YOUNG COUNTY OIL FIELD ENLARGING; SEVERAL NEW LOCATIONS THIS WEEK

A visit to the Young county oil fields will prove interesting to any one whether he has the oil fever or not. The field is enlarging and drilling activities increasing at such a rapid rate that even the local oil men who are away from the fields for a few days express surprise on returning to find the new derricks under construction and to learn of the new locations.

Oil men from all sections of the county are here looking after their interests. Many of them acquired leases several months ago when oil was first found in the county and they are here now planning to develop holdings. In addition to the large number of men coming here daily many inquiries are being received asking about the different phases of the oil situation. E. C. Stovall is in receipt of a letter from England making inquiry about acreage in the South Bend field.

Bunger District to Be Developed
This week marks a new era in what has long been considered one of the most favorable localities in Young county for oil as material is being hauled on the ground to begin a well on the Askew property near Bungler, the location of which will be on the north part of the John Whittenburg Survey, eight miles south of Graham.

The well is to be a deep test and is being drilled by C. S. Thomas of Los Angeles, who has long been connected with the Union Oil Company of California, one of the most successful producers of oil in that State.

Mr. Harry Becker is in charge of operations and has a full equipment of machinery, casing, etc., to put the well down at once and has demonstrated his operating ability in this section by the well recently drilled on the Whittenburg land in northern Stephens county.

The contract calls for the well to be drilled 3800 feet or through the Stephens county line of the Smithwick shale formation unless a commercially productive well is obtained at a lesser depth. This means a test for the upper sands that should be encountered from the production obtained a few miles west in the South Bend district at from 1800 to 2600 feet as well as the deeper formation, so productive in Stephens county to the south.

The well is said to be located on excellent structure and is about two miles southwest of the Lisle well drilled by the Empire Company about two years ago on the block of acreage leased by C. W. De Freest in that section.

This deal was consummated through the efforts of M. G. Cheney with the aid of C. W. De Freest, and accomplished through contributions of acreage from several different companies and individuals holding acreage in that district. It has taken months to overcome the prejudice arising from the lack of commercial production obtained in the Lisle well despite the fact that there was a considerable amount of oil encountered at 2360 feet yet producing a large

quantity of gas which will be used for fuel by piping to the Thomas location.

From a geological standpoint the Bungler district has long been looked upon as prospective oil territory only awaiting development and with the demonstration of oil and gas to the east in the Lisle well and the production being obtained in the district from four to six miles west in the South Bend locality, it holds great possibility and may be destined to be one of the most productive areas in the county.

Other wells for this district are in the process of negotiation so that the Bungler district will be thoroughly tested in the near future and the town of Graham is much interested in the results to be obtained.

Drilling Activities, South Bend Field
Konawa Oil & Gas Co., on west 80 acres, Block No. 19, Stovall Plantation, a rig up. Plan to begin drilling soon.

Snowden & McSweeney, on Block No. 37, Stovall Plantation, drilling at something over 2200 feet and should reach the McCluskey sand this week. They missed the Donnell and Scott sands.

The Mid-Tex Petroleum Company, of Fort Worth, has bought the Graham Syndicate well and will bring it up its full capacity. This is one of the good producing wells in the South Bend district.

The Texas National is drilling at 500 feet. This company is expecting a good producer soon as the drilling is going forward at a rapid rate.

The Miami-McKeen, which came in last week, is still showing up well. The well will be drilled a few feet deeper in the sand. This well is only seven miles from Graham.

GRAHAM STEAM LAUNDRY BURNED LAST NIGHT
The Graham Steam Laundry burned about 10:30 o'clock last night. The flames had spread over a large part of the building before the alarm was turned in. The fire department was on the ground soon after the alarm was turned in but the flames spread so rapidly that the building could not be saved.

The loss is about \$22,000.00 with only \$4,000.00 insurance.

The owners have sustained a heavy financial loss and Graham will feel the loss most keenly as the manager was giving first class service and Graham needs a first class laundry.

