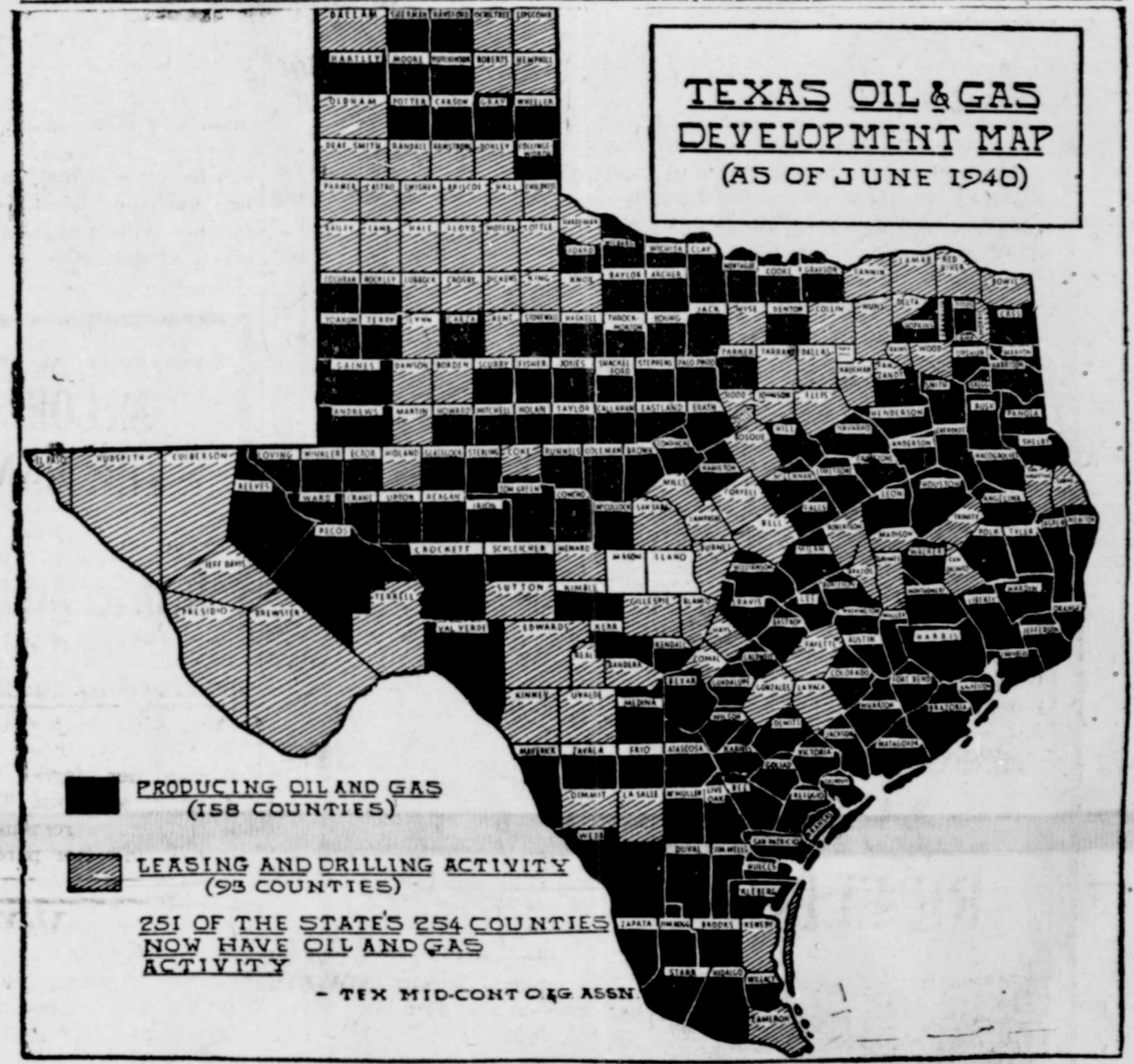

NO REPUBLICAN WILL BE ELECTED PRESIDENT ANYHOW

Harold E. Stassen, 33-year-old Governor of Minnesota and keynote speaker at the Republican convention Monday night gave Roosevelt and the Democrats the devil for: Not being prepared in the present war emergency; for not having thousands of airplanes, tanks and war equipment; for spending so much money; allowing so-called fifth column activities to flourish; allowing sit down strikes; retarding private industry.

The Republicans might remember that: Those countries who were next door neighbors to Germany, and who have only a small percentage of the wealth and manpower of the United States were not ready.

The Republican might remember that: Presidents Hoover and Coolidge, both Republicans, led the way to disarmament of the United States and brought about the scuttling of more ships than we can build in a full year's program. Under their administrations the army and navy were skeletonized.

Ever since that date the bare mention of preparedness has

If Versailles of 1919 was the sowing-time of dragon's teeth and Compeigne of 1940 is the harvest time, as surely as God lives Adolf Hitler has sown a new crop of dragon's teeth which will be harvested at some future day, perhaps in the same fateful spot.

