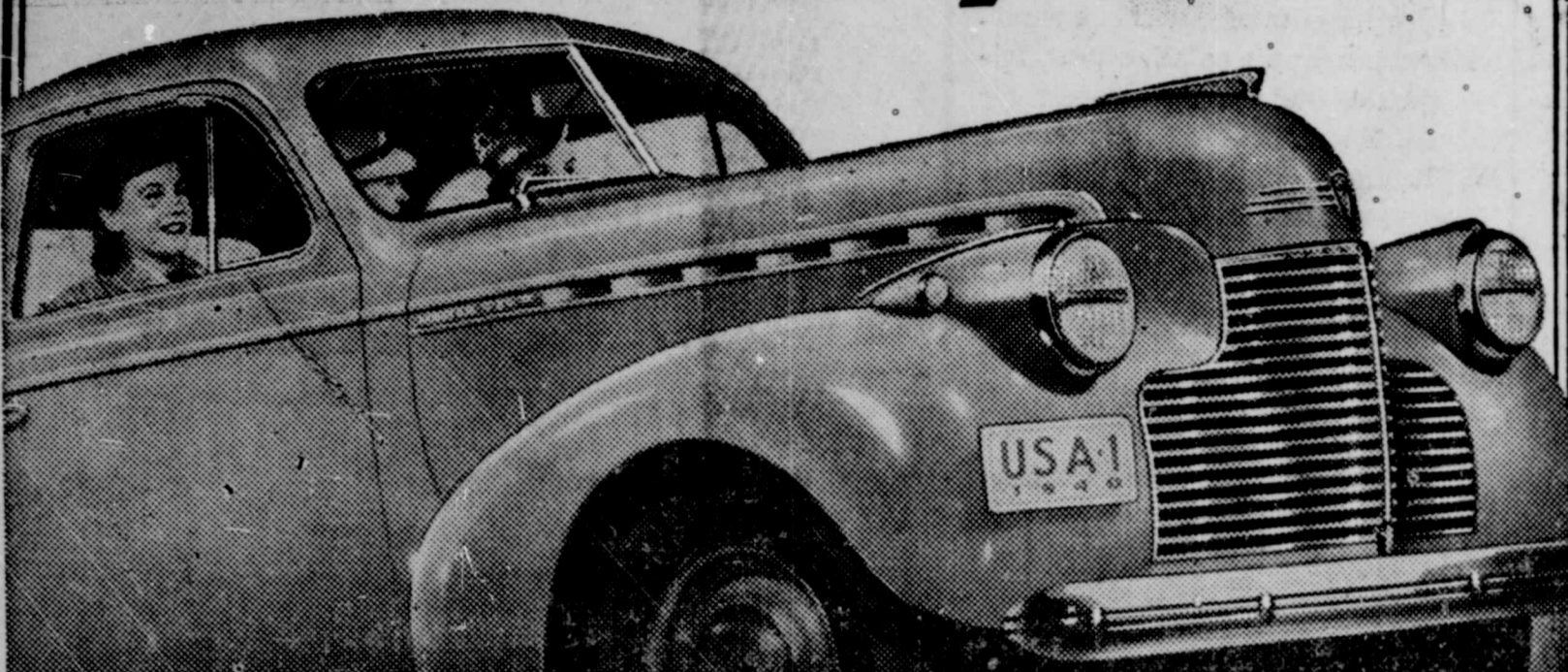

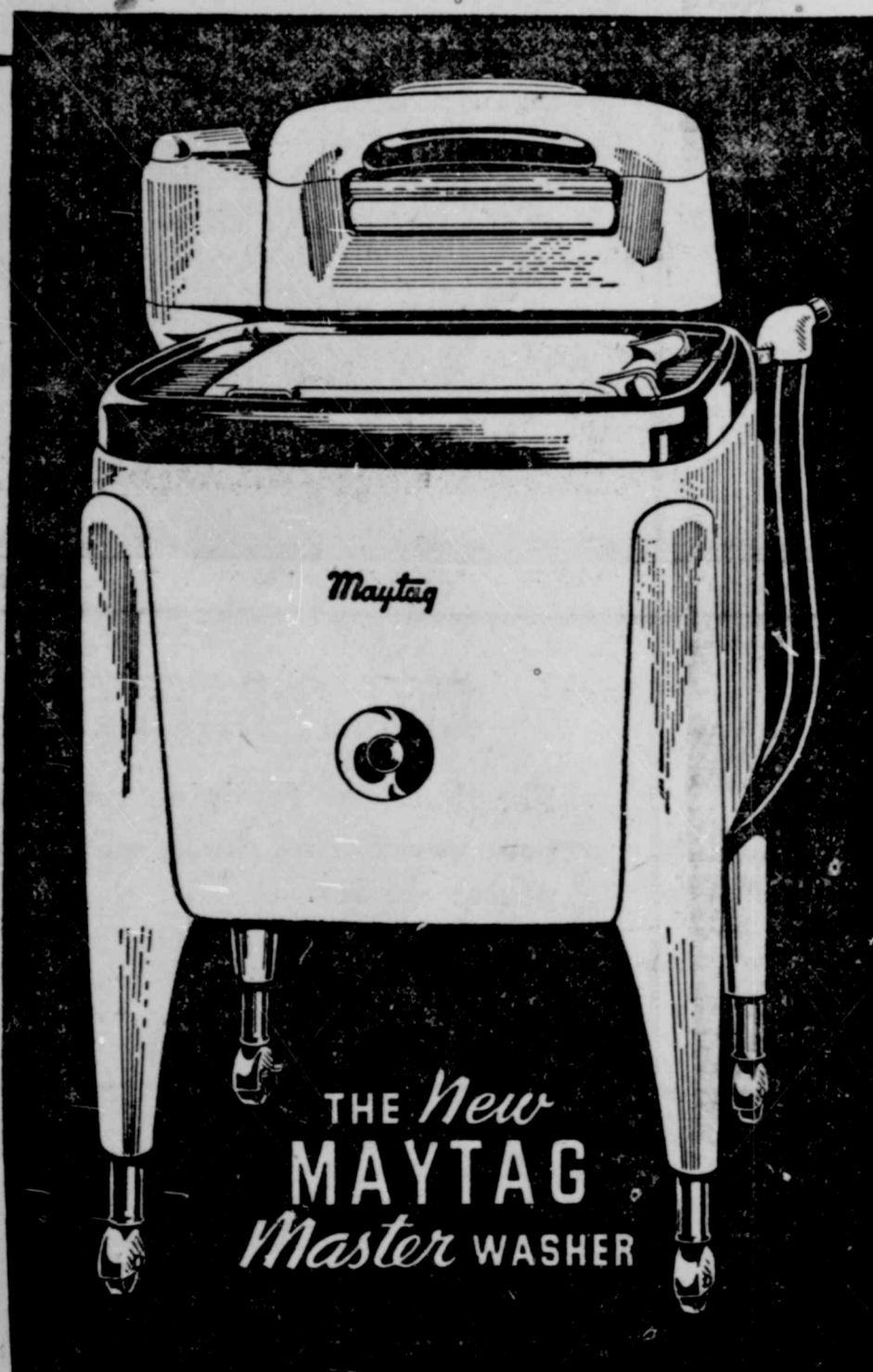

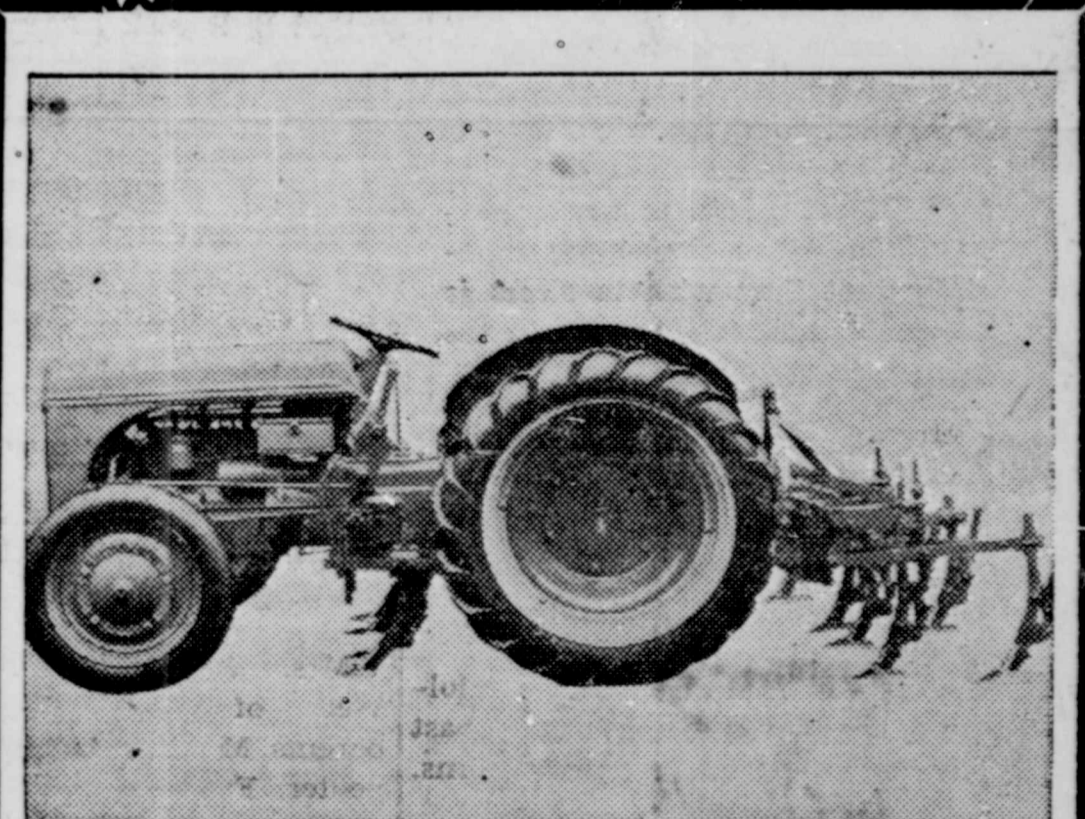
According to the wind gauge at Lubbock, February lacked about 1000 miles producing the normal wind mileage. But the way March is progressing, it'll make up lost time.