FINAL APPEAL FOR BETTER SCHOOLS—AMENDMENT

Next Tuesday we shall have another opportunity of exercising the most important function of citizenship, namely, that of casting an intelligent ballot. Seldom in the history of the State or Nation has the voting public been called upon to render its verdict on questions of greater moment. Too often in the heat of a national campaign we lose sight of the more vital local issues, and for that reason this article is given to the press in the hope that it may arouse the citizenship of Young county to a very urgent public duty. Whatever the future holds for America, Texas can reap no more of the benefits than her citizenship is prepared to receive. A nation is no greater than its citizenship; therefore, the present and future generations must be prepared to enter the competitions of life where a thorough and practical education is, and will continue to be, the greatest asset. This is no snobbish appeal for education to avoid work, but it is a fervent hope that our young manhood and womanhood may be educated so that they will know how to work.

Every red blooded citizen of Texas deprecates our low rank in public education. The same ones know the cause to be inadequate financial support. They also know that the only hope for the future is more money for the schools through local taxation. From every side comes the cry of a teacher shortage, but a recent advertisement of a well-paid position in a one-teacher rural school of this county brought to my office no less than fourteen applications from teachers of ability and experience. Teachers are not scarce, but they can not live on good reputations and public praise! Neither can your children be educated without teachers. Therefore, it is up to you as a voter to solve the problem by casting your ballot for the Constitutional Amendment removing the school tax limit from local communities. The measure is thoroughly Democratic in that it places on the public no extra burdens, but merely gives to a community the means of properly caring for its schools. Granting then, that the schools must have greater financial support and that the Amendment will provide the means of obtaining same, how can you consistently vote against it?

In conclusion, I hope that you will not forget for a moment between now and the closing of the polls next Tuesday that whatever good or bad the future holds in store for the world, Texas can reap her share of the benefits only through an educated, enlightened, and progressive citizenship. I trust, too, that you will not forget that Texas is first in size, first in agricultural products, first in production of cotton, third in production of oil, seventh in wealth, and THIRTY-NINTH IN EDUCATION! Shall Texas keep this rank, or will you work and vote for the Better Schools Amendment November 2nd?

CONTRACT SIGNED FOR NEW RAIL ROAD—THE RIGHT-OF-WAY SECURED

ARTHUR MURRAY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Arthur Murray was accidentally shot in the arm last week. J. F. Winston and Mr. Murray were driving in their car near South Bend when Mr. Winston seeing a squirrel stopped his car quickly and both men left the car to shoot the squirrel. Mr. Winston shot the squirrel with his shot gun but it did not fall to the ground at once and Mr. Murray thinking it had not been killed prepared to shoot it again with a small rifle he was carrying but the squirrel fell to the ground before he fired his gun. They returned to the car and it is believed that Mr. Murray failed to let the hammer of his gun down and that it struck the emergency brake causing it to discharge. He was shot in the arm and bled profusely before reaching Graham where he received treatment. He went to Fort Worth Saturday and had the ball removed from his arm. His friends hope for him a speedy recovery with no permanent injury.

The new railroad from Wichita Falls through Graham to Breckenridge has been secured as far as Mr. Kell of Wichita Falls and the citizens of Graham are concerned. Mr. Kell was in Graham last Thursday and explained the plan and while here signed the contract. The citizens of Graham signed the contract immediately and it was forwarded to Mr. Kell at Wichita Falls.

The true Graham spirit was shown in the entire deal. Mr. Kell made the proposition that if Graham would raise \$200,000 and furnish about 15 miles of right-of-way that the road would be routed through Graham. Very little noise was made but some of our progressive citizens took hold of the matter with the result that the conditions were complied with and it is expected that the construction will begin as soon as some details can be worked out with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The engineer has taken up his residence in Graham and is giving his personal attention to securing the right of way. He is being assisted by a committee of our citizens and it is hoped that the right of way will soon be secured as the contract calls for the completion of the road within nine months after the right of way has been obtained.

