### GRANDPA STEWART ENJOYS FAMILY REUNION LAST WEEK

A reunion of unusual interest took place here last week when Grandpa Stewart's children came to see him. W. A. Stewart, Sr., known as Grandpa Stewart, was the central figure in the reunion. He has eight children living and it was the first time in twenty-seven years that they had been together. Grandpa was so overcome with joy that he could not suppress his feelings and the same was true of the big stalwart man and women, some of whom no doubt are making their last visit to their dear old father, who is now eighty-eight years old.

Grandpa Stewart is a native of Georgia and lived in that State until 1880 when he moved to Navarro county, Texas, where he lived for about twenty years. His companion died about twenty-two years ago and since that time he has lived with his children. For several years he has called W. A. Stewart, Jr., his home his home although he has lived with different ones. He has been a familiar figure here a long time and is lovingly known by everyone here as Grandpa. When he leaves for a visit to his children living elsewhere the people of Graham are always glad for him to return. Except in very inclement weather he is always seen on the streets and the people enjoy hearing him relate his experiences. He is hale and hearty for a man of his age and from present appearances will be here some time yet but, on account of his advanced years, his children felt that they should all come to see him.

It has been a great reunion and Grandpa has lived over his life again this week. He told The Leader reporter that in former days all he had to do to secure obedience was to wink at the boys but this week he said he had to call W. A. (Bill) down several times. Grandpa wanted a picture of the group and called for a photographer. Six of the children weigh 200 pounds or more but Bill only 135. In order to look like his other brothers he proceeded to pad himself with all the pillows about the place and marched out with the rest for his picture. His father informed him that he meant business and for him to remove the pillows and get in the group immediately which the dutiful son did. The reunion would have been incomplete without the good-natured "Bill." He saw that there were no dull moments during the whole week.

### Improvements on the Bunger Road

The Chamber of Commerce has been doing some work on the Bunger road this week, but it has not rained in this county enough this fall to enable any permanent work to be done.

The work this week consisted of putting straw in the worst sand ruts to enable heavy loaded trucks to pass to the oil fields with field supplies. This work is only temporary and will not last long. As soon as it rains an effort will be made to do some permanent work.

Petitions are being circulated for signatures of those favoring a bond issue in this precinct and it is hoped that before many months some of the best roads in the state will be in Young county.

### SOUTHWESTERN BELL TELEPHONE CO. MOVES.

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has moved its office from the First National Bank building to the second story of the building on Oak Street formerly occupied by the postoffice.

The change was made last Saturday night after nine o'clock. Very few of their subscribers suffered any inconvenience as the new switch boards had been installed by the time the subscribers were ready to use them Sunday morning.

The new quarters will give the company more room than in their former location. Additional equipment has been added and the company will be prepared to furnish telephone service to Graham when it has doubled its present population.

Manager Shelton and all the employees are enthusiastic over their new quarters and equipment.

### J. H. BUCHANAN PLANS TO GO TO KANSAS CITY.

J. H. Buchanan plans to leave this week for the national meeting of the American Legion at Kansas City. He represents the Ligon-Daniel Post of Young County and the thirteenth Congressional district composed of twelve western counties.

The Leader reporter asked Mr. Buchanan if he would go if the strike order was not revoked and his reply was "yes, if the trans cease to run he would return in an airplane."

### DR. FLAHERTY IMMUNIZES HOGS FOR YOUNG COUNTY

Dr. Flaherty, of Fort Worth, representative of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, is in the county this week immunizing herds of hogs against cholera.

He is doing this without any expense to the farmers except the cost of the serum. Any one interested in having their hogs immunized should communicate with County Agent Edgar Kemp.

### SOUTH BEND HAS SEVERAL WELLS IN THIS WEEK

Since oil has been advancing in price there has been a decided improvement in the oil situation in Young county. As long as oil was one dollar a barrel nobody cared to play the game. A few wells were drilled during the summer but so many wells are coming in now that it is even difficult for those on the field all the time to keep up with them.

