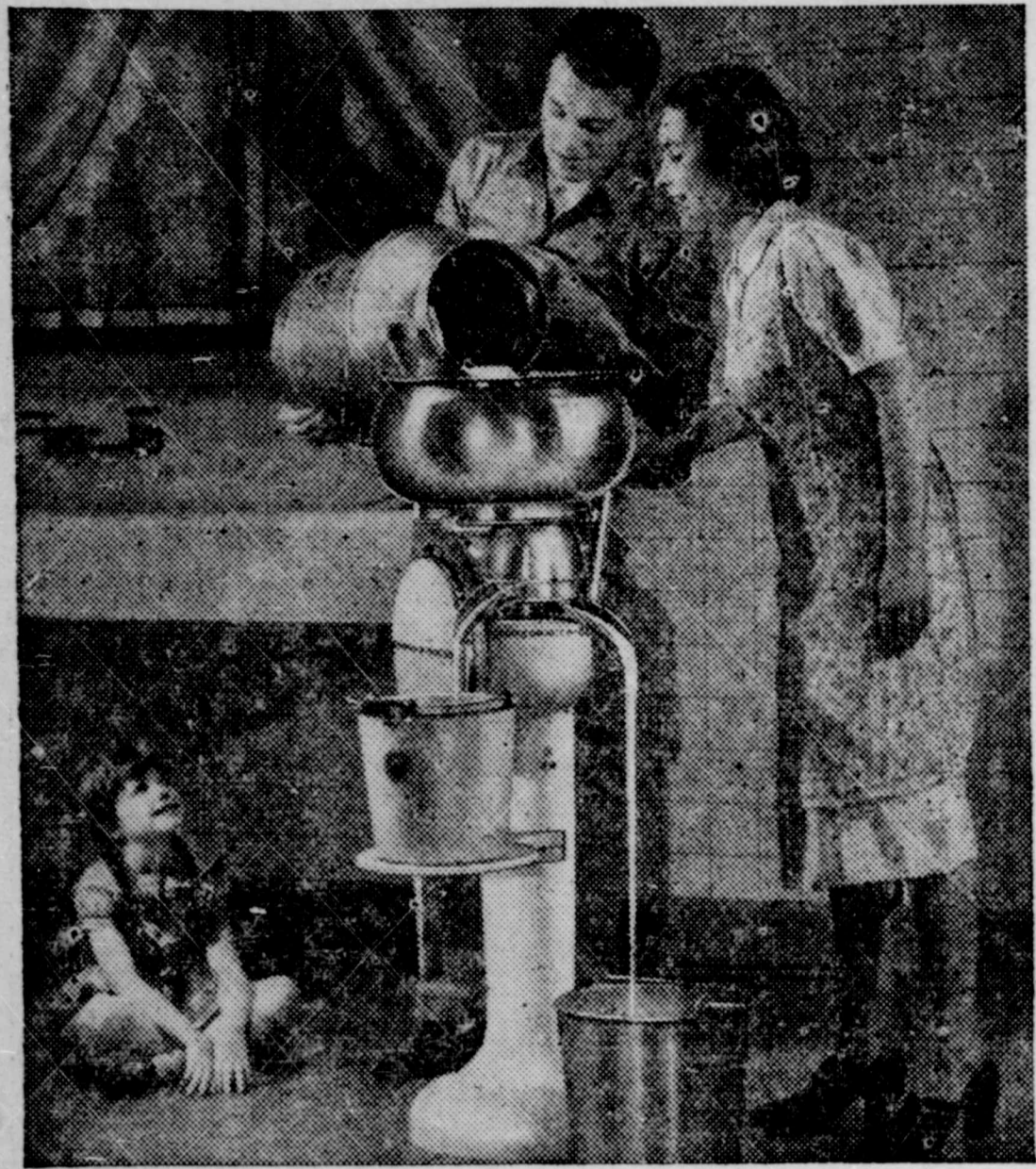

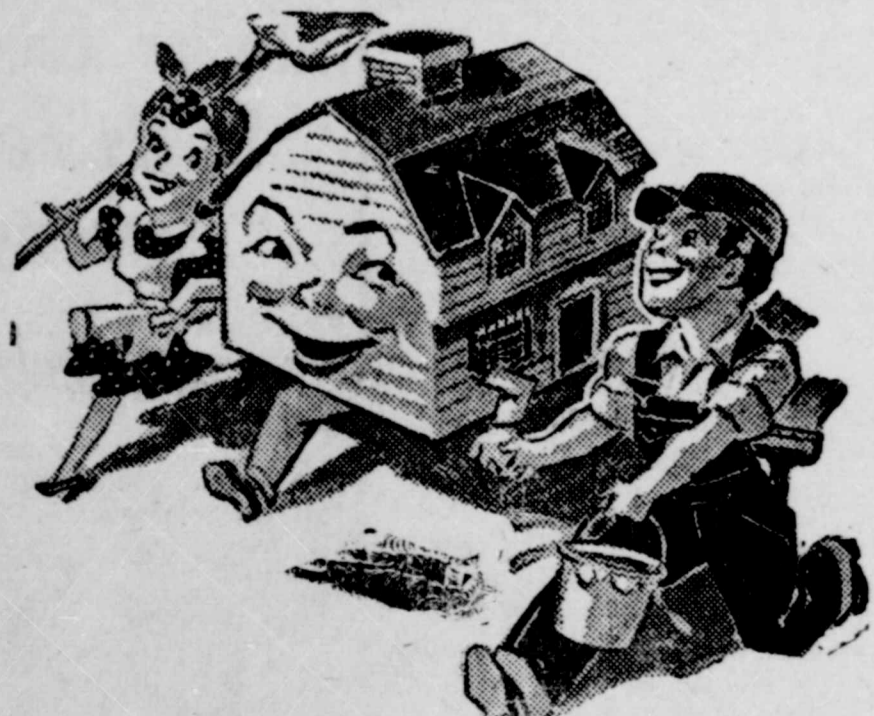

Frank Norris, the novelist once declared, "There are three romantic cities in the United States—New York, New Orleans and, pre-eminently, San Francisco." Mr. Norris, being from San Francisco, was perhaps a bit biased—but certainly New Orleans is romantic a-plenty.

SABOTEURS IN TEXAS

Thousands of Texans are paying from 250 to 500 per cent interest and, in trying to keep up these heavy payments to a loan shark, they borrow from a second, a third and a fourth one.

Many of these borrowers are employed in plants that are producing war materials or supplies that are indirectly needed in national defense. Worried by financial troubles, a workman may operate a valuable machine in such a way that it may be damaged or disabled. Certainly such a worker is not in a frame of mind conducive to maximum production. Too, laws are liable to creep into his products—flaws that may cost the life of an American soldier or sailor.

So the loan sharks are, in effect, saboteurs undermining the morale of thousands of Texans in war-time and weakening our war effort.

Spreading Of Gloom Form Of Sabotage

Austin Texas Feb 2.—"Indulging in worry and spreading gloom is a form of sabotage" Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today in commenting on the necessity for cheerfulness and courage in face of our national crisis.

Doctor Cox asserted that failure to rise and meet our difficulties with determination and cheerfulness will undermine our national strength more seriously than can the enemy acting from without. It has been proved in industry that a gloomy, worried mental state in conductive to accidents, and the President has issued a proclamation deploring the reduction of accidental injuries as essential to national strength, Dr. Cox stated.

Your state health department stresses a warning against worry that is carried to the extreme. If you notice a growing tendency to worry, try by the exercise of your own will to stop this futile, devitalizing habit, he urged.

Doctor Cox pointed out that these are troubled times and it is

natural that we should feel concern about national affairs. It is one thing, he pointed out, to feel this concern and do whatever we can that may be constructive in solving our difficulties, but it is worse than folly he added, to abandon ourselves to the ravages of worry and fear.

SCHOOL STUDENTS GIVEN TRY IN DEFENSE

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. —High school students in Texas will be given an opportunity to participate in a vital part of the U. S. Navy training program by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox.

