## HAMON PROSECUTORS EXPECT ACQUITTAL

### DRIVE FOR SCHOOL FUNDS WILL BE PUT ON AT ELIASVILLE

A drive for funds necessary to carry on the public schools in Eliasville for the full nine months, will be launched this week and is stated that the volunteer pledges already booked in advance of the drive by loyal citizens practically insure the success of the effort. When the scolastic census was taken for this year's appropriation there were very few people in Eliasville and the subsequent great number of children entering the school made it necessary to employ additional teachers with the result that without additional assistance the school could not complete the nine months' term.

James Gilmartin, secretary of the Eliasville Chamber of Commerce, has been appointed a delegate from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to attend the Ninth Annual Convention of the United States Chamber of Commerce of Washington, D. C., to be held in Atlantic City April 27.

### GRAHAM WILL HAVE NEW UNION DEPOT FARMER ANNOUNCES

Fort Worth, Mar. 15.—Graham, newly established oil center, is to have a new passenger station, J. G. Farmer, general passenger agent of the Rock Island, announced Monday.

According to Farmer, the station will be built jointly by the Rock Island and the Wichita Falls & Southern, Frank Kell's line, and work on the erection will be started at an early date.

The station is one of a number of joint facilities to be erected by the Rock Island and Wichita Falls & Southern.

General improvements in facilities at Graham to properly handle the increased business at that point are now being made by the Rock Island.

Many miles of sidetracks have already been constructed, according to Farmer, and others are now in course of construction. In addition to these a large addition to the freight house at that point is nearing completion and will be ready for use in a short time.

Several extra trains, both freight and passenger service, have been added, connecting Graham and Fort Worth.

The Wichita Falls & Southern is now building to Graham from Newcastle and will also build from Graham to South Bend and Eliasville and on over to Jimkurn, connecting there with the Jake Hamon line.

Arrangements will soon be completed to run through trains into Breckenridge and the Rock Island, in connection with the new line, will have the shortest line between Fort Worth and Breckenridge.

### CONSTRUCTION WORK ON MORRISON HOTEL IS NOW UNDER WAY

Actual construction work on the Morrison Hotel, located on North Oak street, was started this afternoon. The foundation already has been completed and the lumber framed. All materials for construction of the building are on the ground or else en route, according to G. H. T. Washburn, architect and superintendent. The building will cover a space of 75x78 feet, will cost when completed about \$75,000 and is expected to be completed within the next sixty days.

A party wall will be built on the north side of the building for another structure which it is understood will be erected in the near future by the John E. Morrison Company.

### LEGION COMPLETES PLANS FOR COMING SPRING FESTIVAL

Members of the local post of the American Legion at a meeting last night at the court house perfected further plans for the Legion festival which will be held here during the week of March 21-26 inclusive. The Frisco Exposition Shows, which will show on the streets around the court house square, are expected to draw hundreds from all over the county during the week.

One big feature in connection with the festival will be the monster parade which the local post will stage on Monday, March 21, at 5 p. m. Every ex-service man in the county and city is requested to be present to take part in the affair. All the business establishments in this city will be closed and everybody is expected to turn out to witness the spectacle. The business houses will be decorated.

On Saturday night, the last day of the festival, a Dodge touring car will be given away to the holder of the lucky number which will be obtained through the purchase of tickets. These tickets will be on sale at all business houses in the city.

The purpose of the festival is to raise money with which to build a community house where the local post can have a meeting place. A certain amount of the proceeds taken in by the Frisco Shows will go for this purpose, and a large amount is expected to be raised.

The American Legion members expect to do their full share in helping to build the future Graham.

### OIL DEVELOPMENT IS SPURRED ON BY GOOD WEATHER THIS WEEK

Spurred by spring weather and the near completion of the pipe line connections of the Prairie Company, development work in Young county is taking on a new impetus. The increased activity has been reflected in Graham this week by the number of new arrivals here and by the heavy traffic to and from the fields.

The O. P. G. No. 3 M. K. Graham has increased its flow from 200 to 600 barrels after being drilled one foot deeper into the sand yesterday.

The Shamrock Company yesterday put the finishing touches to their 55,000-gallon tank which is located on the Stovall Plantation. The tank cost approximately \$20,000.

Building of a rig has been started by the O. P. & G. Company on their No. 2 Keller, while on their No. 2 McCluskey everything is in readiness to spud in.