Among the new wells in the South Bend pool this week are the Godley Oil & Gas Company-Graham No. 17, making 200 barrels.

Panhandle McCluskey No. 1 making 300 barrels.

Roxana-Ford No. 10, 400 barrels.

Connor-McCluskey No. 6, 150 barrels.

North American-Scott, 300 barrels. Eureka Petroleum Co.-McCluskey No. 3 is reported in but we have not been able to learn the production. A number of other wells are on the sand and from week to week wells will be coming in in the famous pool.

The South Bend pool has more than 100 producing wells now and if the price of crude continues to increase it will not be long until there will be 200 wells. This is wildcat territory eighteen months ago.

### RAILROAD STRIKE TAKES PLACE SUNDAY

The question for some time has been "Will the railroad strike take place?" Many have said that the country could not afford to have a strike now. There has never been a time when we could afford a strike but they come and it looks now that the threatened strike will take place beginning Sunday. The I. & G. N. trainmen walked out the 22 and others will follow Sunday.

If the strike becomes general the country will suffer. We are not informed enough on the subject to say what the outcome will be. 4,000,000, or more men are idle according to press reports and it looks like the government could find enough from this number to operate the roads as long as the men want to remain out of service.

We are all interested in the outcome and few of us realize what it will mean for the railroads to be tied up. Let us hope that everything will be amicably settled soon and that the country may speedily pass the reconstruction days.

### REVIVAL SERVICES AT BAPTIST CHURCH

Rev. A. J. Copass, of California, is conducting a revival meeting at the Baptist church here. The service began last Sunday and large crowds have been in attendance from the first service. The evangelist is preaching great sermons which are enjoyed by the congregation from day to day.

One great feature of the meeting is the song service conducted by Mr. Thomas. He has a large choir and orchestra. The music is fine and puts one in fine attitude for the soul-stirring messages of Dr. Copass.

Much interest is being manifested in the meeting and Dr. Taylor, the pastor, is expecting great results. A cordial invitation is extended the entire city to come out and hear the fine singing and excellent preaching.

The American Legion is planning for a big day in Graham November 11. The cooperation of the entire county is desired to make it what the boys want. If you know of any ex-service man who was in the service insist that he come and then you come to see that he is here. Help the boys make it a big day.

### BOND ISSUE MEANS BETTER ROADS FOR PRECINCT NO. ONE

Much has been said for some time about the bad roads in Young county. An opportunity will be given before many weeks for the people in Precinct No. One to vote on a bond issue for permanent road work. Petitions are now in the hands of John E. Morrison, R. E. Lynch and Edgar Kemp and as we go to press we learn that about 200 signatures have been secured.

No one denies that we need roads in this precinct and it is believed that there will be no difficulty in voting the bonds as the people feel the need of better roads. The tax on \$500,000 bond issue will be about \$8.00 a year on each \$1,000. We hear a great deal about taxes but we get full and direct returns on taxes spent on roads in the district in which we live.

There are many idle people in this precinct and if the bonds are voted it is the purpose to give preference to our own people who want work. The roads are in this precinct, our money will build the roads and our people should be given the preference over those living elsewhere. \$500,000 spent in this precinct during the next few months would help us tide over these hard times.

Building material is cheaper now and there is a better market for bonds than during the past months. We will be saved the delay that some counties have experienced in selling bonds while there was no market.

It is hoped that every man will really give the subject serious consideration. If this is done the issue will carry by a large majority. Most of us will save far more on the wear and tear of our vehicles than the taxes will cost, to say nothing about the time saved and the satisfaction of knowing that we will not break a spring or some other part of our car or buggy before we return home.

### WICHITA HIGH TEAM DEFEATS GRAHAM BY CLOSE SCORE 6 TO 0

The Graham high school football team had another hard game last Saturday. The school chartered a car and had a good representation of students at Wichita Falls to witness the annual clash between the two high schools. Graham expected to win but luck was with Wichita and she won by the close score of 6 to 0.

