

FEDERAL RESERVE

ASSISTS FARMERS Dallas, Nov. 10 .- Sloan Simpson, trustee and treasurer of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, announces that the Federal Reserve Bank has agreed to assist Texas farmers in the purchase of pure bred cotton seed.

This is of especial interest at this time because good seed can be bought at a much lower price at this time of the year than they can be obtained later on. Following is the text of a letter addressed by Mr. Simpson to W. F. Craddock of the marketing division of the Texas Farm Bureau:

"In many sections of Texas there are demands now for cotton seed for planting the 1922 crop.

"Many local banks are not in position to advance money to buy cotton seed without help. On the other hand, good seed can be bought now direct from the growers and breeders at a very low price.
