, and investigation has tended to show that this resulted from eating the cockroaches with which the refinery is infested. A nematode worm was discovered as a parasite of the cockreaches, the female being one and one-half to two inches long and one-two-hundred and fiftieth inch in diameter, while the male is only half as large. A number of rats fed on these cockroaches and on the eggs of the parasite developed inflammations and cancer of the stomach. Of rats fed on the eggs, 116 which developed gastric affections included 14 that died in 30 to 40 days without developing cancer, and 54 that eventually died from quite typical cancer of the stomach. The tumors all continued to increase in siee as long as life lasted.

Not Dobbin.

The school building consists of three units, one powered with a gasoline motor; in short a building section on a motor truck. With this powered unit go two trailers and the three rolled into position and joined together make the commodious and convenient class room.

Gravity Labeler Useful. The gravity labeler makes a wide departure from all previous belt machines as one of extreme simplicity, says the Scientific American. Starting from a receiving shelf, the cans roll down an inclined track, passing first over an open tray of adhesive and then over the label stack, picking up a label in their progress. 

NO AID FOR NOSE

Science Unable to Improve Hu-, man Sense of Smell

Really, in That Field, the Leading Thinkers of the World Are Completely Baffled-Anyway, Would Knowledge Be Desirable?

some time ago there was held in England a "Wonders of Science Exion" which served to reveal many to to the public unfamiliar with ork done with the microscope, microphone and the micrograph.

The microphone magnifies sound as the microscope does things seen. The micrograph is the instrument used by the scientist in taking pictures of things shown by the microscope. More people are familiar, to some extent, with the microscope than with the microphone. They know it is possible to hear a fly walk or a caterpillar crawl.

Many other wonders of science were shown at Surbiton, but neither there nor anywhere else has science demonstrated its ability to help the sense of smell. It can do marvels for sight, hearing and touch, but not for the humble and useful nose. In that field the accomplishments of science have

Let a man stand two miles, say, to windward of the point where a herd of caribou will cross an open plain over which a fresh breeze is sweeping and it must be apparent that only an infinitely minute particle of whatever matter may be given off from his body or clothing can possibly reach the nostrils of any one deer in the herd. They would be warned of the presence of a wolf in the same way.

Yet science is utterly unable to detect anything which the olfactory nerve of the deer senses and identifies. It cannot see with a microscope anything in the air which came from the man. It cannot find any such substance with a chemical test of any smell, it is entirely incapable of matching it. Here is another realm for science to invade and subdue; but sirable? RAYLESS GOLDENROD POISONOUS TO LIVE STOCK

Washington, Oct. 4 .- Following investigations of a live stock ailment commonly known as "akali disease" or "milk sickness," the United States Department of Agriculture has found the rayless goldenrod to be the probable cause. Experimental work with this plant produced symptoms corresponding to those characteristic of this disease. Investigations by the department included regions in New Mexico, Texas, and Arizona where "akali disease" has caused many fatalities among domestic animals. The rayless goldenrod is known to botaffists as isocoma wrightii; in Arizona cattlemen sometimes call it

"jimmy weed." Dr. C. C. Marsh, poisonous plants specialist for theBureau of Animai Industry, has found the plant to be poisonous to cattle, sheep and horses. Among cattle, typical symptoms are drowsiness and weakness. If the animals become excited or attempt to travel far their motions become jerky and their legs seem to give way. Some are unable to get up after falling. The fattest cattle are usually the ones first affected. Considerable numbers of work horses and stock horses have died in the regions menioned from influences now attriputed to the rayless goldenrod. Horses frequently died in from one to three "foxing," and a crafty man is "an days after showing symptoms of old fox," but why a certain dance poison. 

FASHION RUN MAD

Women's Costumes in 1817 Decidedly Startling.

Eastern Journal Expresses Some Apprehension Whether There is to Be a Return to the Frankly Revealing Style of Dress.

The history of clothing, it is said, the all other histories, has a tendento repetition, and if this be the case we can look forward to some startling patterns. Can it be that women will again dress as in the days immediately following the terror of

To quote Modes and Manners of

the Nineteenth Century: "The train was quite done away with, cut round at the bottom, leaving the feet free, in 1808, and only reaching to the ankles in 1810. The dress, as it were, moved upward. The ethereal nymphs and goddesses had disappeared, giving place to grotesquely clothed figures, more like manikins than human beings. This tasteless style of costume reached its height in Vienna in 1817, when the dress, now entirely without bodice, fell half way down the legs only, being cut out at the bottom and allowing a good length of lace drawer to be seen be-

fore it ended in an embroidered boot." In those days, the chronicler tells the "English" was soon more correctly designated the "naked" fashion. Not only did corsets and petticoats disappear but additional garments were also discarded—the lady of society wore rings on her bare feet, while silk 'tights and transparent chemise composed the remainder of her costume.