A rig has been completed on the Hedrick-Spoons No. 3, while Vandervort & Seale are shut down at a depth of 1,640 feet.

The Miami Company's well is fishing at a depth of 4,537 feet. The well is reported to have put some 16 inches of oil into a storage tank last Monday night.

Activity still continues to grow in the Burger district. The Barnes Production Company has timber on the ground for a rig and expect to spud in about April 1.

### Sidewalk Is Completed On North Elm Street

The last section of the sidewalk on the west side of North Elm street between Fourth street and the depot, has been concreted with the exception of streets and alleys. This now gives a good sidewalk from Fourth street to the Rock Island station.

### Teams Busy Filling Mud Holes on Square

Teams and men are now busy at work filling up the mud holes around the square, caused by the recent rains. The city tractor is also busy grading and putting the streets of the city in better condition.

### OLD JAIL BUILDING CONDEMNED BY STATE OFFICER YESTERDAY

Following an inspection of the county jail yesterday, Dr. Johnson of the State Health Department condemned the building as being unsafe and unsanitary and recommended that a new building be constructed at once.

When asked about the matter this morning, County Judge Reeves said the question of a new jail had been up before the Commissioners' court from time to time during the last few months but no definite action had been taken as there was a division of opinion among members of the court.

As the county last year voted down a bond issue asked by the Commissioners' Court for the purpose of building a new jail, the court now lacks the money with which to put up a new building.

There is no question in the minds of county officials but what a new jail will have to be built, and they say the people of Young county must be made to understand this at once. It has been necessary for Sheriff Saye to make arrangements with other counties to care for Young county prisoners, as the present jail building, long ago condemned, was rendered totally unfit Monday when four prisoners, and a narrow run-through the wooden floor of the building and made their escape.

There is only two small cells in the building, capable of caring for four prisoners, and a narrow dun-around. It has been necessary to bed prisoners in the courtroom for the last few months.

That some action will be taken in the matter at an early date was stated today by Judge Reeves, who expressed his regret that the people have failed to bring a strong petition before the court demanding a new jail. There are two courses open to the court to raise money—namely, a bond issue or the issuance of county warrants. It is generally conceded that the last method would be the best and quickest, because the court would not then have to go before the people with a bond issue.

### FISHERMEN FLOCK TO LAKE CITY IN ORDER TO ENJOY THE SPORT

Lake City, Mar. 15.—In addition to the tourists and prospectors that visit Lake City every day there are now hundreds of people from the surrounding country that flock to the town almost every afternoon in quest of the rare fishing sport at the big lake. Many catches have been made and almost every fisherman is satisfied with his luck. But on account of the large number that angled for profit the owners of the lake have found it expedient to charge a fee of fifty cents for each person for every day they enjoy the sport of Isaac Walton. This arrangement is a check on the rapidly decreasing supply of fish and is approved by the sportsmen.

Good progress is reported at all the wells drilling around Lake City and a number of new rigs indicate increased activity in that field.

All business men report business gradually growing better and there is generally an optimistic view as to the future of Lake City.

### Foundation Finished For New Warehouse

The concrete foundation for the Waples-Platter Wholesale Company's warehouse, located on Cherry street near the depot, has been completed and the erection of the building is expected to start at once. The building will cover a space of 75x100 feet and will be located next to the Goodner Wholesale Grocer Company's warehouse.

### DODGE TOURING CAR WILL BE GIVEN AT LEGION FESTIVAL

### ELIASVILLE TO HAVE ELECTION TO SELECT MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

Eliasville, Mar. 15.—In the matter of the selection of city officers for the recently incorporated city of Eliasville the citizens' ticket will have the following named gentlemen before the public: A. A. Wisdom, Mayor; Sau Lothian, alderman, Jordan Heights ward; G. E. Neff, College Heights ward; Earl Smith, business section ward; and Donnell Ward representative not yet selected. These gentlemen are popular and their names will make the ticket a strong one. It is reported that there may be another ticket in the field.

In the "clean up" campaign during health week at Eliasville under the direction of Dr. Moseley this week, the Chamber of Commerce donated good cash prizes to boys and girls that gathered the greatest number of tin cans. For the girls prizes, Miss Lillian Tribble gathered 4811 cans for first money and Miss Edna Glover won second prize with 3174. The boys, of course, did not work as hard, but J. C. Evans gathered 1957 cans and was awarded first prize, while John Baker followed for a close second money with 1737. A total of 21,266 mosquito breeding places were destroyed during the day by all the boys and girls.

