INTERVIEWS ARE SECURED ON RACE QUESTION ISSUE

PROMINENT CITIZENS OF GRAHAM FAVOR BRINGING IN THE NEGRO

PUBLIC SENTIMENT SIFTED

Believes Presence Here Is Necessity Because of the Nature of Work They Could Perform Here.

Shall the negro be permitted to live and work in Graham without molestation? Or shall he be discouraged from coming here?

These questions, recently emphasized by two occurrences here in which the race problem was involved, were responsible Wednesday for a representative of the Leader sifting public sentiment on this matter through interviews with prominent citizens and with others whom he had never seen before.

During these interviews only one question was asked—namely, "do you favor, or do you not favor allowing the negro to live in Graham?" The replies, just as they were made by those interviewed, are given below:

Mayor E. S. Graham—"Yes, I am in favor of letting the negro come in. If we are to build a city here I don't see how we can do without him. There are certain classes of work here that no one else will perform, and his presence is a necessity."

E. S. Stovall—"I certainly do favor permitting the negro to come to Graham."

C. F. Marshall—"I don't see why negroes should be any more objectionable than Mexicans or any other class of people, so long as they behave themselves."

Hugh Sherwood—"By all means I favor letting the negro come in here."

J. H. Shelton—"You bet your life. Bring the negro in."

Morris U. Lively—"I am in favor of permitting the negro to live and work here."

J. T. Rickman—"The negro is a citizen."

F. T. Arnold—"I certainly do favor permitting the negro to come here."

J. D. Hayden—"I had rather work with a negro than a Mexican."

T. W. Wallace—"I'll not invite one in here and I won't help chase one out."

W. F. Gallagher—"I favor bringing the negro to Graham because he is needed here."

M. M. Craft—"Under the circumstances, I don't favor bringing the negro here. Of course there are a lot of jobs here a white man won't do, but if you let one negro come in, then it will be six months until the town will be full of them."

A. D. Stewart—"As for myself I wouldn't join a mob to molest a negro that was brought in here, nor would I join in any movement to bring a negro here."

Grover Snyder—"I don't give a what they do."

A. W. Kay—"I favor bringing the negro here."

Felix Ury—"If we are ever going to have a city, we cannot discriminate as to creed or color."

TWELVE SEATS NOT SUFFICIENT FOR CROWD

Patrons of the Rock Island are out of luck when it comes to securing seats in the waiting room at the local station here. To be exact, there are seats in the depot for only twelve persons. Methodist Church Plans Erection of \$75,000.00 Building

Committee is Appointed to Fix Site and to Take Subscriptions for New Building—Plans Completed

A resolution indorsing the building of a \$75,000 church building was adopted at a meeting at the Methodist church Wednesday night, and a committee was appointed to secure the site and take subscriptions.

The architect's plans, which were drawn up by J. T. Galbraith of Dallas, were approved. A handsome drawing of the proposed building is now on display in the show window of S. B. Street & Company.

The plans call for a three-story building, 80x120 feet, with 30 or 35 rooms, a basement, main auditorium and balcony. The building will have a seating capacity of 1,000 persons.

Rev. T. E. Bowman, in discussing the plans Thursday morning, said he believed that now is the most opportune time to raise the money with which to build the structure.

"Our building program we can not afford to neglect the churches," he said.

It is understood that a site has been selected but that the deal for its purchase has not yet been closed. The location of this site is being withheld for the present. Rev. Bowman feels that little difficulty will be met with in raising the money.

FAMOUS MUSICIANS ARE COMING TO CITY

Superintendent H. B. Cogdell and Principal T. H. Glenn of the Graham Public Schools have made arrangements for the people of Graham and Young county to hear some of the ablest musicians in the country. The pupils of the public schools are now selling tickets for the entertainment which will be rendered at the High School Auditorium February 17th. The proceeds will be used to buy equipment for the school grounds.

This promises to be the biggest musical event of the year.

Skovgaard is probably the ablest violinist at present on the American concert stage. He has made several tours of Europe. He habitually uses a rare Stradivarius violin in his concerts. This violin is valued at the fabulous sum of \$13,000.00. His left hand, the fingers of which he uses on the finger-board, is insured in the sum of \$50,000.00.

Mr. Skovgaard is no sissy musician. He is said to weigh nearly 300 pounds. The program rendered will be a rare treat to our people and we wish to emphasize the fact that the proceeds from the entertainment will be used on our school grounds.

FRUIT MAY BE KILLED BY LATE RAW WEATHER

So far this winter the weather has been unusually mild and the severe cold snap early this week was welcomed generally because of its tendency to set back the fruit. LARGEST BRICK IS NOW GOING UP ON WEST 4th STREET

Work on the largest brick building yet erected in Graham was started Monday on West Fourth street, below the Dolman Hotel. R. E. Claiborne and A. L. Fisher of Detroit are the owners.