The benefits to be derived from the construction of this road are too obvious to take time or space to discuss. With a trunk line from Wichita Falls to Waco in addition to our present direct connection with Fort Worth and Dallas, Graham would be one of the most favored cities in all West Texas. This new road will pass through the greatest oil belt and coal fields in the State. Some of the best brick and pottery clay is also near Graham along the route of this road. Tests were made a few years ago of the clay just west of Graham and it was pronounced among the very best for paving purposes and for pottery.

Young county with its rich valley lands along the Brazos and the fertile prairie lands in the northern part of the county, is recognized as one of the great agricultural counties and with the coming of this new road a new impetus will be given to farming. The varied soils in Young county will produce practically any thing grown in any section of Texas and with outlets north and south, more attention will be given to truck farming and fruit growing as a ready market would be found for the produce and fruit grown.

The citizens of Graham are elated over the prospects of the immediate construction of the road.

MISSIONARY NOTES

Looking After the Foreigners in Our Midst

Many of our people, perhaps, do not know that we have two congregations with two pastors in Key West. In Tampa we have five congregations and four pastors for Cubans. We have also a thriving congregation, two Sunday Schools and one pastor for the Italians in Tampa. In West Tampa there are 12,000 people, ninety per cent of them Cubans. Our church burned there several years ago, since which we have been worshipping in a small dwelling. But a new day is dawning for the people. The contractors are bidding on a \$15,000 church there.

The women have two fine settlements and one clinic in Tampa and they are doing a large service to these people. They are now spending several thousand dollars in building in West Tampa and in repairs in Ybor City.

Among all the difficult classes of aliens in this country, our easiest approach is to the Latins. In Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California we have an interesting and growing work among the Mexicans. This with the work with the Italians and Cubans, constitutes a very fascinating field of labor.

Recently in Key West I stood at the grave of young Vandoeser, the first missionary to the Cubans. He was in his twenties when he was sent there as a missionary. He did faithful work among the Cubans long before our church sent her missionaries to the Island of Cuba. His last words were: "Do not give up the Cuban Mission." We have not, nor will we. Our Cuban Christians in Key West often go to his grave and pray that the spirit of this hero may inspire them.—L. L. Russell.

Cuba Supports Man in Belgium
For one foreign mission field to assume the support of a missionary to another foreign field is somewhat unusual. Such arrangements, however, have grown out of the Centenary Movement in Cuba. The Cuban Mission Annual Conference has assumed as a Centenary Special the support of Professor E. B. McKnight, who is now connected with our new mission work in Belgium.

Pastors and congregations in the island are enthusiastic over this special and take pride in the fact that Cuba is the first mission to undertake the entire support of a missionary to another field.

There are more than 50,000,000 people in Africa for whom as yet no definite plan of evangelization has been inaugurated. These are without

light, and will die in darkness unless new plans and new workers are enlisted.

Largest Methodist School in Japan
It is perhaps not generally known, but true nevertheless, that Southern Methodism's biggest school, in point of enrollment, is not in the United States, but in Japan. Kwansai Gakuin at Kobe holds the record, enrolling this year 1,675 promising young men, and turning away a thousand more for lack of room.

Better equipment and a higher standard for this great institution has long been needed and is now possible at last through the Centenary. At the meeting of the Board of Missions in May it was decided to raise Kwansai to the grade of a two-course university, thus requiring additional grounds and a larger teaching staff and additional endowment.

For these purposes the following appropriations of Centenary funds were made for 1921: For native teachers, \$3,000; for endowment, \$60,000; for land and buildings, \$27,875. This change will add greatly to the effectiveness and influence of an institution that for years has been doing invaluable work, not only as a missionary agency, but also as a bond of friendship between the United States and Japan.

Dr. J. C. Newton, for many years president of the Kwansai Gakuin, was sent to Japan in 1888 from the Virginia Conference. Most of this time he has spent in efficient service in Kwansai Gakuin. He was for a number of years dean of the theological department of the school. He was then made president and has served in that capacity until his recent resignation.