### Testimony In Murder Trial Is Completed This Morning; Case Will Reach Jury Soon

Judge Champion Orders Recess Until 3 O'Clock This Afternoon In Order to Prepare His Instructions To The Jury

COURTHOUSE, ARDMORE, OKLA., Mar. 16.—Testimony in the trial of Clara Smith Hamon, charged with the murder of Jake L. Hamon, oil king and Republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, was completed this morning at 10:22 o'clock. Judge Champion recessed court until 3 o'clock this afternoon to give himself time to prepare his instructions to the jury and to allow attorneys time to prepare their final arguments.

### IMPROVEMENT IN THE WATERWORKS SYSTEM URGED BY ENGINEER

Important improvements in the waterworks system of Graham were outlined today in an interview by J. S. Barlow, of the engineering firm of Henry Exall Elrod Company of Dallas, consulting engineers for the city of Graham, who recently drew up the waterworks. In discussing these improvements, Mr. Barlow said:

"Graham needs a high-pressure fire line and alternate pumping equipment in order that the city may never be without fire protection."

"The city of Graham is urgently in need of an increased water supply."

"The steps taken by the city for repairing, and raising the present dam will give the city an immediate increase and is the best method of immediate increasing the supply."

"The city is urgently in need of fire protection that will be provided by the construction of a main supply line and the installation of additional pumping equipment and new fire lines in the unprotected business district."

"An enlargement of the present filtration plant by the construction of an addition thereto is also imperative."

"If the present plans of the city for the enlargement of this plant are carried out the city will have a filtered water, properly sterilized and clarified, for domestic and industrial purposes."

"The city requires additional storage capacity that may be provided by plans now under consideration. A supply ample to take care of the city's requirements for years to come for a very reasonable expenditure may be had."

"The rapid growth of the city in the immediate vicinity of the present disposal plant makes its removal imperative."

"Plans of the city for an enlargement of this plant and removal more remote from habitation will conform to State laws and be in keeping with the best municipal practice."

"Sewer extension into the recently built up sections of the city are urgently needed and form a part of the present city plans."

"All of the present plans of the city are units in a permanent city plan, thus insuring economical use of city funds."

### Foundation Work On New Brick Building

Preparations are now being made to lay the foundation for the new two-story brick building which will be erected on the east side of the square, next to the Graham-land office, by Smith and Smiley. Excavation work is now well under way.

### FIVE PERSONS BURNED TO DEATH IN SLEEPER

Denver, Colo., Mar. 15.—Five persons were burned to death today when fire destroyed a Pullman car on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad at Washingtonburg.

Prosecutor Freezing will not ask the death penalty, feeling that there is more chance of securing a conviction if a lighter penalty is asked. The case is expected to reach the jury late tonight or early tomorrow morning. The prosecution expects an acquittal, it was learned here today.

Sam Blair, newspaper man who interviewed Clara in Mexico, was the first witness today. Clara had denied parts of his interview.

Evlyn Daniels of Denison, Texas, chauffeur who drove Clara on her flight from Denison to Dallas, testified she had a pistol in her possession then.

Rosa Cannon, Hamon's nurse, denied she heard Jake Hamon make a dying declaration that Clara shot him deliberately.

### SEVERAL THOUSAND FEET WATER PIPE IS NOW AT SOUTH BEND

South Bend, Mar. 14.—Several thousand feet of four-inch pipe to be used as water mains, arrived in South Bend Saturday and will be laid right away. Work on the water storage tank has begun and will be rushed to completion. It is thought the water service plant will be complete as to the business part of the town within sixty days.

Considerable enthusiasm is manifested in the matter of a local baseball team. The ball ground has been selected in the east part of the town-site and is being gotten in shape for early practice.

The ladies of South Bend are preparing the organization of a Civic League and have a long list of civic work to be taken up in connection with the local Chamber of Commerce for the good of the town.

It is stated in South Bend that since the oil boom hit the town there has not been a murder or a hold-up in the limits of the townsite. Credit is given to the local police force that is provided by the citizens, and to the fact that almost the entire citizenship of the town is composed of reliable and responsible people.