The building will be a one-story structure and will cover a space of 120x50 feet, or in other words it will have a floor space of 18,000 square feet. When completed it will have fourteen fronts. The building will be made strong enough for two stories so that another story can be added at any time in the future.

The building will be rushed to completion as soon as possible, it was announced Monday by Mr. Claiborne.

BELL MATTRESS AND FURNITURE CO. OPENS

The Bell Mattress & Furniture Co. of Wichita Falls has opened a branch house on West Fourth street, in the second block from the square. The establishment was opened Monday under the supervision of L. C. Robertson. The branch here will be in charge of E. C. Hallford.

The company is starting in a small way here and will hold itself in readiness to enlarge and extend their plant in keeping with the growth of the city, Mr. Robertson stated. He added that he expects later to move more equipment here from Wichita Falls.

LAUNDRY WILL SOON BE READY TO OPEN

The Graham Steam Laundry which has been under construction for the past six weeks, is now nearing completion and will be ready for operation by February 1. It is thought. The owners are Gallaher & Fauntleroy, and the plant is located on Cherry street.

Only the most modern laundry equipment will be installed, Mr. Gallaher said. The plant will have the necessary facilities for turning out \$2,000 worth of work per week and it has been so constructed that the capacity can be increased 100 per cent on short notice.

ICE PLANT DOUBLES PRESENT CAPACITY

The Graham Mill & Elevator Company, anticipating a greater demand for ice this summer, is doubling the capacity of its plant. The company is now completing the installation of a 15-ton unit, this being an exact duplicate of the old unit established in 1914. The plant will now have a capacity of 30 tons of ice per day. The company has spent approximately \$50,000 in improvements.

Even with a capacity of 30 tons per day it is thought the plant will be unable to meet the demands for ice in the districts outside the city. A plant is now being installed at Newcastle but it will not be ready for operation this season, it is said. It will therefore be necessary to ship a considerable amount of ice into the city to supply the needs of South Bend and other places.

FIRMS TAKE SPACE IN NEW BUILDING

The Lauck & Gallagher building at the corner of Fourth and Elm Sts., is being rushed to completion, and the space is being taken as fast as the stores are finished. Among the firms already established in the building are L. Gardner, coffee and lunch house; Davenport & McFall's barber shop; Haines & Yarbrough, automobile parts; Home Laundry Co. and shoe repair shop.

The building now occupied by the City Garage will be torn down to make room for the rear extension to the building.

It is said that a string of lights will be kept burning each night around the building and that a night watchman will be employed to keep guard over the stores.

About 15 Wells On Sand In South Bend District

Present Production is Expected to be Doubled When Pipe Line Connections are Made—Some Reduction in Wages of Workmen is Forecasted by Decline in Price of Crude

About fifteen wells on the sand ready to be drilled in as soon as pipe line connections are made continues this week to be the chief factor in connection with development in the South Bend district. It was reported Thursday that the Prairie Company has completed the concrete foundation for an engine and that the wells will be put on the line within the next ten days. As soon as pipe line connections are made it is expected that the initial production for January, which was about 72,000 barrels, will be more than doubled.

Another drop in the price of crude runs has brought quotations down to \$17.5 a barrel. This is a 50 per cent reduction under prices of sixteen days ago. The drop in the price of crude has been responsible for a movement on the part of operators to bring about a general lowering in the cost of drilling. A slight cut in wages already has been made by some companies in the South Bend field, it is understood. The Dorsey Lumber & Rig Company, under stress of closer competition, has cut the wages of rig builders from \$22 to \$17 per day. It is understood that some of the men of this company are now at South Bend.

Re-adjustment Period. The drop in the price of crude, in the opinion of some operators, reflects a condition in keeping with the period of general readjustment now taking place throughout the country, notwithstanding the fact that the price of oil has experienced a sharper decline than other products. However this may be, it is expected that the oil industry, while working a hardship on oil operators generally, will become stabilized after the period of uncertainty is over.

Panhandle Has Showing. The Panhandle-McCluskey No. 6 showed up for about 6,000,000 feet of gas and about 40 barrels of oil

at 1640 feet, it is said. This well, however, was drilled, deeper and is now on the 2100-foot sand. This well looks good, it is said, and with the storage facilities of the company the well can be tested out to see what production it takes.

The Hamon estate last week made two locations, one on block 29 and the other on block 28, Stovall plantation. These locations are only a short distance from the Panhandle-McCluskey No. 6.

The Roxana-Burns No. 1, located about four miles southwest of Graham, spudded in five days ago and Wednesday night was reported down 700 feet. Should this well be brought in it is expected that all operations will come right up to the door of Graham, so to speak.