It was a good game and was fought hard by both sides. Henrietta and Wichita Falls have defeated the local team by the score of 6 to 0 but the spirits of the boys are high and they will carry away the big end of the score with any team they play here Saturday.

### BROOM FACTORY WANTS TO LOCATE IN GRAHAM

Graham has an opportunity to secure a broom factory. J. N. Lusk, of Liberal, Kansas, desires to move his plant here and all he asks is that our merchants agree to handle his line of brooms, provided he offers as good brooms and as cheaply as they can be bought elsewhere. No fairer proposition could be made.

The Leader hopes the business men will cooperate with the Chamber of Commerce in securing this plant for Graham. Graham has some as fine broomcorn land as can be found anywhere. It seems this is an opportune time to get this plant for it would give our farmers a chance to plant less cotton at a time when we are trying to decrease the cotton acreage.

There are no broom factories in this section and it seems that one here would pay well.

### FIFTH PRODUCER IN BUNGER SURPASSES ALL OTHER WELLS

The Rosell Petroleum Corporation went into the pay sand on the Grimshaw No. 1 at 1907 feet this week and now have the best producer in the Bunger field. The well was drilled 6 1-2 feet into the sand and made a flow every 25 minutes. It is now making 600 barrels of high grade oil per day and gives an added value to all the acreage in this district. This new well is located on the west side of survey 34. There is plenty of gas in the well and no water with the oil.

The Sinclair Company is coming into the Bunger field with a gravity line. This is the fourth line into this new pool. The Humble Company is connecting up this week to take oil with a gravity line. The Prairie is changing its pump line to a gravity line. The first line into the field was the Texas Company which is still pumping the oil. The number of pipe lines already bidding for oil in the Bunger pool indicates the desirable quality of the oil and shows what these companies think of the future of this district.

The Rosell Company found the sand in their Askew No. 1 at 1959 feet and has drilled 17 feet into the sand. The well has made several flows of oil and there is a considerable quantity of gas but the sand is very hard and will no doubt have to be shot to get the best results. There is a million cubic feet of gas and the oil is the same high grade quality found in the other wells to the northwest.

The Rosell-Owen No. 1B reported last week is making 300 barrels, while the original Owen No. 1 is still holding up at 200 barrels. The company's well on the north 80 acres of the Grimshaw land, section 34, known as No. 1E is down 1600 feet. On the Lynn land everything is ready to spud in as soon as the gas line is connected. A location has been made for the Askew No. 2 one-half mile west of the Union Askew No. 1. The Rosell Company is drilling other wells in this field and every one looks good.

Hodnett and Varble are about ready to begin a well on the Parham survey. They are waiting for water and gas connections.

Another well of interest is the

Penn Cities on the Herron land. This is to be a 3500-foot test if necessary and is 1 1-2 miles northeast of the Lisle No. 1. This is promising territory.

Applegate & Harlan-Whittenburg No. 1, drilling at 1775 feet.

Barnes Production Company-Parsons No. 1, drilling at 2050 feet.

Browning & Hodges-Durham No. 1, setting casing at 1900 feet.

Burton & Florrie-Whittenburg No. 1, drilling at 800 feet.

Glasscock & Moore have acquired the 70-acre Askew lease, offsetting the Ross & Tyrell Askew No. 1 from M. G. Cheney and will complete the drilling of the well.

Cheney & Miller-Grimshaw No. 1, setting casing at 1815 feet.

Cheney & Miller-Grimshaw No. 2, spudding.

Godley Oil Company-Owen No. 1, drilling at 1200 feet.

Gulf Production Company-Grimshaw No. 1, drilling at 1300 feet.

Hedrick Oil Corporation-Driver No. 2, drilling at 1600 feet.

Hedrick Oil Corporation-Driver No. 3, running a new string of pipe at 1810 feet.

Mann et al-Whittenburg No. 1, drilling at 1200 feet.

Paragon Oil Syndicate-Vick No. 1, hole cleaned at 2235 feet.

Paragon Oil Syndicate-Vick No. 2, a rig.

Simms Oil Corporation-Owen No. 1, drilling at 1300 feet.