### Building Operations At Harding Increase

Harding, Mar. 16.—Building operations at Harding seem to be on the increase—this week as is evidenced by several new business houses under construction. S. Abraham is building a market and hotel adjoining a small lumber yard recently established. Buckingham & Putnam are building for a general merchandise business, while W. Barnett is erecting a building for a grocery store. Mr. Klump, recently of Jacksboro, is beginning the erection of a building to be used as a machine shop, and Mr. Armstrong of Iowa is building a substantial two-story building to be occupied as a garage and rooming house.

The new restaurant opened for business last Saturday in Harding by Mr. Armstrong and associates is an appreciated addition to the business life of the town. It is the first restaurant to get in business in the city.

**PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM LOCAL JAIL BUILDING FIRED**

What is thought by officers to have been a deliberate attempt to destroy the county jail by setting fire to the building was made early this morning by four prisoners who sawed their way out of the jail and made their escape. Four other prisoners confined in the jail discovered the blaze in a pile of trash in the rear of the stove, and being without water one of the men seized a partly filled coffee pot and dashed the contents over the blaze and extinguished it. The four men who made their escape were Joe Palmer, charged with theft of an automobile; G. J. Smith, serving a six months' road sentence for vagrancy; Charles Mitchell, charged with carrying concealed weapons, and J. B. Baker, accused of theft.

The men converted an ordinary table knife into a saw which was used in cutting a hole through the wooden floor in the upper story. They escaped through this hole to the lower floor and thence through a door to the outside.

Four other prisoners who remained behind declared they were ignorant of what had happened until they were aroused from sleep and saw the blazing trash. They made no effort to escape. Officers believe the other prisoners set fire to the building just before making their escape. No trace of the men has been found.

**FAITH EXPRESSED  
IN POSSIBILITIES  
OF BUNGER FIELD**

Many people are of the opinion that the Bunger district is soon to be developed into a producing territory from the wells now being drilled there. Those who have gone into the merits of the locality from a geological standpoint find the result commensurate with their expectation. The deductions after a correlation of the wells from the South Bend field, five miles west, with those drilled to the east and southeast, prove conclusively that the same producing sands exist in the Bunger district. This leaves the matter reduced as to how much oil will be procured at a given point which in turn depends upon the accumulative area.

The Bunger locality has laid dormant the past couple of years from mismanagement in drilling the Lisle well which was the first attempt to open the territory. The upper sands encountered in this well were never tested although being prolific with oil and gas.

A study of the Bunger conditions will reveal a pronounced upfolding of the country that is most significant to oil men as well as geologists. As one drives past Survey 44 where a well is rust being started by the Barnes Production Company he will be impressed with its similarity to Ranger.

From Bunger the Askew well, 2 1/2 miles south, can plainly be seen and the results to be obtained there will have a large bearing on the general locality. This well is now about 1100 feet deep with a large hole. The State well, 2 1/2 miles to the southwest, has reached a depth of 960 feet. Both of these wells are being drilled by the Union Oil Company of Ne-

Every feature of the work is open to the public without charge and it is to be hoped that every one will avail himself of this opportunity of gaining some first hand information in regard to the work of Young county's public schools.

### O. B. COLQUITT AND ASSOCIATES GIVEN A PERMIT TO DRILL

Former Governor O. B. Colquitt and associates have been granted permission to drill four wells in the bed of the Clear Fork of the Brazos in an opinion handed down at Austin last Tuesday by Judge Saddles, representing the Texas Railroad Commission. The Roxana Company has appealed to the full commission and the case is set for hearing next Monday, Mr. Colquitt said today.

The suit grows out of an application of Mr. Colquitt and associates to drill twenty-eight wells in the river bed, the application being opposed by several companies and individuals who own leases adjoining the river bed. A hearing was recently held here before Judge Saddler, the final decision being handed down at Austin. In his opinion Judge Saddler granted permission for the drilling of four wells offsetting the O. P. & G. and Shamrock.

### BILL CREATING NEW JUDICIAL DISTRICT IN HANDS OF NEFF

The Binkley bill proposing the creation of a separate judicial district for Young, Clay and Archer counties now is in the hands of the Governor and it may be some days before he acts on it, according to information received in Graham. Additional information concerning the number of cases on the district court docket has been furnished the Governor by District Clerk Willie Riggs. Under the bill Wichita county would form the 30th judicial district with the present judge and the district attorney filling the offices there. Should the bill be signed by the Governor, it will be necessary for him to appoint a special judge and district attorney to fill the vacancies in this district until the next election.

