Lilly Attends FSA Meeting at Amarillo

Dennis Lilly, local administrator of the Farm Security Administration has returned from Amarillo, where a regional meeting that includes the Panhandle-Plains section, as well as portions of New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma was held. Much of the report concerns portions of this and other states remote to Terry and Yoakum counties and of course will not be of very great local interest. Mr. Lilly states that it was found at the meeting that those who had closely followed balanced farming were in better position to stand the onslaughts of a drouth than others. However, reports from many places on conditions led many department of Agriculture officials to believe that the drouth might finally be as severe as 1935.

In the Panhandle-Plains section of Texas, the counties of Swisher, Hale, Donley, Cottle, Collingsworth, Cochran, Childress and Briscoe counties were particularly hurt, and some of them will have to start buying feed.

Applications for loans and work grants showed an increase in August over July in practically all the counties affected, according to the regional office at Amarillo.

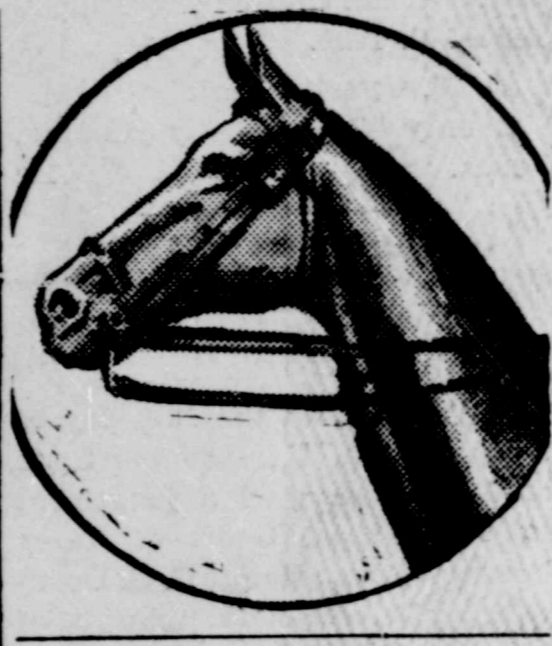

Mahon Predicts Cash-Carry Neutrality

LUBBOCK—Congressman Geo. Mahon closed his Lubbock office on Monday of this week and returned to Washington for the Special Session of Congress, convening September 21.

He predicted that the cash and carry neutrality policy advocated by President Roosevelt would be enacted into law. "I voted for the cash and carry provision last Session and I expect to do it again," he said.

Mahon explained that it is not possible to tell in advance how long the Special Session would last. It might possibly last until late in the fall he said. The regular Session of Congress will convene on January 3, 1940.

Texas Utilities to Build Line to Seagraves

Judge Simms Writes Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel

Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel,
Austin, Texas
Dear Governor O'Daniel:

You are being called upon by the people all over the State to call a special session of the State Legislature, for the purpose to enact a revenue bill to support the social security program heretofore enacted by law. This matter is very urgent and becomes more apparent every day and I feel it the best thing you could do. To defer the meeting of this serious problem and wait till the next Regular Session of the Legislature passes the matter too far off and will result in working a serious hardship on our old people, the blind and the poor and neglected people of this State.

I appreciate the sincere efforts you made in the past session of the Legislature to secure the passage of a bill to meet these needs, and you will recall that I wrote you a letter in this regard, but to have failed then does not mean that at least a temporary tax measure could not be passed now which might be used to get by on till a better bill could be worked out in some future session of the Legislature.

I am not writing you this letter with an attempt to tell you



what you should do, but I would like to correctly represent the people of Terry County and to voice their wishes in things of public interest. I feel that at least 85 per cent of our people want some way provided whereby these urgent needs may be taken care of by the State.

Man Sentenced In Boy's Death

PLAINS, Sept. 16.—A six months jail sentence and a \$200 fine were assessed L. R. Burck, 58, of Hagerman, N. M., today on a plea of guilty of negligent homicide in connection with the death Friday of Darrell Stuart, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Stuart of near Tokio.

Yoakum county Judge W. R. McInturff also revoked the New Mexico man's driver's license for six months.

Investigation by P. G. Stanford, county attorney, and members of the Texas highway patrol revealed that Burck failed to stop when approaching a school bus when children were alighting, a misdemeanor in Texas.

Burck reported to Sheriff Ches Gore after the accident but jurisdiction of the case was in Yoakum county. The mishap happened four and a half miles west of Tokio, just inside Yoakum county.

The Stewart child evidently had started to the family mail box and ran directly in the path of the automobile. The Stewart residence is on the same side of the highway on which the bus was stopped, investigators said.