A location has been made by Morris J. Grodzin and others on the east 100 acres of the 140-acre tract of the W. H. Elkins survey. A contract for the rig has been let to J. F. Winston.

The Texas Rig Building Company started construction Tuesday morning of a rig for the Young County Oil Syndicate, the rig being located about 150 feet from the First State Bank at South Bend. The rig is expected to be completed Saturday night.

A rig has just been completed for the H. & S. Syndicate on the Ruthy Campbell Survey, and another one has been finished for the M. & M. Drilling Company on the J. Wertig farm.

The Midway Oil Company's McLaren No. 1 has spudded in and a location has been made on the same tract for their No. 2.

The Young County Oil & Gas Company reports a good showing in their M. K. Graham No. 1 at a depth of 2383. However, the well will be drilled, to the 2100-foot sand. The North American-Scott No. 1 also had a good showing in this same strata.

J. S. LAMAR WELL KNOWN CITIZEN DEAD

The citizens of Graham were shocked when the sad news rapidly spread over the city early Saturday morning that J. S. Lamar had died suddenly at his home at one o'clock that morning. He worked all day Friday and seemed to be as well as usual.

Mr. Lamar was born April 22, 1857 in Kentucky. He moved to Texas thirty-five years ago and has lived around Graham the greater part of this time. He has many friends in Graham as he has always lived a quiet and upright life. He has been a consistent member of the Methodist church for years.

Mr. Lamar is survived by his wife and seven children—two sons and five daughters. One son preceded him to the other world. He has been a familiar character around Graham for many years and will be greatly missed by his friends who are numbered by his acquaintances.

The Leader joins in extending sympathy to the loved ones in this hour of sorrow and sadness.

TEMPORARY INJUNCTION GRANTED E. C. STOVALL

A temporary injunction restraining oil operators in the South Bend district from running salt water into the Clear Fork of the Brazos River was granted E. C. Stovall Monday by Judge Weldon of Wichita Falls. Some twenty companies and individuals were named in the injunction proceedings. Many operators already have shut off the water, it is said. Mr. Stovall, who has secured the state water rights in the South Bend district, stated this action was being taken to prevent the fresh water in the river from being ruined.

PERMISSION NOT YET RECEIVED FOR BUILDING ROAD

WICHITA FALLS & SOUTHERN EXPECTED TO BE COMPLETED MARCH 20.

STATEMENT MADE BY KELL

Expects Through Train Service Between Graham and Wichita Falls By March 20.

Up to noon Thursday no word had been received at the office of Chief Engineer McFarland from the Interstate Commerce Commission concerning permission to proceed with construction of the Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad. Plans, however, are now being made to start the work just as soon as permission is received.

Frank Kell, president of the road, has returned to Wichita Falls from Washington, according to a cable in the Wichita Falls Daily under date of February 6. This article in speaking of Mr. Kell's return, says:

"Through train service between this city and Graham will be established by March 1, according to Frank Kell, president of the road, who has just returned from an extended business trip to the East. Contracts have been let for the construction of trackage and the rails will be laid by the date mentioned above.

"The only thing which can block the speedy finishing of the road is the refusal of the Interstate Commerce Commission to grant a certificate of operation, but Mr. Kell is of the opinion that no trouble will be experienced in obtaining this."

NEGRO CAUSES SOME EXCITEMENT TUESDAY

No little excitement was caused Tuesday night when a large crowd attracted by the presence of a negro in the White House Barber Shop, on West Fourth street, gathered in front of the building. Several threatening remarks were made but there was no direct attempt to molest the negro.

W. H. Dinning, proprietor of the barber shop, armed himself with a shotgun and warned members of the crowd that he would fire on the first man who made an attack on the negro.

The negro, Frank Ingram, is from Henrietta and is employed as a porter by the barber shop. It is said he was wounded while serving in France. This is the second difficulty here during the last few weeks over the race question, a negro having been run out of town a few weeks ago by a large crowd.

BUY TICKETS FROM THE SCHOOL CHILDREN

GOVERNOR NEFF DRAWING TIGHT REIN

Immediately after his inauguration, Governor Neff took hold of the reins of government in a manner pleasing to a large majority of the law-abiding citizens of Texas. He is proceeding with caution. In his first message, he did not outline a mass of legislation that must be passed by the Legislature. He called attention to the platform which promised certain definite things and asked that the terms of the contract be carried out.

Governor Neff promised to make certain reforms. He promised to do away with useless bureaus and boards. Some doubted that he would make good this pledge but after he had been in office four days he discontinued the board of pardons. He gave good reasons for doing so. Everybody agrees with him that there have been too many pardons.

He has also recommended the outright repeal of the suspended sentence law. There is no doubt but that the abuse of the suspended sentence law and the free use of pardoning power has been responsible for much of the crime committed.