Under a new plan, 500,000 aircraft models—10,000 models each of 50 different types of fighting planes—will be needed for training personnel in aircraft recognition, range estimation in gunnery practice and civilian defense training. The Navy soon will call on Texas students to build at least 20,000 of them.

The United States office of Education, which will administer the program, will send letters outlining the plan to state superintendents within the next few days. The first set of working

drawings will be in the hands of cooperating schools by Feb. 23.

The models will be made on a precise scale of 1 to 72—one inch on the model represents 6 feet on the actual airplane. The same proportion holds true as to distance; a model seen at 35 feet is identical with the true airplane seen at just under half a mile.

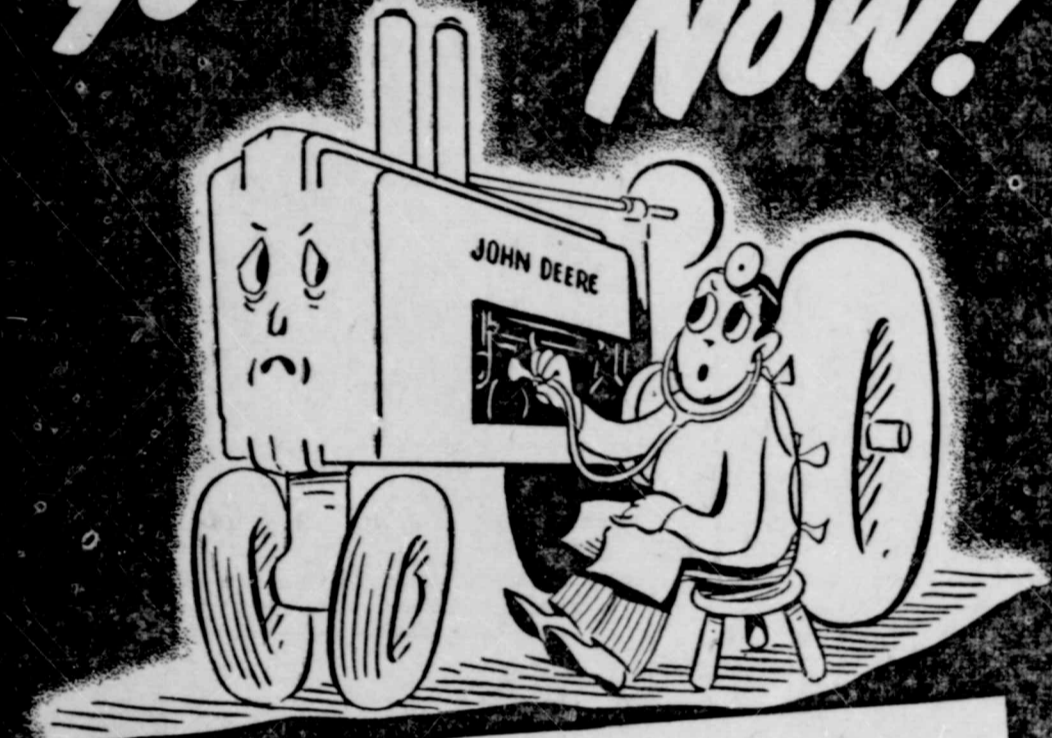

Irish Potatoes In This Section

If you have had trouble in getting Irish potatoes to grow, try these suggestions offered by Mr. and Mrs. Blake Reynolds of Seminole who have been successful in growing potatoes.

Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds raised enough potatoes last year for the family's use from the latter part of May through December. But this was not unusual for they have potatoes every year.

They have found the Irish Cobbler to be the variety best suited for this section and best for storing. They usually plant the potatoes the middle or latter part of March. "We always have our first potatoes for Blake's birthday dinner on May 28," stated Mrs. Reynolds.

To get a good yield, Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds suggest preparing the soil carefully by pulverizing and applying fertilizer. To have stronger plants, they cut the seed potatoes into pieces half the size of a hen egg, then plant, eye up, 14 inches apart in rows that are at least three feet wide.

Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds suggest further keep the soil wet, clean and worked, but don't disturb the

rootst by hoeing or working while the potatoes are making.—Seagraves Reporter.
