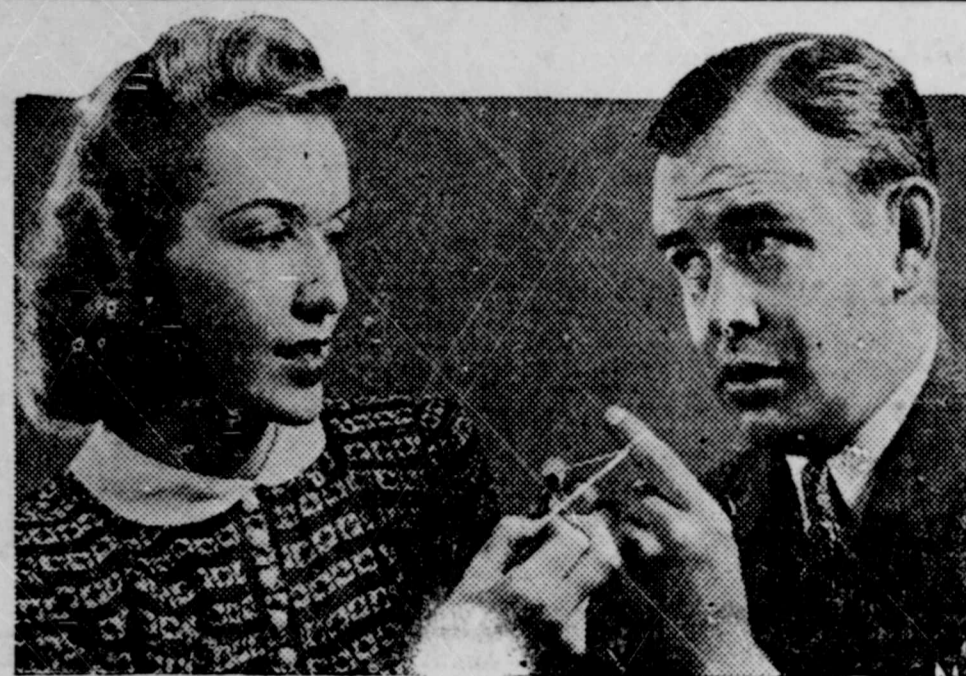

AUSTIN, Feb. 11—Actual improvements in the American diet may result from the current sugar rationing program, in the opinion of a University of Texas nutrition expert.

Sugar or no sugar, this can still be the best-fed nation in the world," declares Dr. Ruth Leslie, professor of home economics. "Sugar as such is not needed by the body at all. There are numerous other sources of energy—butter, flour cereal grains, starches, fats and large quantities of such protective foods as milk, fruits, and vegetables."