Governor Neff further recommends the removal from office at once of "all officers who corruptly stand in the way of enforcement of the laws, and enforcement of the Dean prohibition law so that a verdict of a jury which has heard all facts can not be set aside on mere technicalities. He is urging many wholesome measures and if he secures the co-operation of the legislature he will, no doubt, prove to be a very efficient governor.

BABE RICKMAN

Most boys are honored with a new name when they enter college. Byron Rickman who entered Baylor University last fall, is no exception to the rule. On account of his "size" he has been given the name of "Babe" Rickman around the college. He is a very accommodating young man and is making himself useful around the Baylor campus according to the following clipping from the Baylor Lariat, the student publication of the University.



OIL OPERATOR GIVES VIEWS ON OUTLOOK

A prominent oil operator, whose holdings extend to several fields said Thursday that the recent cut in oil prices might have the effect of slowing down field operations but that it would only be temporary. Wildcat operations, he said, would be effected. He predicted, however, that within three or four weeks oil production would go forward with greater activity than ever before in the history of Texas operations.

"The wave of money stringency has passed over the Eastern States," he said, "and we are just beginning to feel it out here. The year 1921 will, in my judgment, be a banner year for oil men. Of course wages and materials must come down with the price of crude, but all this will soon be adjusted and business will go forward on a normal basis."

RIG BUILDERS WILL OPPOSE REDUCTION

Rig builders in Young and Stephens counties will oppose any reduction in wages, according to an agreement entered into last Saturday night by over 100 workers at a meeting held at Breckenridge. The meeting was the result of a cut in wages recently made by the Dorsey Lumber & Rig Company, Builders from both counties were present at the meeting.

A motion was made and carried to cease work when wages fell below \$22 per day for crew men, and \$23 per day for foremen. It is understood the men later called on one of the Dorsey crews in the South Bend district and ordered them to cease work. The Dorsey company made a cut of from \$22 to \$17 per day.

No union was formed at the Breckenridge meeting, it is said, the men agreeing to act through a mutual understanding.

THE GEWALKS BADLY NEEDED IN CITY CITIZENS THINK

The most pressing need of improvement in the civic affairs of the city at this time, in the opinion of a majority of Graham citizens, is the construction of sidewalks. This fact was recently brought out at the Chamber of Commerce meeting and through expressions of various individuals throughout the city. Graham will be unable to get a city mail delivery unless sidewalks are built.

Just what plans will be formulated to carry out the work of building sidewalks is not known at this time. A reciprocal agreement, however, was entered into some time ago between the city and property owners across streets and alleys. It is very doubtful at this time whether the city will now be able to live up to this agreement in all cases, it was stated Monday by Dr. W. A. Morris, member of the City Council. The city, he said, is handicapped by a shortage of funds.

Some seem to think that the property owners should proceed with the work regardless of the action taken by the city. This would at least go far towards relieving the situation and getting a portion of the city out of the mud, it is contended.

There is no doubt but what the sentiment of the people is for building sidewalks ahead of any other civic improvement.

WARNING SOUNDED BY COUNTY ATTORNEY

Local citizens are warned by County Attorney F. V. Hinson and Assistant County Attorney Rupert P. Ricker against placing their signatures on the bonds of bunco men, bad check artists and other law violators with whom they are not familiar.

"We intend to prosecute all violators to the fullest extent of the law," was the joint statement issued by the attorneys. "And if criminals are given their freedom on bonds," the statement continues, "they will have an opportunity to jump the county and escape punishment. We will ask the jury for a conviction in every case where a bad check is given, and in this we are backed up by the banks."

Mrs. G. W. Carlton was born November 7th, 1846, and departed this life December 3rd, 1920, at her home near Newcastle, Young County, Texas. She was Miss Nan Rogers and was married to G. W. HOWELL & HOWELL BUY THE SMITH BUILDING

The building occupied by the Majestic Theatre, on the east side of the square, has been purchased from Smith Brothers by Howell & Howell of Wichita Falls. It is a one-story structure and covers a space of 40x100 feet. The consideration has not been announced. It is said that the purchasers may add another story to the building.

The building covers a space of 53x94 feet and when completed will be one of the most imposing buildings in the city. The structure cost about \$40,000 according to Mr. Lynch. The lower floor will be used for stores, while the upper story will be occupied by offices.

RICKER IS ASSISTANT TO COUNTY ATTORNEY

Rupert P. Ricker, of Big Springs, Texas, has located his law practice here and will be assistant to County Attorney F. V. Hinson. IVAN SIFTINGS

Ivan is beginning to assume the appearance of a real live oil town. One does not have to ask what Ivan has. The big derricks are standing monuments to that question.

There are ten rigs in a half mile radius. Fifty-three producers within a 4 mile radius and forty-seven rigs up with some spudded in and others getting ready.