The school is jointly owned by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Church of Canada. Our church will supply her share of the funds from Centenary money.

Kwansai Gakuin has an academy, a college, and a theological seminary. For the year closing in March, 1919, there were 173 graduates in all departments; 118 in the academy, 45 in the college, and 10 in the theological school. This is the largest number ever sent out in one year.

A new academy building has just lately been completed. The cost was about \$100,000, exclusive of furnishings. The academy is in desperate need of a chapel building. It has been necessary to hold the chapel meetings outdoors.

The theological department has sent out 100 graduates in the thirty years of its existence. Ninety of these are living and seventy-six are in the Christian ministry.

PUBLICITY SUPT.

LORD MAYOR OF CORK DEAD

Terrence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, died at Brixton prison in London last Monday. His death followed a hunger strike of more than seventy-three days, eclipsing any in the annals of the medical world. His brother, John MacSwiney and a Catholic priest were with him when the end came. He had been unconscious for thirty-six hours and relatives and friends had not been permitted to see him. The brother and priest were notified, a short time before his death that the end was near and they were admitted to his prison chamber. His body was taken to Ireland for burial.

Terrence MacSwiney was 48 years old and was one of the most prominent Sinn Feiners. He started life as a draper's assistant, but became a poet, author and a playwright before taking up politics seriously. Later he became violently anti-English.

While in Wakefield jail, Yorkshire, in 1916, he met Muriel Murphy, daughter of a wealthy Cork distiller, who visited the jail, and shortly after they were married, despite much opposition.

MacSwiney was elected as a Sinn Feiner member from Cork of the British Parliament in 1918, but never took his seat. He was present at the first session of the Irish Parliament in 1919 when the establishment of the republic was confirmed and was elected Lord Mayor of Cork in 1920.

For various political offenses, he had been in jail with brief intervals of liberty since January, 1916, and in October, 1917, secured his release jail by hunger striking.

As soon as the news of the lord mayor's death began to spread through the city small knots of people began moving toward Brixton prison. The police, however, did not allow anyone to pass into the street leading to the prison entrance, keeping the people moving so that a crowd could not form. Fear had previously been expressed that the lord mayor's death might cause a demonstration at the prison.

The MacSwiney family arranged during the morning for the removal of the body from the prison to St. George's Cathedral in London as soon as the inquest was ended. The body will lie in state there until it is taken to Dublin, where it is planned to place it for a day or two in the Mansion house.

The death of Lord Mayor MacSwiney was the first of an Irish hunger striker to occur in England. Just a week ago, on the occasion of the death of Michael Fitzgerald, one of the eleven hunger strikers in the

Cork jail, the lord mayor telegraphed: "We do not know who is to be the second to step in the path of immortality, but offering unreserved sacrifices we are safeguarding the destinies of Ireland."

It became evident several days ago that MacSwiney was nearing the end. Up to that time he had steadfastly refused nourishment, although tempting dishes were brought to his bedside daily by the authorities. Both the authorities and the lord mayor's relatives, emphatically stated they had not administered food to the prisoner, notwithstanding rumors to the contrary.

At last, after the mayor had reached the stage of extreme emaciation, had become periodically delirious, the officials began to give him liquid nourishment. This came too late, however, as the mayor has been all but dead for many days.

TO THE VOTERS OF THE THIRTEENTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:

The verbatim statements herein set out are taken from the Treaty of Peace with Germany, published in the Congressional Record as submitted by President Wilson, and published in a separate pamphlet form as Document No. 49 of the Senate Records of the 66th Congress 1st Session, from the Government Printing Office.

Article 1 of the Covenant, Paragraph 1, is as follows: "The original Members of the League of Nations shall be those of the Signatories which are named in the Annex to this Covenant and also such other States named in the Annex as shall accede without reservation to this covenant." The original members of the League of Nations Signatories of the Treaty of Peace, as shown in the Annex are as follows: "United States of America, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, British Empire, Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, India, China, Cuba, Ecuador, France, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Hedjaz, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Liberia, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Roumania, Serb-Groat-Slovene State, Siam, Czechoslovakia, Uruguay."