For the world has little tolerance of conquerors, especially not

for conquerors who gloat over their victories. Call the grim roll—Alexander, Caesar, Alaric, Napoleon. The seeds of self-destruction were in all their conquests, as Hitler's are.

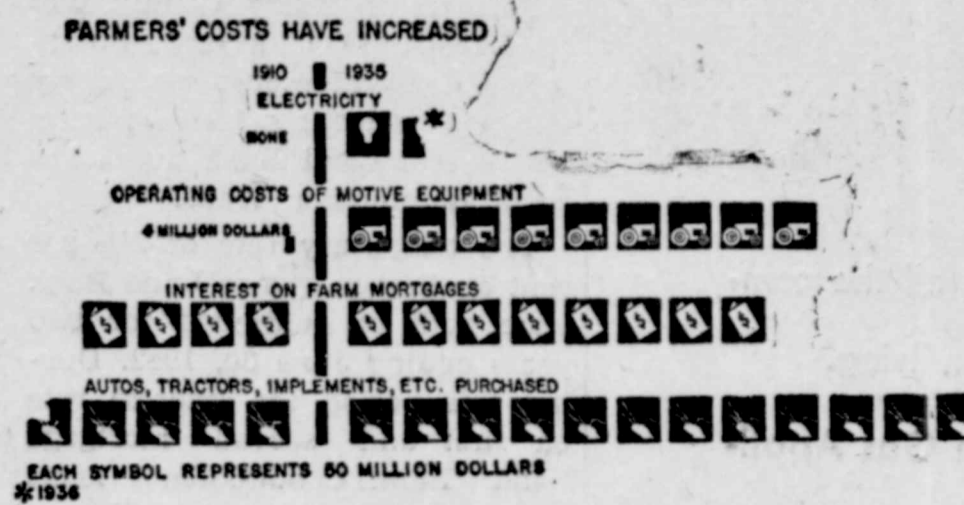

Why America Has A Farm Problem . . . VI



One factor that has contributed to America's farm problem is the increased cost of farming.

In 1935, the farmers received only a little more than half the share of the national income they did in 1910, but their costs were several times greater.

Thus where in 1910 the operating costs of motive equipment totaled 4 million dollars, in 1935 the cost amounted to 440 million dollars.

Interest on farm mortgages totaled 199 million dollars in 1910

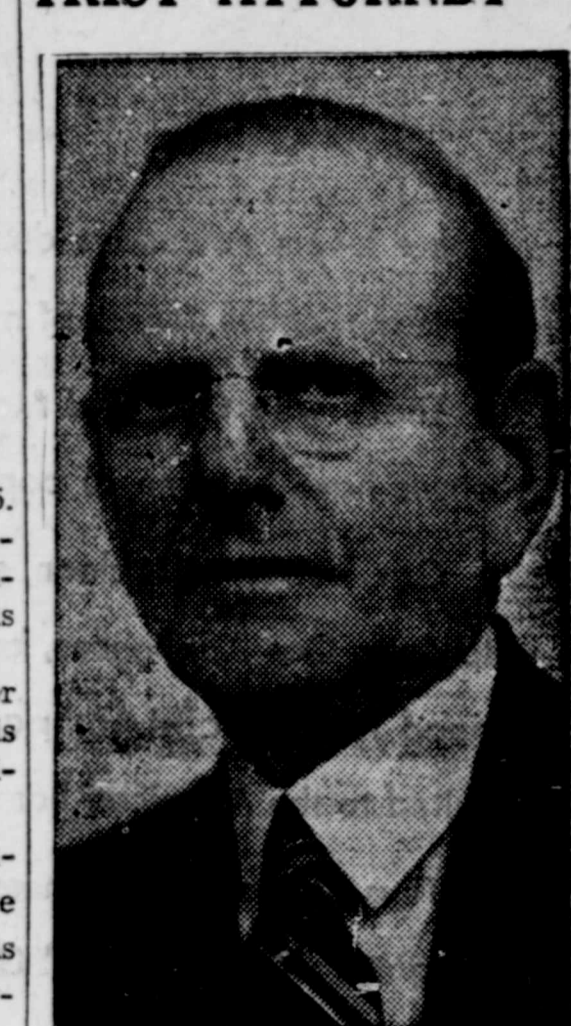
and 400 million dollars in 1935.

In 1910, autos, tractors, and other machinery cost farmers 222 million dollars; in 1935 this cost was 593 million dollars.

There were no expenses for electricity in 1910; in 1935 this item cost farmers 68 million dollars.

Several of these items have combined to make the work of the farmers go further and have thus contributed to the agricultural surpluses.

Terry County To Save \$14,000 Interest

Farmers in Terry County will save about \$14,000 a year as a result of legislation just enacted by Congress affecting interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commission loans.

The temporary rate of 3½ per cent on first mortgage Land Bank loans will be continued for two years ending June 30, 1942. During this period the interest rate on first and second mortgage Land Bank Commission loans will be reduced from 4 to 3½ per cent. Land Bank and Commission loans were originally written at contract rates averaging about 5 per cent.