Since our last communication practically five new wells have been added to the list of producers yet for lack of proper pipe-line connectors these wells can not be brought in proper. They are as follows:

The L. A. Spain by the Humble Co., the Kendrick No. 1 by the Sun Co., and the Smith, Kirtley, and Kirkland by the Mid-Kansas. In addition to the above, the Moon well by the Sinclair interests and only one-half mile to the east of Ivan is reported in the lime and ready for a shot but it, like all others, is awaiting company orders.

The Corbett No. 1, three-fourths of a mile to the south is drilling at 3000 feet and the company anticipates bringing it in by the first of the week. This is an off set to the 1400 barrel Martin well.

The Breckenridge field may be properly accredited as the New Tulsa of the South. The daily production still gives her the centre of the stage, but we never miss the water till the well runs dry is an old appellation that we may rightfully use without doing violence to Breckenridge, inasmuch as the vast number of drilling operations must necessarily shorten the life of this great pool.

Wise men learn but fools never do and so shrewd oil men are taking opportunity by the forelock and pushing their operations right on toward the heart of Ivan, the next big pool to be brought in.

As a further verification of this fact the town is almost encircled by production already which easily accounts for her rapid development at this time and assures her of a greater degree of permanency than many oil towns. In fact Ivan has a brilliant future since the town's growth is based upon the oil activities and developments in like ratio.

Now if you want to grow pork or beef you must grow it quick, the same may be true for the truck gardener. If he wants his vegetables crisp and tender he must force their growth, but this rule must be limited in its application. The ideal condition is the one approaching nearest

to normal. Sometimes I have plucked seemingly the largest ears of corn from my garden only to find when I had stripped down the shuck a cob covered with smut. The cause was easy and simple. The abnormal conditions under which the plant grew was the underlying cause. Just so with towns. There must be some real basis which accounts for the origin of every town as well as its growth. It may be where two roads intersect, it may be agriculture, livestock, coal, oil or any other resource that contributes to the wealth of the country, but unless one or more of these be there the life of the town can not be prolonged for any definite time.

Ivan could have no hopes of making a town from an oil standpoint if she tried to build it on a record of dry holes. True, there could be an occasional one as is the case in every oil field, but so far let it be said in order to keep the records straight, not a single dry hole can be found on the South, the West, or the North. The East remains to be more fully explored.

These reasons furnish an abiding hope for Ivan in the minds of big oil operators and this confidence is reflected in the solid growth of the town. Hence Ivan can not be classed as a boom town of the mush-room variety. She has not attired herself in bridal attire over night to don her grave clothes as many others have in the past few months and as others will do in the near future.

The location of a town is a strong bid for prolonging its life. Ivan is a cross-roads town and almost midway between two thriving towns, Breckenridge and Graham. It is not perched upon a mountain top nor chucked in a hole where you have to back out to get out.

Another outstanding feature of the town's development is that it is composed of a modest set that are not trying to run ahead of the procession to get the spectators to gaze upon them instead of the own with its various activities surrounding it. Why, scarcely a day passes by that some big interests make a survey of the town, select a location while the 'geef, in's good'.

Another hopeful sign is that the town is not too busy booming real estate but that they are able to hit the bull's eye when it comes to putting over a business proposition along business lines and business methods. As an illustration, the Chamber of Commerce with only three weeks' training pulled off a stunt that

startle some towns of two or even three times the population of Ivan. At this meeting they arranged for a permanent water supply and did it in less time than it would take to sit down and talk it over. The reason was simple. They went coked and primed to put it over and they did.

They had a written proposition from R. O. Moore of Breckenridge, Texas to furnish the town with water. The proposition was met and the contractor agreed to have water flowing through the mains of Ivan at the rate of 350,000 gallons every 24 hours into a 5000 barrel reservoir to be located on Finley's point that will not only supply plenty of water for the domestic needs of the town but for fire emergencies as well, besides furnishing the drilling operations about the town and adjacent territory, which is so badly needed at this time.

In conclusion we might add that Ivan has been appraised of the fact that she is to become a tributary to a much closer and better point of distribution than either Graham or Breckenridge. Well, she has accepted the ultimatum with much grace and kindness of spirit as the Kaiser's forces acceded to the terms of the allies, but being of a resourceful nature they are negotiating for "air craft supplies" inasmuch as this will be the most accessible route to this new locus of all points, which all reminds us of the moral brought out in the story of the convention of wild animals which ran like this: The meeting was in full blast but was brought to a halt by the appearance of a huge lion on the crest of the hill coming at full speed and leaving a cloud of dust behind. In another moment the meeting would have ended by the panic, but the lion raised his head and opened his mouth as if to give off a tremendous roar, but instead it was he-ha! he-ha! When some better acquainted with the lion's habits, remarked, that if he had kept his "darned" mouth shut he might have been able to get the center of the stage and keep it.