Paragraph No. 1, Article No. 3, provides that "the Assembly shall consist of Representatives of the Members of the League."

Paragraph No. 4, Article No. 3, that "at meetings of the Assembly each member of the League shall have one vote, and may have not more than three representatives." In other words in the Assembly England controls six votes and the United States one.

Paragraph No. 1, Article No. 4,

provides that "the Council shall consist of Representatives of the Principal Allied and Associated Powers, together with representatives of four other members of the League. These four Members of the League shall be appointed by the Assembly from time to time in its discretion. Until the appointment of the Representatives of the four Members of the League first selected by the Assembly, Representatives of Belgium, Spain, Brazil and Greece shall be members of the Council." In other words the United States has equal representation with England on the Council, because as further provided by Paragraph 6, Article 4, "At meetings of the Council, each Member of the League represented on the Council shall have one vote, and may not have more than one representative." But this applies only to the Council.

The next question is one of jurisdiction and the respective powers of the Assembly and Council. Paragraph 1, Article 15, is as follows: "If there should arise between members of the League any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, which is not submitted to arbitration in accordance with Article 13, the members of the League agree that they will submit the matter to the Council. Any party to the dispute may effect such submission by giving notice of the existence of the dispute to the Secretary General, who will make all necessary arrangements for a full investigation and consideration thereof."

In other words when a dispute arises between members of the League of Nations the dispute at once goes to the Council.

But Paragraph No. 9, Article 15, provides as follows: "The Council may in any case under this Article refer the dispute to the Assembly. The dispute shall be so referred at the request of either party to the dispute, provided that such request be made within fourteen days after the submission of the dispute to the Council." Paragraph No. 10, Article 15, then follows: "In any case referred to the Assembly, all the provisions of this Article and of Article 12 relating to the action and powers of the Council shall apply to the action and powers of the Assembly, provided that a report made by the Assembly, if concurred in by the Representatives of those members of the League represented on the Council and of a majority of the other members of the League, exclusive in each case of the representatives of the parties to the dispute, shall have the same force as

a report by the Council concurred in by all the members thereof other than the representatives of one or more of the parties to the dispute."

Now, supposing that there is a dispute between England and the United States. The dispute would go at once to the Council where England and the United States are equally represented. But England by giving fourteen days notice could take the case to the Assembly where neither England or the United States could vote on the question, but the dependencies of England, namely, Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and India, would each have a vote and it does not take a Solomon to forecast how Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and India would vote in case of a dispute between their mother country and the United States. True the nations, not parties to the dispute who have representatives on both the Council and Assembly must all agree to the report, but these in the illustration mentioned would be, France, Italy, Belgium, Spain, Brazil and Greece, besides requiring a majority of the others not parties to the dispute. Of the others who have not representatives on both the Council and Assembly, England would control five votes and the United States would have none.

Now, is it all a lie as the Democrats charge that England has not six votes to the United States one? The fact is that in such a dispute between the United States and England, England would have five votes and the United States none.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the last letter of Chester H. Terrell, former Democratic Speaker of the House of Representatives of Texas, who recently died, was to Senator Harding and Mr. Terrell in part said: "I have been a prominent Democrat all my life. I had never contemplated changing parties until I found that my own party had committed itself to a League of Nations which contains such provisions as Article X. It is beyond my conception that any American could ever agree that Great Britain could have six votes to America's one before the Assembly of the League of Nations."

These were the dying words of one of the most prominent Democrats; a man who was loved and respected by all; a man who placed love of country before love of party, and one who while honored by the Democratic party in the State of Texas as Speaker in the House, did not forget that the paramount duty of every citizen is

to his country and not his party. Primary pledges, former alliances and all were swept away in the clear vision of this patriotic Texan.

