Just what the prospect for an increase in the price of crude is, The Leader is not in position to say, but we do know that the premiums paid by some companies have stimulated drilling in Young county.

The famous South Bend field ten miles southwest of Graham has at all times had considerable activity but new deals recently have added new interest there. New locations, new rigs, new wells every week is the program in South Bend.

The popular Bunger district is becoming active with much material on the road which shows that there will be many tests in that section this fall. This field is only six miles south of Graham.

Oil is being taken regularly from the Owen well by the Texas Company whose pipe line reached this well last week. The completion of the line to this field after the coming in of the Owen well attracted a great deal of attention from oil men every where. Considerable acreage has changed hands at fancy prices.

The company is now ready to furnish all the rigs in the Bunger field. The Bunger field now has a 4-inch pipe line, a gas line, and a water system. This is rapid progress for a field that has really been proved only three weeks. Of course it has been known for some time that this would be a good field but the Owen well came in only three weeks ago. Casey-Mercier, Jeffery No. 1

North of town there is considerable interest in the Casey-Mercier well on the Jeffery land as a sand was encountered at 2275 feet that began to show oil so the well was shut down waiting for sufficient water to drill with. This sand corresponds to the South Bend district and is thought to be the same as





MUCH MONEY FOR IMPROVING

Over \$400,000,000 Expended on Rural Roads and Bridges During Calendar Year of 1919.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

During the calendar year 1919, 46 States of the Union expended over \$400,000,000 on their rural roads and bridges, the bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture recently announced. This total is made up of the actual cash expenditures for such items as labor, materials, supervision and administration, amounting to \$389,455,931, and



is estimated at about \$132,000,000. So interest payments on road and bridge bonds have been excluded.

An All-Rubber Storage Battery

-this is the latest achievement in the development of the electrical system on the modern motor car.

Announcement of this advance was made this week in Cleveland, by T. A. Willard, inventor and founder of the battery manufacturing company which bears his name.

In this improved battery, everything is of rubber excepting the plates or grids. The wooden battery box is done away with, and replaced by a hard-rubber case. This change has made possible another important one, for with the wooden box there passes the separate rubber jar heretofore required for each battery cell.

The new case being of rubber, it has been found practicable to mould it with seamless partitions, which eliminate the necessity for jars. The term "Monobloc" which has been applied describes the one-piece construction very satisfactorily.

Between the plates, threaded rubber instead of wooden separators are used. This use of rubber, however, is not entirely new, having been started six years ago under Willard patents. It is in the development of the new case and the bringing together of rubber container and rubber separators that the latest important advance has been made.

An all-rubber battery has been the goal of the industry for years. The biggest obstacle was the apparent impossible of making practical rubber separators. This was due to the fact that no way could be found to provide for the free passage of the battery solution between the plates without making holes in the separators so large as to cause trouble.

The use of thousands of tiny threads, which act as wicks, finally overcame this difficulty and paved the way for the all-rubber unit. The moulded rubber case, besides eliminating the separate battery jar, resists decay and corrosion, in much greater degree than the wooden container, being unaffected by the acid solution or by water. Also, since rubber is a non-conductor, it markedly reduces electrical leakage, which is especially likely to be present with wooden cases in damp weather. It has a tensile strength of 3600 pounds to the square inch and must stand 18000 volt electrical test. In making this test two wireless transformers capable of sending 1000 miles were used.

In a statement given out by him regarding his most recent contribution to the development of the storage battery, Mr. Willard said that it was the result of an effort to produce a unit that would give as nearly uninterrupted service as possible, and the various parts of which would have not only longer but also more equal life.

"My purpose has been," he continued, "to make a battery like the one-horse shay, all parts of which would live to a ripe old age and lay down their different burdens at the same time."