Simms Oil Corporation-Owen No. 2, five million cubic feet of gas at 1870 feet. This well is expected in at any time.

Sun Company-Driver No. 1, drilling at 1710 feet.

Galbraith & White-Grimshaw No. 1, rig up.

There are now more than thirty rigs in the Bunger field and it is believed that if water can be secured that there will be one hundred by the first of the year. No more promising field is to be found anywhere. Mr. McNamara, oil and gas supervisor, says "that everybody is working together in this field. He compliments the Young county operators.

### A. F. STEWART HERE FOR FAMILY REUNION

A. F. Stewart, who formerly lived here, is in Graham this week attending a family reunion. He was in business here many years and his friends regretted to see him leave and we believe that he has been sorry that he left. He is putting on a bold face and says that he has done well in Arkansas.

His brother, W. A. Stewart known in Graham as "Bill," tells many stories about the cause of A. F. leaving here. Bill was in Arkansas last summer to visit his brother and told his neighbors over there that he could not get along with the preacher. Here in Graham Bill tells other stories. A. F.'s many friends are glad to see him here on a visit and would be glad to have him move back among us, even if his brother does tell strange stories about his leaving.

The body of the unknown American soldier to be buried with military honors in Arlington Cemetery will be selected, October, October 25, from four coffins in France. The coffin will then be transported to the railway station on a French military caisson. Then the flags of all the American regiments on the Rhine will accompany the body by special train to Havre, where there will be additional honors from the station to the dock of the American warship Olympia.

The new Methodist church will soon be completed and is the pride of Graham. The new three-story jail is one of the attractive buildings of the city. A number of residences are under construction.

D. 1922, the same being the 6th day of March, A. D. 1922, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1921, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 6625, wherein C. S. Ringle is Plaintiff, and H. L. Tucker, A. L. Dewees, Jeff & Everett, a co-partnership composed of Jeff and Everett are Defendants, and said petition alleging For cause of action, plaintiff would show to the Court, that heretofore, to-wit: Beginning about the 25th day of February, A. D. 1921, he worked for the defendants and performed labor in operating and drilling an oil well on certain leasehold estate hereinafter described, for the sum of Fifteen and 00-100 (\$15.00) Dollars per day, as described in the annexed account attached hereto and made a part hereof; that such labor was performed at the special instance and request of the defendants and each of them and included the services of George Miller, for four days at Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars per day and Jack Washburn for five days at \$15.00 per day, which accounts have been sold, transferred and assigned to the plaintiff who is now the legal owner thereof, and that the total amount due to the plaintiff is Six Hundred Fifteen and 00-100 (\$615.00) Dollars, which is just and true and is due and unpaid, and that all lawful offsets, credits and payments have been allowed, but that the defendants have hitherto failed and refused to pay said sum or any part thereof.

The plaintiff would show further that within thirty days after said account had accrued, to-wit on April 11, 1921, he made and presented to the defendants and each of them a duplicate account of such services, and that he filed his lien in the office of the County Clerk of Young County, Texas, covering the interest of the defendants in an oil and gas leasehold estate covering the West 40 acres of the North 124 acres of the J. J. Scott and F. C. ## GOOD ROADS PAY TAXES

A load of cotton bumped its way slowly into Vernon yesterday, drawn by four large horses. The owner lives about ten miles in the country. Three hours were required for bringing his cotton to town, and the return trip consummated practically as much.

The incident is typical and may be seen with variation in detail on almost any of the roads coming into Vernon. Figure up, if you can, how much time the farmer might save if he had a hard surface on which to haul. At least half the time might be saved—two hours each trip. Then if there is other work to be done, one of the teams might be left at home.

Is it any wonder, when we face these conditions day after day, that many of our farmers are saying that they lose enough on each trip to town to pay their tax on a road bond issue for an entire year.—Vernon Record.