The child died in a Brownfield hospital a short time after he was brought here by a passerby. Burial was held in Brownfield cemetery after funeral services here Saturday afternoon.

B. L. Woodell and Billy Johnson of the highway patrol assisted in the investigations. —Lubbock Avalanche.

Nelson-Primm Building Large Balcony

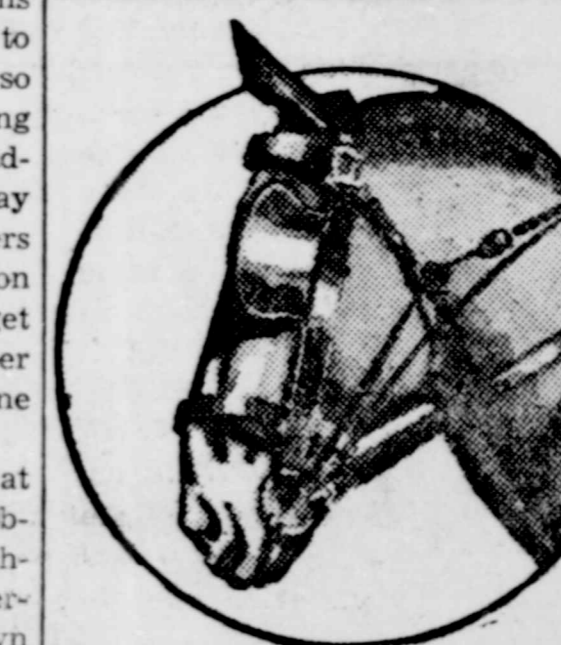
Workmen started this week erecting a 25x32 feet balcony in the rear of the Nelson-Primm Drug that will give this firm some 800 feet more floor space in their 25x100 feet building. In other sections of the county can be governed by these directions: Go to the Red Top Service Station at Gomez, thence south one mile to the Will Black corner, thence west one and one-half miles, thence south a half mile at the old Brownfield ranch headquarters, which now belongs to Lee Brownfield. That's where you get your cane made into syrup.

We "seed" old Charley Guy Sunday morning there at Mark Halsey's drug store, looking as fresh as if he were out of a bandbox. Suppose the "little woman" made him go to Sunday School.

The Herald this week got complimentary passes as well as car parking privileges from the authorities of the Panhandle South Plains Fair, which somewhat allayed our anger because that booster bunch last week passed up the Herald office while giving out rulers.

The Herald agrees with Congressman George Mahon that in the event of another war, when the draft goes into effect it cover capital and labor as well as just the old boys that go into the trenches. During the last war, billions of dollars of war profits were piled up by profiteers, while the boys in the trenches drew their \$35 per month. And there were non-combatants working in munitions factories and building barracks drawing their \$8 to \$15 per day, while the boys in these barracks drilling to go overseas were getting their \$1.00 per day. Let's put all on an equal footing.

Back in Greenville, Miss., the city authorities are trying out a very coarse cotton ducking not unlike cotton bagging for baling cotton on their streets. The cloth is being furnished by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, putting down a layer of this cloth, then asphalt, then more cloth until about three layers of each is made. Engineers believe this is going to be one of the cheapest as well as the best asphalt roads that has ever been built, and predict that within a few years, not only streets but highways as well will be built, using thousands of bales of cotton in their construction.

The Texas Highway department has contributed a nice little folder that should be in the hands of every person who ever gets hold of a steering wheel to take to the highways. Here's some of the good points in it, except they are illustrated with drawings in the folder: 1st. The auxiliary or broken stripes on the right side of the road going up hill are put there to warn you to stay on your side of the center line. 2nd. Broken lines on each side of the center stripes warn you that the vision ahead is too restricted in either direction to pass cars. 3rd. Broken stripes on curves indicate that passing is dangerous. 4th. Broken stripes on each side of the stripe on overpasses or underpasses means that passing other cars is prohibited. 5th. On four lane highways use the inside lane for passing only. Crossing double stripe is prohibited. 6th. On deep dips vehicles may safely pass when the broken stripe is opposite your side of the center line. Keep these six simple rules in mind and avoid accidents.

MRS. WOOD JOHNSON PASSES
The Herald is sorry to chronicle the passing of another pioneer lady, Mrs. Wood E. Johnson, 43, who passed away at a Fort Worth hospital last Thursday, exactly a week after being carried down there. Mr. Johnson had come home the day before, thinking her improving, but we can little know what can transpire in a few hours. Mrs. Johnson had been in poor health for some time. Like the Johnson family, Mrs. Johnson's people were also pioneers, I. H. Hudson and family moving here in the early days, and settled in the Johnson community. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were married soon after the end of the World War, after he returned from the front. Three children, all boys, were born to this Union. The body was brought back