### REV. TAYLOR WRITES ON RELIGIOUS NEEDS OF FUTURE GRAHAM

Having been asked to write an article on the churches for the first issue of the Daily Leader, I gladly comply. First, let me say that the fact that we are to have a daily paper in Graham is a forcible reminder of the recent growth of the city. We have been rapidly leaving the small town class for the small city class. This great influx of population has created new problems and brought new responsibilities for our churches. The biggest asset that Graham has had in the past was her churches. These made Graham a good place to make a home, and attracted a class of citizens with high ideals. It ought to be our ambition to see that our churches keep pace with the growth of Graham along other lines. This will require adequate houses of worship. No church can accomplish the maximum service to a community without room for a modern up-to-date Sunday school. That means ample room to take care of all whom it is possible to enlist in its Sunday school limited room in a church building means limited growth in Sunday school and congregations. Some of the churches in Graham must build or practically stand still. It is a tragedy for church people not to provide these buildings. They will be paying investments.

Graham churches ought to be aggressively evangelistic all this time. The large numbers who are not professors and who are not affiliated with any church ought to challenge the zeal of the pastors and members. God has given us a rare opportunity to seek the lost. We should preach an old-time gospel with old-time fervor. It will attract the people to our churches as nothing else will.

Again our churches ought to be militant against lawlessness, and vice, and every form of amusement which is a menace to the morals of our people. Already it has been hinted that we are to have Sunday baseball next season. The moral forces of Graham ought to let it be known at one time that this will not be without a fight. The preachers and church members must lead the attack against these evils which menace us. In other words, it is the business of the churches to stand for law and order and a high standard in social life. I contend that we do not have to turn our town over to the devil because we have grown a little lately. The churches ought to fight the devil wherever he bobs up. This is imperative in Graham at this time. This is the way to keep our ideals high and our town a good place to live in.

The churches must not forget the unfortunate in our midst. Jesus said, "the poor ye have always" and to these the churches must be first to extend heartfelt sympathy and a helping hand. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these ye have done it unto Me." By all means let us see that our churches are the liveliest, most wide-awake, active institutions in Graham. This will require time, thought, prayers, money and loyalty upon the part of our church people. Let every one who put first things first, rally to the churches.

### COMPLAINT AGAINST HAGGARD DISMISSED AT BRECKENRIDGE

Wichita Falls, Mar. 12.—The complaint against H. H. Haggard, Wichita oil operator, in which he was charged with theft of oil pipe in Stephens county, was dismissed on motion of the state when the hearing was held in Justice W. J. Cunningham's court at Breckenridge Friday. Mr. Haggard returned from Breckenridge Saturday bringing with him a certified copy of the ruling of the court. A copy of the order follows: "This day this cause came on to be heard when the state appeared by her district attorney W. J. Cunningham, and the defendant, H. H. Haggard, appeared in person and by counsel, and each party announced ready for trial, whereupon counsel for the state suggested to the court that it was not in possession of any evidence to connect the defendant, H. H. Haggard, with the theft charged against him, and asked leave of the court to dismiss the case, which permission was granted by the court.

"It is therefore ordered, adjudged

and decreed by the court that said cause be and the same is hereby dismissed, and that the defendant go hence without delay, and be not further held in connection with this matter."

Mr. Haggard says that he is still pushing an investigation of the note left in his car Friday night which led to the belief that he had been murdered. He said that one of the parties under suspicion of perpetrating the hoax had left town.

### Graham Refinery To Be Completed Soon

Satisfactory progress is being made in the work of constructing the Graham Refinery, located at South Bend, according to J. J. Kilgore, president, who was in Graham today. The refinery, which will have a capacity of 500 barrels daily, is expected to be completed within the next twenty-five days.

"As soon as the time is ripe we expect to erect a large refinery in Graham," Mr. Kilgore said.

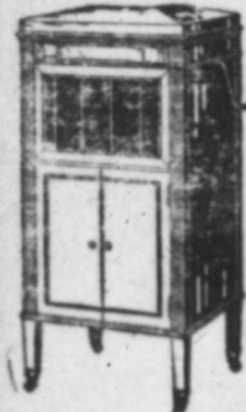