**BUILDING ROADS IN TEXAS BY THE HUNDREDS OF MILES**

Out in that part of Texas where a hundred miles is no more than a day's journey, an not so eventful a day's journey at that, four counties have clubbed together to construct a road one hundred miles long. When it is done it will be a hundred miles of testimony to the public-spiritedness of the people whose enterprise and tax money made it possible. It will come to be known to thousands of people who will remember very little else about their journey through Texas. It will be an achievement in co-operation by the road authorities of Midland, Ector, Martin and Howard counties.

This undertaking is a lesson in the fact that an isolated, food-road county is favored and that an isolated, bad-roads county can spoil the road system of a whole section of the State. There is a county in Texas situated in the heart of a thickly populated and progressive class of people which is exterminated half a score of States because of its bad roads. All the counties around it have spent large sums of money in improving their roads and in taking care of them, but this particular county still clings to the notion that mud is cheaper than concrete or crushed rock. Tourists have manufactured a coarse pun on the name of this county to indicate what they really think of a people which will not measure up to the road requirements of this day and time. Whenever they have occasion to come to Texas again, they vow that they will seek out a route that will steer clear of this harborer of unspeakable roads.

A road is a means of getting somewhere. Unless it does get somewhere it is an expensive monument to an incompetent plan. The county is not longer the unit of civilization or of travel. Some parts of Texas are recognizing this on a larger scale than before. This accounts for the high standing of the State in road improvement. But here and there are to be found counties which hurt themselves and the State by remaining merely mud-holes or sandbeds in what would otherwise be wonderful systems of thoroughfares.—Dallas News.

**PRESIDENT ASKS TWO MINUTE PRAYERS NOV. 11**

Washington, Oct. 14.—The American people were called upon by President Harding, in a proclamation issued to offer a silent two-minute prayer at noon on Armistice Day, Nov. 11, when the body of an unknown American soldier, killed in France, will be laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery.

The proclamation calls upon "all devout patriotic citizens" to pause for two minutes from 12 o'clock noon until two minutes past 12—"for a period of silent prayer or thanks to the Giver of all good things for these valuable and valorous lives and of supplications for his divine mercy and for His blessing upon our beloved country."

Directions are contained in the proclamation for half-masting of the flags on all public buildings, all stations of the army, navy, and marine corps and on all American embassies, legations and consulates throughout the world from sunrise to sunset on Armistice Day, when it is the hope of the President that the whole nation shall join in honoring America's dead of the world war.

**1922 SEALS AND PLATES TO BE AVAILABLE SOON**

State Highway Commission Announces 1922 Seals and Number Will Be Ready at Early Date

The highway department has received all seals, number plates forms and other tax collector's supplies for 1922 and will begin shipping them out to the several counties within a few days.

Heretofore the commission has had considerable trouble in getting contracts filled for these supplies on account of the war and other conditions. The contractors were very prompt this year, which makes it possible for the department to ship these supplies by freight instead of by express, thereby making a considerable saving in shipping expenses.

There will be no change in number plates for motor vehicles for 1922. Motor vehicle seals for 1922 will be black letters with orange back ground. Dealers distinguishing number plates will be black letters on orange back ground and motorcycle seals will be black letters on dark red back ground.

There will be very little change in the forms used for 1922. The only change being made to conform with the new truck law passed by the last legislature.

The commission suggests that car owners in cities obtain their licenses as soon as possible to avoid the rush, which invariably comes with the closing days of January.

### PIPE LINES MAY BUY CRUDE OIL ON GRAVITY BASIS

Oklahoma oil men are alarmed, but north and west Texas operators seem pleased over a buying policy which the Gulf Production Company put into effect in Oklahoma last week. Under this policy, the company buys according to gravity. Oil of gravity of 38 and over brings \$1.75. The price is graduated down according to gravity.

It is believed that the Prairie, Sinclair and other purchasing companies will put this system of buying into effect. Under this schedule all of north and west Texas oil would bring the high price, while only 60,000 barrels of Oklahoma's daily production would fall in that class. It is believed that the big oil companies look to the high gravity Texas crude to take the place of the rapidly diminishing supplies of Pennsylvania oil, which now brings the world's tip price.