The more fashionable women strove as to which of them should put on the least clothing. No one spoke of any one as "well dressed" but as "well undressed," and it became an amusement in society to weigh a woman's garments; her whole clothing, including shoes and ernaments, was not allowed in 1800 to weight over eight ounces. Mme. Hamelin, the beautiful wife of a rich Swiss banker, went the length of walking in the garden of the Tuileries clad only in a gauze veil until the obtrusive behavior of the public obliged her to return home.

In 1801 a woman in Hanover laid a wager that she would walk through the streets dressed only in a chemise and a neckerchief without exciting any particular attention-and she won

her bet easily. becoming, the fashion was too new and surprising not to excite lively criticism. In 1794 a Berlin critic, writing of the actress Burabius, aceused her of returning to the habits of the uncivilized world, of offending morality and decency and, indeed, of swakening disgust-and this merely because she ventured to appear of the stage with bare arms-and the following years the "unclothed" style became the general fashion.-New York Times.

Precious Relic for Reima,

The Reims treasure has been enriched by a precious jewel of the ninth, or maybe the eighth century, a generous gift of the Empress Eugenie, says Le Moniteur de la Bijouterie in an article in the Jeweier's Circular.

The matter in question is the reliquary of Charlemagne, a round capsule of gold encircled with precious stones, in the middle of which, made out of two hollowed-out sapphires, a piece of the true cross is enclosed.

It was found on the neck of the great emperor and the clergy of Alxla-Chapelle (where Charlemagne died and was buried in 814) gave it in 1804 to Napoleon I. Napoleon III preserved this magic talisman, which assured, he said, the empire to its holder, in his bed-chamber at the Tuileries, at the head of his bed.

LAND OF THE HOMESTEADERS

Warmest Hospitality the Unvarying Custom-How "Hell-Buster" Acguired His Peculiar Nickname,

But despite the struggle which mest of the homesteaders were having against poverty and other unyielding factors of frontier life, we met everywhere with warm hospitality. The custom of the country seems to be to take in the stranger and share roof and meal with him. We often had difficulty inducing families to take payment from us even those families who were in the bardest straits, Viola E. Paradise writes in "Trailing Statistics on an American Frontier" in Scribner's. Sometimes the mention of pay was an insult. Again and again we were invited to "spend the night," and though we were usually quite comfortable sleeping out of doors on the ground, we often accepted invitations to sleep in. There were times when a bed could hardly be resisted, and when the chance to get a good wash was tempting beyond refusal. And frequently invitations' were so proffered as to be hard to refuse. "What are you afraid of?" asked the father of a family of five persons who lived in one room, partitioned by a scant curtain. (Few houses have more than three rooms, and most of them consist of only one or two rooms. And the size of the family is usually in inverse ratio to the size of the dwelling). "Nothing here'll hurt you, unless it might be a bed bug, and they don't bite hard this time of the year. And you aren't afraid of a little bed bug, are you?" The agent who had protested that she could be quite comfortable in the hay stack felt challenged to show her lack of fear and slept comfortably with the mother and baby while the father and the boys occupied the floor on the other side of the curtain.

Another night three of us stayed at "Hell Buster's" ranch. His real name we never could learn. The nickname he had earned at proncho busting on an occasion when a wild "brone" had thrown him and stepped on his face. He had "been given up for gone," when he surprised the onlookers by regaining consciousness suddenly, making at once for the "brone" and succeeding in subduing the animal. New Phosphate Industry. The electric furnaces of a southern plant have been diverted from wartime products to the manufacture of phosphoric acid and potash, such materials as synthetic pig iron, ferromanganese and ferro silicon being found ne longer profitable. In the new industry, as described by the Iron Age, phosphoric rock is smelted in the electric furnace, the phosphorus being driven off as phosphoric oxide suspended in the gases. Collection of the gases and treatment by electrical precipitation yields the phosphorus as a fine powder, which on further treatment and concentration becomes a superior product, free from the impurities usual when sulphuric acid is the disintegrating agent. American shales are similarly treated for the production of petash, the potassium oxides being formed in the gases, and precipitated and collected.