The Southern farmers are selling cotton for less than it cost to produce it, the western farmers are selling wheat for less than it cost to grow it; the rice farmers are selling rice for less than the cost of production; the cattle raisers are selling cows for less than it cost to feed them; the merchants are selling goods for less than their cost; the railroads lack a great deal of earning operating expenses; and the subscription price of newspapers is below the cost of white paper. With everybody losing money, how long will it take to force the world into bankruptcy? —Honey Grove Signal.

NEW SIDEWALKS FOR GRAHAM
A much needed improvement will soon be under way in Graham. The rain for the past week has impressed upon our citizens the need of better sidewalks.

Capt. F. S. Jones has been at work on the proposition and we have been informed that he has succeeded in inducing the property owners around the square and on Elm street from the square to the depot to put in concrete walks and that work will begin at once.

This, we hope, will be only a beginning of sidewalk buildings in Graham. Good walks should be built to the school building and, in fact, several miles of concrete walks ought to be built in Graham. One prerequisite of free mail delivery is good sidewalks. When the work of building concrete sidewalks is once begun we believe it will continue until walks are built over a large part of town.

VOTE FOR SCHOOL AMENDMENT

If the educational amendment is defeated in the election November 2nd, it will be because of the apathy of the solid people of the State and for no other reason. There is no chance for ignorance or sheer maliciousness usually mobilized against any such proposal to prevail in this instance if the huge majority of people who have the welfare of their children in their commonwealth at heart will take time to consider the question and then go to the polls and vote.

There can be no tenable argument against the amendment. The old war-cry of raised taxes, that has before sent worthy amendments down to defeat cannot be truthfully raised against this. We do not doubt that this cry will be raised, that it is already being raised. It has even been said that large landholders are, in fact, issuing orders to tenants to vote against the amendment on this ground. The amendment does not increase the school tax any more than the present provision of the Constitution fixes the tax law. Each common or independent school district will have to vote in another and a special election to raise the tax.

The educational amendment, by a strange paradox, will probably encounter strongest opposition in the

rural districts, the stronghold of resistance to "tax measures" of all kinds. The amendment is a measure of justice to rural schools, giving such of them as desire to do so the permission to improve their schools with own money.

Is there anything wrong with a proposition of that kind?—Star-Telegram.

