GEORGE TACKETT BOUND OVER TO GRAND JURY

George Tackett, who is charged with having held up a poker game on the night of January 14, last, in an outhouse belonging to Marshall Morgan, was bound over Monday to the action of the grand jury and released on \$3,000 bond. Bond was allowed on the advice of Dr. Price, who testified that Tackett was in a bad condition physically.

The preliminary trial was held Saturday and Monday before Justice C. D. Brewton, many witnesses in the case being heard. Young Tackett is the son of Watchman Tackett, a well-known and highly respected citizen of Graham.

The alleged poker game which Tackett is charged with hi-jacking is said by officers to have been participated in by four men. Tackett, it is charged, entered the room, his face covered with a cap and at the point of a revolver relieved the men of \$100 and an automatic pistol. He was arrested and placed in jail on the day following the robbery.

It is understood that a brother of Arthur McIntyre, one of the men charged with being in the game, testified at the trial that Tackett had made overtures to him and stated that if he (McIntyre) would get a poker game going he would see that the money was obtained. In feeling between Arthur McIntyre and young Tackett culminated Monday when the men met and engaged in a fist fight on the west side of the square.

Eliasville, Texas, Jan 11.—The Eliasville extension of the Wichita Falls & Southern became a certainty last week.

Following a hearing at Austin, when other railroads protested, both the Texas railroad commission and the interstate commerce commissioner announced that they would recommend the necessary "certificate of convenience," which would allow the work to continue.

Eliasville breathed easier with the news. When the three lines entering Breckenridge submitted protests against the new road a few weeks ago the situation took on an uncertain color here. Several big projects, which depended upon the railroad coming, were held up until the controversy was settled.

All protests were either withdrawn or disapproved at the Austin hearing. Objection of the Jake Hamon road, which was the most stubborn of all, was removed when Frank Kell told the commission he would agree to a trackage arrangement with the Jake Hamon road—the Kell line to connect with the other at Jimkurn for the run into Breckenridge, while allowing the other trackage privileges from Jimkurn into Eliasville and South Bend.

Arrangements for the Kell extension will be pushed at top speed. Grading crews at Newcastle and Graham, which were pulled off of the work a month ago, will be sent back.

It has been announced from the chief engineer's office that contracts have already been signed for the grading of the terminals at Eliasville and for the road for a distance of four miles south of Eliasville. A bridge superintendent will also be located here. All material for construction of track and bridges has been bought, it is said.

Citizen representatives of Eliasville, Graham, Breckenridge and Wichita Falls attended the hearing and gave testimony showing necessity of immediate construction of a railroad into this country. A. A. Donnell represented Eliasville. Graham representatives were M. K. Graham, R. E. Lynch, A. W. Kay and Judge W. P. Stinson. Breck Walker and Cliff Caldwell were there from Breckenridge, and E. C. Stovall and O. A. McBrayer from South Bend. Objection of Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth was based on the plea that Kell's extension would parallel that road, which already has a charter into this country and has built as far north as Jimkurn. J. H. Barwise, Jr., attorney for that line, suggested the trackage arrangement, and Kell told him it would be acceptable. Details of it are yet to be worked out between the two lines. However, it is known that instead of going straight through to Breckenridge, as planned, engineers of the Kell road have been pulled back to a point four miles south of Eliasville, there to start a new survey toward Jimkurn.

Under this arrangement, Eliasville will have the advantage of two roads instead of one. The Jake Hamon road will give its train service both freight and passenger, as far as South Bend. This road will give direct through service to Fort Worth. The Kell road will offer through service to Wichita Falls.

NEW THEATRE TO BE OPERATED IN CITY

Graham is to have a new theatre with a seating capacity of 2,000 persons, it became known last Friday when Wilkie Brothers & McConnell purchased the Price Brothers' building on the west side of the square. The consideration was \$25,000. The building will be remodeled and converted into a theatre and a second floor will be added. The company plans to spend \$16,000 in improvements, the work on which will be started about February 1st.

Wilkie Brothers are well known Texas theatre men and own other shows in Graham and Wichita Falls.

They surely have had some experience in dealing with the tendon of Achilles and the small tarsal bones of the foot. The leaders of that society are saying this is a fad that must come down. The senselessness of it leads the remainder of the thoughtful men to answer: "So say we, all of us."--Nashville Advocate.

(From the Mexico Bulletin, sent in by Norwood F. Wynn, Jan., 1921.)
The Steady Growth of Laurens Institute:

Laurens is now in its thirty-fifth year. It was over seventy years ago that "Uncle Larry" touched by the seed of the Mexican children for education, decided to found the school, and started the Rosebuds of Virginia supporting it. The work has grown steadily, year after year. We have had among our ex-students, a plenipotentiary minister to Brazil, a State governor, several members of Congress, the head of the largest preparatory school in Mexico, a noted inventor, many ministers of the Gospel, and, what counts more than these whose names have become known, multitudes of just ordinary folk, fathers and mothers of families, whose lives have been better because of "what they received at Laurens. Now we have only boys, boys just full of fun, just as bright and intelligent as yours and mine. There are now over two hundred boys in school, a notable increase over last year. There is a large class of students who are missionary volunteers most of them studying for the ministry, though one wants to be a doctor and some of the others say they are going to be teachers. We have a big commercial department that is getting the reputation of doing the best work of any school in Monterrey, and besides these, there are children in the regular grades, and in the English Department, where the course is entirely in English. Almost fifty of these boys are boarders, and the crying need just at present is a new building for a boarding department. The missionary schools of Mexico are facing the greatest opportunity of their history. The people are eager for education, and only by Christian education can the country be saved. And it is such a wonderful country, and the people are so worth saving.--Mrs. Arra P. Sawyer, Head of English Department.