BOND ELECTION FOR \$150,000 TO BE CALLED SOON

The City Council will probably ask for a bond issue of \$150,000 in connection with the construction of additional reservoir dam on Salt Creek and extension of water and sewer mains to new additions of the city, it was stated last week by Mayor E. TOLL BRIDGE WILL BE BUILT ACROSS FORK OF BRAZOS

INCOME TAX FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Births, deaths, and marriages during the year 1920 affect materially income tax returns for that year. Millions of babies were added to family circles, each of whom brings an exemption of \$200 in the parents' income tax return.

Widows and widowers who lost their husbands or wives during the year are especially affected. They are single for the purposes of the income tax law and are granted only an exemption of \$1,000 unless the head of a family.

Persons who were divorced or separated by mutual agreement during the year also must consider themselves as single persons.

The status of the taxpayer on December 31, 1920, determines the amount of the exemptions. If on that day the taxpayer was married and living with wife or husband, claim may be made for the \$2,000 exemption. If single, or married and not living with wife or husband on December 31, the exemption is only \$1,000.

Persons who reached majority during the year and whose earnings for that period amounted to \$1,000 or more, or \$2,000 or more, according to their marital status, must file a return and pay a tax on their net income in excess of those amounts.

To avoid penalty, the return must be in the hands of the Collector of Internal Revenue for the district in which the taxpayer lives, or has his principal place of business, on or before midnight of March 15, 1921.

SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE

Austin, Feb. 7th.—A house concurrent resolution was introduced in the house this morning by Representative Baldwin of Lubbock, Pope of Nueces and twenty-four other representatives, providing for submitting the proposition of moving the University of Texas to a vote of the people of Texas, the election to be held in July, 1922. It proposes to determine a permanent location for the university in either Austin or some other city of Texas.

2,750 RABBITS ARE KILLED BY YOUNG COUNTY HUNTERS

What is thought to have been the record rabbit kill in Young county took place a few days ago near Ingleside when seventy-five hunters killed a total of 2,750 cotton-tails during a three-day hunt. The hunt took place within a radius of three miles of Ingleside. It is estimated that about 6,000 rounds were fired and that 90 per cent of all rabbits seen were killed.

During the first day's hunt only 350 rabbits were shot. The next day the hunters were better prepared and they bagged a total of 1,000. During the last day's shoot they slew a total of 1,400, which is considered a record for one day's hunt.

It is thought that there will be a shortage of rabbits around Ingleside for the next few months.

UNIVERSITY REMOVAL ENDORSED BY STUDENTS

Austin, Texas, Feb. 8th.—A petition over twenty-five yards in length and signed by 2,461 students of the University of Texas endorsing the proposal of the Board of Regents and urging the removal of the University to the Brackenridge site, will be presented to the legislature by prominent students of the institution who circulated the petition. At the time the petition was circulated opportunity was given also for students opposed to the removal to record that fact. The record showed, on final count, 2,461 for and 220 against removal. It is regarded as significant that the students signing the petition for removal represent 214 counties over the state, and that the

count would indicate strong approval on the part of students from all parts of the state, with the possible exception of those of Austin, where the chief opposition has been manifested. Of the students recording opposition to the proposal, 40 per cent gave their place of residence as Austin. However, more than half the students from Travis county, most of whom reside in Austin, signed the petition favoring removal.

TREE PLANTING TIME

February is a fine month for planting or re-setting trees. We should not forget our civic duties in our rapid growth. If there was ever a time when our citizens should plant trees and flowers it is this spring. The city has doubled in size since last spring. This being true, thousands of trees, shrubs and flowers should be put out.

The good rains during the fall and winter have put the ground in fine condition for tree planting and our people should use the month of February in putting out their shade trees.

Graham has always been noted for its cleanliness and beauty and now as it is fast becoming a city our citizens should not neglect their civic duties. While we are planting trees and flowers around our homes let us not forget the parks in the city. The ladies of the Civic League are interested in the parks and the citizens generally should help them this spring.

REDUCE AND DIVERSIFY OR FACE DISASTER

Dallas, Texas, February 5th—Texas farmers, bankers and merchants are facing a crisis in the business of the State, and it seems certain that unless a drastic reduction of at least 50 per cent in the cotton crop is made, the bitter experiences of the past harvest season will not only be repeated but will be intensified next fall, according to a bulletin of the Texas Industrial Congress.

Reports to the Congress from correspondents in various parts of the State indicate that in many cases farmers are not contemplating a reduction in the cotton acreage of even one-third, as has been generally recommended.

The experience of the past has shown that where a reduction of one-third has been urged the actual reduction has been about 10 per cent of the previous year's crop.

The bare facts lead to the conclusion that a 50 per cent reduction in this year's acreage is not too great.

