When Attorney General Mann declared in an address last week that, "labor bosses" must be \_\_\_\_\_\$1.00 driven from their position of power in the labor unions of America, he may have been speak ing with an eye to the political situation of tomorrow, but, nevertheless, he proclaimed a doctrine so soundly American that it should have the enthusiastic applause of every thoughtful citizen.

There are those who will say that "bosses" in every area of national life should be included in the list to be exterminated, and they are right, provided they are not so saying for the purpose of diverting the public mind from the direful situation most needful of immediate attention.

If America is to be snatched from some of the conditions that brought about the sudden defeat and humiliation of France, selfish and disloyal "bosses" in the ranks of labor must be eliminated.







### Farm Income Expected To Be Near 1929 Peak

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 29-Cash farm income for the United States this year is expected to be nearly equal to the 1929 peak and the net income for farmers is expected to be the highest since 1920, the Federal Reserve bank of Kansas City said today in its monthly review of business and farm conditions.

October rainfall damaged some late crops severaly, the review said, but in western Kansas tests showed soil moisture at a depth of 44 inches, compared with 28 inches a pear ago.

The non-resident licenses would have cost the party only \$75. There's quite a little difference





Malaya. When war broke out, only Australia in this part of the world had a small aircraft industry of her own. This has since been expanded and now turns out hundreds of bombers and trainer-reconnaissance planes. There is also a new accessory industry in the East Indies, and the region is dotted with new assembly plants and repair shops. But even today, local industries can supply only a small part of the area's defense needs, and although not all of the U. S.-built planes so far delivered are of the latest types, it will depend on them and on the men who fly them-Australians, Dutchmen, British, Indians and Javanesewhether or not an Axis drive into the South Pacific and South Asiatic zones could be successful.

Shown in these pictures are: (top) Curtiss interceptor planes of the Royal Netherlands East Indies Air Force, manufactured in St. Louis, Mo., and similar to a type that has been standard in the U. S. 

A DEQUATE ventilation is as essential in an unexcavated or partly excavated cellar as one containing the laundry, playroom or heating units. The free circulation of air is advisable at all times, as isolated areas void of ventilation facilities inevitably create damp and unhealthy conditions in the home.

Channels of ventilation may vary from full-sized windows to grill slits, while adequate openings can usually be made in solid partitions, following construction at reasonable

Q: How can I frost a kitchen window facing the street to insure privacy?

A: Durable frosting for glass is readily prepared at home by brushing on soft paste white lead reduced with turpentine to a thin paint, to each gallon of which is added a pint of hard drying, light enamel

varnish to promote adhesion. Several coats of this extra-thin formula are preferable to one of normal consistency, as thick paint tends to peel from glass.

Spread the paint on rapidly and evenly, allowing plenty of time for each coat to set-up firmly before the



### **Scientific Feeding To Get More Milk**

Denison, Texas, Dec. 1,-Two factors - scientific feeding and strict observance of Federal and State sanitary regulations as they apply to the Dairy Industry will determine the success and profit with which Texas dairymen meet the national demand for increased milk production.

Commenting on these two vital points, A. J. Riddle, President of the Texas Dairy Products Association says, to obtain the 14 per cent increase in milk asked by the government it will be necessary for Texas dairymen to give more thought to scientific feeding than ever before. You can feed a profit into a dairy herd, but you can't starve one into it. The maxim of the Texas dairy cow might well be, 'I'll give, if I get'. Starving a dairy cow does not necessarily mean depriving the animal of sufficient forage and water to cause death. It means through lack of proper concentrates and balanced rations the starving of the sensitive organic structures with which she produces milk.

For these reasons the dairyman should check carefully and scien- the more certain the result. tifically the rations on which the dairy herd will go into the barn on this winter. 

# NORTH CAROLINA

We arrived in Wilson, N. C., en route to a lecture at Greenville, N. C., and were met by Dr. Leon R. Meadows, president of East Carolina Teachers college. The state highway patrol preceded us on the 30-odd mile drive to Greenville. They had evidently decided that I was an old lady with nerves and did not like to be driven at more than 30 miles an hour, so we drove at a snail's pace. I was about to ask what was the matter, and then decided that it was not up to me to ask questions and I had better take advantage of the opportunity to look at the countryside.

I remembered well that this is the part of the country which had been hardest hit when the war closed its tobacco markets, because of the sudden decision by Great Britain that it could not buy tobacco over here. Almost 50 per cent of the tobacco raised here, used for cigarettes, had been sold in England. Before the Japanese-Chinese war, much of it was sold to China.

The government helped the planters over this period. In one way it has had a beneficial effect, for through their state agricultural college, they have received assistance in establishing a more varied agriculture. You now see fields of corn. a little cotton and gardens. Mayor Sugg of Greenville, who drove over with us, told me he had attended a meeting recently on home canning, which had really been inspiring.

I was glad to hear of this, for it seems that the nutrition program is working. I feel that if we can establish community planning for specific purposes during this period, we shall have a stronger instrument with which to meet any problems which face our communities in the





They were sent partially to fulfill a request by the Women's Voluntary Services for 250,000 pairs. The remainder are being purchsed and shipped as rapidly as possilbe, 40,- 102,103 dresses. 000 more now being enroute. The American Red Cross previously had brought over 328,697 pairs of shoes and boots for children and

The months shipment of 58,757 plankets for civilian use makes a total of 690,795 blankets now in Great Britain for use during the blitz nights of winter.

Medical and hospital supples totalling \$241,624 were received in September by the British Red Cross. Included were 10 fracture tables, 363,010 items of enamelware, cotton wool and gauze, 9,000 hot water bottles with covers, 84 inhalation sets, 120 obsterical units, 598 oxygen units, 25