At present about 338 Terry County farmers have Land Bank and Commission loans outstanding aggregating \$937,915. The difference between the contract rate and the temporary rate thus effects a substantial saving for the farmers.

In a statement from Washington, A. G. Black, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, said that the saving to farmers through the reduced interest rate will have the same effect as an addition to the farmer's net income.

"The ultimate purpose of the reduced interest rate on Land Bank and Commission loans is to help farmers keep down their fixed charges and thus leave more income for the retirement of debt principal, or to meet necessary operating and living expenses," Governor Black said.

Eight Thousand Take In Short Course

College Station, July 15.—Eight thousand farm people took in the annual Farmers' Short Course at Texas A. and M. College last week.

The number was made up of three thousand 4-H Club boys and girls who registered for the junior section during the first two days of the week and of that many farm men and farm women who registered for the adult section. In addition, it is estimated that 2,000 people from surrounding counties attended without registering for rooms.

Frozen food lockers, land use planning and conservation headlined the program with speakers divided about equally between men and women of national importance and farm people.

Special groups who made the short course the occasion for meetings included the Texas Home Demonstration Association, Texas Agricultural Writers, Texas Agricultural Workers, Master Farmers of Texas and Hereford Cattle Breeders' Association.

County agricultural and home demonstration agents gathered for their annual conference, as did workers of the Agricultural Experiment Station. Several hundred members of land using committees and some 500 AAA county committeemen also attended. The Texas County Agricultural Agents held a business session.

Uniformed teams of Woodmen from five states have already been entered in the Axe Manual Contest, which will be held as one of the features of Woodmen Day at the State Fair of Texas, on Monday October 7th.

Real Estate Dealers Must Have License

A recent session of the Legislature passed a law—The Real Estate Dealers License Act. Although more than 9,000 dealers and salesmen have secured licenses from the Securities Division there are still a number of people who have not complied with this law and they are subject to criminal prosecution. Anyone who lists Real Estate for sale, who sells Real Estate, or exchanges Real Estate or buys or rents or offers or agrees to negotiate a sale, exchange, purchase, or rental or Real Estate or who collects, attempts, or agrees to collect rents for the use of Real Estate, who negotiates or offers to negotiate a loan on Real Estate, who appraises Real Estate or who auctions Real Estate or who engages in the business of buying and selling Real Estate, should have a Real Estate Dealers License.

Any person who performs a similar service with respect to oil and gas leases or royalties should have a Securities Dealers license.

These laws were passed for the protection of the public and anyone who has property for sale would do well to know whether or not the dealer with whom they list such property, is licensed. It offers them a measure of protection they cannot get otherwise.

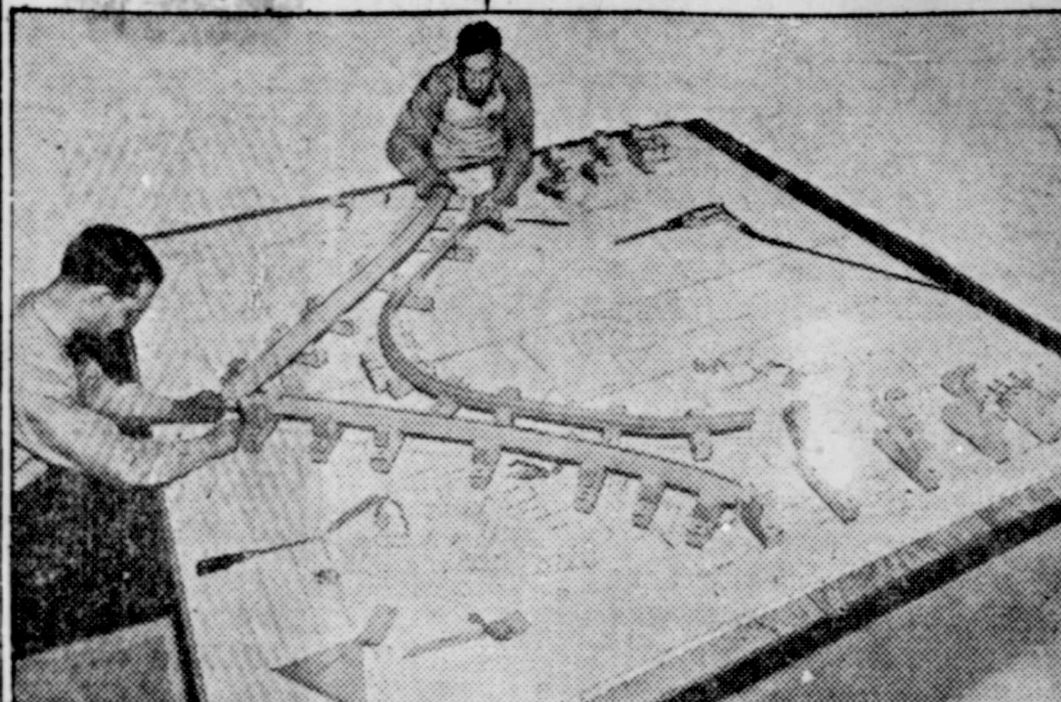