The 1920 crop amounted to 13,000,000 bales. With no market abroad and a lessened consumption at home, there is every probability of a carry-over of from seven to eight million bales. A normal acreage this year, therefore, and a favorable season, will swamp the South.

There is no market for cotton because Europe is already well supplied or has not sufficient credit to purchase the crop still on hand.

Farmers who produced a crop last year on credit are in still worse condition today, because their indebtedness has not been liquidated, and hence the banker and merchant under these circumstances can not be expected to extend the usual credit for making his year's crop, even if they were inclined to do so. From expressions received from a number of bankers and merchants it is believed that they will regard with favor the use by the farmer of such credit resources as he may have in growing a variety of crops and in the production of hogs and cattle for the consumption of the forage crops which he can raise.

We are now confronted with the choice of reducing the cotton acreage, severely, and raising a diversity of crops, or of facing business disaster next fall.

SPECIAL BLANKS FOR FARMERS' INCOME TAX

Thousands of farmers whose net income for 1920 equaled or exceeded the exemptions of \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,000 for married persons will be required to file on or before March 15, 1921, income tax returns for the year 1920.

As an aid to farmers the Bureau of Internal Revenue has prepared a special form, 1040F, for recording sales of live stock, produce, and a summary of income and expenses. This form should be attached to the taxpayer's individual return on Form 1040 or 1040A. Full instructions for making out the forms are contained in each.

Under gross income a farmer is required to include all proceeds derived from the sale of farm products whether produced on a farm or purchased for resale. When he exchanges his produce for groceries, clothing, or other merchandise he must include in his income the value of the articles received and exchanged. Profits received from the sale of farm land or rent received for the use thereof must also be included.

Net Income
In determining his net income, upon which the tax is assessed, the farmer may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the operation of his farm during the year. These include cost of cultivation, harvesting and marketing of his crops, the cost

of seed and fertilizer used, amount spent in repair to farm buildings other than the dwelling, and to fences and machinery. The cost of farm tools used up in the course of the year, wages paid to employees other than domestic servants, and rent paid for farm land and buildings (other than dwelling) are deductible items.

Farmers who keep no records or only records of cash receipts and disbursements should make their returns on the basis of actual receipts, but farmers who keep complete accounts and who take inventories at the beginning and end of the year to determine their profits should report on the accrual basis. Both methods are fully explained on Form 1040F, copies of which may be obtained from the offices of collectors of internal revenue.

SOUTH BEND MAN PAYS AN ALLEGED BUNCO MAN \$1000

What is said by officers to be the slickest and most brazen skin game yet brought to their attention in Young county, was worked Friday at South Bend by an alleged quack eye specialist. B. F. Scott, aged 76, and well known citizen in that community, reported he was fleeced of \$1,000 in the deal. Mr. Scott, who is afflicted with weak eyes, charges a Dr. Evans with performing a fake operation for cataract and with collecting \$1,000 as a fee for his "professional services."

R. E. Meisner, who is said to be a prominent citizen of Houston, became involved through a dice game with Dr. Evans, during which he is said to have won a portion of the \$1,000 which had been paid Evans by Mr. Scott through checks issued on a bank at South Bend and on the First National Bank at Graham. Evans is said to have indorsed the checks over to Meisner, the latter later cashing them at the First National Bank. Meisner, who disclaims any responsibility in connection with the affair, other than gambling with Evans, was arrested Friday and released on \$2,000 bond. No trace of Evans has been found.

In relating the story Saturday afternoon, Mr. Scott said Evans called at his home and offered to sell him a pair of spectacles. After testing out several pairs of glasses, Mr. Scott said Evans told him he had a cataract growth on his eyes, which could be remedied only through an operation. He then represented himself as a specialist from St. Louis. Mr. Scott said, and told him he could perform the operation, but that having no license to practice in this state Mr. Scott would have to keep the matter quiet.

"Then before I knew what he was doing," said Mr. Scott, "he began gouging in my eyes and removing something. I didn't know what he did, but it seemed to me I could see a little better. The man cautioned me not to say anything about the operation."

"After he had finished the operation I asked him how much I owed him, and he said \$1,000. Well, I do not know how I came to do it nor why, but I gave the man two checks—one for \$465 and the other for \$500. I paid him the balance of the \$1,000 in cash.

"Evans then went to the South Bend bank and attempted to cash the checks. The cashier refused to let him have the money, after which he returned to my house and told me he couldn't get the checks cashed. I then offered to go to the bank with him, but he made an excuse by saying he had to see another party. But instead of seeing another party he got into an automobile and went to Graham.

"I got to thinking the matter over and pretty soon I arrived at the conclusion that I had been duped. I got on the telephone then and attempted to stop payment on the checks but was informed by the bank at Graham that the checks had already been cashed."