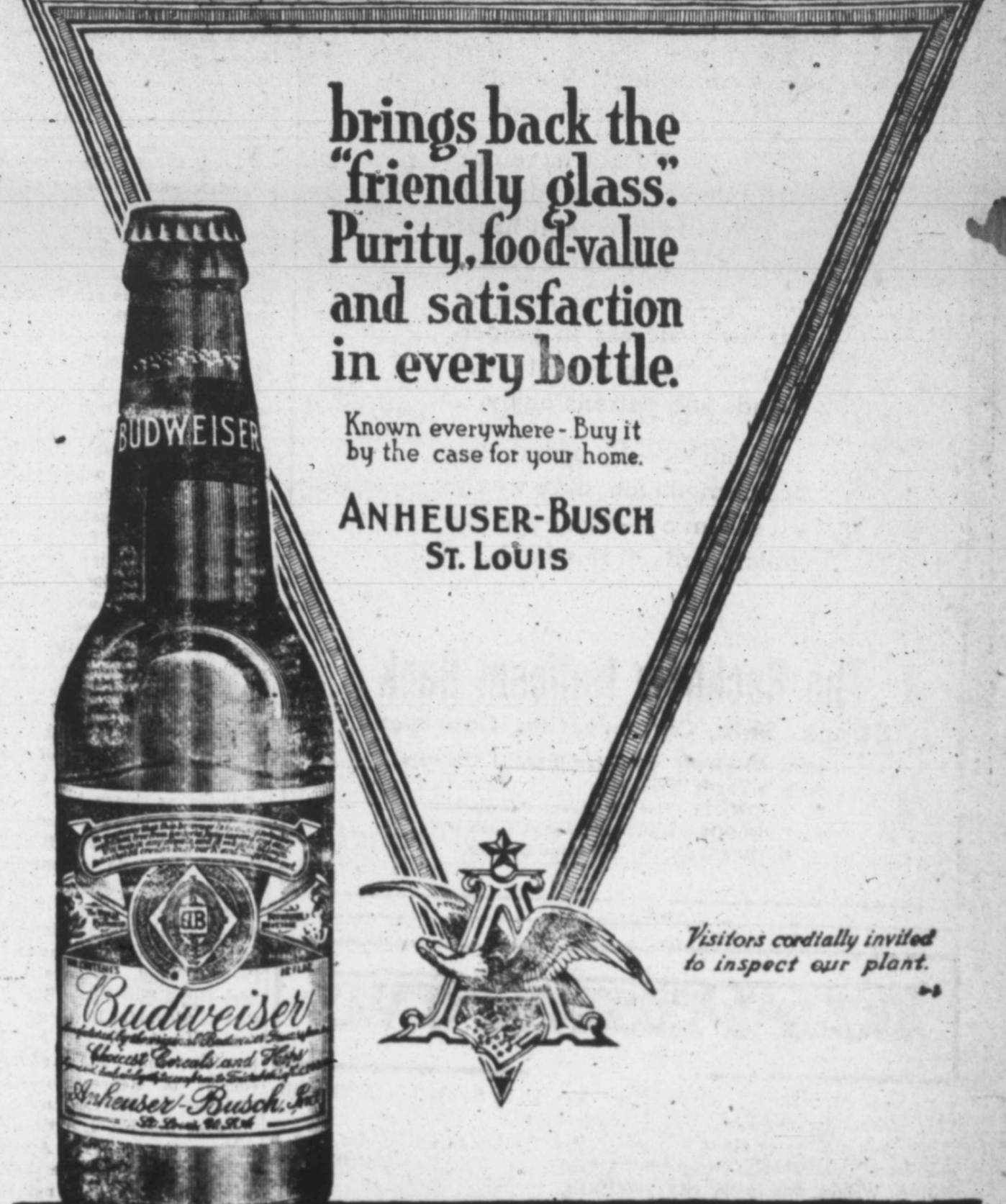

PROTECT THE QUAILS

It will soon be open season for quail shooting, and with the hope of inducing hunters to spare and land owners to protect the useful, pretty birds, The Leader reproduces what a man who for many years has been engaged in the study of bird life has to say regarding the value of Bob Whites:

"The quail is in need of protection. The fact that he is a game bird is overbalanced by the fact that he is one of the greatest destroyers of weed seeds and insects. When killed he is worth about 50 cents even at present high prices, as far as his actual meat value is concerned. When on the farm he is worth about \$5 every month he scratches and picks around in the cultivated field. Estimating his average life to be three years, which is a conservative one, it will be seen that he will be worth a considerable sum during his lifetime. When he disappears from the farm by the shotgun route the farmer must pay this amount out for poison and labor to destroy the insects."

The farm that is closed against shot guns is fortunate. If people must kill something let them kill rats. There are worlds of rodents and they are doing great damage.

WORTHLESS RAILWAY BONDS BEING SOLD IN TEXAS, BELIEF

A communication from a reputable brokerage house of Kansas City advises that during the past few months persons in Kansas and Oklahoma have been sold or traded worthless Rock Island bonds. It is reported that parties selling or tarding the bonds have thoroughly worked Kansas and Oklahoma and that indications are they are now in North Texas, as the brokerage company recently received an inquiry from Fort Worth as to the value of the bonds.

The company advises that the Collateral Trust 4 per cent bonds of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company maturing in 2002 are absolutely worthless. This company, it says, was dissolved in 1916 upon the reorganization under the present name of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company and at the time of the reorganization the bonds were exchanged for stock in the present company. It appears that some of the Collateral Trust 4s were not transferred or exchanged and that these are being offered to the public.

The company advises that the bonds in question must in no way be confused with the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company's General 4s, due in 1938, which are saleable bonds and perfectly good.