Officers are now searching for Dr. Evans, but so far no trace of his whereabouts has been found.

BUICK AUTOMOBILE IN SHERIFF'S POSSESSION

Who is the owner of a perfectly good Buick automobile?

Sheriff John Saye is now asking himself this question. Several days ago a man secured permission from H. H. Chism to store the car in a garage on South Cherry street. After the car had remained there for several days Dr. Chism became suspicious and reported the matter to the sheriff. An investigation disclosed, according to Mr. Saye, that some sort of acid had been placed on the engine to eat the numbers out. The sheriff took possession of the car and moved it to a garage. Dr. Chism later reported that the man had returned secretly for the car. When he saw that it had been removed he took the lock from the garage and disappeared, Dr. Chism said.

BOGUS "RANGERS" HIGH-JACK SOUTH BEND GAMBLERS

Two hi-jackers, posing as state rangers, rounded up about seventy alleged gamblers at South Bend on Tuesday night, January 4, and collected "fines" aggregating \$1,200. So smooth did these hi-jackers work that it was two days before the real truth of the matter was known. The men even went to the Chamber of Commerce where Deputy Sheriff Charles Hoffman was attending a meeting and prevailed upon him to assist them in their work.

The hi-jackers drew their revolvers, entered the gambling hall and informed their prisoners they could choose between paying fines or going to jail. Many paid their fines promptly and those released set about securing the release of others, according to information reaching here last week from South Bend.

SPEECH OF MARVIN JONES IN HOUSE

"It is very interesting to study the cost of the various wars in which the United States has been engaged. The estimated costs of the wars of the United States are as follows:

War in 1812\$ 120,000,000
With Mexico, 1846-48	174,000,000
Civil War, 1861-65	3,500,000,000
With Spain, 1898	1,900,000,000
World War, 1917-18	24,010,000,000

The \$24,000,000,000 cost of the World War does not include loans to the Allies and other activities. The total cost of the World War to all nations has been conservatively estimated at about \$200,000,000,000. If property and other indirect losses are included the amount would reach the enormous total of \$300,000,000,000.

Dr. Edgar B. Rosa, Chief Physician of the Bureau of Standards, declares that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, 92.8 per cent of our total expenditures were for wars and the result of wars.

For the four years, 1914 to 1918, the armament and military expenditures of this country has cost each man, woman and child \$130.00, which does not include the \$24,000,000,000 spent for the World War. I believe this country should reduce its military appropriations to the lowest possible amount consistent with national protection. If any nation on the face of the earth is in a position from an economic point of view, from a military point of view, or from the standpoint of prestige to set an example it is the United States of America.

In 94, prior to the World War the peace time strength of Germany's standing army was 870,000 men, and she had a reserve force of five million trained men. The standing army of France was 783,000 men; Russia, 1,500,000; Austria, 431,000; Italy, 306,000; Great Britain, 262,000; Turkey, 230,000.

I have always observed that a "pistol toting" man will sooner or later get into a fight. Evidently that applies to nations. The South American Republics have practically no peace time military strength, and they have not had any wars to account to anything for many years. In 1914 Argentina had a peace time army of 18,000; Chile, 1,000; Peru, 6,000; Venezuela, 9,000; Bolivia, 3,000; Columbia 5,000; while in Europe even little Bulgaria had a peace time army of 65,700.

During the last hundred years Europe has had about 40 wars and during the same period no wars of any consequence have occurred in South America. Europe has had these vast armies and the South American countries have lived in peace. They have had small armies. Moreover, at the time mentioned the European nations, except Great Britain, had universal military training and service; while none of the South American countries, with the exception of Argentina, had military training and even her training did not include universal service. If we are to have military establishments with equipment bristling over the face of the whole earth we are going to have war.

Is death the end of all this struggle? Is destruction to be the paramount purpose of mankind? Are the engines of desolation to continue to call for the major activities of man? If so, there is no bow on life's dark cloud and no star of hope in the firmament of the future.

There is no royal road to peace through a lane of bristling bayonets along which great armies may march in regal splendor to the tunes of martial music."

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Young, Texas, to be held at Graham and Olney on March 12, 1921, to fill the position of rural carrier at Jean, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-named county. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 24 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointment unless they are the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty. Form No. 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington, D. C. at the earliest practicable date.

GOVERNOR SIGNS DELINQUENT TAX PAYMENT ORDER

Austin, Texas, Jan. 31.—The house bill postponing the publication of delinquent tax lists of October 15, and reducing the penalty from five per cent for failure to pay 1920 taxes by January 31, 1921, was signed today by the governor. It was the first general bill signed by Neff.

Failure to pass the bill by the necessary two-thirds vote of the senate will make the act effective ninety days after adjournment.

Members of the legislature doubt whether this new law will grant relief, as intended, because it is not effective immediately.
